The meeting was called immediately following the worship period in the General Conference Chapel.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON PHYSICAL ARRANGEMENTS:

In the Committee meeting held on October 17 a report from the Committee on Physical Arrangements for the 1958 General Conference session as well as a report from the Committee on Secretarial and Office Help for the 1958 General Conference session had been distributed. This gave opportunity for careful reading of the reports. Consideration was given to the report from the Committee on Physical Arrangements, and with certain additions and changes it was adopted as follows:

The Committee on Physical Arrangements of the 1958 General Conference session presents the following series of recommendations:

Organization

Manager--Hans Kohler

Assistant Managers--I. V. Counsell, J. O. McLeod, J. O. Gibson, E. F. Willett

Locating Committee: Chairman, C. H. Kelly; Assistant, A. J. Patzer; Other Members--D. W. Hunter, W. N. Wittenberg, F. B. Knight, Pastors of the Euclid Avenue, Lakewood, and Regional Churches in Cleveland

The Locating Committee will assign hotel space to the various delegations and will be responsible for operating the registration desk.

Committee on Management during session: That the Manager, I. V. Counsell, J. O. McLeod, J. O. Gibson, E. F. Willett, C. L. Torrey, W. R. Beach, and W. P. Bradleyserve as a Committee on Management to care for all physical arrangements after arrival in Cleveland, this committee to continue to function until June 28.

Printing

That the Manager in counsel with R. H. Adair arrange for the printing of such stationery, labels, and other general material as may be needed.

Signs October 18, 1957

That all the departments and individuals concerned be asked to have plans for their signs and visual material completed by January 31, 1958, keeping in touch with the Committee on Physical Arrangements so as to avoid delays and congestion, and completing their work before leaving for Cleveland so far as this is practicable.

Requisition Form

That the Manager prepare and circulate a suitable requisition form on which the needs of the various departments and groups can be listed, including furniture, desks, office equipment, pianos, blackboards, etc.; these forms to be filled in and returned by the time of the Autumn Council.

Post Office

That the Treasury arrange with the postal authorities in Cleveland for a branch office to be operated in the auditorium during the session.

Book Display

That the Review and Herald Publishing Association be requested to lead out in the usual arrangements for the book display.

Globe and World Map

That the globe and world map showing the location of Adventist centers and growth of the work be brought up to date and sent to the session, W. R. Beach to supervise the revision.

Nursery Service

That the Manager make arrangements through the Columbia Union Conference for a suitable nursery service for the session.

Transportation Facilities

That F. B. Knight, with assistance where needed from the Columbia Union, provide the transportation services in the auditorium.

Badges

That the Secretary of the General Conference arrange for delegates' badges, the Manager to provide the necessary badges for his staff.

Seating of Delegates

That the committee appointed to assign seating space for delegates and to look after the distribution of material arrange for the standards and signs marking the location of delegations.

Sound and Recording Arrangements

That the Pacific Union Conference be requested to lend us the services of Leston Post to look after the special lighting, also the sound and recording arrangements, all recording activities to be in his charge; that except

for the official recording of proceedings as arranged by the Secretarial Department, all recording be done in a room set apart in the basement for that purpose, and a fee of \$5.00 be charged to each person for the use of the facilities provided; the release, sale, duplication or distribution of any recorded matter to be arranged and authorized only through the Secretarial Department, notices to this effect to be posted in the recording room.

Official Bulletin and Photographers

That the Review and Herald Publishing Association be asked to prepare and publish the official bulletin and to serve as official photographers.

Pictures for Sale or Distribution

That the official photographers, who are allowed to function at all times, be requested to arrange for suitable pictures, slides, and prints for sale to interested individuals.

Taking of Pictures

That in order to avoid interference and confusion in the services, all taking of photographs on the part of visitors and delegates be prohibited evening ervices, preaching services, evening programs and reports, during prayer, and during the hours of the Sabbath; that picture taking be allowed on week days during the business sessions, prior to the actual! commencement of the evening programs, and following the benediction; that it be the duty of the Manager and his assistants to see that this regulation is put into effect.

Personal Notices and Announcements

That personal notices and announcements to be made in the auditorium be cleared through N. W. Dunn, Leston Post to provide facilities for flashing these on the screen.

Radio and TV Programs

That the Radio Department prepare a provisional schedule of radio and possible TV presentations which involve the use of the auditorium.

Committee on Platform Decorations

That the following committee be appointed to plan and supervise the platform decorations in the main auditorium and in the auditorium where the young people will be meeting, and to assign them a budget of \$1500.00 for expenses. Committee appointed: H. L. Rudy, W. J. Harris, E. W. Dunbar, C. W. Bozarth, Mrs. V. G. Anderson, L. A. Skinner, Maybelle Vandermark.

Department Booth Expense

That the departments be allowed a budget of \$150.00 for the expense of decorating and preparing the respective booths on the basis that this does not include the painting of identification signs.

American Bible Society Exhibit

That an exhibit by the American Bible Society be displayed.

Literature for Free Distribution to non-Adventists

That the Home Missionary and Publishing Departments give study to the providing of an appropriate piece of literature that can be distributed quite freely to non-Adventist visitors at the General Conference session. (T. L. Oswald, Chairman)

Assignment of Space

That the assigning of space and completion of arrangements in the auditorium be as follows:

- 1. Booths for departments, bureaus, institutions, and divisions to be located in the main exhibit hall beneath the auditorium, along the east and west walls.
 - 2. Information, registration, and reception desk to be in the main lobby.
- 3. Lobby and writing room to be in the main exhibit hall, north end, starting at the foot of the stairs and extending south to the third row of posts.
- 4. First-aid room--provided on second floor of auditorium at south end of east corridor, service to be arranged by Manager through Columbia Union Conference as necessary.
- 5. Day nursery and mothers' room--third floor, Clubroom C, service to be arranged by the Manager through Columbia Union Conference.
- 6. Book and periodical stand-to be situated in middle of main exhibit hall, about 40' x 92' in size, starting at third row of posts from north end.
- 7. Transportation -- to use space with two windows adjacent to and north of cashier's windows.
 - 8. Post office -- to use Western Union space.

- 9. Checking rooms. Two are conveniently located adjacent to rooms #132 and #163 near arena entrance.
 - 10. Bulletin boards--to be in main lobby.

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- 11. Recording room for private recordings -- to be partitioned off in south end of south exhibit hall, space assigned as required.
- 12. Prayer room -- to use small dressing room, east side of platform, second floor.
- 13. General stenographic pool and dictating room--space to be set off in south end of west main floor corridor.
- 14. Ministers' assembly and prayer room; also steering committee -- to use musicians' room at west side of platform.
- 15. Review editorial room—to use either service room at rear of fourth floor ballroom, or chorus dressing room, second floor, west side of platform.
 - 16. Photo studio for Review, in connection with above.
 - 17. Manager, assistants, messengers--Office #132.
 - 18. President--Office #165; Vice presidents, #163.
- 19. Treasurers--room adjoining the cashier's windows and counting room (#143?); Treasury secretaries, #135.
- 20. Secretaries with Secretarial Department stenographers--space as needed in south end of west main corridor.
 - 21. Session recorders -- adjacent to #20 above.
- 22. Cashier's office--to use three ticket windows together with small room at rear, on east side of main lobby.
- 23. Choir--chorus dressing rooms are available, both east and west sides; also platform of Little Theater.
- 24. Radio studio -- two rooms, #286 on west side; middle of second floor corridor.
- 25. Public Relations room--#148 at east end of short corridor off main lobby.
 - 26. Sign painters--to work in corridor space beyond musicians' room.
- 27. Ushers and distribution of materials -- in connection with Nos. 20, 21 in west corridor.
 - 28. Headquarters hotel--Hotel Cleveland.
- 29. Offerings: No restrictions; W. E. Phillips to be in charge, and he will see to providing offering envelopes and plates and will organize personnel.

31. Sabbath meeting arrangements:

- 1) Children's Departments: To use rooms as listed in #30 (except Music Hall) as needed.
- 2) Youth Section: A committee investigated Cleveland Arena and reported it to be unsuitable. First choice is the Armory, located across the street from the Municipal Auditorium, which is convenient, suitable, and would hold about 3,500; but its availability is uncertain. After further investigation it was agreed to reserve the Baptist Church at 18th and Euclid, seating 2,275, but to use the Armory if it becomes available in March or April, 1958. (It would need a platform 12' x 18^{*} x $3\frac{1}{2}$.)
- 32. Chairs for veterans and small chairs for children--to be arranged by the Manager and J. O. McLeod.
- 33. Arrangements for the deaf--some seats in front of the auditorium to be wired for phones; section in balcony, southeast end to be reserved for deaf mutes; to investigate availability of interpreter from Greater New York or California.
- 34. Method of hanging charts, maps, etc., in auditorium by wire or otherwise, to be arranged by the Manager.
 - 35. Exposition service, renting of furniture -- the Manager will arrange.

Care of Lobby and Reception Room at General Conference session:

That J. A. Stevens be requested to take the responsibility of supervising the lobby and reception room in the downstairs area adjoining the exhibits.

Height of Partitions Around Booths

That the partitions for the booths be eight feet in height.

Furniture for Exhibit Booths

That the following basic list of furniture be approved for each booth at the General Conference session:

Sale of Newspapers

That the sale of newspapers within the auditorium not be permitted during the session.

Public Signs

That a committee be appointed to work out plans for public signs to be displayed outside the auditorium setting forth the time and nature of the General Conference session. Committee appointed: L. K. Dickson, Howard Weeks, D. A. Roth, O. A. Blake, W. P. Bradley.

Hours of Exhibit Booths

That the exhibit booths be closed during the morning devotional meetings and also during the night meetings, as well as on the Sabbath.

Watchmen

That the Manager and C. H. Kelly complete arrangements for watchmen.

It is estimated that three will be needed from the General Conference and that the Columbia Union might be able to supply three as well.

Messengers

That eight messengers be hired and that the rate of remuneration be one dollar per hour; that all messengers employed for the session be at least sixteen years of age at the time of the session, and that the names of those wanting employment be referred to the Manager.

Map of Cleveland

That arrangements be made to print in the program folder a reduced copy of the map of the central section of Cleveland which appears in the brochure, "Why They Come to Cleveland"; also that a supply of this map be printed separately for general distribution to visitors at the General Conference session.

Pulpits and Other Furniture for Meeting Rooms

It is understood that requests for furniture and equipment for use in the various committee and meeting rooms will be made to the Manager by the departments or organizations using these rooms. Regarding rooms whose use is not by any department such as the prayer room, ministers' meeting room, Nominating Committee room, etc., it was agreed—

That the equipping of these rooms be arranged by the Manager, J. O. Gibson, and O. Λ . Blake.

Gratuities

That the matter of gratuities to certain individuals at the Cleveland Convention Auditorium be referred to the Manager, C. H. Kelly and F. B. Knight, with power to act.

Directory of Frequently Used Local Telephone Numbers

That Evelyn Wells be asked to prepare a directory of frequently used local telephone numbers in Cleveland.

Sign Painters

That two sign painters would be required at the session, and that the Manager make arrangements for these.

Songbook

The Review and Herald has proposed the use of the new book <u>Songs of Praise</u>, at the General Conference session, and will supply five thousand copies at a special price.

That <u>Songs of Praise</u> be used at the session, ordering five thousand copies; and that these be sold at the close of the General Conference session at cost to the first buyer.

Windshield Stickers

It was reported that arrangements might be worked out through the police commissioner of the City of Cleveland for delegates and visitors attending the session to have special parking treatment. It was agreed

That the Manager be requested to look into this and if the plan is possible to prepare special stickers to be used on the windshields of automobiles of individuals attending the session which will make them eligible for special parking arrangements.

R. R. Figuhr mentioned the recent illness of C. B. Haynes who is now in a somewhat low physical condition, and suggested he be remembered in prayer. In the prayer that followed by E. D. Dick, intercession was made in behalf of Elder Haynes, and the blessing and guidance of God was asked on the plans laid in the Council.

A welcome to the Autumn Council was extended to the delegates by R. R. Figuhr. He referred to the fact that the feeling between nations has become in recent months increasingly acute. There is a threatened annihilation of nations, perhaps of the world population itself. This is a challenge to us who believe that God has given to this people the last important and great message to go to the world. It should make us serious, earnest, and fervent in the tasks to which God has called us.

October 24, 1957

Elder Figuhr spoke of the organization of the early church as recorded in the book of Acts, chapter 6: 1-4. They united in a great, common program, carrying what we call the good news to the world. We have united in the same program of world evangelization. The organization at first must have been very simple. Then as there arose a murmuring because of apparent neglect, the twelve apostles asked the disciples to "Look ye out among you seven men of honest report, full of the Holy Ghost and wisdom, whom we may appoint over this business, but we will give ourselves continually to prayer and to the ministry of the word." The problem seems to have been solved.

It is good to look back over our own church history and to see how marvelously God has led in the development of our unique church organization. Referring to Testimonies to Ministers and Gospel Workers, page 24, Elder Figuhr spoke of the fact that in the beginning our members were few and poor, but they were aggressive, with great plans. He read from the following pages regarding the progress of organization and membership. God has blessed us because we have a united program. We ought to follow God's plan for carrying on God's work in God's world in a united and co-operative way. As we enter into our discussions, may it be with a fervent desire to be a united group, to accomplish the things of God to the glory of His name.

The Secretary, W. R. Beach, then presented cabled greetings which had been received from overseas fields, which point up the solidarity of the Advent Movement and the loyalty of our members. The first item brought to the attention of the delegates was the Financial Statement. On request of C. L. Torrey, O. A. Blake spoke on the outstanding items in the Treasury Reports.

O. A. Blake referred to the Summary of World Field Requests as given on the first page of the Estimated Needs of Foreign and North American Divisions for 1958, and stated the total budget requests for 1958 for the world field are \$23,193,867.17. C. L. Torrey stated that during the year 1956 the tithes and offerings were the largest in the history of our work. C. J. Nagele gave a brief report of the business being done by Harris Pine Mills. Their profits are approximately \$50,000 more than they were for the same period last year. The work is in the hands of good, loyal Seventh-day Adventists.

AUTUMN COUNCIL

Two Hundred Twenty-fifth Meeting

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

October 24, 1957, 4:00 P.M.

The second business meeting of the Council convened at 4:00 P.M. with prayer by J. J. Nethery.

AGENDA ITEMS:

Agenda items were assigned to various committees.

SCHEDULE OF MEETINGS FOR 1958:

VOTED, That the Chair, in consultation with the Secretary, appoint a committee to study the schedule of conventions and councils to be authorized for 1958, and report back to the Autumn Council. Committee appointed: L. K. Dickson, R. R. Figuhr, W. B. Ochs, W. R. Beach, N. W. Dunn, and Union Conference Presidents.

STATISTICAL REPORT FOR 1956:

H. W. Klaser, Statistical Secretary, presented the ninety-fourth Annual Statistical Report of Seventh-day Adventists, calling particular attention to encouraging items in our various fields of church endeavor. The total number added to the Church by baptism and profession of faith during the year 1956 was 82,925-78.6 per cent overseas, and 21.4 per cent in North America. The net gain in membership for the year 1956 was 45,234, of which 85.55 per cent was overseas, and 14.45 per cent in North America. The denominational tithes and offerings for the entire world amounted to \$74.40 per capita, an increase of \$2.16 per capita over the previous year. Per capita giving in North America for the last year was \$202.02, an unprecedented figure and a higher annual per capita giving than any other Protestant denomination.

A comparison of interest to the delegates was the fact presented that during the year 1956 the increase in church membership in overseas divisions was 4,487 more than for the previous year, and that with 250 fewer evangelistic workers; while in North America the increase in membership was 318 under the figure for the previous year, although 220 more evangelistic workers were employed.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR SANITARIUMS AND EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS:

H. W. Klaser, Statistical Secretary, presented financial summaries and analyses of North American sanitariums, academies, and colleges for the year 1956-157.

SDA COMMENTARY COMPLETED:

F. D. Nichol reported that the seventh and last volume of the SDA Commentary is now on the press on schedule, within five years from its

beginning. Each volume has a total of over a thousand pages, complete with colored maps, drawings, and very extensive index. It is felt that several plans have helped to make the project a success—choosing as writers Bible teachers from colleges and the Seminary; enlisting the helpful criticisms on the galley pages of other of our denominational Bible scholars; checking with all our former publications, all the writings of the Spirit of prophecy, and all archaeological findings—even the most recent; giving frank, tentative statements where information is varied; the consecration and assistance of all co-operating. They did not create an Adventist theology by the preparation of the Commentary, but they have endeavored to discover the consensus of thought and opinion.

1958 AUTUMN COUNCIL:

VOTED, That the Chair appoint a committee of seven to study the plan for the Autumn Council of 1958—the time, the place, and the attendance. Committee appointed: R. R. Figuhr, A. L. Ham, C. A. Scriven, F. W. Schnepper, D. R. Rees, V. G. Anderson, R. H. Nightingale.

