The Chairman, R. R. Figuhr, expressed pleasure and happiness to see the workers, especially those who had come in from the field, and others who have been invited to attend the Spring Meeting.

"Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing" was sung as an opening song.

For a Scripture reading, R. R. Figuhr read from the Revised Standard Version of the Bible, Acts 2: 1-4, which records the experience of the disciples on the day of Pentecost. The disciples were together in one place and there came "a sound from heaven" and the Holy Spirit appeared unto them and they were filled with it.

Elder Figuhr spoke of the effect the descent of the Holy Spirit had on the disciples. They began to speak in a different way--different intonations.

Spring Meeting

different emphases were given. Every one who was in the room was affected by it. The sounds of nature, the sorgs of birds, delight us. A good many of the sounds in the earth are created by man-made machines, like locomotives that whistle and that make a noise when they come along. There are human voices, angry voices, arguing voices, discussing voices. When Jesus was baptized, there was a voice from heaven saying, "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased." That happened before Jesus preached a sermon, before He had healed any one. He was a carpenter's son, pleasing God. Elder Figuhr referred to the experience recorded in 1 Chronicles 14 and the instruction given by God to David that he should go out to battle when he heard a "sound of going in the tops of the mulberry trees." In the midst of all the sounds we hear, there is a danger that the voice from heaven, the indication that comes from above, may not make the impression that it should. Human devisings and plans may take the place of God. Our people must be led into a deeper experience in the things of God than they have had. We must retain the confidence of our brethren by our examples, by the lives we live, and by the way we talk. We must be a hundred per cent in our dedication to the cause of God. We should thank God for the privilege of being workers in His cause.

Opportunity was given for those in attendance to speak, and testimonies were given by the large majority of those present. They told of the certainty of the triumph of the Advent Movement, and their personal dedication to its triumph. They expressed, too, their happiness in fellowship with their brethren in the work, and their desire to hear the voice of God above that of other sounds.

Prayer was offered by C. L. Torrey and W. R. Beach, remembering especially our brethren overseas, that they may be blessed in their soul-winning endeavors. They prayed that we may always hear the still, small voice from heaven, and that we may follow its guidance, and asked the blessing of God upon the participants in this meeting.

Recommendations were presented from the General Conference Officers and Union Conference Presidents, and adopted as follows:

BUREAU OF PUBLIC RELATIONS ADVISORY COMMITTEE:

We recommend, The addition of the following to the Advisory Committee of the Bureau of Public Relations:

- 1. Assistant secretaries of the Bureau
- Union conference Bureau secretaries (n.a.)
 Representatives from the Ministerial and Home Missionary Departments.

And further

That the time and place of meeting of the Advisory Committee be upon authorization of the Autumn Council preceding each meeting.

Spring Meeting

A report from the Committee on LD Classification of Teachers was considered carefully, suggestions for improvement made, and it was referred back to the Committee for further study.

The meeting recessed, giving way to a meeting of the Seminary Constituency. which had been called at 10 o'clock. It was followed by a short meeting of the Seminary Board.

At 10:45 A.M. the Council convened, and a report from the Wage Committee, which had met April 5-8, was presented. The following recommendations were adopted:

SALARY INCREASE:

We recommend, 1. That the 1956 Wage Scale be revised to provide an increase up to a maximum of \$7.00 weekly for the heads of families and \$5.00 weekly for all other salaried workers.

- 2. That the salary increase contemplated in this recommendation apply only to those who are being remunerated in harmony with the regular denominational wage scale.
- 3. That this salary increase become operative as of July 1, 1957, or as soon thereafter as conferences and institutional boards can arrange their budgets.
- 4. That in the case of medical and publishing institutions a committee be appointed within each institution to give study to the adjustment of the wage or wages within various categories and adjust them within the limits of the proposed suggestions above.

HEATING EXPENSE:

Recognizing the need of assistance to workers when they are put to excessive expense in heating their homes,

We recommend, That the General Conference, the General Conference institutional boards, and the union conferences be authorized to assist workers with their heating expense by sharing with them on the annual cost of heating on the amount exceeding \$100 per year.

RENT SUBSIDY:

We recommend, That Section 1 of the Rent Subsidy policy now reading "A denominational worker is ordinarily not obliged to pay rent, exclusive of furnishings, heat, gas, light, and water more than 11 per cent of his salary on the wage scale adopted at the 1954 Autumn Council of the General Conference." be revised to read: "A denominational worker is ordinarily not obliged to pay as rent, exclusive of furnishings, heat, gas, light, and water, more than 10 per cent of his salary on the current wage scale of the General Conference."

SUSTENTATION RATE INCREASE:

We recommend, That paragraph 80 of the Sustentation policy be revised to read as follows:

"The family rate of workers eligible for sustentation shall be \$90.00 a month for fifteen years of service and for each year of service from fifteen to forty there shall be added \$4.00 a month making a maximum of \$190.00 for forty or more years of service."

That this revised policy become effective July 1, 1957.

CHILD ALLOWANCE INCREASE:

We recommend, That paragraph 77 of the Sustentation policy be revised to read as follows:

"Beneficiaries of the Sustentation Fund having dependent children under eighteen years of age may, if necessary, be granted a child allowance of \$30.00 a month for each child," and further--

That this revised policy become effective July 1, 1957.

COMMITTEE TO STUDY SUSTENTATION OF MARRIED WOMEN:

We recommend, That this Spring Meeting appoint a committee to study that section of the Sustentation policy which affects the Sustentation of women when they marry, and that this committee report to the Autumn Council.

4-D CLASSIFICATION FOR TEACHERS
IN SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTIST SCHOOLS:

VOTED, To accept the report of the Committee on 4-D Classification of Teachers, as follows:

WHEREAS, The work of the church-school teacher is recognized by the denomination as an essential spiritual function of the church in its endeavors to attain its objectives as a Christian organization,

We recommend, That men teachers whose activities definitely include the conducting of worship or teaching Bible and religion in the school and spiritual leadership in regular church services, be designated "ministerial teachers" and that they be granted a ministerial-teacher license, it being understood that ministerial teachers belong to the category of "regular ministers" as specified by National Selective Service.

CIRCULATION OF LISTEN MAGAZINE:

VOTED, To adopt the report of the Committee on Circulation of <u>Listen</u> Magazine, as follows:

WHEREAS, One of our major missionary projects for 1957 is the placing of <u>Listen</u> in the homes of approximately 70,000 clergymen under the <u>Listen</u> Sponsorship program; and

WHEREAS, Any change in plans for the promotion of <u>Listen</u> at this time would tend to disrupt this present program already promoted in the field,

We recommend, 1. That the Publishing Department, the Missionary Volunteer Department, and the Pacific Press Publishing Association join with the American Temperance Society in promoting the circulation of <u>Listen</u> magazine, and that this arrangement go into effect immediately.

- 2. That our conferences request their local churches to send all available temperance funds into the conference office to cover the cost of sending Listen to these 70,000 clergymen.
- 3. That the officers of the General Conference be requested to appoint a committee to formulate an effective plan for the promotion of <u>Listen</u> magazine, this plan to be submitted to the 1957 Autumn Council.
- 4. That favorable consideration be given to increasing the subscription price of Listen magazine to \$1.50, and the membership and Listen sponsorship subscriptions to \$1.00.

CLASSIFICATION AND STATUS
ASSISTANT DEPARTMENTAL SECRETARIES:

We recommend, That the classification and status of Assistant Departmental Secretaries in the General Conference Office be referred to the Officers.

SPIRIT OF PROPHECY CORRESPONDENCE COURSE:

VOTED, To accept the report of the Committee on Spirit of Prophecy Correspondence Course as follows:

We recommend, 1. That a Spirit of prophecy correspondence course be made available to all our members in North America.

- 2. That the General Conference Committee appoint a committee to prepare the lessons for this course and also a booklet for use as a text, that this committee avail itself of the privilege of using as a basis for its lessons those prepared by the Southern Union Bible Correspondence School, and that the publishing and handling of these lessons and the accompanying booklet be assigned to one of the publishing houses.
- 3. That each union conference committee determine the best method for the distribution of these lessons within its territory, with the suggestion that these lessons be processed through the local or union conference Bible school, or in the event of there not being a conference Bible school, through the union or local conference Home Missionary Department.

