Information was given that there is great need for more help in the Philippines in the consideration of problems connected with the work of reconstruction, and also of some one to make contacts with officials with reference to securing for our institutions in the Orient some of the war surplus materials that are to be disposed of in Manila. In view of this situation, it was

VOTED, To request L.F.Bohner, who is under appointment to the Malayan Union, to go forward to the Philippines as soon as transportation can be secured, to assist in the emergency situation there for a few months before proceeding to Malaya.

Consideration was also given to L.F.Bohner's family situation, which has caused some uncertainty in his mind with reference to accepting the call to return to the mission field at this time. It was

VCTED, That if by the end of a year it seems unwise for L.F.Bohner's family to follow him to Malaya, he shall be returne to the homeland for placement here.

Resolved, That a temporary account be opened in the name of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists in the Old Kent Bank, in Grand Rapids, Michigan, and that the said bank be, and hereby is, authorized to honor the signatures of W.E.Nelson, Treasurer, and/or W.H.Williams, Undertreasurer, and/or H.H.Cobba: Assistant Treasurer, on checks drawn against this account.

PURCHASE OF SURPLUS WAR MATERIALS:

The Committee on the Purchase of Surplus War Materials submitted a list of equipment and materials they felt to recommend for the China and Far Eastern Divisions.

VOTED, That our representatives in the Philippines be authorized to purchase the items recommended by the committee, for the China and Far Eastern Divisions, if these are offered for sale in Manila at what they consider a reasonable price.

VOTED, That the Southern Asia Division Committee be authorized to purchase any surplus war materials offered for sale in New Delhi, India, that may be of use in the rehabilitation of our work in Burma.

SKODSBORG SANITARIUM:

Request was presented from P.G.Nelson, of the West Nordi-Union, for assistance in connection with the rehabilitation of the Skodsborg Sanitarium, which was used as a military hospital during the German occupation of Denmark. While they hope to get some compensation, they will not receive enough to cover all the damage and restore their losses. They ask for an appropriation from the General Conference of \$40,000 for this purpose, with th request that they be permitted to draw on mission funds being he in the West Nordic Union for part of it, the remainder to be use in the purchase of a list of items they have designated to be se cured here and sent to them.

VOTED, To appropriate \$40,000 from the Rehabilitation Fund for the rehabilitation of the Ekodsborg Sanitarium, with the understanding that from this amount certain supplies which they have requested will be secured for them as far as possible, and that they are authorized to draw on mission funds in the West Nordic Union for that part of the appropriation which they will use in the rehabilitation of the building.

CHURCH SCHOOL BUILDING -- DULUTH:

Request was presented from the Northern Union on behalf of the Minnesota Conference, for approval of the erection of a church school building for the Duluth church, at an estimated cost of \$7,500, the necessary funds being in hand.

VOTED, That we approve of the erection of a church school building for the Duluth church, as proposed by the Minnesota Conference.

SOUTHERN MISSIONARY COLLEGE --- BROOM SHOP MATERIAL:

Request was presented from the Southern Union on behalf of Southern Missionary College, for authorization to borrow from organizations within the union, up to \$30,000, for the purchase of the broom corn required by their broom factory.

VOTED, That we give authorization for Southern Missionary College to borrow up to \$30,000, with which to purchase the material required for their broom factory, it being understood that the loan will be liquidated within six months.

BASIC FREEDOMS:

C.B. Haynes presented the draft of a statement on religiou liberty, prepared by the committee that was appointed to draw up such a statement for presentation to the Commission on Basic Freedoms, of the United Nations Organization, and the remainder of the time was spent in a consideration of part of this document, until 12 o'clock, when the Committee recessed, to meet again at 1:30 P.M.

On reassembling at 1:30, consideration of the manuscript was resumed, and after full discussion, it was

VOTED, That C.B. Haynes, L.E. Froom, L.L. Moffitt, H.H. Votaw and J.I. Robison be a committee to make a final draft of the document, incorporating the suggestions made during the discussion.

VOTED, That this committee be authorized to prepare at least fifty copies, to be bound in leather, for presentation to the members of the Commission on Basic Freedoms of the United Nations Council, and to other members of the United States Government and the United Nations Council, and that sufficient copies be orinted for distribution to the press, both religious and secular.

APPENDIX:

VOTED, That the committee be instructed to transfer the matter on the relation of religion to war, to the Appendix, with the historical citations following each reference.

CHURCH INTERFERENCE IN GOVERNMENT:

VOTED, That there be included in the manuscript a statement to the effect that we also disapprove of religious organizations interfering in matters of state, as well as the state interfering in religious affairs.

Request was presented from the Pacific Union for approval of the erection of an elementary school building in connection with the Glendale Union Academy, at an estimated cost of \$60,000,75% of the amount being in hand.

VOTED, .That we approve of the erection of the elementary school building as proposed in connection with the Glendale Unior Academy.

ARIZONA ACADENY AND ELEMENTARY SCHOOL:

Request was presented from the Pacific Union on behalf of the Arizona Conference for approval of a building for the Arizona Academy and elementary school, at a cost of between \$55,000 and \$60,000. They have more than 75% of the funds in hand; and assurance is given that the project will be completed without incurring any indebtedness.

CHINA DIVISION ORGANIZATION:

The committee that was appointed on the question of leadership for the China field, submitted the following recommendations, which were adopted:

WHEREAS, The work in China is entering upon a period when comprehensive study should be given to its reorganization and rehabilitation by a responsible committee representative of its many interests; and,

WHEREAS, For a period of years the work in China has been under divided direction and in the immediate future a unification of leadership should be effected; and,

WHEREAS, One of the major tasks of planning for the work in China is the restaffing of the field, which will involve the appointing of former workers and the recruiting of new workers in this country; and,

WHEREAS, The General Conference session is only a few months distant, at which time it will be possible to elect the permanent leadership for China with adequate representation from the field in attendance; therefore,

We recommend, That during the period from the time of the adoption of this action until the next session of the General Conference, there be set up at General Conference headquarters an executive committee for the China Division, to have general

charge of the China work; and that in China there be a committee on the field to carry forward the work under the direction of the executive committee provided above.

In harmony with the above plan,

We recommend, The appointing of the following leadership to serve the China Division until the time of the General Conference session:

President: J.L.McElhany. Secretary: N.F.Brewer.

Executive Committee: Officers of the General Conference, D.E.Rebok, D.M.Waiton, M.D., H.M.Blunden, H.A.Morrison, E.L. Longway, W.I.Hilliard.

The Treasury functions of the committee shall be handled in the General Conference Treasury.

In China:

Vice-Chairman: G.J.Appel. Associate Vice-Chairman: Y.H.Chu. Acting Treasurer: G.J.Appel. Associate Acting Treas: S.J.Lee.

Associate Acting Treas: S.J.Lee.
Committee on the Field: The above officers in China, the workers who would be ex-officio members of the division committee, and Chang Peh An, Chen Ming, Chuan Hsi Tien, James Wang, Su Hsing.

SALARIES IN SOUTH AMERICAN DIVISION:

A committee that was appointed to make recommendations with reference to salaries in the South American Division, submittee the following recommendations, which were adopted:

We recommend, i. That in order to make it possible for our overseas workers in the South American Division to meet the increased cost of living and maintain proper standards of living, the present bonus granted these workers be increased above the basic rate to an amount equal to 25% to 35% according to the cost of living where these workers reside.

- 2. That all bonuses be set by authorization of the General Conference Committee upon recommendation of the Division Administration of the South American Division and payments be made by the General Conference.
- 3. That adjustments made in harmony with the above will be made retroactive from April 1, 1945.

- 4. That the General Conference Treasurer be authorized to provide an appropriation from the Emergency Fund to meet this additional expense called for by these adjustments for 1945.
- 5. That the whole question of payment of overseas workers be referred for study to the General Conference session in 1946.

HUE PRINTS COMMITTEE:

VOTED, That J.A. Stevens be added to the Blue Prints Committee.

NORTH NORWAY -- RELIEF CLOTHING:

VOTED, To allocate up to \$2000 from the Relief Fund to the Relief Clothing Committee, as may be found to be necessary, for the purchase of warm clothing for numbers of our believers in North Norway who are in great need. It is hoped that certain articles of clothing needed can be purchased from surplus war supplies.

COLLEGE OF MEDICAL EVANGELISTS -- BUILDING PROGRAM:

An outline of a building program for the College of Medical Evangelists was submitted from the Board of the College. The program contemplates expansion of the present facilities in Los Angeles, as follows:

- a. To provide increased hospital facilities--"hospital beds" to a total of approximately 400 beds in all.
- b. To provide increased space and facilities for each of the teaching departments, including doctors offices and head-quarters, clinics, laboratories, work rooms, teaching space, etc.

To provide these facilities the erection of the following buildings is proposed: Dormitory; Main Hospital Building; Physical Therapy Building; and buildings for Medical Clinic, Surgery Clinic, Admissions, Pharmacy, Diagnostic Clinic. The total cost is estimated at \$2,751,460.00, and it is understood that the program may require from five to ten years for its completion, decending on the procurement of funds.

VOTED, That we approve of the building program for the College of Medical Evangelists as proposed by the Medical College Board.

MISSICKARY VOLUNTEER COUNCIL:

VOTED, That Miss Grace Coyl be asked to go to Grand Rapids for the Missionary Volunteer Council, in place of Mrs. Marjorie Marsh, who is detained by the illness of her mother.

MR. AND MRS. RAYMOND S.MOORE -- TANGANYIKA:
