REPORT ON WORK OF THE WHITE ESTATE:

Arthur L.White, reporting concerning the work of the E.G. White Estate, brought out many interesting facts. During the past year, as a result of the campaign to increase the circulation of the E.G.White books, 12,000 more copies of these books were placed in Seventh-day Adventist homes than during the preceding year. Approximately 1700 sets of the nine-volume set of "Testimonies" and from 1800 to 2800 each of the five books of the "Conflict" series were sold, and 828 sets of the newly published "Selections from the Testimonies."

Several new editions made their appearance in foreign languages during the past year, among them "Ministry of Healing" in abridged form in the Ilocana and Payayan dialects of the Philippines; "Christian Experience and Views" in the Urdu dialect of India; a volume of selections from the "Testimonies" in the Czech language, and the book "Education" in the Portuguese.

The work of the White Estate at St. Helena was bound off December 31, 1937, and all the materials shipped to Washington, where they are now housed in the vault of the General Conference building. The name of the organization has been changed to "Ellen G. White Publications, Incorporated."

Brother White in concluding his report, called attention to the fact that there are many now in our churches, who have joined us in recent years, who have but a meager knowledge of the place of the Spirit of prophecy in our movement, and suggested that a solution might be found in the proper instructing of the young people in our schools, the education of new converts in this line, and continuous efforts to increase the circulation and reading of the Spirit of prophecy books.

ABRIDGED EDITION OF "GREAT CONTROVERSY":

F.M.Wilcox and A.L.White called attention to a request that has come from the field for an abridged edition of "Great Controversy and the suggestion that an abridgement might be made, bringing out the last half of the large book in subscription book form, to be sold at a medium price to the public, but not to take the place of the large book among our own people, the full book being obtainable in the trade edition. It was

VOTED, That the Chair appoint a committee to give study to this question and make recommendation.

THE DEVOTIONAL SERVICE:

Elder L. H. Christian, in the devotional service beginning at 8:30 A.M., spoke on the spiritual value of the second advent idea. A deep, personal, longing love for the appearing of Jesus should abide in the hearts of our people. We would then be joyful in the thought of His soon coming. Four important results would follow: (1) A great personal testing. (2) A mighty incentive to holiness. (3) An impelling power to missionary endeavor. (4) A strong bond of Christian unity. In "Early Writings," page 58, is the instruction: "Live and act wholly in reference to the coming of the Son of man." Our people are to be led not only to believe and talk of the signs of His coming, but personally to love His appearing.

Earnest prayers were offered by W. K. Ising and A. W. Peterson.

The business of the Council was commenced at 9 A.M., with W.H.Branson as Chairman.

COMMITTEE ON CALENDAR OF SPECIAL DAYS, CAMPAIGNS, AND OFFERINGS, 1939:

VOTED, That the Chair appoint a committee to bring in a report on Special Days, Campaigns, and Offerings for the year 1939.

Appointed: E. D. Dick, W. H. Williams, J. A. Stevens, W. H. Bergherm, A. E. Nelson, M. A. Hollister, W. B. Mohr.

LOCATION OF AND ATTENDANCE AT AUTUMN COUNCIL:

The committee appointed to bring in recommendation as to location of the Autumn Council sought advice in this matter. After some discussion, it was--

VOTED, That the Chair appoint a committee to bring in recommendation as to location of the Autumn Council, also specifically designating classes—of individuals who should be invited to attend.

Committee appointed: M. N. Campbell, union conference presidents, W. E. Nelson, and E. D. Dick.

PLANS FOR THE GENERAL CONFERENCE SESSION:

J. L. McElhany explained the need of giving early attention to plans for the General Conference session, in order to make preliminary arrangements for use of an auditorium, as well as to give study to departmental conventions to be held at the time of the session. There was an expression of feeling that the holding of departmental conventions during the time of the session caused too congested a program, also that in the interests of economy and to facilitate the carrying on of business it would be well to limit the attendance.

Recess was taken from 10:40 to 10:50 A.M.

