FREIGHT ON CLOTHING TO MARTINIQUE:

Request having been received from the president of the Caribbean Union Conference for a supply of discarded clothing that might be suitable for use by destitute people in the islands of Martinique and Guadeloupe, and the Home Missionary Department having signified their willingness to make a collection of such clothing, if the cost of transportation could be met, it was

VOTED, To meet from the Emergency Fund the cost of transportation both to the port and from the port to the Caribbean field, of such clothing as may be collected for the people of Martinique and Guadeloupe.

COLLEGE OF MEDICAL EVANGELISTS--APARTMENT HOUSE:

Request was presented from the Board of the College of Medical Evangelists for approval of the purchase of an apartment house, to help in providing housing facilities for workers connected with the College. Such a house is available near by and can be secured for \$9,000.

VOTED, That we approve of the purchase of the said apartment house by the College of Medical Evangelists.

UNION COLLEGE--SCIENCE BUILDING:

Request was presented from the Central Union on behalf of Union College, for approval of the erection of a science building, at a cost of approximately \$100,000. It was

VOTED, That we approve of the endeavor of Union College to secure funds for financing the erection of a science building with the understanding that they will proceed with the construction of the building only as the funds are in hand.

LA SIERRA COLLEGE--LIBRARY BUILDING:

Request was presented from the Pacific Union on behalf of La Sierra College, for approval of the erection of a library building, at an estimated cost of \$75,000. Building plans have been submitted to the Building Plans Committee and approved.

VOTED, That we approve of the erection of a library building at La Sierra College, with the understanding that they will proceed with the construction of the building only as the funds are in hand.

TEMPERANCE FILM:

Consideration was given to the question of the production of a temperance film in full color, with sound effects. There was general agreement as to the educational value of such a film, and that if a good one were produced there would be no question regarding the demand for its use. It is estimated that the film will cost \$3,000, and that copies may be made available at \$75 each. Information was given that the Pacific Union is willing to contribute \$500 toward meeting the cost of the film.

VOTED, That we authorize the production of a temperance film, that we ask J.F.Wright while he is on the Pacific Coast to make some investigation concerning the matter, and that the Committee on Mission and Evangelistic Films take responsibility of collaborating with F.C.Carrier and others in connection with the production of the film.

VOTED, That F.C.Carrier be authorized to spend the month of July on the Pacific Coast, assisting with the preparation of the temperance film.

PACIFIC PRESS--REMODELING:

Request was presented from the Pacific Press Board for approval of a remodeling project, which will provide a two-story building, with a chapel below having a seating capacity of 400 to 450, and offices above for the editorial staff, at an estimated cost of \$100,000. This will make possible the enlargement and more satisfactory rearrangement of the factory. The necessary funds are in hand.

VOTED, That we approve of the plans as submitted by the Pacific Press Board for a remodeling of the publishing house.

BATTLE CREEK COLORED CHURCH:

Request was presented from the Lake Union and the Michigan Conference for approval of a plan for remodeling a building to make a suitable place of worship for the colored church in Battle Creek, at a cost of \$5,000, to be provided by the church, and the union and local conference.

VOTED, That we approve of the plan suggested for providing a church building for the colored church in Battle Creek.

PAUL KNUDSEN--SUPPORT:

VOTED, That we request the East Nordic Union, on behalf of the Northern European Division, to continue the support of Paul Knudsen, who is now in Sweden.

VALLEJO (CALIFORNIA) CHURCH:

Request was presented from the Pacific Union on behalf of the Northern California Conference for approval of the erection of a new church building for the church at Vallejo. They have been given an estimate of \$25,000 for a building with a seating capacity of 427. The church has \$18,000 in hand. Giving consideration to the proposition, it was felt that the estimate is entirely too low for a building of the size suggested, and it was

VOTED, To call this to the attention of the Northern California Conference, and that we counsel that additional funds be arranged for before proceeding with the building project.

MEDICAL TRAINING IN CHINA:

The officers in counsel with G.J.Appel, N.F.Brewer, Drs. H.M.Walton and W.E.Macpherson, and F.Griggs, had given consideration in Chicago at the time of the Spring Meeting to the question of medical education in China, and in harmony with a recommendation brought to the Committee by the officers as the result of their counsel together, it was

VOTED, That while we do not see any practicability of establishing a medical school in China at the present time, we encourage the brethren in that division to strengthen the pre-medical course offered in their existing institution, so that our young men who go out from the school may have such recognition as will be to their advantage in arranging for medical training in an outside institutions.

In the light of information that has come to us from Brethren Longway and Appel concerning prospects for affiliation, we recognize that there seem to be very material difficulties in the way of this being accomplished. We would recommend, however, that the China Division continue to explore every possi-

bility of seeking satisfactory affiliation with some recognized medical school, and that with this in view we suggest that in seeking such affiliation we stand ready to supply a teacher to help in the work of the school, as was done by the division when Dr. Dale connected in such a program with St. John's Medical College.

E.W.STORING--EXTENSION OF FURLOUGH:

VOTED, That inasmuch as his health condition is still unsatisfactory, E.W.Storing of Jamaica be granted an extension of his furlough to June 30.

J.E.WEAVER TO VISIT HAITI:

VOTED, That in response to the request of the Inter-American Division, J.E.Weaver be authorized to visit the Haitien Mission, May 8-18, to join in laying plans for the training school and the development of the educational work in that field

COMMISSION TO VISIT SELF-SUPPORTING INSTITUTIONS:

VOTED, That J.E.Weaver and F.A.Mote, and a representative of the General Conference Treasury, be added to the commission appointed to visit the self-supporting institutions in the South, the members previously appointed being, W.G.Turner, H.T.Elliott, H.A.Morrison, and Dr. H.M.Walton.