BIBLE CORRESPONDENCE SCHOOLS:

VOTED, To accept the report from the Committee on Bible Correspondence Schools, with amendment, as follows:

WHEREAS, The results of our Bible Correspondence Schools are dependent in the first place upon a successful enrollment program, and

WHEREAS, Such a program to be most effective, requires the support of the organized missionary activities of the church,

We recommend, 1. That the Home Missionary Department be requested to assume the responsibility of fostering Bible school enrollments, whether for local, union, Faith for Today, or Voice of Prophecy schools, through the missionary organization of the church, and provide for a recording of the enrollments thus secured, and that all pertinent information as provided by these schools be forwarded on to the Home Missionary Department of the local, union, and General Conference.

AUTUMN COUNCIL ATTENDANCE:

VOTED, To accept the report of the Committee on Autumn Council Attendance, as follows:

We recommend, That the attendance at the 1957 Autumn Council, which precedes the General Conference session, be restricted to the regular members of the General Conference Committee.

EDUCATIONAL PROBLEMS:

In view of the fact that a survey is being made at the present time among our colleges, and that certain educational problems, such as graduate study, are being made and implemented, it was

Recommended, That the appointment of the large survey committee, which had been authorized by the 1956 Autumn Council be postponed indefinitely, and that the problem of educational buildings and teachers needed be referred to the local field.

Before the vote was declared, attention was drawn to the fact that these surveys do not cover the definite needs in the elementary problem.

The item was held for further study.

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

April 11, 1957, 9:45 A.M.

The meeting convened following the devotional service at 9:00 A.M., at which meeting Elder T. Carcich was the speaker.

Prayer by R. A. Anderson.

Information was given by R. R. Figuhr that during the past year, 1956, the number of baptisms throughout the world field was 78,692, and the number of members received on profession of faith was 4,222, making a total of 82,914. This is nearly equal to the membership of one of our largest world divisions.

Opportunity was given for reports from representatives of the Pacific Press Publishing Association and Southern Publishing Association as to the outworking of the plan for the missionary journals to be published monthly, and also as to the campaign dates. The subscriptions at the Southern Publishing Association have been fewer than during the previous year, though the Pacific Press Publishing Association has 35,000 more than they had previously. A few inquiries have come in as regards the Signs not being continued on a weekly basis, but it is felt that in general the plan has been well received in the field.

SIGNS, THESE TIMES, AND MESSAGE CAMPAIGN:

At the 1956 Autumn Council, authorization was given for a committee to be appointed to work with the two publishing houses to initiate the plans for the monthly magazines, and with regard to prices. This committee presented the following report, which was adopted:

We recommend, 1. That beginning in the Autumn of 1957 there be one annual campaign date for the Signs, These Times, and the Message Magazines, preferably in October.

2. That the special campaign subscription price be extended through the month of November.

BUREAU OF PUBLIC RELATIONS

AND RELIGIOUS LIBERTY DEPARTMENT--ADDITIONAL SECRETARIES:

We recommend, 1. The employment of one additional Associate for the Bureau of Public Relations.

2. The employment on the General Conference staff of a man with legal training and experience, to serve the interests of the Religious Liberty Department, and to assist in caring for other legal matters in connection with the General Conference work.

VOTED, That we authorize the Officers and General Conference Committee to go forward with the selection and employment of the above workers.

COMMITTEE ON EDUCATIONAL PROBLEMS:

Further time was given to discussion of our educational work, the number of schools we have, and the lack of teachers to meet the demands. Increasingly, we find teachers leaving our schools to go out into the public schools. The 1956 Autumn Council authorized the appointment of a committee to study the educational problems and report to the 1957 Autumn Council. It was

VOTED, To request the Officers to proceed with the appointment of the committee, and that it include field administrative representation.

Opportunity was then given for a short meeting of the North American Division Committee on Administration.

At 11 A.M. the business of the Spring Meeting was resumed.

NARCOTICS EDUCATION PROGRAM:

A suggestion has come from the General Conference Officers and Union Conference Presidents with regard to the Narcotics Education Program. It was

VOTED, That the Narcotics Education Program be sponsored by the American Temperance Society.