EXPANSION GRADUATE PROGRAM WALLA WALLA COLLEGE--REPORT OF SURVEY COMMITTEE:

The following recommendations from the General Conference Officers were adopted:

We recommend, That the following report of the Survey Committee regarding the Expansion of the Graduate Program at Walla Walla College be approved:

"One of the great needs of the Church is for an adequate corps of well-trained teachers who will serve the ever-increasing number of students in the schools of the Church. This need, together with increasing need of upgrading our teachers to meet state and national requirements, the growing desire of Adventist youth for graduate education, and the responsibility of the Church to provide opportunities for graduate study within the framework of the Church, causes Walla Walla College to request authorization to expand the graduate program to include chemistry and history.

"The Survey Committee recognizes the following implications:

- "1. Presently, a minimum of four teachers would be required for an adequate graduate program in chemistry. In history, the full-time services of at least two teachers and the part-time services of another would be required. It is believed that the above number of teachers is the minimum. Increases in the undergraduate enrollment would necessitate employment of additional staff.
- "2. Recognizing that adequate library resources are the <u>sine qua non</u> of graduate education, it would be necessary to provide within the next two years \$5,000 for each of the departments, this amount to be in addition to the present library budget.
- "3. An additional budget for laboratory equipment and teaching aids, sufficient to meet the needs of the advanced program, would be required.

- "h. It is understood that adequate space for research will be provided in the planned expansion of the Chemistry Building.
- "5. Recognizing that graduate education is expensive and will not support itself, increased subsidies should be provided by the Board.
- "6. With the increased emphasis of science and technology in modern society, it is recognized that many opportunities for research grants are available which would materially enhance our total program.
- "7. It is recognized that the operation of an adequate graduate program requires the strengthening of other supporting departments within the College.
- "8. It will be recognized that a graduate program will necessitate provision of opportunities for creative research on the part of the staff.

"In view of the needs of the field, the necessity of upgrading present preparation level of our in-service teachers, the growing interest of our youth in graduate study, and the responsibility of the Church to provide opportunities for such study, a survey of the resources and facilities of Walla Walla College, and the willingness of the Board of Trustees of the College to support a graduate program;

"We recommend, That Walla Walla College be authorized to offer graduate programs in chemistry and history to the Master's degree level."

AUTUMN COUNCIL

Two Hundred Twenty-sixth Meeting

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

October 25, 1957, 10:15 A.M.

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The third business meeting of the Council was opened with prayer by T. Carcich. A. L. Ham in the Chair.

The Council recessed to give time for a meeting of the International Insurance Company called at this hour.

INTERNATIONAL INSURANCE COMPANY:

H. L. Rudy took the Chair, and called to order the meeting of the International Insurance Company. Opportunity was given for the distribution of

the Financial Statements of the International Insurance Company and the General Conference Insurance Service, an informative statement entitled "Denominational Properties can Burn!", also a copy of the Insurance Highlights, which contained a letter to denominational administrators re brochures to be provided giving insurance data. Statistics and Financial Statements were then presented by J. W. Pecke, and these were accepted to be recorded in the minutes of the Company. Action was taken referring to the Nominating Committee of the Council the filling of vacancies on the Board of Directors, it being stated that the term of office for the following persons expires this year: W. R. Beach, H. T. Elliott, H. L. Rudy, and C. L. Torrey.

Adjournment was taken at 10:55 A.M. until 10:15 A.M., October 28, 1957.

INTERNATIONAL TEMPERANCE ASSOCIATION:

A. L. Ham, as Vice-Chairman, called to order the meeting of the International Temperance Association. Dr. W. H. Beaven, in the absence of W. A. Scharffenberg, reported on world activities by the Secretaries and workers of the International Temperance Association. He gave a wonderfully inspirational report, and action was taken expressing to Doctor Beaven appreciation for the efforts being made in behalf of the International Temperance Association on his part, and thanks to the University for allowing him to continue his services also in the Temperance work. Jesse O. Gibson presented the Financial Statements for the International Temperance Association, which indicated a net worth of \$6,873.75 as of December 31, 1956. F. Brennwald read the Auditor's Statement, which was accepted.

The meeting of the International Temperance Association adjourned at 11:20 A.M.

AMERICAN TEMPERANCE SOCIETY:

A meeting of the American Temperance Society was called to order by H. L. Rudy, Chairman. Dr. W. H. Beaven introduced two new Associate Secretaries of the Temperance office: Jesse O. Gibson and James V. Scully; and also Francis A. Soper, Editor of Listen Magazine. Francis A. Soper in giving a brief report on his work stated that the Temperance office is endeavoring to place Listen in the hands of prominent clergymen throughout the United States. He also spoke of the plan to issue Listen bimonthly, beginning with the year 1958. James V. Scully briefly reported on the work he is carrying of developing leaders in the Temperance work. He presented by recording an appealing statement from a young man who is totally blind because of having taken too much alcohol. It is planned to use this recording in temperance work among young people.

Dr. W. H. Beaven referred to other developments in promoting temperance, speaking especially of the encouraging results following the Institutes of Scientific Studies for the Prevention of Alcoholism. Jesse O. Gibson presented the Financial Statements for the American Temperance Society, the total net worth as of December 31, 1956 being \$31,442.81, and it was voted to accept the Auditor's Statement. R. R. Figuhr expressed his conviction that the effectiveness of the Temperance work is largely due to the distribution of the

literature issued. He voiced the hope that co-operation will be given in circulating this good literature and the films on tobacco and alcohol.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:45 A.M.

The Council resumed its work.

UNIVERSITY -- ADDITIONAL SCHOLASTIC OFFERINGS:

The University Board presented a request for authorization to present additional offerings. It was

VOTED, (1) That authorization be given to the University to offer the Master's degree with a major in history; and (2) also to offer speech as a supporting field.

UNIVERSITY --- NAME OF:

E. D. Dick reported briefly on the efforts made to give a proper name to the School of Graduate Studies, and the fact that the name Adventist University had not received a favorable reception in the field, especially overseas. Some have advised that it be given a geographical name. The University Board having been authorized to give further study to an appropriate name, it was

VOTED, To adopt the recommendation of the University Board that the name of the School of Graduate Studies be the Potomac University.

PROMOTION FOR REVIEW AND HERALD:

Opportunity was given R. J. Christian, Periodical Department Manager of the Review and Herald Publishing Association, to speak briefly regarding the Review and Herald. He spoke of the plan to report the General Conference session in the Review and Herald for 1958, also of various methods being used to promote the circulation of the paper. In contributing in 1958 seventeen million pages of the official reports of the General Conference session the Review and Herald Publishing Association will be rendering the field a real service. He solicited the co-operation of the leaders in speaking a word in behalf of the Review. Complimentary copies of the Review and Herald were distributed.

The importance of having the Review and Herald in the home of every Seventh-day Adventist was stressed also by W. R. Beach. From personal experiences he stated that it is one of the most vital links in holding our churches together, and holding our members in the Church.

Recommendations from the Committee on Working Policy were adopted as follows:

BASIC RATE FOR PHYSICIANS:

We recommend, 1. That paragraph 18 of the Sustentation Policy be revised by adjusting the basic rate for physicians to read (last 2 lines),

"As may be in excess of the basic rate for physicians according to the current wage scale."

2. That the last sentence reading, "This policy shall become effective as from January 1, 1952," be deleted.

AMORTIZATION ON ALLOWANCES UNDER MEDICAL APPOINTEES RESIDENCY TRAINING PROGRAM:

We recommend, 1. That the following paragraph be added on page 106 of the Working Policy and that it be numbered paragraph 8; the following numbering to be revised accordingly:

"The General Conference and the overseas division concerned concurrently shall amortize the assistance given under this program on the basis of $12\frac{1}{2}$ per cent per year for each year the appointee serves in overseas mission service."

2. That the first sentence of the present paragraph 9 (new numbering, paragraph 10), be revised to read, "In the event the resident physician does not enter denominational service upon the completion of the residency, the moving expense to the place of residency and salary above the institution's regular resident rate shall be refunded to the General Conference by the resident within a maximum period of five years after the completion of the residency."

RESIDENCY PLAN FOR FURLOUGHING PHYSICIANS:

- We recommend, 1. That the first part of the sentence on page 172 of the Working Policy, paragraph 4 (second part) reading, "In view of this longer period of study," be deleted. The rest of the paragraph to remain as is.
- 2. That paragraph 8, p. 172 be revised to read, "not less than twenty per cent per year," instead of 12½ per cent.
- 3. That the following new paragraph to be numbered 9 be added to page 172, "The overseas division shall amortize its portion of the assistance under this policy on the basis of 20 per cent per year for each year the appointee serves in overseas mission service following receiving the benefits of this policy."