Following the intermission, J. L. McElhany spoke further concerning plans for the General Conference session, emphasizing the need of this meeting representing the interests of the cause around the world, also that it be a great forward movement in an endowment of spiritual power.

There followed an open and full discussion of plans for and objectives of such a meeting.

VOTED, To ask the Officers of the General Conference to give careful study to plans for the General Conference session in 1940, to take up correspondence with the fields abroad, and to bring in recommendations to the Autumn Council: with the understanding that in studying this question the Officers shall give serious consideration to the elimination of large departmental conventions or institutes in connection with the General Conference session.

VOTED. That the item of whether or not there shall be exhibits at the coming General Conference session also be given consideration by the Officers.

FINANCE COMMITTEE'S REPORT:

A report was presented from the Finance Committee, which being amended was adopted as follows:



* SUSTENTATION RECEIPTS

FOR SUPPORT OF PERMANENTLY RETURNED WORKERS:

On July 21, 1937, the General Conference Committee voted that up to 5 % of sustentation receipts be set aside for carrying the salary of workers returned permanently from foreign mission service until such time as they can be placed and for making final settlement with such workers when necessary. Inasmuch as the fund thus created is larger than needed,

We recommend. That the percentage of sustentation receipts set aside for workers permanently returned from foreign mission service be reduced from 5 % to 3 %, and that any amount in excess of \$10,000 remaining in the Permanently Returned Workers' Fund revert at the close of each year to the Sustentation Fund.

REDUCTION IN NUMBER OF OFFERINGS:

We recommend, 1. That no deviation from our general denominational policy and plan for raising mission funds be made by either union or local conferences without action of the General Conference Committee.

We recommend, 2. That the Vice-President for the North American Division, the Treasurer of the General Conference, the union conference presidents of North America, and H. T. Elliott, be appointed as a committee to study the possibility of lessening the number of mission offerings during the year either by combinations or otherwise, and report to this meeting.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE
ON ABRIDGED EDITION OF "GREAT CONTROVERSY":

The committee appointed to give study to the proposal of an atridged edition of "Great Controversy" for subscription sale, submitted a report which with certain changes was adopted as follows:

WHEREAS, The publishers of "Great Controversy" in the United States, realizing the increasing importance of greatly augmenting the sale of the book, are at the present time making investment and taking steps to materially extend its circulation; and

WHEREAS. An abbreviation of the book, as suggested, would omit the historical background, which is of inestimable value in providing for a better understanding of the more important latter chapters in the book, thus failing in giving to the readers a philosophy of history which is needed today as never before;

We recommend, 1. That the consideration of an abridged English subscription edition of "Great Controversy" be postponed.

In view of the ominous times in which we are entering, and the fact that "Great Controversy" as no other book, carries so vital a message for this hour, given to enlighten the remnant church, and to fortify them against the wiles of the closing days of this earth's history;

We recommend, 2. That very special efforts be put forth to place
"Great Controversy" in Adventist homes now without it, and that we endeavor to
give careful study to its message. As a means to this end, we suggest that
"Great Controversy" be included in the Church Officers' Reading Course for
1939.

[encourage our entire church membership to]

Inasmuch as "Great Controversy" is designed also for wide general circulation by our colporteurs, so presenting the message, and especially the great issues of the threefold message as to bring enlightenment and conviction to hearts;

We further recommend, 3. That our Publishing Department leaders in all parts of the field be urged to greatly encourage the sale of this message-filled book through colporteur channels.

MISSIONS EXTENSION PROJECTS:

VOTED. That the selection of Missions Extension projects for 1939 be referred to the Minority Committee to be dealt with immediately following the Autumn Council.

SABBATH SCHOOL DEPARTMENT RECOMMENDATIONS:

The Sabbath School Department presented a series of recommendations regarding the appointment of union conference Sabbath school secretaries, the continuance of the Department to send promotion material direct to each of the local conferences and missions, and the local conferences to report direct to the General Conference Sabbath School Department as in past years.