The Publishing Department Committee presented a series of recommendations which were adopted as follows:

COLPORTEUR ATTENDANCE AT GENERAL CONFERENCE SESSION:

Recognizing the desirability of having our successful and dedicated colporteurs in attendance at the General Conference session.

We recommend, That a plan, providing for the following, be worked out through the General Conference Officers, responsible boards, and committees to make possible the attendance of literature-evangelists at the General Conference session, which is to be held in Cleveland, Ohio, June 19-28, 1958:

- 1. That this plan be extended only to licensed and credentialed literature evangelists.
- 2. That male literature-evangelists be required to work 1500 hours and deliver \$10,000 worth of subscription literature.
- 3. That women literature-evangelists be required to work 1200 hours and deliver \$7,000 worth of subscription literature.
- 4. That the Book and Bible House accounts of those who qualify be in a satisfactory condition; namely, that the accounts be covered by actual inventories and active outstanding customer accounts, or a safe credit margin.

Spring Meeting

- 5. That the twelve-month period during which the literature-evangelists will qualify on the above basis begin April 1, 1957 and end March 31, 1958.
- 6. That the following courtesies be granted to the literature-evangelists who qualify on the above basis:
 - a. That conferences grant the same allowances to these literature evangelists as to other non-delegate workers.
 - b. That literature-evangelists arrange to take their vacations at the time of the session so that the vacation policy of the regular literature-evangelist program will apply.
 - c. That the publishing houses grant \$50.00 for each literature-evangelist within their respective territories who qualifies for the above.
 - d. That the Book and Bible Houses grant \$25.00 per literature-evangelist within their respective territories who qualifies for the above.
- 7. That the special grants outlined above will not apply unless the literature-evangelist actually attends the General Conference session for at least four days, including a week end.

FILMS FOR EVANGELISM AND TV:

It was stated that about twenty of the evangelistic and TV films have now been finished. The present plan calls for the production of thirty-nine. A committee had been appointed to bring in a recommendation as to prices on the films. The committee has recommended that the cost be \$45.00 for black-and-white films, and \$440 for the color films, including mailing charges. It was

VOTED, That a committee be appointed to give study to the use of the evangelistic films as well as TV production.

NORTH AMERICAN DIVISION COMMITTEE ON ADMINISTRATION-ITEMS REFERRED:

It was stated that a number of items should be referred to the North American Division Committee on Administration.

VOTED, That we authorize the North American Division Committee to deal with requests to borrow money within the North American Division Committee.

VOTED, That the item of Vacations be referred to the North American Division Committee on Administration.

VOTED, That the Mutual Assistance Plan be referred to the North American Division Committee on Administration.

SALARY OF C. J. NAGELE:

VOTED, That the salary of C. J. Nagele be referred to the Officers for consideration.

Spring Meeting

R. R. Figuhr expressed appreciation for the fine spirit manifested by every one during the meeting, as well as the interest shown in the items discussed. It is helpful to look at the work beyond the immediate borders where we labor. The Lord has led and will continue to lead us.

Announcements were made of subcommittees to meet in the afternoon, and of the General Conference Committee to meet on April 12, following worship.

The work of the Spring Meeting having been completed, adjournment was taken at 11:50 A.M.

It has become evident that the implementation of the plan would involve some serious difficulties both financial and otherwise. It was therefore

VOTED, That Sections 3 and 4 relating to the diagnostic procedures beyond the routine health checkup and financial provision for the same, be eliminated, and that the Papanicolaou Test be included for women in the annual checkup. The provision for the annual physical examination for the General Conference staff would then read:

An annual routine health checkup shall be available to all full-time General Conference employees and General Conference workers' wives, this checkup being mandatory in the case of individuals over forty years of age. This routine checkup will consist of an examination of the ears, nose and throat, lungs, heart including blood pressure, abdomen, reflexes, and the rectal and genito-urinary tracts, also a complete blood count and urinalysis. For workers over forty years of age blood cholesterol check is provided on advice of a physician, and the Papanicolaou Test for women. Application should be made through the Treasury for the forms to be presented to the examining physician.

DR. J. H. MCFARLAND--SDA THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY:
