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Cable having been received reporting the serious illness of Dr. E.E.Bottsford, of Bolivia, and mention being made that Elder E.F.Hackman and M.C.Taft were to undergo surgery at the Glendale Sanitarium, these brethren were remembered as prayer was offered by N.F.Brewer and J.W.Turner.

#### BEVERLY BUNNELL---KARACHI HOSPITAL:

VOTED, To invite Miss Beverly Bunnell, of Walla Walla, Washington, to connect with the Southern Asia Division, for nursing service in the hospital that is being established in Karachi.

#### GLENDALE SANITARIUM---LAUNDRY:

Request was presented from the Pacific Union on behalf of the Glendale Sanitarium for approval of the erection of an addition to their store building, to be used as the new laundry. The estimated cost is \$35,000 to \$40,000, and the funds are in hand.

VOTED, That we approve of the erection of the proposed laundry building at the Glendale Sanitarium.

#### SOUTHWESTERN UNION -- CHURCH BUILDINGS:

Request was presented from the Southwestern Union for approval of the erection of a church building at Lubback, Texas, at a cost of \$13,000; and a church building in Corpus Christi, Texas, at a cost of \$25,000. The funds are in hand for both of these building projects.

VOTED, That we approve of the erection of the church buildings in Lubback, Texas, and Corpus Christi, Texas, as proposed.

#### NEW ENGLAND SANITARIUM--CHURCH BUILDING:

Request was presented from the Atlantic Union for approval of the erection of a church building at the New England Sanitarium, at a cost of \$90,000, satisfactory provision having been made for the necessary funds.

VOTED, That we approve of the erection of the proposed church building at the New England Sanitarium.

## REVIVALS IN THE CHURCHES:

VOTED, That all our organizations be urged to lay plans for carrying out as quickly as possible the recommendations adopted by the General Conference Session relative to revival efforts in each church, school and institution around the world.

Two series of recommendations referred by the General Conference in session to the Executive Committee were presented, and adopted as follows:

#### ENLARGED EVANGELISM:

Realizing that the supreme task of the church of God is to give the everlasting gospel of Christ to a perishing world, and believing that the present disturbed and disordered state of civilization challenges the church to arise and finish its Godgiven task, we call for a complete dedication of the ministry to soul-saving endeavor.

Our ministers are called primarily to be soul-winners. The example of the Apostle Paul is worthy of emulation. He journeyed from place to place raising up churches, and afterward he appointed and trained leaders to care for these churches, thus making it possible for him to move on into unentered territory with the gospel.

In view of the challenge of this hour and the call of God to His church,

We recommend, l. That our pastors in charge of our churches be urged to train the laity to assume greater responsibility in the care of the churches in order that they may give their time and efforts to evangelism in new areas.

- 2. That wherever possible, conferences and mission fields hold church officers institutes early in each year to assist church elders and other officers to conduct their work more efficiently.
- 3. That responsible committees make plans for younger workers to gain experience by participation in public evangelism.

4. That in addition to large city evangelistic campaigns which are used as training schools of evangelism, many smaller evangelistic campaigns be conducted which will utilize the soul-winning talents of all ministers.

## WORLD-WIDE VISITATION EVANGELISM: •

WHEREAS, The call for concerted action in finishing the work has been sounded, and this hour summons every member of the church to share his faith by giving God's last warning message to all men; and

WHEREAS, The soul-winning methods of the Saviour, "whose work was largely made up of personal interviews," (Christ's Object Lessons, 229) are to be emulated by every Christian, for the giving "of the third angel's message. ..must be largely accomplished by persevering, individual effort; by visiting the people at their homes," (Historical Sketches, 150); and

WHEREAS, The denominational program of visitation evangelism carried forward in the world field during the mid-century year has opened doors and hearts to the message of truth and has been instrumental in winning many to Christ,

We recommend, l. That two Sabbaths each year, one in the spring and one in the autumn, be set apart for a world-wide denominational visitation crusade sponsored cooperatively by the Home Missionary and Missionary Volunteer Departments.

- 2. That each department advance this crusade under its own designated title using its own methods of promotion and follow-up, and that in this concerted home visitation crusade the departments encourage the adults and youth to utilize the literature and the approach in visitation contact agreed upon for that particular Sabbath.
- 3. That in this world-wide evangelistic effort supreme emphasis be laid upon personal visitation of neighbors "by bringing the truth into their houses, praying with them, and opening to them the Scriptures." (Ellen G.White, Review and Herald, December 8, 1885.)
- 4. That a meeting of each church for the recounting of experiences be conducted following the visitation endeavor.
- 5. That new tracts in color, striking in design and challenging in their message, be prepared by the publishing houses in cooperation with the two departments.
- 6. That in North America on the autumn Sabbath of this visitation crusade church members distribute the special tract prepared by our denomination and the Bible reading bookmark of the American Bible Society.

- 7. That in connection with this house-to-house visitation program, efforts be made to secure enrollments in one of our denomination correspondence schools.
- 8. That we encourage the continuation of the visitation program at other times during the year, making such visitation a part of Missionary Volunteer and missionary institutes, thus endeavoring to reach every home

## MEDICAL EXTENSION SECRETARY:

Some consideration was given to the question as to where it might be best for the Medical Extension Secretary to be located, suggestion having been made that it might be desirable for him to locate in Washington with the other secretaries of the Medical Department, or perhaps at some other point in the East. After considerable discussion, it was

VOTED, That the Medical Extension Secretary be advised to locate in Los Angeles, where it will be possible for him to have close contact with the young men and women through the years of their medical training.

## 1954 GENERAL CONFERENCE SESSION:

VOTED, That a committee be appointed on the location for the 1954 General Conference Session, said committee to report to the Autumn Council.

#### OVERSEAS REQUESTS FOR HELP:

VOTED, To refer to the Home Officers and the Division Presidents all overseas requests for General Conference help.

## PARIS YOUTH'S CONGRESS:

VOTED, That we approve of the recommendation of the Southern European Division, that a Youth's Congress be held in Paris in 1951, the North Atlantic and Central European Divisions being invited to send as many of their young people as may be possible to join the young people of Southern Europe in the Congress, it being understood that each division make financial provision for its delegation.

VOTED, That we approve of a token delegation being sent from North America to the Youth's Congress in Paris, details with reference to the number, etc., being referred to the Committee in Washington.

#### C.B. HAYNES--WAR SERVICE COMMISSION:

VOTED, That C.B. Haynes be appointed secretary of the War Service Commission.

## H.C.HARTMAN---UNION COLLEGE:

VOTED, To pass on to the North Pacific Union Conference and Walla Walla College the call from the Central Union for H.C. Hartman to become president of Union College.

## T.O.WILLEY--FLORIDA:

VOTED, To pass on to the Southwestern Union and the Oklahoma Conference the call from the Southern Union for T.O. Willey to connect with the Florida Conference as Educational and Missionary Volunteer secretary.

## LEE CARTER--OKLAHOMA:

VOTED, To pass on to the Southern Union and the Florida Conference the call from the Southwestern Union for Lee Carter to become Missionary Volunteer and Educational secretary of the Oklahoma Conference.

## R.W.WOODS-LA SIERRA COLLEGE:

VOTED, To pass on to the Central Union Conference and Union College the call from the Pacific Union for R.W.Woods to connect with La Sierra College as dean.

## APPOINTMENTS AND ITINERARIES:

VOTED, That we approve of the following appointments and itineraries:

L.R.Rasmussen, Secondary Beachers' Institute in Pacific Union, August 31 to September 3.

James Chase, Medical Cadet Corps camp, for publicity work, the Central Union and the Colorado Conference being asked to make it possible for him to attend this camp.

W.E.Barr to attend the meeting of the Schools of Nursing Bible Teachers at Angwin, July 23-25, the General Conference to meet salary and entertainment.

G.E. Vandeman, Missouri Conference workers meeting in Kansas City, August 7-9.

#### WAGE SCALE:

The report of a committee that was appointed on the Wage Scale was submitted, and adopted as follows:

We recommend, 1. That the Working Policy, page 138, be amended by replacing the word "uniform" with the word "equitable" The paragraph would then read, "In order that there may be an equitable basis for remuneration of various classes of workers, a denominational wage scale has been adopted which applies in

principle in all the world." (This would of course apply in the first paragraph of the introductory statement in the Wage Scale.)

- 2. That in the present Wage Scale leaflet, page 8, the paragraph following the rates for Ministerial Interns be altered by the deletion of the following words: "And that upon completion of their intern period they be placed at or near the maximum for licensed preachers."
- 3. That between the first and second paragraphs onn-tained on page 2 of the Wage Scale the following paragraph from page 139 of the Working Policy be included:

"It is understood that the committee in each division makes a wage scale for the division in terms of local currency and in harmony with the living costs and standards of the people of their respective territories."

4. That the following become the Wage Scale for the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, effective January 1, 1951:

## SOUTHERN EUROPEAN DIVISION HOME MISSIONARY AND PUBLISHING DEPARTMENTS:

VOTED, That in harmony with the request of the Southern European Division, F. Charpiot be released from the action of the General Conference Session, electing him as Publishing Department Secretary, and that he be elected instead to serve as Secretary of the Home Missionary Department.

VOTED, That C.G.Cross be elected Publishing Department Secretary of the Southern European Division.

## C.D.MARTIN-ZAMBESI UNION:

VOTED, To request the Pacific Union and the Southeastern California Conference to release C.D.Martin, to connect with the Southern African Division, for evangelistic work in the Zambesi Union Mission.

#### L.H.LINDBECK--PERMANENT RETURN:

VOTED, That on recommendation of the Inter-American Division Committee, we authorize the permanent return of L.H. Lindbeck.

#### WERBER JOHNSON--PERMANENT RETURN:

VOTED, That on recommendation of the Far Eastern Division Committee, and in harmony with his own desire, we authorize the permanent return of Werber Johnson from the Philippines.

#### INTER-AMERICAN DIVISION---RADIO SECRETARY:

VOTED, That A.H.Roth be elected to serve as Radio Secretary of the Inter-American Division.

## NORTH ATLANTIC DIVISION -- PUBLISHING SECRETARY:

VOTED, That G.D.King be elected to serve as Publishing Department Secretary of the North Atlantic Division.

A committee that had been appointed on special items submitted a report, which was adopted as follows:

## EXCESSIVE INCOME TAXES:

WHEREAS, In some of the world divisions our workers have been brought into perplexities because of heavy personal income and other salary taxes,

We recommend, To the respective divisions that some suitable plan be made, in counsel with the General Conference, to give financial help to workers who are obliged to pay excessive tax on salary income.

## DENOMINATIONAL RELATIONSHIP TO LABOR UNIONS:

We recommend, To the General Conference Executive Committee that the officers of the new administration be asked to nominate a representative standing committee to study carefully this matter, suggesting (a) that a core committee within the representative committee be appointed to collect information on the subject; and (b) that this committee plan to report to the next Biennial Autumn Council.

## SECTION I AND SECTION II--DIVISION COMMITTEES:

We recommend. That the following be the policy relative to Section I and Section II of Division Committees:

In the providence of God the Advent cause has been greatly prospered and strengthened in the homelands of the world. With this development there has grown up a large and capable group of Christian workers, who have been willing to go as foreign missionaries to pioneer and strengthen the gospel cause in other lands. The believers of the homelands impelled by the great commission of Matthew 28 have been and are willing to send these self-denying messengers to needy fields abroad and to support them in their work there.

The sending out of missionaries from the homeland to a foreign country imposes upon the sending organization the obligation of caring for these workers. These missionaries have responsibilities to discharge to their families—the education of children, the support of parents, and other obligations. The General Conference and sending Divisions through the years have recognized their responsibility for the care of these workers and have endeavored to arrange for administrative functions in the fields to enable the missionaries to meet these responsibilities.

In the administration of the work in our overseas divisions it is recognized that the direction of all workers is the responsibility of the organization to which they have been called to labor. And where, in the opinion of the General Conference it is advisable a Division Overseas Workers Committee shall be appointed by the Executive Committee of the General Conference (or in the case of mission fields under direction of home base divisions, by the division committee). This Division Overseas Workers Committee shall give direction to the personnel problems of overseas workers. They shall deal with such matters as overseas workers wages, audits, housing, rents, furloughs, class of travel, and other allowances to such workers.

In divisions where it is necessary for Overseas Workers Committees to be appointed for unions these appointments shall be made by the respective Division Overseas Workers Committees.

The General Conference Committee in Autumn Council shall make a division of the annual appropriations for the divisions as between Sections I and II of the budget in counsel with the division. The Section II budget shall be distributed by and administered under the direction of the Division Overseas Workers Committee.

## ORDINATION OF WOMEN:

We recommend, That a small committee be appointed to study, and report on the question of the ordination of women for Dorcas work, and as Bible workers.

ORIENTATION OF FOREIGN MISSION APPOINTEES AND WORKERS IN THE LIGHT OF THE NEED FOR THE DEVELOPMENT OF NATIONAL LEADERSHIP:

We recommend, 1. That the plan outlined on page 101 of the General Conference Working Policy, entitled "Mission Appointees Relationship to National Leadership" be revived.

- 2. That all new missionary appointees be directed toward a specified reading program to be outlined by the Secretarial Department of the General Conference.
- 3. That as far as possible all new recruits to the mission field upon their arrival be (a) placed in a language school or a language teacher be provided for such a period as each field may arrange; or (b) be associated with workers of experience, so as to enable the recruits to become adjusted to conditions within the field, and at the same time learn a language where such is required, before taking up positions of responsibility.
- 4. That in our mission divisions plans be laid to call together our older workers from time to time so as to give study to their reorientation and adjustment which may be required in connection with the development of national leadership.

#### CHURCH BUILDING AND CHURCH SCHOOL BUILDING PLANS:

WHEREAS, There is definite need for guidance in the preparation of plans for church buildings and church school buildings, so that proper accommodation may be made for Sabbath school rooms and other church activities; and

WHEREAS, It might be found difficult to follow detailed structural plans for church and church school buildings in some parts of the world field, although a general plan would be helpful even under the various conditions in different countries; therefore

We recommend, That the General Conference Committee prepare a set of church building plans, and church school building plans, and related suggestions for various sized churches and church schools, for use in the North American Division, and that copies of these sets of plans and suggestions be supplied to the divisions with a view to the division committees adapting the plans for use in their respective fields.

# MODEL FORM OF CONSTITUTION AND ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION:

Forms of a Constitution and Articles of Incorporation, prepared by a committee which had been appointed for the purpose, were submitted and adopted as follows, to serve as a model and guide to conference organizations in drawing up their Constitutions and Articles of Incorporation:

## CONSTITUTION OF-----CONFERENCE OF SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTISTS

#### ARTICLE I---Name

This organization shall be known as the---- Conference of Seventh-day Adventists.

## ARTICLE II--Object

The object of this conference is to teach all nations the everlasting gospel of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

## ARTICLE III -- Territory

The territory of this conference shall consist of----

## ARTICLE IV---Membership

Section 1. The membership of this conference shall consist of such churches as have been or shall be properly organized and accepted by vote of the conference.

Section 2. The votersof this conference at regular and special sessions shall be:

- a. Such delegates as shall be duly accredited by the organized churches of the conference. Each church shall be entitled to one delegate for the organization and one additional delegate for each ——members or major fraction thereof.
- b. All members of the executive committee of the conference.
- c. All members of the General Conference, and the -----Union Conference Committees who may be present at any session of this conference.

- d. All ordained ministers employed by this conference who are in good and regular standing, and holding credentials from the ———Union Conference or from this conference.
- e. The secretary, the treasurer, and the secretaries of all recognized departments of this conference.
- f. The principal and the business manager of academy, and the medical director and the business manager of the sanitarium.
- g. Such other persons as may be recommended by the executive committee and accepted by vote of the delegates in session; the number of delegates thus seated shall not exceed 20 per cent of the delegates duly accredited by the organized churches.

## ARTICLE V--Officers and Their Duties

Section 1. The officers of the conference shall be a president, a secretary, and a treasurer (the secretary and treasurer may be one person known as secretary-treasurer).

Section 2. President: The president shall act as chairman of the executive committee, and labor in the general interests of the conference, as the executive committee may advise.

Section 3. Secretary: It shall be the duty of the secretary to keep the minutes of the proceedings of the conference sessions and of the executive committee meetings, to collect such other data as may be desired by the president or the executive committee, and to perform such other duties as pertain to the said office.

Section 4. Treasurer: It shall be the duty of the treasurer to receive all funds, disburse them in harmony with the actions of the executive committee, audit the books of the local churches at least once each year, and render such financial statements at regular intervals as may be desired by the president or the executive committee, and perform such other duties as pertain to the said office. Where it is found impossible for the treasurer personally to audit the books of the local churches, the executive committee shall arrange with him for such assistance as may be necessary.

Section 5. All officers of the conference, and all other members of the executive committee, and secretaries of all departments shall be elected by the conference in regular sessions and shall hold their offices for the term of two years or until their successors are elected and appear to enter upon their duties.

## ARTICLE VI -- Auditing

Section 1. The auditor of the accounts of this conference shall be the auditor of the ----- Union Conference.

## ARTICLE VII -- Executive Committee

Section 1. At each regular session the conference shall elect an executive committee which shall consist of not less than nor more than members, of which committee the president shall be a member and the chairman.

Section 2. Between sessions the executive committee shall have full administrative power to conduct the business of the conference, with authority to grant and withdraw credentials and licenses to its workers, to employ or to discharge its employees, and to fill any vacancies which may occur by death, resignation, or otherwise, of conference officers, committees, boards, or agents of the conference, unless other provision is made by vote of the conference for filling such vacancies.

Section 3. Meetings of the executive committee may be called at any time or place by the president, or in an emergency, upon counsel with the ————Union Conference president, by the secretary of the conference, or by three members of said committee. At all meetings of the committee, two thirds of the membership of the committee shall constitute a quorum.

# ARTICLE VIII -- Incorporations, Trustees, Departments Agents, Committees

Section 1. Such incorporations may be authorized by the conference in session, or by the executive committee, as may be necessary for the execution of its business or for the operation of its institutions.

Section 2. The conference shall maintain such departments as may be provided for by vote of the conference in regular sessions, or by the executive committee; and shall employ such committees, agents, ministers, missionaries, or other workers, and make such distribution of its laborers as may be necessary to effectually carry on its work.

#### ARTICLE IX --- Sessions

Section 1. Regular sessions of this conference shall be held biennially for the election of officers and for the transaction of business pertinent to the welfare of the conference, at such time and place within the territory of the conference as the executive committee shall designate by notice in the official organ of the ——————Union Conference of Seventh-day Adgentists three weeks before the date of the meeting.

Section 2. Special sessions may be called at the discretion of the executive committee at such time and place within the territory of the conference as the executive committee shall designate by a like notice as of regular sessions, and the actions of such special sessions shall have the same force as those of the regular sessions.

Section 3. The election of officers, and the voting on all other matters of business shall be by <u>viva voce</u> vote unless otherwise demanded by a majority of the delegates present.

Section 4. Twenty-five delegates present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

## ARTICLE X -- By-Laws

The voters of this conference may enact BY-LAWS and amend or repeal them at any session thereof, and such BY-LAWS may embrace any provision not inconsistent with the constitution.

## ARTICLE XI -- Amendments

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the delegates present and voting in any meeting, provided that if it is proposed to amend the constitution at a special session, notice of the proposed amendment shall be given in the call for such special session.

## ARTICLE XII -- Dissolution

Section 1. The dissolution of this conference may be effected by a three-fourths vote of the delegates present and voting at any regular or special session of the conference, provided that if it is proposed to dissolve the conference at a special session, notice of the proposal to dissolve shall be given in the call for special session.

# ---- CONFERENCE CORPORATION OF SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTISTS ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, That we, the undersigned, namely (here insert the names of the original incorporators) being of full age, and citizens of the United States, and residents of (State)desiring to associate ourselves together to form a corporation for the purposes and objects hereinafter set forth, in pursuance of and in conformity with (here refer to the law), for ourselves, our associates, and successors, do make, sign and acknowledge this certificate in writing, which, when recorded, shall constitute the Articles of Incorporation of the hereinafter-named corporation.

## ARTICLE I -- Name

The name of the corporation hereby created shall be L\_\_\_\_\_ CONFERENCE CORPORATION OF SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTISTS

## ARTICLE II -- Duration

The term for which said corporation is organized and the duration of its existence is to be perpetual (or for the maximum period provided by law.)

## ARTICLE III -- Business and Objects

The particular business and objects for which this corporation is formed are for the purpose of diffusing moral and religious knowledge throughout the entire world by means of churches, organizations, publishing houses, medical or health institutions, educational institutions, publications, missionary agencies, and all other instrumentalities and methods appropriate and available for and tending to the advancement of such ends and aims, and to that end to receive loans, gifts, and deposits of money; to issue notes; to grant annuities; to make loans; to acquire, possess, and hold title to real, personal, and mixed estates in this or foreign countries, either in trust or otherwise, by gift, bequest, devise, or purchase, and to have power to pledge, incumber, sell, and convey the same by such mortgage or other instrument of security or conveyance as may be suitable; it being, however, expressly declared that this corporation is not for personal profit or gain to any one, but that all its property and effects must be used and expended in carrying into effect the aims, ends, and objects of its existence.

## ARTICLE IV -- Trustees

shall be chosen at such time and place and in such manner as shall be provided in the By-Laws of this corporation, and a majority of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Whenever a vacancy shall occur in such Board of Trustees, it shall be filled in the manner prescribed in the By-Laws.

#### ARTICLE V

This corporation shall enjoy all the rights, privileges, and immunities, and exercise all the powers and authorities now conferred, or which may hereafter be conferred, by the laws of the United States upon corporations of a similar kind or nature.

#### By-Laws

## ARTICLE I -- Name

The name of this Corporation is "-----CONFERENCE CORPORATION OF SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTISTS."

ARTICLE II -- Location

The principal office of this Corporation is located in-----

## ARTICLE III -- Objects

The particular objects for which this Corporation is formed are stated in the Articles of Incorporation.

## ARTICLE IV -- Membership

- Section 1. The members of this Corporation shall be:
  - a. The board of trustees of this Corporation.
- b. The members of the-----Conference Committee of Seventh-day Adventists.
- c. The members of the General Conference Committee of Seventh-day Adventists present at any regular or special meeting of the------Conference of Seventh-day Adventists.
- d. The duly elected and accredited delegates at any regular or special session of the ----- Conference of Seventh-day Adventists (an unincorporated body) who shall be

present at any regular or special meeting of this Corporation. For the purpose of this Corporation, these delegates shall continue in office until other delegates are chosen to succeed them.

Section 2. A quorum for the transaction of business shall consist of not less than \_\_\_\_\_ members.

## ARTICLE V -- Trustees

Section 1. The members of this Corporation shall elect biennially ——— persons to act as trustees for this Corporation, who shall hold their offices until their successors are duly elected and appear to enter upon their duties.

Section 2. The trustees shall have the ordering of all affairs of this Corporation, the management and disposal of all its property, and the execution of all trusts confided to it.

Section 4. The trustees shall elect biennially from their number a President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer.

Section 5. The trustees shall employ a competent auditor, who shall audit the books of this Corporation, and submit an itemized report to the members of the Corporation annually, or at such times as may be required by the Board.

Section 6. The trustees shall have power to fill any vacancy occurring in their membership.

## ARTICLE VI -- Duties of Officers

The duties of the officers of this Corporation shall be such as usually pertain to such officers respectively, and such other duties as the Board of Trustees may prescribe. The President and the Secretary, or in the absence of either, the other and the Treasurer, shall in behalf of the Corporation, sign all deeds, mortgages, powers of attorney, annuity agreements, or other instruments of writing of similar character and import.

## ARTICLE VII -- Seal

The seal of this Corporation shall consist of an ordinary-sized circular impression with the words "------Conference Corporation of Seventh-day Adventists," in an outer circle enclosing the word "Seal" and the word "Incorporated."

## ARTICLE VIII -- Meetings

Section 1. Every regular and special meeting of the members of this Corporation shall be called by the Board of Trustees. Notice of any such meeting shall be published in two successive issues preceding the time of the meeting, in the official organ of the —————— Union Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, or in the Advent Review and Sabbath Herald, a weekly paper published at Washington, D.C.

Section 2. The meetings of the Board of Trustees, both regular and special, shall be held at such times and places as may be designated by the President.

Section 3. When not otherwise especially provided, all votes of the members of this Corporation for the election of trustees or for the deciding of other questions shall be taken viva voce.

Section 4. Each voter, whether member or trustee, shall have one vote, and only one, on any question.

## ARTICLE IX -- Amendments

These By-laws may be amended by two-thirds vote of the members of the Corporation present and voting at any regular meeting of said members, when the proposed amendment does not conflict with the Articles of Incorporation of the Corporation. When it is proposed to change the By-laws at any special meeting of the members of the Corporation, notice shall be given to this effect in the call for the meeting, and the nature of the proposed amendment or amendments shall be stated.

## ARTICLE X -- Dissolution

## 1950 AUTUMN COUNCIL:

VOTED, To leave with the Committee in Washington the question of attendance at the 1950 Autumn Council.

## MADISON COLLEGE:

VOTED, To refer to the Committee in Washington for consideration the question of including Madison College in the sisterhood of denominational colleges.

## MEETING OF INGATHERING COMMITTEE:

VOTED, That we authorize a meeting of the Ingathering Editorial Committee in Washington, October 11, attendance to include Robert Eldridge, and the Home Missionary Secretaries of the Atlantic, Canadian, Central, Southern and Pacific Unions.

## ROBERT E.MAXSON--PERMANENT RETURN:

VOTED, That on recommendation of the Inter-American Division Committee, we authorize the permanent return of Robert E.Maxson from Puerto Rico.

That the Leave of Absence policy (page 111 of the Working Policy) be amended to read: "While there is no regular furlough policy for kaborers called from other divisions to labor in Australia, New Zealand, Europe, and North America, there is a general understanding that such workers may be granted a leave of absence once in eight years by action of the division committee in consultation with the General Conference Committee."

2. That the leave of absence policy apply to workers called from one home division to another home division, and not to those who marry nationals.

## DATES FOR UNION CONFERENCE SESSIONS:

VOTED, That the question of the dates for the union conference sessions be referred to the Committee in Washington.

## BUREAU OF PRESS RELATIONS:

VOTED, That J.R. Ferren be appointed Secretary of the Bureau of Press Relations.

#### REMUNERATION OF PHYSICIANS -- INCENTIVE PLAN:

The committee that was appointed on remuneration of physicians submitted their report, which was adopted as follows:

WHEREAS, It is desirable to establish a more uniform basis for the employment of physicians in the Cóllege of Medical Evangelists and in Sanitariums in North America,

We recommend, l. That a base pay be given covering participation in the revenue producing professional services to the Sanitarium; assistance in religious and social activities of the institution; teaching duties in the training school and supervision and teaching of interns and residents; care of charity cases; professional care of employees of the Sanitarium as follows:

First year after internship	\$45.00
Second year after internship	47.50
Third year after internship	50.00
Fourth year after internship	52,50
Fifth year after internship	55.00

Additional allowance to the Medical Director for medical administration

\$10.00-25.00 per week

Additional allowance to the acting Medical Director for medical administration in the abssnce of the Medical Director

7.50-12.50 " "

Additional allowance to staff members who have speciality board certification

5.00 " "

2. Supplementary pay for professional services to patients charged for as follows:

These percentages may be varied so long as the ceiling is not exceeded.

3. A maximum of \$125.00 per week is set above which no benefits will be paid, it being understood that this be computed either on a bi-weekly or monthly basis.

## 4. Interpretations:

Percentage is computed on net charges.

Percentage is computed on a receding basis of any one fee.

Assisting surgeon and surgeon turn in separate charges and percentage be computed accordingly.

No percentage is to be paid for care of char-

ity patients.

Percentage is to be paid for office treatments given by the physician's office nurse, under his direction.

Men and women physicians be remunerated on the same basis.

## 5. Other benefits as follows:

Postgraduate. An allowance be made for postgraduate work for the physicians in the amount of three weeks per year at base pay, and the same be cumulative for a period of not more than four years, except by special board action.

Plans for the utilization of the provision set up above be submitted to the Board in writing through the Medical Director for approval before the postgraduate work is taken.

For work so approved the institution assist the physician in meeting the expense involved in the following manner:

- a. Full registration and/or tuition fees.
- b. One half of hotel or rooming expense.
- c. One half General Conference per diem allowance,
- d. One half transportation expense not to exceed first class railroad fare and Pullman lower berth.

That in special cases involving training of specialists for Board certification, postgraduate allowances be increased as may be determined by the governing Board.

That attendance at medical conventions outside of the local area where the physician is employed be considered to be postgraduate expense.

Vacations. Vacation allowance of two weeks per year at base pay plus allowances for official responsibilities.

- Automobile. a. One half of the registration fees.
  - b. One half of five-point insurance.
  - c. Mileage for institutional business

Sustentation. Sustentation provision paid on base pay.

Medical Society Dues. a. National, State, and County. b. One speciality society.

Malpractice Insurance. Blue Cross coverage according to institutional policy of employing institution.

Rent Subsidy. Coverage according to policy of employing institution, calculated on full amount of physician's earnings.

Medical Assistance. In harmony with institutional policy. Telephone.

6. That the application of this policy to physicians in the College of Medical Evangelists be referred to the major Board of that institution.

That it be the responsibility of the officers of the respective Sanitarium and College of Medical Evangelists Boards to adhere to the foregoing policies, and that before any modifications are made approval be secured from the General Conference Committee.

That the foregoing policies become effective January 1, 1951.

VOTED, That in the case of all other physicians in North America, except those on the incentive plan as provided in the foregoing recommendations, the General Conference wage scale be applied; and that the overseas divisions be advised to maintain the present wage scale as applied to physicians, according to the 1948 edition of the Wage Scale leaflet.

#### EAST MEDITERTANEAN DIVISION:

VOTED, That the East Mediterranean Division be divided into two union missions, to be known as the Middle East Union, comprising Turkey, Lebanan-Syria, Iraq, Iran, Kuwait, Oman Hadramut, Cyprus, and the Neutral Territory between Iraq and Transjordan; and the Nile Union, comprising Egypt, Lybia, Anglo-Egyptian Sudan, Saudi-Arabia, Aden, Yeman and Transjordan.

VOTED, That on recommendation of the East Mediterranean Division Committee, R.H.Hartwell be asked to serve as President of the Middle East Union, and that Neal Wilson take the Presidency of the Nile Union.

VOTED, That since he cannot accept, C.B.Green be released from the action of the General Conference session electing him Secretary-treasurer of the East Mediterranean Division.

VOTED, That C.C.Morris be elected Secretary-treasurer of the East Mediterranean Division.

#### OFFICERS OF NEW DIVISIONS:

VOTED, That it beanderstood that the officers of the two new divisions, the North Atlantic and the East Mediterranean, shall begin to function at once, and that the divisions as organizations begin to function January 1, 1951

VOTED, That all questions of a financial nature in connection with these officers taking up their work be referred to the Committee in Washington.

## DR. J. NUSSBAUM--LAKE SUCCESS:

VOTED, To request the Southern European Division to arrange for Dr. J. Nussbaum to attend the coming meeting of the United Nations Assembly at Lake Success.

## DENTAL COLLEGE:

VOTED, To refer to the Committee in Washington the question of the establishment of a dental college, suggesting that perhaps it should be given further study at the Autumn Council.

## WEST AFRICAN UNION MISSION:

VOTED, That the present officers of the West African Union Mission be requested to continue to function until the North Atlantic Division has opportunity to appoint officers at the beginning of the year.

#### ANGOLA AND PORTUGUESE EAST AFRICA:

VOTED, That October 1 be the date for the transfer of the territory of Angola and Portuguese East Africa from the Southern African to the Southern European Division, and that the matter of finances be worked out between the treasurers of the two fields and the Treasurer of the General Conference.

#### E.S.CUBLEY-SOUTH AMERICAN DIVISION:

VOTED, To pass on to the Middle East Union the call for E.S.Cubley to connect with the South American Division as assistant treasurer.

#### SOUTH AMERICAN DIVISION OFFICE:

VOTED, That in harmony with the recommendation of the South American Division Committee, we approve of the removal of the South American Division headquarters office from Buenos Aires to Montevideo, Uruguay.

#### EAST MEDITERRANEAN DIVISION HEADQUARTERS:

VOTED, That we approve of the choice of Beirut as the headquarters for the East Mediterranean Division.

## EXCHANGE RATES:

VOTED, That the fixed rate of exchange for the Guilder in Indonesia be .13½; for the Piaster in Indo-China, .05; and for the Tical in Siam, .05, effective as from January 1, 1950.

#### SESSION TELECAST:

VOTED, That the Treasurer be authorized to meet an additional item of \$200 in connection with the telecast during the General Conference Session.

## CHINA DIVISION --- RELIGIOUS LIBERTY SECRETARY:

VOTED, That Hsu Hwa be elected Religious Liberty Secretary for the China Division.

## SOUTHERN ASIA DIVISION--ENTERING TIBET:

Some time was spent in discussing the possibilities of entering Tibet, and the desire of Dr. R.H.Dunn and William A. Hilliard that the plan that they should go into Tibet if the way opened should be adhered to, rather than that they be assigned to other work in the Southern Asia Division, as contemplated by our action of May 22. R.H.Pierson, the President of the Division, and others spoke of the desirability of adhering to the original plan, or at least that the plan be not abandoned until an attempt has been made to get into the country.

VOTED, That we approve of the Southern Asia Division carrying out the Tibetan project as may be found to be feasible.

Adjourned, with the closing prayer by E.M.Adams.