VOTED. To refer these recommendations for consideration also to the committee appointed to study the possibility of decreasing the number of mission offerings during the year.

Adjournment was taken at 12:15 P.M.

ATTENDANCE AT AUTUMN COUNCIL:

The committee appointed to bring in recommendations regarding attendance at Autumn Council presented its report, which was amended and adopted as follows:

We recommend, 1. That the following classes of workers be invited to attend Autumn Councils and sit with the General Conference Committee:

- a. Union Treasurers.
- b. Local Conference Presidents.
- c. That Superintendents of mission fields of the North American Division be invited to attend one Autumn Council between General Conference sessions, preferably the biennial session.
 - d. Union Negro Secretaries.
- e. Such other persons as may be specially invited by the General Conference Committee.
- 2. That the privilege of voting be extended only to the above invited classes of workers.

UNION SABBATH SCHOOL SECRETARIES:

The committee requested to give study to the appointment of Union Conference Sabbath School Secretaries presented a report, which was adopted as follows:

WHEREAS, The General Conference principle of organization for the departments in all divisions outside North America includes Sabbath School Secretaries for Union Conferences and Union Missions, and

WHEREAS, The Sabbath school work in North America would be greatly strengthened by secretarial leadership in each of the Union Conferences, therefore,

We recommend, 1. That a Sabbath School Secretary may be appointed in each Union Conference of the North American Division where a suitable person can be found without increasing the salary expense to give general supervision to the Sabbath school work.

- 2. That the General Conference Sabbath School Department continue its present direct promotion with each of the local conferences and missions of the North American Division, and
- 3. That the local conferences of this division continue to report direct to the General Conference Sabbath School Department, as in past years.

REDUCTION IN NUMBER OF OFFERINGS:

The committee to consider decreasing the number of offerings rendered the following report, which was adopted:

We recommend, 1. That, in order to take advantage of the natural time of giving, and yet not have the offerings too close together, the Week of Sacrifice be November 19 - 25, 1939, the Week of Prayer and Annual Offering be December 9 - 16, 1939;

- 2. That in 1938 the Week of Sacrifice be moved from its present date in October, to November 20 26.
 - 3. That the offering for the Translation Fund be eliminated.

COUNCIL FOR EDITORS:

J. L.McElhany made a statement regarding the need for greater care on the part of our editors that nothing be published which would bring our work into disrepute in the eyes of any government, or lower our denomination in the estimation of people generally. It was pointed out that some things which have appeared in print from our writers in the past have caused embarrassment to our workers and people in countries where there is press censorship. The editors in our denomination have expressed a desire to hold a council at which they could discuss their problems among themselves and with denominational leaders, in an effort to formulate safe policies for the carrying forward of editorial work. It was suggested that book editors as well as periodical editors should attend a meeting of this kind. The consensus of opinion was that this meeting should not be held in connection with Autumn Council. After considerable discussion regarding the need for such a council, it was

VOTED, That we recommend the holding of an editors: council, the details as to time, place, and representation to be referred to the Minority Committee.

COUNSEL TO PUBLIC SPEAKERS:

The necessity of our public speakers exercising extreme care in the statements they make from the pulpit regarding political questions was emphasized by Elder McElhany. A discussion of the question, and the citation of several illustrations of the unfortunate and in some cases disastrous results of unwise sensational advertising of evangelistic meetings,

and indiscrete public references to governmental leaders and policies, led to the decision that an effort should be made to impress our ministers and evangelists with the necessity for extreme caution in these matters. It was suggested that Elder McElhany prepare a written statement, similar to the remarks which he made in opening the discussion, to be circulated among our denominational public speakers.

VOTED, That the chair appoint a committee of three to draw up a short statement, to be used in connection with the statement which Elder McElhany shall prepare, on the necessity of carefulness in public reference to political questions, and that this material be sent to the Union Conference Presidents, with the request that they forward it to the public speakers in their respective territories. Appointed: L. H. Christian, I. H. Evans, M. E. Kern.