M.L.ANDREASEN:

VOTED, That in view of M.L.Andreasen's condition of health, we agree to the arrangement made with him by the Theological Seminary Board, to teach three terms instead of full time during a two-year period, and that we authorize him to make his home in California, carrying on his writing and meeting camp-meeting and other appointments from there when he is not teaching at the Seminary.

W.H.ANDERSON--VISIT TO SOUTHERN ASIA:

VOTED, That we approve of the plan, if it can be worked out between the Southern Asia and Southern African Divisions, for W.H.Anderson to respond to the request of the Southern Asia Division to visit that field between November, 1944, and March of next year.

G.E.SHANKEL--PERMANENT RETURN:

VOTED, That because of unfavorable health conditions, the return of G.E.Shankel from the Southern African Division be changed from the furlough to the permanent return basis.

Prayer by F.H.Robbins. Minutes of the meetings of April 3 and 7 were approved.

47th GENERAL HOSPITAL--APPROPRIATION:

A letter was read from Dr. Ben Grant, Commanding Officer of the 47th General Hospital, now located in New Guinea, in which request was made for funds with which to purchase a number of twenty-four inch electric fans, and some other equipment that would add greatly to the well-being and comfort of the hospital staff. This is equipment that the government does not furnish. The letter expressed appreciation for what had been done by the General Conference in supplying means for some special equipment as the hospital staff was starting overseas.

VOTED, To appropriate \$2,404 from the Emergency Fund to the 47th General Hospital, for the purchase of a number of electric fans and some other desirable equipment.

VOTED, That it be understood that the General Conference shall retain ownership of the equipment covered by this action, as well as that previously provided for, with the thought of its being turned over to the Australasian Division or used in some other way when the 47th General Hospital is through with it.

CANADIAN UNION--HOUSES FOR UNION WORKERS:

A letter was read from H.L.Rudy, calling attention to the impossibility of securing proper living quarters in Oshawa for all the workers connected with the union headquarters staff, and requesting approval of the erection of two dwelling houses

on land owned by the union in Oshawa. The cost of the two houses will not exceed \$10,000, and the union has money in hand that can be used for this purpose.

VOTED, That we approve of the erection of two dwelling houses in Oshawa, as proposed by the Canadian Union Conference.

COMMITTEE ON EAST ASIA --\$207:

In response to a request received from the Foreign Missions Conference, it was

VOTED, To make a special appropriation of \$207 to the Committee on East Asia for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1944.

LOCATION OF FRENCH LANGUAGE PROJECT:

After careful consideration of the question of the best place to locate the ten families under appointment for the study of the French language, it was

VOTED, That these families be brought to Takoma Park, and that the French Language Project be connected with the Theological Seminary, along with the Russian, Arabic and German groups already located here.

DR. M.G.ANDERSON--TROPICAL MEDICINE:

VOTED, That Dr. M.G.Anderson, under appointment to South Africa, be authorized to take the short course in Tropical Medicine offered at Tulane University.

DR. A.E.COYNE--SHORT COURSE IN SURGERY:

VOTED, That Dr. A.E.Coyne, under appointment to India, be authorized to take the short course in surgery offered at Columbia University, May 15-22.

R.E.SPANGLE--CUBA:

VOTED, To request the Northern Union and the North Dakota Conference to release R.E.Spangle, to connect with the Inter-American Division, for missionary service in the East Cuba Conference.

DR. J.M.COX--RIVERSIDE SANITARIUM:

VOTED, That Dr. J.M.Cox, who is in the employ of the General Conference, be located at the Riverside Sanitarium, and his services be available to that institution when he is not itinerating in the field.

VOTED, To invite Dr. F.G.Strong, of England, to connect with the Gopalganj Hospital, in the Southern Asia Division.

DR. SAMUEL H. PHANG--CHUNGKING:

VOTED, That Dr. Samuel H.Phang, under appointment to return to China, be assigned to the Chungking Sanitarium and Hospital.

DR. WINSTON G.NETHERY--YENCHENG:

VOTED, That Dr. Winston G.Nethery, under appointment to return to China, be assigned to the Yencheng Sanitarium and Hospital.

H.H.HICKS--LATIN AMERICAN RADIO COMMISSION:

VOTED, That H.H.Hicks be hereby appointed a member of the Latin American Radio Commission.

DR. T.R.FLAIZ--MAYO CLINIC:

VOTED, That Dr. T.R.Flaiz, under appointment to India and expecting now to sail in June since he did not succeed in getting on the April boat, be authorized to spend the intervening time at the Mayo Clinic.

VOTED, That the Educational Department be authorized to arrange for A.E.Axelsson, of Maplewood Academy, to come to Washington for textbook committee work this summer.

SOUTHWESTERN JUNIOR COLLEGE--BOYS' DORMITORY:

Request was presented from the Southwestern Union Conference for approval of the erection of a boys' dormitory, at Southwestern Junior College, to replace the building recently destroyed by fire. It is estimated that the building will cost \$100,000. The union has submitted a plan for financing the undertaking which will care for \$75,000 of the cost, and they are requesting an appropriation of \$25,000 from the General Conference.

VOTED, That we approve of the plan for financing the rebuilding of the boys' dormitory at Southwestern Junior College, with the understanding that the work of construction will proceed only as the funds are in hand.

VOTED, To appropriate \$25,000 from the Emergency Fund to Southwestern Junior College, to apply on the cost of rebuilding the boys' dormitory.

INGATHERING WATCHMAN:

In view of the need, as presented by the Home Missionary Department, for additional papers in the field for carrying on the Ingathering campaign, it was

VOTED, That the Southern Publishing Association be approached to discover whether it is feasible within their allotment of paper, to print another 100,000 copies of the Ingathering Watchman, and that if it is feasible, that they be authorized to do so.