Further recommendations from the General Conference Officers were considered, and with amendment adopted as follows:

INDIVIDUALS TO BE TRAINED IN GEOLOGY AND PALEONTOLOGY:

WHEREAS, There is a need for giving selected individuals additional training in the fields of geology and paleontology in our colleges;

- We recommend, 1. That arrangements be made to send two mature, experienced men of proved loyalty, to take special studies in the abovementioned fields in qualified institutions for advanced study.
- 2. That the expense connected therewith be borne by the General Conference on the basis of the <u>Graduate Study Policy</u> now in effect.

- 3. That a budget of \$13,500 be provided to cover the cost involved during the first year.
- 4. That a committee of seven be appointed by the General Conference to discharge the following duties:
- a. To recommend to the General Conference Committee for approval the names of the individuals who should undertake this program of study.
- \underline{b} . To give the necessary guidance to these men in their study program.
- c. To make such recommendation as may be necessary to implement the progressive development of the program.
 - d. To administer the budget provided for this purpose.
- 5. That the committee be nominated by the Officers and elected by the General Conference Committee composed of representatives from the following:
 - a. The Officer group--3
 - b. The Department of Education -- 2
 - c. The University--2

The General Conference Officers and Union Presidents presented a series of recommendations, which with amendments were adopted as follows:

SPECIAL CONSIDERATION TO WORKERS
BY OUR MEDICAL INSTITUTIONS:

We recommend, To our medical institutions that as regards charges, special consideration be given to our denominational workers, and that the boards of these institutions give study to this matter with a view to adopting a plan whereby special discounts can be given to denominational workers, including those on Sustentation, recognizing the fact that in view of special area conditions it is difficult to develop a general policy applying to all institutions.

POLIO INOCULATIONS:

In view of the fact that polio inoculations have proved to be of great benefit to all who may be subjected to polio infection,

We recommend, That all our organizations, including the General Conference, provide for polio inoculations for each worker requesting them, and that the worker be authorized to report the full charge for these inoculations.

WASHVILLE AGRICULTURAL AND NORMAL INSTITUTE (MADISON COLLEGE) -- SUSTENTATION:

We recommend, That the following paragraph be inserted in the Sustentation Policy immediately following paragraph 61:

"The continuity of a worker's service shall not be considered broken, when, by consent or recommendation of the organization employing him, or by

regular call or transfer handled through denominational channels, after at least twenty years of service in denominational work, he discontinues his connection with the organized work and accepts employment at the Nashville Agricultural and Normal Institute, at Madison, Tennessee; but, except as provided in paragraph 61 above, the time spent in the employ of this self-supporting institution shall not be counted as service on which sustentation eligibility or rates shall be based should he later find it necessary to apply for sustentation benefits. It is understood that this provision does not apply to any other self-supporting institution or unit, even though it be related to Nashville Agricultural and Normal Institute."

SURVEY OF GENERAL CONFERENCE STAFF:

We recommend, That the Autumn Council appoint a committee to survey the General Conference staff with a view to making recommendations on its size and the character of the work that it is to render in the field, to the Home and Overseas Officers at their meeting prior to the 1958 General Conference session, and to the session.

PRE-SESSION MINISTERIAL INSTITUTES:

We recommend, 1. That the Ministerial Association Advisory Committee be authorized to meet on June 16 and 17 at Cleveland preceding the General Conference session, and that the members of the Advisory Committee who will be attending the General Conference session, and the union presidents and union evangelists who are appointed delegates to the session be invited to this meeting.

- 2. That authorization be given for the holding of a Ministerial Council in Cleveland, June 18 and 19, and that this Council deal with practical instruction in evangelism, opportunity being given for reports from successful evangelists, and discussion of methods to be employed for better results.
- 3. That a large gathering be not planned for, but that the union and local conference presidents and the union evangelists and other ministers in evangelistic or pastoral work who are appointed as delegates to the session be urged to attend.
- 4. That the Ministerial Association staff, in counsel with the available members of the Advisory Committee, plan for these meetings and that all information pertaining thereto be sent to the field through the union and local conference presidents.

Announcements followed concerning the afternoon, Sabbath, and Sunday morning meetings, and committees called.

Adjournment was taken at 12:30 P.M. until 10:15 Sunday morning, October 27.

On Sabbath afternoon, at 4:00 ?.M., a Symposium on Missions was given in the Sligo Church. W. R. Beach had charge of this meeting and was assisted by four Associate Secretaries, W. P. Bradley, N. W. Dunn, E. W. Dunbar, and E. E. Roenfelt. A number of missionaries on furlough, several of whom are in attendance at the SDA Theological Seminary, contributed to the Symposium. Costumes worn by these missionaries added color and interest. The importance of the task assigned to us as followers of Christ in giving the gospel to others was stressed. Many items of progress and incidents of interest were given. V. G. Anderson, president of the Columbia Union, told of forward-looking plans being carried out in this field in evangelistic endeavors. A short vesper service closed the meeting.

AUTUMN COUNCIL

Two Hundred Twenty-seventh Meeting

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

October 27, 1957, 10:15 A.M.

The fourth business meeting of the Council was opened with the song "Blest Be the Tie That Binds," and prayer by Frederick Lec.

Recommendations from the General Conference Officers and Union Conference Presidents were adopted as amended, as follows:

GENERAL CONFERENCE SESSION DELEGATES -- ALLOVANCES:

We recommend, That the following financial provisions be made for delegates to the 1958 General Conference session which is to be held in Cleveland, Ohio:

- I. For members of the General Conference Committee resident in North America and heads of associations, commissions, and services who may be appointed by the General Conference Committee to represent their particular work at the session and who may be accompanied by their wives:
 - 1. If traveling by automobile:
 - a. One full first-class railway fare each way.
 - b. One Pullman section each way.
- c. Travel allowance at \$7.00 daily for the round trip, the allowance to be calculated on the basis of 450 miles or major fraction thereof daily by direct route.

- d. Hotel room rent and \$7.00 daily while in Cleveland, including preand postsession meetings at which attendance is required.
- e. Garage rent at \$1.50 a day during the session, up to a maximum of \$20.00 for the entire time spent in Cleveland.
 - f. No allowance of any kind for children.
 - 2. If traveling by rail:
- a. One clergy rail fare each way for the husband or one first-class round-trip fare if he does not hold clergy certificate; one first-class round-trip fare for the wife, or one clergy fare each way if she holds clergy.
 - b. One Pullman section each way.
- c. Travel allowance at \$7.00 daily for the round trip, the allowance to be calculated on the basis of the most direct route.
- d. Hotel room rent and \$7.00 daily while in Cleveland, including preand postsession meetings at which attendance is required.
 - e. No allowance of any kind for children.
- II. For members of the General Conference Committee resident in North America and heads of associations, commissions, and services who may be appointed by the General Conference Committee to represent their particular work at the session and who are unaccompanied by their wives:
- (1) If traveling by automobile:

 Travel expense in harmony with the usual policy, including travel allowance at \$4.00 daily for the round trip, the allowance to be calculated at 450 miles or major fraction thereof daily by direct route.
 - (2) If traveling by rail:
 Travel expense in harmony with the usual policy.

GENERAL CONFERENCE SESSION--ALLOWANCES TO OFFICE STAFF:

We recommend, That members of the General Conference Office Staff who may attend the session be granted allowances as follows:

- I. To those who may be sent to the session for special duties but who are not members of the Committee nor heads of departments to be represented at the session:
 - (1) If traveling by automobile:
- a. One first-class round-trip rail fare, one lower Pullman each way, two days' travel allowance at \$4.00 daily.
- b. Hotel room in Cleveland at single rate during time services are required.
- c. Daily allowance of 34.00 while in Cleveland during the time services are required.
- (2) If traveling by rail:

 Same as (1), but two days' travel allowance for the round trip at \$4.00 daily.
- II. To those members of the General Conference Office Staff whose services are not required at the mession, but who request and are permitted to attend

and can arrange for a vacation of two weeks in order to do so: Cash allowance the equivalent of $l\frac{1}{2}$ cents a mile, and \$35.00, with the understanding that at least one week is actually spent at the session (including presession meetings), absence from the office beyond two-weeks' vacation time to be without salary; that $l\frac{1}{2}$ cents a mile and \$35.00 be the maximum grant in cases where both husband and wife are in the denominational employ and both attend the session on a vacation basis.

GENERAL CONFERENCE SESSION -- FIELD ALLOWANCES TO NONDELEGATES:

We recommend, That the provisions in the General Conference Session-Allowances to Office Staff, paragraph II, serve as a pattern in making arrangements for allowances to be granted to workers in the field who are authorized to attend the General Conference session or presession as non-delegates.

GENERAL CONFERENCE SESSION--

FURLOUGH WORKERS AND OVERSEAS NATIONAL DELEGATES:

We recommend, That the following suggestions be made to overseas divisions:

- 1. Allowances to workers on furlough in North America who are sent as delegates by their divisions be as follows:
- a. If accompanied by wife, two round-trip rail clergy fares with Pullman section and daily allowance of \$7.00. If travel is by automobile, daily allowance to be calculated at 450 miles daily by the most direct route. Hotel and daily allowance while at the session to be cared for by the General Conference on the same basis as delegates from the General Conference. All travel expense to be met by the division concerned. No allowances of any kind for children.
- b. If the delegate is alone, regular clergy rail fare under the policy with hotel room at single rate and daily allowance at \$4.00.
- 2. That the division deal directly in each case of a worker on furlough who is not a delegate to the session.
- 3. That the division concerned make arrangements for the outfitting and travel expense of overseas nationals attending the session as delegates.

GENERAL CONFERENCE SESSION -- STAFF HOUSING:

We recommend, That a General Conference staff member whose family, including dependent children, attends the session with him, be permitted to use other accommodations than the Hotel Cleveland with the understanding that he may report the cost of such other accommodation up to a maximum of \$12.00 per day.

PRESESSION DEPARTMENTAL MEETINGS-ATTENDANCE:

Inasmuch as the Educational, Home Missionary, Medical, Missionary Volunteer, Publishing, Radio and Television, and Sabbath School Departments, American Temperance Society, Ministerial Association, National Service Commission, Bureau of Public Relations, and Auditors have requested the privilege of holding presession departmental meetings;

- We recommend, 1. That all of the above Departments hold their departmental meetings between the dates Monday, June 16, and Thursday, June 19; the Officers and the Department leaders to work out the program schedule for these meetings.
- 2. That these meetings be held on the basis of representation from the General, Division, and Union Conferences, it being understood, however, that local conference men who are authorized to attend the General Conference session may be invited to participate in these meetings.

TELEVISION EVANGELISTIC FILMS-"IT IS WRITTEN":

R. R. Figuhr Commented on the new evangelistic films, a total of thirty, out of a planned fifty-two, which have been finished. The films in this series entitled "It Is Written," are designed for use in connection with evangelistic meetings. Elder Figuhr introduced W. O. Reynolds who spoke briefly regarding the organizational plans for the Washington area, where the television films are at present being tested. Members of the Washington area churches are participating in the various methods of contacting the interested people, and it is hoped that large numbers of enrollments in the Bible Course will result. In early spring a series of three-week decision meetings will be held for those who are interested. Television station and newspapers have cooperated wholeheartedly.

SMALL CONFERENCE FUND:

We recommend, That the present plan of aid to smaller conferences be continued, and that the appropriation from the Small Conference Fund for 1958 be as follows:

Conference A recommendation from the Officers and Union Presidents regarding the Million-Dollar Offering, was adopted as follows:

WHEREAS, The holding of the General Conference session in the year 1958 will furnish a special opportunity to approach all our people with an appeal for world advance in evangelism and a larger work in the mission fields,

- We recommend, 1. That a general offering be taken in all of our churches on Sabbath, June 7, and at the General Conference session on Sabbath, June 21, this offering to be known as "World Evangelism and Missions Advance."
- 2. That this offering take the place for the year 1958 only of the Missions Advance Offering and the Midsummer Offering.
 - 3. That the overall goal for this offering be one million dollars. (Concluded on page 1015)

That this offering be divided between the General Conference, and the overseas divisions and unions of North America, on the basis of 60 per cent to the General Conference and 40 per cent to the Divisions and North American unions, with the understanding that an amount equal to the 1956 Missions Advance and Midsummer Offerings be allocated from the General Conference share of the Million-Dollar Offering to the general mission funds, since these two offerings have always been a part of General Gonference income.

AUTUMN COUNCIL

Two Hundred Twenty-eighth Meeting

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

October 27, 1957, 4:00 P.M.

The fifth business meeting of the Council was opened with prayer by George Taylor, Religious Liberty Secretary in the Columbia Union.

W. B. Ochs, as Chairman, suggested that the delegates relax a bit from consideration of Council items. He requested A. H. Rulkoetter to introduce a distinguished guest. In turn, A. H. Rulkoetter said that our guest is known to most of the delegates as he has spoken in our camp meetings. Dr. Glenn L. Archer was introduced as an ardent and able defender of the principles of religious liberty. He is the Executive Director of Protestants and Other Americans United for Separation of Church and State.

Doctor Archer spoke of the great material resources of our country—the towering oil derricks pumping their black gold, the expansive wheat fields suplying bread for the nation. Important as these may be to our national welfare, he came to speak of a treasure more precious, that priceless heritage of the free church, the free state, the free society, and free conscience. Such a meeting as this could not be held today in at least twenty so-called Christian countries of the world. In no country do we have as full freedom

in the matter of religion as we have in this country. Why is this so? It is so because our forefathers guaranteed religious freedom to their children by writing the First Amendment into the Constitution which establishes the separation of church and state.

Live again, if you will, said Doctor Archer, the hardships, denials, and persecutions of our forefathers who crossed the sea of storm and suffering that their children might worship God according to a free conscience. Out of bitter experience, amid trial and error, they evolved four sound principles of law: (1) No church shall be established; (2) No citizen shall pay a tax to support his religion or that of any other; (3) No church shall have special privilege from the state; all must be equal before the law; (4) No citizen shall pass a religious test for public office. Doctor Archer gave quotations from certain church leaders which indicate that all churches are not happy with the American plan of separation of church and state. He spoke of the organization ten years ago of leaders from many walks of life, who met and decided to do something about the defense of church-state separation. They formed a non-profit, educational corporation known as Protestants and Other Americans United for the Separation of Church and State. With boldness and courage they have spoken out in the affirmance of our tradition, and corrected many violations of law in the courts of the nation.

He gave the following quotation from Dudley Field: "The greatest achievement made in the cause of human progress is the total and final separation of church and state. If we had nothing else to boast of, we could lay claim with justice that first among the Nations, we of this country made it an article of organic law that the relations between man and his Maker were a private concern, into which other men have no right to intrude. To measure the stride thus made for the emancipation of the race, we have only to look back over the centuries that have gone before us, and recall the dreadful persecutions in the name of religion that have filled the world."

He closed by saying "You are the champions of the grandness of the gospel of Jesus Christ; wherein men may be truly free."

A leaflet entitled "The Erec Pulpit" by Glenn L. Archer was distributed.

DR. GLENN L. ARCHER--AP RECIATION TO:

W. B. Ochs and R. R. Figuhr expressed to Doctor Archer the appreciation of the delegates for his visit, and this wonderful, timely message. It was

VOTED, To express our thanks to Dr. Glenn L. Archer for delivering this most eloquent, pointed, and timely message to the Council.

Recommendations from the Plans Committee were considered, and with amendments adopted as follows:

GIFT RESENTATIONS OF THE BOOK QUESTIONS ON DOCTRINE:

WHEREAS, It is important to give the book Questions on Doctrine the widest possible circulation,

We recommend, 1. That our churches be encouraged--

- a. To place this new volume <u>Seventh-day Adventists Answer Questions</u> on <u>Doctrine</u> in as many public, college, and <u>Seminary libraries</u> as possible.
 - b. To place a copy in each church library.
 - c. To urge every Seventh-day Adventist family to purchase a copy.
- 2. That copies of this book also be made available by our churches for presentation to ministers not of our faith who reside in the vicinity of the churches.
- 3. That the paster or district leader, possibly in association with the local church elder, be responsible for making the presentation to the libraries and the clergy.
- 4. That in order to make this program possible, we suggest that our churches take an offering and also that they encourage special gifts from the members.
- 5. That our conference presidents be urged to present this plan at workers' meetings at the carliest opportunity.
- 6. That the Ministerial Association prepare helpful suggestions for the making of these presentations to the various libraries and the clergy; lists of libraries by states to be furnished.
- 7. That to aid in integrating this denominational program of presentation to libraries and ministers, our Book and Bible Houses be requested to make a special price for these presentation volumes of \$4.50 per copy to our churches.

FIRST SABBATH MONTHLY MISSIONARY SERVICE:

WHEREAS, In the writings of the Spirit of prophecy: "We are exhorted not to forsake the assembling of ourselves together, these assemblies are not to be merely for our own refreshing. We are to be inspired with greater zeal to impart the consolation we have received."--Testimonies, Vol. 6, p. 365. And "Let the missionary meeting be turned to account in teaching the people how to do missionary work."--An Appeal to Our Churches, p. 11; and

WHEREAS, The successful accomplishment of missionary work on the part of all members depends on whether or not regular instruction and inspiration are given so that our people may be intelligent as to the work they are to do for God,

We recommend, 1. That the Autumn Council action of 1924, "That the first Sabbath of each month be designated as Home Missionary Day," be reaffirmed and re-emphasized.