CANADIAN WATCHMAN PRESS:

At the time of the Publishing Survey Commission, held just prior to the Spring Committee Meeting, a subcommittee was appointed to study the Canadian Watchman Press situation, and to bring a report direct to the Spring Meeting. The committee, consisting of W. H. Williams, W. E. Nelson, J. H.Cochran, C. G. Maracle, H. A. Shepard, W. B. Ochs, W. G. Turner, F. R. Isaac, M. N. Campbell, and W. P. Elliott, presented the following report, which was adopted:

In view of its inability to operate without incurring heavy indebt-

- We recommend, 1. That the Canadian Watchman Press discontinue its manufacturing and printing operations, and function only as a publishing agency, having its printing and binding and other factory work done on a competitive basis by such concerns as it may choose.
- 2. That the Canadian Union Conference take over the general management of the Canadian Watchman Press, with its factory building and equipment, and arrange for the factory building to be rented according to the following plan:
- a. The front section of the building to be rented at a minimum yearly rental of \$2,000.
- b. The rear half of the factory building, including the north and south wings of the east section, with the pressroom and equipment, to be rented to some suitable person of experience to operate as a printing establishment, at a yearly rental of \$2,400, this arrangement to be covered by a contract safeguarding the interests of the Corporation.
- c. That in turning over the equipment on a rental basis an inventory accompany the contract.
- d. The bindery equipment for hard binding to be sold for \$7,500 and the proceeds applied on the debts of the Canadian Watchman Press.
- e. The houses and farm lands to be disposed of and the proceeds applied as above.

- f. Until sold, all gains from rentals of cottages and lands and factory building to be applied on the Canadian Watchman debts.
- g. The net profits accruing from the operations of the Canadian Watchman Press as a publishing agency, to be applied on its debts.
- h. It is understood that as far as possible the person renting the factory section of the plant will utilize student labor and such of the present employees as can be used to advantage.
- i. That there be an early reappraisal of the assets of the Canadian Watchman Press by the General Conference.
 - j. This plan to take effect not later than July 1, 1938.

LOCATION OF FALL COUNCIL:

VOTED, To favor holding the 1938 Autumn Council in some suitable city in the Middle West, and to refer the final decision as to the exact place to the Minority Committee.

DONALD HUNTER--WASHINGTON SANITARIUM CHAPLAIN:

VOTED, To pass on to Donald Hunter, permanently returned from India, the invitation to connect with the Washington Sanitarium as chaplain and Bible teacher.

F. L. BURKHARDT -- NEBRASKA CONFERENCE FOR TEMPORARY SERVICE:

VOTED, To request the Northern Union and the North Dakota Conference to release F. L. Burkhardt temporarily to connect with the Nebraska Conference as Assistant Field Missionary Secretary, for a period of six months.

ALICE BODINE -- RELEASE FROM CALL TO MINNESOTA:

VOTED, To release Miss Alice Bodine, of Wisconsin, from the call to Minnesota, for church school teaching.

AMERICAN CEREAL FOOD CORPORATION.

The committee appointed to give study to the relationship which the General Conference should sustain to the appeal brought to us by the Stockholders' Protective Committee of the American Cereal Food Corporation, presented its report, which was amended and accepted as follows:

WHEREAS, Brethren Harry S. Beckmer, of South Lencaster, Mass., B. F. Summerour, of Norcross, Ga., Oakley H. Callicott, of Memphis, Tenn., and J. F. Fechtenburg, 2831 West Cheltenham Avenue, Philadelphia, Penna., members of the Stockholders' Protective Committee of the American Cereal Food Corporation, appeared before the General Conference Committee on May 11, 1938, earnestly requesting counsel concerning the perplexing situation in which this corporation finds itself at the present time; and

WHEREAS, It was pointed out by them that it is necessary that certain creditors of the corporation be paid and said corporation reorganize in order to save it from bankruptcy; and

WHEREAS, It seems impossible for this "Stockholders' Protective Committee" to raise sufficient funds to meet the requirements of the corporation within the limited time available; and

WHEREAS, This industry has proven to be a great asset to the Atlantic Union College, of South Lancaster, Mass., by furnishing remunerative employment to a large number of students who otherwise could not have attended college; and

WHEREAS, The closing of the factory of this corporation would greatly affect the attendance as well as the income of said Atlantic Union College.

We recommend, 1. That the plan proposed by the representative of the Atlantic Union Conference of Seventh-day Adventists be adopted. This plan provides that the Atlantic Union purchase with available funds \$10,000 worth of first mortgage bonds from the American Cereal Food Corporation.

- 2. That in the plan of reorganization the Atlantic Union Conference president and one other person to be nominated by the Atlantic Union Conference Committee, be chosen as members of the board of directors.
- 3. That all of the present officers of the corporation resign and the new board of directors determine who are to be the future officers.
- 4. That all formal contracts between the corporation and its present officers be annulled.
- 5. That those chosen for official position be members of the Seventh-day Adventist church in good and regular standing.
- 6. That the present holders of promotion stock outstanding in the American Cereal Food Corporation surrender all or a major portion thereof to the Stockholders' Protective Committee. The said stock shall be held in the voting trust until such time as the bonds are paid off by accrued earnings of the corporation, when they will be returned to the treasury for treasury stock.
- 7. That the Officers of the General Conference nominate two persons to be expointed by the General Conference Committee, to collaborate with W. H. Hockman in giving counsel relative to the future work of the American Cereal Food Corporation.
- 8. It is hereby declared that the General Conference assumes no responsibility, financial or otherwise, for this corporation.

Persons appointed to collaborate with W. H. Heckman in giving counsel relative to the future work of the American Cereal Food Corporation: W. H. William and H. H. Votaw.

The meeting closed with prayer by W. K. Ising.

"This Crisis Hour," or the perils of the last days, was the subject of the devotional service, led by W.H.Branson. Paul in the second epistle to Timothy says that in the last days perilous times shall come, --to the church as well as to the world. Ever since the beginning of this message we have expected that the time would come when we would have to carry on the work under pressure of great trial and religious persecution. We are facing that situation in many countries today. However, the greatest danger to the church is not those things from without, but the conditions within, --the loss of faith, the letting down of standards, the creeping in of worldliness. Elder Branson appealed to the workers who will go out to the camp meetings this summer to concentrate on the endeavor to build up the faith and confidence of our people in the great fundamentals of this message. We are in a crisis hour. We face dangers from without and from within. But the message is true, and the Lord will lead it and His people on to final triumph.

A telegram from Dr. Magan conveyed a request from Elder J.L. Shaw that he be remembered in prayer, and earnest prayer was offered in his behalf by Elders Dick and McElhany.

PRAYER FOR THOSE IN OTHER LANDS:

As the business part of the session was begun, a suggestion was made that it might be helpful if an article could be published in the Review, calling the attention of our people in America to the hardships and trials through which many of our brethren and sisters in other lands are passing. It was

VOTED, To ask J.L.McElhany to prepare an article for the Review, calling upon our people throughout North America to pray especially for our suffering brethren and sisters in other lands.

MISSION FUNDS:

The Treasurer referred to the report on the Forty-cent-a-week Fund for the thirteen weeks ending March 26, 1938. Last year the per capita contributed was 14½ cents. This year it is 15 cents. The total increase is \$19,590. He also calked attention to the fact that last year was our banner year, in North America, in the amount of tithe paid, more tithe having been paid than in any other year in our history.

CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP DAY FOR 1938:

VOTED, To set December 31 as Christian Stewardship Day for the year 1938.

BASIS OF AWARDING SABBATH SCHOOL PENNANTS TO CONFERENCES:

The Sabbath School Department called attention to the fact that by action of the General Conference Committee the financial goal for the white membership is set at an average of twenty-five cents per week per member, while the goal for the Negro membership is set at an average of twenty cents. Therefore it is impossible for a conference to get a Sabbath school pennant on the present basis of an average of twenty-five cents per week for the whole conference membership, even though both white and colored churches reach the goal that has been set. It was

WOTED, That a Sabbath School Department pennant be awarded to any conference or mission in the North American Division when its white membership reaches the goal of twenty-five cents per member, and its Negro membership reaches the goal of twenty cents per member.

CAMP MEETINGS:

Some time was spent in a discussion of the question of improving our methods of conducting camp meetings. Among the points emphasized were: The need of proper organization by conference officials before the meeting begins. A definite burden for souls on the part of all the workers. The importance of planning definitely for special revival services. The necessity of guarding against turning the meeting into a mere Chautauqua, but rather of holding it to its original purpose, that of a gathering for spiritual uplift, Modification of the heavy program of meetings, in order that there may be time for quiet meditation and for personal work.

SPECIAL AND EMERGENCY APPROPRIATIONS:

VOTED, That in harmony with our regular policy, all requests for special appropriations be referred to the Autumn Council, except those that are considered to be of an emergency nature, and that the Minority Committee be asked to deal with such.

GENERAL CONFERENCE HELP FOR OVERSEAS DIVISIONS:

VOTED, To refer to the Minority Committee all requests for General Conference help for overseas divisions.

HARVEST INGATHERING -- INDIVIDUAL GOALS:

VOTED, To refer to the Minority Committee the setting of the individual goals for the Harvest Ingathering campaign.

"REVIEW AND HERALD" -- PROMOTION PLAN:

W.P. Elliott introduced the question of a regular, systematic plan for the promotion of the circulation of our church organ, the Review and Herald. In view of the small increase in the circulation of the Review, in comparison with the growth in membership, it is evident that many new members are not benefitting by the unifying influence of our denominational church paper. It was felt that a permanent promotion plan should be inaugurated for bringing before our people regularly the importance of every Seventh-day Adventist family having the Review and Herald. It was

VOTED, That this matter be referred to the officers for the appointment of a representative committee, with a view to bringing a definite recommendation to the Autumn Council.

COORDINATING COMMITTEE:

At the last Autumn Council a large commission was appointed to give study to the unification and coordination of the work of the North American Division publishing houses, and to various phases of the publishing work. This commission has just held a meeting here in Washington, and they submit for approval of this Committee a standing Coordinating Committee that they have appointed.

VOTED, That we approve of the following Coordinating Committee on Publishing Interests, as appointed by the Publishing Survey Commission: M.N.Campbell, chairman, C.E. Weaks, E.E. Franklin, and the manager and treasurer of each of the following publishing houses: Pacific Press, Review and Herald, Southern Publishing Association.

INTERNESHIPS FOR EXPERIENCED WORKERS FROM OTHER DENOMINATIONS:

Attention was called to the fact that now and then young men join our ranks, who have had experience in the ministry in other denominations, and it is desirable that before being taken on as regular workers they should have opportunity to demonstrate their calling to the ministry in this denomination. It was felt that if they can qualify in all other respects, ministerial interneship should be granted if applied for, but in view of the previous experience the interneship need not be for the full two-year term. It was therefore

May 16, 1938

VOTED, That where a worker makes application for ministerial interneship after a period of service in another denomination, if otherwise he qualifies under the interneship plan, he be granted one year's interneship instead of two; and that the one year be at the first year's salary rate.

H.D. ISAAC -- PERMANENT RETURN:

VOTED, That we authorize the permanent return of H.D. Isaac from Jamaica.

JOSEPH CAPMAN -- HINSDALE SANITARIUM:

VOTED, To pass on to the Atlantic Union the call from the Lake Union for Joseph Capman, of Bermuda, to connect with the Hinsdale Sanitarium as chaplain.

C.O.BAILEY -- PERMANENT RETURN:

VOTED, That on recommendation of the China Division, the return of C.C.Bailey from China be changed from the furlough to the permanent return basis.

The Spring Meeting adjourned at 12:30 P.M.
