SITUATION IN CHINA:

Consideration was given to a letter and cable messages from V.H.Branson with reference to the developing situation in China. Communications between Hong Kong and the Communist held areas are almost entirely cut off, and it is impossible to send foreign funds into the Communist areas. The China Division Committee in Hong Kong, after giving careful consideration to the situation, have submitted a series of recommendations to this Committee for approval, requesting reply by cable. The Committee in Hong Kong also requested that cable be sent to the workers in Shanghai, approving instruction from the Division Committee that all foreign personnel be evacuated from Shanghai, Hankow, and Chiaotoutseng. The recommendations from the China Division Committee are as follows:

Whereas, It now appears that outside contacts with Communist occupied China may soon be entirely severed, thus making it impossible to direct the work in those sections from the Division office in Hong Kong or any place in Nationalist China,

We recommend, 1. That a temporary Provisional Division be set up for the direction of the work in Communist occupied areas of China, including Division institutions within that

territory with headquarters in Shanghai, the same to be known as the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, North China Provisional Division.

2. That the China Division Committee and officers act as counselors to the temporary Provisional Division, and maintain as close contact with their officers and committee as possible.

3. That the following persons be appointed to serve as officers and departmental leaders of the temporary Provisional Division:

> President, Hsu Hwa. Secretary, H.H.Tan. Treasurer, S.T.Wang. Educational Department Secretary, H.C.Shen in connection with his principalship of the ECUA. Home Missionary and Publishing Secretary, Giao Hung Shen. Medical Department Secretary, Dr. H.Liu (to locate at Wuhan Sanitarium). Sabbath School and M.V.Secretary, Chen Ming.

Division Committee Members: Hsu Hwa S.T.Wang, Chen Ming Giao Hung Shen, H.H.Tan, H.C.Shen, Dr. H.Liu, John Oss, Union presidents and vice-presidents of the territory administered by this Division, Dr. Paul Lee, Manager Signs Press, Medical Director Shanghai Sanitarium.

4. That the budget for the areas to be administered by the temporary Provisional Division be turned over to the Shanghai office, including a proportionate share of the Division administration budget, specials, etc.

5. That financial, statistical and departmental reports of the two divisions be correlated for presentation to the General Conference through the Hong Kong office.

6. That the Hong Kong office continue to present the budget requests for the entire China field to the General Conference.

7. The temporary Provisional Division shall, as far as possible, administer the work in the territory over which they have charge in harmony with the policies of the China Division.

VOTED, That the following cable be sent to the China Division Committee in Hong Kong: Committee concurs your plans for Provisional Divisional organization as you have outlined. Have cabled Shanghai that we concur your instructions to evacuate all foreign personnel.

VOTED, That the following cable be sent to the workers in Shanghai: General Conference Committee concurs in Division instructions to evacuate all foreign personnel.

The meeting adjourned, with earnest prayer by Elder McElhany, in behalf of the work and workers in China.

CHINA:

Consideration was given to further communications from China. In reply to our cable to the brethren in Shanghai counseling evacuation of all foreign personnel, a message was received from Claude Miller, Hsu Hwa and E.L.Longway, conveyed through the State Department, again urging that a limited number of missionaries be allowed to remain for the sake of the work and because they believed there was no threat to personal safety.

VOTED, To reply to the brethren in Shanghai, through the State Department, as follows:

"General Conference opinion regarding evacuation unchanged, but recognize privilege of individual decision you understanding likelihood complete severance communications, funds, supplies, and future evacuation facilities. We insist on evauation at first opportunity all with health hazards."

A cable from the China Division officers in Hong Kong reported word from E.L.Longway that the authorities in Shanghai had levied a \$12,000 tax on the Ningkuo Road property for the last half of the year, and that there were indications that other tax demands would be made soon. Brother Longway request ed counsel as to whether to pay the tax or risk losing the property.

Advice having been sought from Mr. Perkins, of the State Department, regarding this matter, it was

August 16, 1949

VOTED, That the following cable be sent to W.H.Branson, in Hong Kong: "State Department officials recommend that counsel be had with Shanghai Consul, also with other mission bodies concerning tax levy. We concur this procedure. Advise us before making any payments."

Request had been received in a former communication from the Division officers at Hong Kong, for counsel with reference to the organization of Hong Kong, Formosa and Macao into a union mission, and the linking of said union with the Far Eastern Division.

VOTED, To reply to this request as follows: "Approve your suggestion re reorganizing South China territory. Avait further developments before deciding turn Hong Kong, Formosa, Macao over to Far East."

TIBET:

A letter was read from W.H.Branson, suggesting that at this time when there is such heavy withdrawal of our forces from China, advantage be taken of what appears to be a providential opportunity for opening the work in Tibet. He suggested that a group of China workers be sent into Tibet, through India, and that the Southern Asia Division administer the undertaking, after the group had been selected by the China Division.

RADIO ADVERTISING OF HARD LIQUORS:

The American Temperance Society reported the introduction of a bill into Congress opposing the advertising of hard liquors over the radio and television. It was

VOTED, To approve of sending the following letter to the chairman of the committee that will consider the bill:

To the Honorable Robert Crosser, Chairman of the Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce. House Office Building.

Honorable Sir:

We, the members of the Executive Committee of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, with headquarters at 6840 Eastern Avenue, N.W., Washington, D.C., assembled in executive session August 25, 1949, unanimously voted to urge the speedy passage of the bill H R 6111, introduced by Congressman Fred L.Crawford of Michigan, to prohibit the use of radio and television in the advertising of distilled spirits, wines or malt beverages.

We oppose this brazen attempt of the distillers to invade our homes with hard liquor advertising and to entertain our children with "fantastic stories of the alleged 'rare' qualities of the distillers' products."

August 25, 1949

Since Schenley's Advertising Department indicates some 200 independent radio broadcasting stations have agreed to broad cast their products, and since there is now no adequate legal control to prevent television and radio broadcasters advertising hard liquors, we respectfully urge the earliest possible passage of this bill to empower the Alcohol Tax Unit of the Bureau of Internal Revenue and the Federal Communications Commission and/or other authorities to act in prohibiting such an invasion of the American home and thereby protect our teen-age Generation from being exploited with hard liquor advertisements.

The evil consequences of the proposed advertising which violates all recognized standards of good moral judgment, if permitted, would further debauch the youth of America in these critical times and outweigh all monetary or business advantages accrued thereby.

We herewith register our strongest possible protest.