- 2. That at Workers' Meetings and Church Officers' Institutes consideration be given as to how to make this service "intensely interesting."
- 3. That the plan of allocating the first Sabbath of certain months to various departments to carry forward a well-balanced missionary program be continued.

1958 INGATHERING GOAL:

WHEREAS, The Ingathering work in the North American Division has made tremendous progress during the past few years, so that by the end of September we had raised in 1957 a total of \$4,676,141.64; and

WHEREAS, The Ingathering goal of $\psi 3,750,000.00$ has not been increased since 1953, thus making the gap between the goal and the actual amount raised altogether too large,

We recommend, 1. That the Ingathering goal for 1958 be set at \$4,075,000 with the understanding that it will not affect the "basic goal."

2. That our Ingathering field objective for 1958 be to raise a total of \$4,850,000.00.

THE WEEKLY MISSIONARY SERVICE:

WHEREAS, The weekly 10-Minute Missionary Service has proved effective in stimulating missionary activity in our churches and in sponsoring a well-balanced evangelistic program; and

WHEREAS, In our denominational program it is the only time allotted on Sabbath for the promotion and presentation of missionary plans; and

WHEREAS, A decline in these weekly missionary services would be seriously reflected in decreased missionary activity with a resultant lessened baptismal harvest,

We recommend, 1. That we reaffirm our belief in the importance of the weekly 10-Minute Missionary Service in contributing to a well-planned, soul-winning church program,

- 2. That at workers' meetings to be held during the coming year, the importance of the weekly missionary service be presented and plans be laid to foster this service in every church.
- 3. That in connection with this weekly service, arrangements be made for church members to relate soul-winning experiences which may inspire others to do missionary work, and that the regular weekly missionary reports be taken every Sabbath.
 - 4. That in order to implement the Autumn Council action of 1947,

"That in order to train the children and youth of the church in missionary activity, they remain in their divisions after the close of the Sabbath school exercises for a ten-minute missionary service adapted to their age interests, dismissal of the children to follow this ten-minute missionary service,"

the Missionary Volunteer, the Homo Missionary, and the Sabbath School Departments co-operate in planning program material and procedures that will insure the success of this service.

LOCAL CONFERENCE SESSIONS -- DELEGATES AT LARGE:

We recommend, That the local conference constitutions be revised so as to make provision whereby not only persons who hold ministerial credentials and licenses, but also those holding missionary credentials, may be seated as delegates at large at local conference sessions.

NOMINATING COMMITTEES -- SUGGESTIONS:

Suggestions were made from the floor that provision be made for a larger nominating committee in the local and union conference sessions. The present provision is for seven to eleven in a local conference session, and eleven to seventeen in a union conference session.

VOTED, To refer this suggestion for study to the Home and Overseas Officers prior to the 1958 General Conference session.

Adjourned at 5:15 P.M. until 10:15 A.M. on Monday, October 28.

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

October 28, 1957, 10:15 A.M.

The sixth business meeting of the Autumn Council convened Monday morning at 10:15. A. W. Cormack offered prayer.

The Council recessed to give time for a meeting of the International Insurance Company which was called to meet at this hour.

INTERNATIONAL INSURANCE COMPANY:

H. L. Rudy took the Chair, and called for a report from the Nominating Committee, E. W. Dunbar, secretary of the Nominating Committee, read the report, and it was

VOTED, That we accept the report of the Nominating Committee that the following men serve on the Board of Directors for the International Insurance Company for a term of three years: W. R. Beach, H. T. Elliott, H. L. Rudy, C. L. Torrey.

Adjourned sine die.

October 28, 1957

The Council resumed its work.

BOARD OF REGENTS:

The Nominating Committee brought in its report on filling the vacancies on the Board of Regents, for a three-year term, and it was

VOTED, To appoint D. Lois Burnett and Nathaniel Parker to fill the present vacancies on the Board of Regents.

REPORT OF COLLEGE OF MEDICAL EVANGELISTS:

Since G. T. Anderson's report to the Board given a short time ago will be printed in the Review and Herald, Doctor Anderson reported briefly on a few important items. Their School of Dietetics has just been granted full accreditation for their internship program by the American Dietetic Association. The School of Dentistry received its final accreditation last year and the first class fully accredited has gone out. The faculty has recently made a statement of rededication to the purpose of Christian education and a pledge of loyalty to the church in upholding its standards before the students and before their associates. Progress is being made on their goal of staffing the school with our own leaders. The School of Tropical Medicine, set up in 1948, to assist in the worldwide program of denominational missions and research, finds their areas of research expanding through grants from various agencies for research purposes. The recent Week of Prayer led by E. L. Minchin in their two teaching areas of the College of Medical Evangelists proved exceptionally helpful and inspirational. The College of Medical Evangelists has no other purpose than that it will be all it should be in these days.

Recommendations from the Finance Committee were adopted as follows:

ENDOWMENT FUND:

We recommend, That our educational institutions be encouraged to build up an Endowment Fund, and that the Ford Foundation grants recently received form the nucleus of such a fund in each school, this Endowment Fund to be added to from time to time from available resources.

GRADUATE STUDY PROGRAM:

We recommend, That the following three paragraphs be added to the policy, entitled "In-Service Training Assistance," appearing on pages 89-90 of the General Conference Working Policy:

- l. In the case of a faculty member who, during such leave of absence, receives from nondenominational sources a scholarship, fellowship, or grant-in-aid which permits him to take a full program of graduate study and whose stipend is less than his regular full salary, the faculty member shall return to the college an amount equivalent to the stipend received, and in return receive from the college his regular full salary which would be allowed for a full program of teaching.
- 2. In the case of a faculty member who, during such leave of absence, receives from nondenominational sources a scholarship, fellowship, or grant-in-aid which permits him to take a full program of graduate study and

whose stipend is greater than his regular full salary, the faculty member shall return to the college a sum equal to his regular full salary. In return, he will receive periodically from the college his regular full salary check as he would if teaching on the college campus.

3. Faculty members engaged in graduate study as indicated above will be expected to return to the college for further service according to the regular denominational policy, but in no case for less than one year of service.

LOANS TO PHYSICIANS AND DENTISTS:

WHEREAS, A number of conferences are unable to increase their investment in loans to dental and medical students and graduates; and

WHEREAS, These loans may be arranged through regular banking facilities by help of the conference,

We recommend, 1. That conferences arrange for dental and medical graduate loans through local banking facilities, thus relieving conferences of this burden.

- 2. That doctors who have loans from conferences at present be requested to transfer their loans to banks.
- 3. That each local conference give study to setting a ceiling, approved by the union conference, for such contingent liabilities.
- 4. That interest payments shall be the responsibility of the loanee in accordance with the policy of the bank making the loan.
- 5. That repayment of the loan shall begin within twelve months following completion of internship, or at such a time as shall be mutually agreed upon by the loaning bank and the doctor, and that in no case shall the repayment period be more than four years following beginning of practice.

MINISTERIAL INTERNSHIP ALLOTMENT--1958:

We recommend, That provision be made for 124 ministerial internships for 1958, the two-year allotment to be as follows:

1. That 109 internships be assigned to the several unions as follows:

2. That 15 internships be assigned for Regional workers and be distributed by the North American Division Committee on Administration.

THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY MINISTERIAL INTERNSHIP ALLOWANCE:

We recommend, That provision be made for 18 ministerial internships for graduates of the Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary for the year 1958, and that they be distributed by the North American Division Committee on Administration in counsel with the Theological Seminary.

Recommendations from the Plans Committee were approved as follows:

FOLLOW-UP OF RADIO-TELEVISION BIBLE CORRESPONDENCE SCHOOL INTERESTS:

WHEREAS, There are thousands of individuals who have completed Radio-Television Bible Correspondence School courses who have never been visited, many of whom have expressed specific interest in the message,

We recommend, That conference administrators and their committees lay plans to intensify the follow-up program,

- 1. By encouraging the local conference Radio-Television Committee to formulate plans that will help ministers in their follow-up program.
- 2. By urging all church pastors to take immediate steps to visit all accumulated and current Bible School interests and to follow up promptly and thoroughly all such subsequent interests.
- 3. By giving added emphasis to this phase of evangelism at Workers' Meetings.
- 4. By arranging for local and union Radio-Television secretaries to devote time regularly to the visitation of Bible School interests in co-operation with local pastors.
- 5. By interesting and training laymen to assist ministers in the follow-up of Bible Correspondence School interests.

FIXED EXCHANGE RATES:

The Finance Committee recommended the Exchange Rates for the year 1958 which were adopted as follows: (See pages 1024-1026.)

THE 1958 AUTUMN COUNCIL:

The Committee on the 1958 Autumn Council presented its report, and it was adopted as follows:

We recommend, 1. That the 1958 Autumn Council be held October 15-21, 1958, at Takoma Park, D.C.

- 2. That the local conference presidents be invited to attend.
- 3. That the Officers of the General Conference be authorized to invite such other persons as appears advisable up to and including 25 in number.

AUTUMN COUNCIL

Two Hundred Thirtieth Meeting

GENERAL CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

October 28, 1957, 3:00 P.M.

The seventh business meeting of the Council was called to order at 3:00 P.M.

Dr. J. W. McFarland led in prayer.

In opening the meeting, R. R. Figuhr spoke of a letter received from Dr. A. W. Johnson who recently stopped off in New Mexico en route to California. He went to Las Cruces where two of our colporteurs had been arrested. The Judge suspended their fines on the basis they would not continue their work. Doctor Johnson had a visit with the Judge. The colporteurs had left one of their books with him. He had been reading it, and said that if the other books were as good as this one he was going to purchase a set. Elder Figuhr received a letter from H. J. Peverini, the president of the Austral Union, reporting that in the city of Tucuman they won over a hundred souls last year. Another hundred were baptized this year in a further effort. The newspaper write-ups mounted to ten and one-half pages. Four of the radio stations carried news of the meetings.

POLICIES AFFECTING UNIVERSITY STUDENTS:

Autumn Council Agenda item No. 9 was referred to by W. R. Beach--Present Seminary Policies in Relation to Financial Policies for University Students. He stated that the Committee to whom this item had been referred were unable to come to a conclusion. It was

VOTED, To authorize the Committee to report to a future Council.

EDUCATIONAL PROBLEMS:

It was stated that the Committee on Educational Problems cannot report at the present time. It was

VOTED, To authorize the Committee to report to a future Council.

SUDAN TERRITORY --

MISSION TERRITORY CENTRAL EUROPEAN DIVISION:

At the 1956 Autumn Council authorization was given for the transfer of the Sudan territory, which was formerly included in the Middle East and Northern European Divisions, to the Central European Division as mission territory. On suggestion of the Central European Division the General Conference Committee took action June 13, 1957, suspending the action of the 1956 Autumn Council until such time as the situation could be further studied. It is explained that the work in the Sudan could only be operated through Egypt. After discussion of the political situation existing in that area, it was

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VOTED, That the Middle East and Northern European Divisions continue to supervise the mission work in the Sudan, and that study be given to the assignment of other mission territory to the Central European Division.

FURTHER VOTED, That a committee be appointed to consider the item of assignment of mission territory for the Central European Division, and that this committee report to the Home and Overseas Officers prior to the General Conference session in 1958.

The Committee on the 1958 Autumn Council presented recommendations which were with amendment adopted as follows:

PRESIDENTS' COUNCIL:

We recommend, That in giving study to the future schedule of meetings, consideration be given to the holding of a Union and Local Conference Presidents' Council in 1959, the time and place to be arranged by the General Conference Officers.

ATTENDANCE 1960 AUTUMN COUNCIL:

We recommend, That the local conference presidents and such others as may be decided upon at the previous Spring meeting, be invited to attend the 1960 Biennial Council.

A recommendation from the General Conference Officers was considered and with revisions adopted as follows:

"MORE FUN FOR BOYS AND GIRLS":

We recommend, That the request of the Review and Herald to begin the publication, January 1, 1958, of a junior health sales journal for non-Seventh-day Adventist boys and girls under the title, "More Fun for Boys and Girls," be approved. The field of circulation for this journal will be found outside of the church through the sales of the literature evangelists. It will not be promoted in our churches for Seventh-day Adventist subscriptions.

The General Conference Officers and Union Presidents presented recommen - cations which with an addition were accepted as follows:

ANNUAL STATISTICAL REPORT AND YEARBOOK:

We recommend, 1. That in the General Conference Statistical Report, Table 1, Column 22, be eliminated. (This column lists the amount of tithe appropriated to fields outside of the conference.)

- 2. That Part 2 of Section 2 on medical institutions, page 24, of the Statistical Report, wherein self-supporting sanitariums are listed, be eliminated.
- 3. That the listing of all sustentation workers from the Workers' Directory of the Yearbook with the exception of ordained and licensed ministers, credentialed Bible instructors, and credentialed missionaries be eliminated, and that this list be obtained from the list of honorary credentials issued by the respective unions.

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- 4. That the Necrology list which has been published each year in the Yearbook be eliminated, but that the Statistical Secretary keep a card file of the deaths of all prominent workers.
- 5. That the list of School and Sanitarium Periodicals be eliminated from the Periodical listings in the Yearbook.
- 6. That under the Sabbath School Department summary, in the Statistical Report, an additional column be added, listing the per capita giving of Sabbath school members, on a church membership basis.

DIRECTOR OF FOOD SERVICE:

We recommend, That the title Director of Food Service be substituted for the title of Matron in all references to the person in our educational institutions who has charge of the kitchen, dining room, making up of menus, and preparation of food.

The Committee on Nursing Education presented a recommendation which with revisions was adopted as follows:

COST OF EDUCATION OF MIRSES:

We recommend, That the General Conference Officers appoint a representative committee including a hospital administrator, a nurse educator, a general educator, a college business manager and an accountant, to conduct a study to determine the cost of educating a Seventh-day Adventist nurse in preservice programs in North America, also the cost and value of such a course to the offcring medical institution, and that this group report its findings to the General Conference Officers for study and for counsel to the field.

Further recommendations from the Plans Committee were given consideration and with changes and additions adopted as follows:

PUBLIC RELATIONS ADVANCE IN 1958:

WHEREAS, The development of good public relations prepares the way for a better understanding of the church, its faith and its objectives, and creates a favorable attitude toward our evangelistic program,

We recommend, 1. That in order to take advantage of the opportunity which the General Conference session year affords, our public relations program be intensified.

- 2. That our local churches be encouraged to list their location and hours of worship, in newspaper church directories, telephone and city directories and maps, hotel and motel lobbies, trailer parks, rail, bus air and ship terminals, military camps, and organizations such as the YMCA, YWCA, USO. etc.
- 3. That early in the year, each conference conduct a definite campaign for the erection of the roadside signs now available, in order that the public may be aware of the location of Seventh-day Adventist churches.

- 4. That more intensive use of media of information be made to explain Adventist beliefs and attitudes concerning public issues, and to establish in the public mind the true characteristics of the Advent Movement.
- 5. That arrangements be made in each union to train conference Public Relations secretaries and local church press secretaries and pastors, in order that their public relations efforts may be more precise and effectual.
- 6. That conference Public Relations directors be encouraged to develop plans to help institutions, churches, and headquarters offices in their public relations work, and that wherever possible full-time Public Relations secretaries be appointed.

SPECIAL HELP FOR YOUTH FACING MILITARY SERVICE:

Because of the special problems we face in military service.

- We recommend, 1. That pastors of our churches that have young people who are approaching military age, be urged to keep in close touch with such youth, carefully instructing them as to the reasons why the Church counsels its young people not to enlist, but to wait for the draft.
- 2. That our church pastors encourage our youth who are in the military age group to take the Medical Cadet course.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION PROMOTION:

WHEREAS, The Spirit of prophecy states that "the Lord would have the children gathered out from those schools where worldly influences prevail, and placed in our own schools" (CPT 166); and "nothing is of greater importance than the education of our children and young people" (CPT 165); and "no other work committed to us is so important as the training of the youth" (Ed 218); and

WHEREAS, Many of our Seventh-day Adventist children and youth are attending secular schools and therefore are not under the protection of the church schools; and

WHERE/S, Conditions today make it imperative that we protect our children and youth by providing them with an education which will build Christian character and prepare them for God's service,

- We recommend, l. That the doctrine of Christian education be vigorously presented at conference and church officers' meetings in order to lay upon our leaders their privileges and obligations with reference to this important matter.
- 2. That in view of the increasing pressure on the existing church school facilities and the very definite forecast that the enrollment is expected to increase sharply during the next few years, local conferences carefully survey the elementary education needs, study the prospect of future growth, and lay plans for the development of elementary and intermediate schools to care for the increase which is expected during the next five to seven years.

3. That in view of the fact that there exists a serious shortage of qualified elementary and intermediate teachers in the North American Division, we urge our union and local conferences to give serious study to this situation and to take immediate steps to increase the number of teachers and to lift the level of preparation of the teachers now employed.

SPECIAL OFFERING FOR THE COLLEGE OF MEDICAL EVANGELISTS:

WHEREAS, The medical missionary work of the College of Medical Evangelists should be brought to the attention of our people more effectively; and

WHEREAS, Our churches are called upon once each year to support this work with an offering,

We recommend, 1. That the College of Medical Evangelists carry the principal responsibility of clarifying the missionary objectives of the institution and promoting this special offering.

- 2. That personal soul-winning experiences of our medical missionaries receive special emphasis in the material that is sent to the churches for the promotion of the offering for the College of Medical Evangelists.
- 3. That the College of Medical Evangelists be counseled to make available as many able speakers as possible for the camp meetings, and prior to the date set for the offering, to contact the graduates of the College of Medical Evangelists throughout the country with a view of recruiting speakers for our churches who are in a position to represent effectively the missionary activities of the institution.

INSTITUTING LEGAL PROCEEDINGS INVOLVING RELIGIOUS LIBERTY PROBLEMS:

WHEREAS, It might be greatly to our disadvantage if legal procedures involving religious liberty are initiated without proper counsel,

We recommend, That local conferences seek the counsel and approval of the unions, which in turn will consult with the General Conference before instituting proceedings; and further,

That the prevailing denominational policy of allocation of costs not be made available unless these suggested steps are taken.

CALL TO PUBLIC EVANGELISM:

WHEREAS, A sense of urgency is everywhere apparent in world events indicating that this is indeed the hour of our destiny; and

WHEREAS, We recognize that the Advent Movement has been divinely commissioned to carry God's last message of mercy to a doomed world; and

WHEREAS, Unprecedented demonstrations in the field of public evangelism have recently revealed the heart hunger of the masses for the saving gospel of Jesus Christ,

We recommend, 1. That a denominational call be made for a worldwide rededication of our ministry to the public proclamation of the everlasting gospel of a crucified, risen, and soon-coming Saviour, and that our ministers be urged to conduct evangelistic meetings in as many places as possible, utilizing public auditoriums, our own churches, and every other available facility.

- 2. That in connection with these meetings, we follow the counsel of the Spirit of prophecy (Evangelism, pages 143, 562), and make a study of the community with a view to laying plans to present the message in such a way as to meet community needs, win the confidence of leaders of other Christian groups, and make favorable impressions on the general public.
- 3. That our union and local conferences give study to developing evangelistic teams, associating workers of varied talents, thus adding strength to their soul-winning programs in order to meet the challenging counterattractions of these modern times, and that where our devoted laymen have been

faithfully sowing the seed of truth we endeavor to reap the harvest by holding short evangelistic revivals.

- 4. That we recognize the importance of medical-ministerial evangelism, and encourage our consecrated doctors to add the weight of their influence and professional skill to the evangelistic program.
- 5. That our ministerial workers be urged to do more personal visitationevangelism in the homes of the people; and that our conferences give study to developing more Bible instructors for home evangelism.
- 6. That in places where circumstances do not permit the holding of regular evangelistic meetings, we urge that evangelistic Bible classes be organized to which our members can bring their interested friends; and that those who lead out in these classes be encouraged to make the presentations effective by using the excellent visual aids now available.
- 7. That in all phases of our evangelism we endeavor to fulfill the real purpose of the Advent message, which is "to bring more prominently before the world the uplifted Saviour" and to make Him "appear in His efficacious work as the Lamb slain, sitting upon the throne;" and recognizing that "The sacrifice of Christ as an atonement for sin is the great truth around which all other truths cluster," we heed the counsel, "Christ and His righteousness—let this be our platform, the very life of our faith," and thus prepare through the proclamation of the everlasting gospel, in the setting of the last messages of God to mankind, a people ready to meet their Lord. *(Evangelism, pages 190-191)

WEEK OF PRAYER APPEAL:

We recommend, That the following urgent appeal from the Autumn Council for a more effective Week of Prayer be sent to all our ministers and church leaders:

We stand on the threshold of eternity. Each day brings us nearer to the coming of the Lord and still nearer to the great crisis which will test every soul on earth. Only a spiritually awakened and triumphant church can stand in that tremendous hour. We have been warned that "a storm is arising that will wrench and test the spiritual foundation of every one to the utmost. Therefore avoid the sand-bed, hunt for the rock; lay your foundation sure. Build, oh, build for eternity! Build with tears, with heartfelt prayers." --Testimonies, Vol. 5, p. 129. Uncertainty, perplexity, and confusion abound on every hand. World-shaking events are taking place with terrific rapidity. Such conditions can be faced only by those who have been transformed into the likeness of our Lord Jesus Christ. In view of the events which lie ahead,

We urge that this coming Week of Prayer be made an occasion, when, with deep heart-searching and with souls that thirst after God we seek a more vital relationship with the Lord our Righteousness.

From its inception this has been the supreme objective of our annual Weeks of Prayer. While through more than seventy years these annual prayer convocations have brought great blessing to the Church of God, we, assembled in Autumn Council, feel that in view of these momentous times our people everywhere should seek to make this coming Week of Prayer an experience of vital

spiritual blessing and victory. We urge all our ministers and workers to take a particular and personal interest in making this occasion one of genuine revival and reformation, seeking through the use of the special messages as found in the Week of Prayer Review to lead the Church into a preparation for the mighty infilling of the Holy Spirit, and utilizing to this end the special Readings prepared.

Open doors on every hand becken Spirit-filled heralds of the gospel. Soon many of these doors will be closed. Now is our opportunity. Today more than ever before the cause of God stands in a prominent position in the eyes of the world. Sensing that this is indeed the hour of our destiny, let us endeavor to make this Week of Prayer the greatest spiritual blessing in our history.

That we believe in planning for the development of future Public Relations workers, and we recommend that our colleges give consideration to conducting Seminars in Public Relations during the summer sessions; and that a committee be appointed by the General Conference Committee to foster the planning for Seminars in Public Relations in selected colleges in 1958.

GLENDALE S.D.A. CREDIT UNION:

An organization named "Glendale S.D.A. Credit Union" has been set up in California. It was

VOTED, To request our church members not to use the name nor the initials of Seventh-day Adventists in denominational organizations or enterprises.

A.S.I. SECRETARY:

VOTED, That Section 2 of the series of recommendations of the Autumn Council of 1951, page 76, pertaining to the Association of Seventh-day Adventist Self-Supporting Institutions, be amended to read as follows:

That the Association secretary-treasurer devote to the interests of such organization such time as, in the judgment of the General Conference Committee, may be necessary, it being understood that this will not necessarily require full time, and that his salary and expense together with stenographic and office expense, be included in the General Conference Committee budget.

Further, that the Association of Self-Supporting Institutions be notified of this amendment.

A meeting of the North American Division Committee on Administration was called at 4:40 P.M. Consideration was given to recommendations from the War Service Commission. The recommendations as passed will appear in the minutes of that Committee.

A.S.I. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE:

A recommendation from the Officers was presented and adopted as follows:

We recommend, That the following be appointed as A.S.I. Executive Committee members at the time of the next biennium meeting of the Association of Self-Supporting Institutions: W. B. Ochs, W. R. Beach, W. P. Bradley, H. T. Elliott, A. L. Ham.

MISSION RY BOOK OF THE YEAR:

VOTED, That a book comprised of Steps to Christ and Mount of Blossing be used in 1959 as the book of the year.

BUDGET FOR 1958:

The 1958 Budget as presented to the Council exceeded the Budget for 1957 by \$3,241,196.76. The Treasurer expressed appreciation for the sacrifice of our people in making possible this large appreciation, amounting to \$26,064,954.95. These funds will greatly strengthen our work throughout the world field. O. A. Blake presented the recommendations from the Budget Committee which were adopted as follows:

A further statement was made by the Treasurer in regard to the special appropriations made from the Working Capital, as listed on page 1 of the Budget, amounting to \$3,508,950.00. The funds drawn from Working Capital reduced the Authorized Capital by \$1,508,950.00. This reduces the Authorized Working Capital from 40 per cent to 32 per cent. It was further

- VOTED, To authorize the use of this \$1,508,950.00 for the 1958 budget with the understanding that the Constitution will be amended to provide for this percentage reduction in Authorized Working Capital.
- V. T. Armstrong expressed the wish that we could convey to our people throughout the field the thankfulness in our hearts for their loyal support and liberality.
- E. D. Dick stated in behalf of the Seminary and University deep and sincere appreciation for the unexpected and liberal provision made for the development of these institutions. He also pledged in behalf of these institutions the best possible application of these funds for the use intended.

A recommendation from the Plans Committee was presented and adopted, entitled "Expression of Gratitude," and by vote of the Council an expression of appreciation to our church members was added, as follows:
