R. R. Figuhr, Chairman, welcomed the members of the Committee to this meeting, and extended also a warm welcome to some of the retired brethren who were present.

The delegates stood for the opening prayer, which was offered by J. A. Stevens.

R. R. Figuhr spoke of the experience of Rehoboam as given in 1 Kings 12. A transition was being made from the reign of King Solomon to that of his son Rehoboam. Solomon had passed off the stage of action, and Rehoboam was taking over. Rehoboam had grown up in luxury and in peaceful times. Israel had come to Shechem to make him king. The people presented their grievances. They asked Rehoboam to make the yoke lighter than during his father's reign--rather a pathetic comment upon the reign of Solomon. The people were groaning under the burden. Rehoboam said, Give me three days and I will think it over.

Then Rehoboam went to the older men, the tried and true men who had gained wisdom by experience. He asked, What do you advise to be done? They suggested a course of procedure that would recognize why prosperous times had come to Israel and why Israel had thus been blessed. The money which should have been held in sacred trust was selfishly absorbed in ambitious projects. Money, wealth, influence, and power were in the nature of a trust. They were trust funds designated for a certain purpose, for the relief of the worthy poor and for the extension of the principles of the kingdom of God. But they were spent otherwise. The heavenly auditors would have turned in a different kind of statement from earthly auditors—if they had auditors at that time or anything that corresponded to them. These old men said, Be a servant to the people, and speak good words to them.

That did not seem to have the ring that Rehoboam expected. He went to the young men. They spoke brave words, Your little finger is going to be larger than your father's thigh. Rehoboam said to the people, I am going to add to what my father placed upon you in burdens. Those were very foolish words. They made certain the division of the kingdom of Israel. The breach created by the rash speech of Rehoboam proved irreparable.

The confidence of our people is one of our greatest assets. We must find a way of keeping the confidence of the good people, and of regaining the confidence of those who have gone astray. We must endeavor to do that more than in the past. We shall have more and more problems. But we must keep our people informed. We need the same degree of simple trust and faith in God, and full dedication to God as our pioneers. One of them went out with his patched trousers to cut hay to forward the cause of God. What a great evidence of faith that was! We must maintain simplicity. We must look at the expense involved in our buildings. We ought to build according to the needs, not in a small way, but large enough, with vision, and yet without needless expenditure. The funds which come into our hands are entrusted to us to forward the cause of God along right lines.

If we are faithful and true, there is a spiritual armor and protection the Lord throws about us; the Lord carries us through. The Lord will give us wisdom and guidance. By faith we can move forward.

A season of prayer followed, led by T. L. Oswald, A. L. Ham, and F. A. Mote. They asked the blessing of God upon the meetings, upon our leaders, and especially remembered F. W. Schnepper in prayer.

#### HINSDALE SANITARIUM AND HOSPITAL:

A statement was made by A. C. Larson, Administrator and Treasurer of the Hinsdale Sanitarium and Hospital, regarding the growth of the institution. There is need for an additional wing to be built to accommodate the patients. Plans are now being made to meet this need. The extension is to add 150 beds to the institution. It is estimated the cost will be \$\partial_1,000,000\$. The community have agreed to raise one half of the cost of the addition. One fourth of this amount is to be contributed by the Lake Union Conference and the Hinsdale Sanitarium and Hospital. It is anticipated that one fourth of the cost will be cared for by Hill-Burton funds.

On request of the Lake Union Conference and Hinsdale Sanitarium and Hospital, to enable them to obtain the needed Hill-Burton funds, it was

VOTED, To authorize the General Conference Treasurer to issue to the Hinsdale Sanitarium and Benevolent Association a letter of credit in the amount of \$500,000, with the right to draw upon this sum as may be needed, it being understood this guarantee of credit is valid until December 31, 1960.

Washington, D. C.

C. L. Torrey, the Treasurer, stated that he was very happy for what had been contributed in tithes and offerings by our people to the denomination during 1959. The tithe for 1959 amounted to \$41,331,984.35 for North America, and \$38,242,567.44 was received for 1958, or a net gain of \$3,089,416.91; or 8.07 per cent.

The Sabbath School and other mission offerings, aside from Ingathering, showed a very fine increase in 1959 over 1958, the amount being \$496,950.59. The Ingathering for 1959 was \$5,010,209.25, as compared with \$4,794,851.75 in 1958.

Elder Torrey stated that the finances of the General Conference were in good condition, the Working Capital being in hand in accordance with the General Conference Constitution.

#### STATISTICAL SECRETARY -- STATEMENT BY:

H. W. Klaser, Statistical Secretary, presented a report. The report, which was distributed, contained also three charts. The first gave a comparison of the North American Division baptisms and professions of faith for 1958 and 1959. This showed a decrease of 2,600 for 1959. During 1958 there were eight persons baptized for each active ordained and licensed minister; during 1959 this figure dropped to 6.3. The following two charts gave a comparative view of the various funds received during the year. One hundred thirty-seven dollars and ninetythree cents paid from within the North American Division each minute, day and night, during 1959, adds up to a tremendous amount: \$72,496,604.43 for all phases of evangelism. This is a per capita giving of \$227.30, an increase over the previous year of \$11.21. The third chart shows that there has been a steady increase in our membership growth, but in our giving to foreign missions, especially since 1930, there has been a constant drop each year in relation to each dollar tithe received. During 1930 there was 67.4 # given for foreign missions for each dollar tithe, whereas in 1959 this ratio figure dropped to 28.6 . While foreign mission offerings are proportionately less, various local church needs offerings are increasing. During 1959 the local church offerings exceeded the total offerings to foreign missions by \$4,565,141.

#### MISSIONARIES SENT DURING 1959:

W. R. Beach, Secretary, said that 1959 was a very fine year with regard to the sending out of missionaries. Of 1667 missionaries who were sent out last year, 253 were new workers, and 2114 were returning workers. There were also six who returned to their homelands on the basis of national workers. Twenty-three of the number sent out were doctors. Last year, of the total number of workers sent out, 60.7 per cent were sent from North America, and 39.3 per cent were sent from home bases overseas.

#### SABBATH SCHOOL FILM:

Time was then given for presentation of a film on the Australasian Division, especially portraying the needs in New Guinea, and the work being done among the primitive peoples in that area. Neal C. Wilson read the script. It was stated this film is to be ready for delivery by May 15, 1960.

## THE REVIEW AND HERALD-PROMOTION OF:

F. D. Nichol, Editor of The Review and Herald, spoke on the success and circulation of the church paper, The Review and Herald. He displayed a chart showing the growth in membership in North America from 1940-1959, and pointed out that three times during the 1940's and three times during the 1950's the total of apostasies and missing has been greater than the remaining net gain. He inquired what we do to try to hold each person to our membership. We have a marvelous organization, but the weakest link in the organization is between the pastor and the church people. One of the ordained means from the very beginning of the work to hold our people in the faith is the organ of the Advent Movement. He referred to the various features in The Review and Herald, and quoted letters from the field giving their reactions to the articles which appear. Another chart which was displayed gave the percentage increase in relation to membership of the circulation of The Sabbath School Worker, The Youth's Instructor, and The Review and Herald. He stated the difference lies in the promotion of the Review and most other of our papers intended for the church. The responsibility rests squarely with the leadership of the whole field. Elder Nichol moved, it was seconded, and

VOTED, That the Chair be asked to appoint a representative Committee to give wide study to the matter of the circulation of The Review and Herald, and to practical methods of achieving the goal that should be reached; this Committee to make a report to the 1960 Autumn Council.

Adjourned at 5:15 P.M. until 9 o'clock on April 6, 1960.

The second Business Session of the Spring Meeting of the General Conference Committee convened immediately following the devotional period.

#### NAME--EASTERN UNIVERSITY:

R. R. Figuhr, Chairman of the Potomac University Board of Trustees, presented the recommendation of the Board that the University be renamed a more fitting name for the eastern university since it has been transferred to Berrien Springs, Michigan, the name chosen being Andrews University. This name was chosen because it honors our first missionary, a scholarly, dedicated man, J. N. Andrews, and is a name that has a very strong Adventist appeal.

VOTED, To approve the name Andrews University, for the eastern denominational university, formerly known as Potomac University; and to authorize a meeting of the Constituency as may be necessary to adopt this name legally.

#### ACCOUNTING POLICIES IN MEDICAL INSTITUTIONS:

VOTED, To accept the report of the Committee appointed to consider many problems relating to hospital accounting, as follows:

The committee considered many problems relating to hospital accounting and developed a basis for an accounting system for our medical institutions. Included in this comprehensive study were the following:

- 1. The development of a system for the classification of accounts by numbers.
- 2. The development of uniform forms for a Balance Sheet, a Statement of Income and Expense, a Departmental Operating Summary, etc.
  - 3. The development of simple methods for distribution of indirect expenses.
- 4. Uniform methods for treating many technical accounting problems such as deductions from income, definition of charity, donated services, computation of required reserves for uncollectible accounts, etc.

We recommend, That the material developed, copy of which is on file with this action, be made available to the field through the Medical Department of the General Conference in the form of recommendations, counsel, or suitable manuals of operation rather than in the form of legislative policy.

## ATTENDANCE AT 1960 AUTUMN COUNCIL:

VOTED, That the Chair appoint a Committee to bring in recommendations regarding the attendance at the 1960 Autumn Council. Committee appointed: R. R. Figuhr, W. R. Beach, C. L. Torrey, Union Conference Presidents (including W. J. Blacker).

PERSONNEL TO ATTEND NORTH AMERICAN
QUADRENNIAL EDUCATIONAL COUNCIL, 1960:

In harmony with the usual practice, it was

VOTED, That invitations to attend the North American Quadrennial Educational Council in 1960 be extended to the following personnel:

Union Conference Educational Secretaries
Union Conference Assistant Educational Secretaries
and/or Supervisors (2)
Local Conference Educational Superintendents
Local Conference Elementary Supervisors (14)
Directors of Elementary Education from North American
Division Colleges

A representative group of Elementary School Principals as may be selected by the Union Conference committees (should not exceed more than one from each local conference).

ATLANTIC UNION CONFERENCE REQUEST FOR ASSOCIATE MISSIONARY CREDENTIALS FOR COOPERATING PHYSICIANS AND DENTISTS:

VOTED, To table for further study the request of the Atlantic Union Conference that there be created a credential for cooperating physicians and dentists, termed an Associate Missionary Credential.

## NEW RELIGIOUS LIBERTY TRACT:

VOTED, That we approve of the plan of the Public Affairs Department, Religious Liberty section, to print a tract on One Hundred Arguments Against Sunday Legislation, and that the Officers appoint a reading Committee for this new tract, which it is hoped will be widely distributed by our membership.

#### DEPARTMENTAL SIMPLIFICATION:

Since the activities and procedures in the Departments are becoming more complex and in some areas seem to overlap; and also because of the complexity and possible overlapping of publications within the Departments, it was

VOTED, That there be a Committee appointed by the Officers to study the question of Departmental simplification, and report to the 1960 Autumn Council.

#### APPORTIONMENT OF COST OF NURSES! EDUCATION:

Discussion was given to the financial load carried by the colleges and the sanitariums in regard to the cost of the nurses' training program. During the past year a survey has been made of the costs of operation of nurses' training schools, and since there could be a need for a more acceptable distribution of these costs, it was

VOTED, That the Officers appoint a representative Committee to study the cost of nurses' education to be apportioned between the colleges and sanitariums, this Committee to report to the 1960 Autumn Council.

#### PACIFIC UNION CONFERENCE

CENTRAL COLLECTION AGENCY PROGRAM:

VOTED, To grant the Pacific Union Conference a two-year extension of the period authorized for trial of the Central Collection Agency program on subscription book sales.

### NOMINATING COMMITTEE:

VOTED, That the following persons comprise the Nominating Committee for the Spring Meeting session: R. R. Figuhr, W. R. Beach, W. J. Blacker, T. R. Flaiz, M.D., Richard Hammill, W. J. Hackett, F. L. Peterson, D. R. Rees, and H. E. Rice.

#### GRADUATE WORK IN EASTERN COLLEGES:

Inasmuch as it seems desirable that a certain amount of graduate work be offered on the campuses of various of our eastern colleges under the sponsorship of Andrews University, on recommendation of the Committee on Graduate Work in Eastern Colleges, it was

- VOTED, 1. That Atlantic Union College, Oakwood College, Southern Missionary College, Union College, and Washington Missionary College be invited through their Boards of Trustees to become affiliates of Andrews University in regard to graduate education.
- 2. That the General Conference Committee set up a Commission of Seventh-day Adventist Graduate Education in the East to provide communication between the participating institutions and their several conference organizations (union and General), to consider requests of affiliated institutions to offer graduate work, to assess the ability of the several institutions to offer work of graduate character, to recommend the beginning or termination of graduate work on the various college campuses which may be applied toward a graduate degree in the School of Graduate Studies of Andrews University, and to establish such regulations as may be necessary in the administration of the total co-operative graduate program; and

That the membership of the Commission be as follows: An Officer of the General Conference, Chairman; the Educational Secretary of the General Conference, Secretary; the President and Dean of the School of Graduate Studies of Andrews University; the president of each of the participating colleges; the chairmen of the Boards of Trustees of the participating colleges; the educational secretaries of the union conferences which support a participating college, and three members of the General Conference staff to be named by the General Conference Committee.

- 3. That each affiliated college, when duly approved and authorized to offer graduate work, will assume financial responsibility for its own courses, collecting tuition, paying teachers, and providing adequate facilities. It is understood that adjustments in this arrangement may be worked out in certain cases in which a teacher from Andrews University is a visiting teacher at an affiliated college.
- h. That each affiliated institution collaborate with the administration of the University in designating an official to coordinate all appropriate graduate activities and be responsible for registration of students and transmission of academic records to the registrar of Andrews University.
- 5. That exchange of teachers between the several participating institutions be encouraged so as to insure a rich and varied program of course work.
- 6. That the administration of Andrews University seek at once, in consultation with the president of Washington Missionary College, to work out a plan for offering a limited program of graduate work in the Washington area, and at the earliest opportunity present it to the Committee.
- 7. That the administrative officers and admissions committee of Emmanuel Missionary College not accept a larger percentage of out-of-union students than in former years, and that the respective affiliated colleges agree on their part not to accept a larger number of students from the Lake Union Conference than in former years.

#### TUITION ASSISTANCE TO CANDIDATES FOR MINISTERIAL INTERNSHIPS:

Since all students in the Andrews University are now charged a tuition, discussion was given to a plan for granting tuition assistance to candidates for Ministerial Internships during their year of graduate study at the SDA Theological Seminary just before entering upon their internship.

VOTED, To refer the matter of twition grant to candidates for Ministerial Internships to the Officers and Union Presidents and the 1960 Autumn Council.

#### CAMP MEETING ATTENDANCE ADJUSTMENTS:

VOTED, To approve Camp Meeting attendance adjustments as presented, the list being recorded in the Officers' minutes.

## NORTH AMERICAN RELIGIOUS LIBERTY AND PUBLIC RELATIONS COUNCIL-1961:

VOTED, That the North American Religious Liberty and Public Relations Council be held the week following the Spring Meeting of the General Conference Committee in 1961, the place to be decided by the 1960 Autumn Council.

## DENOMINATIONAL BOOKS TO PUBLIC LIBRARIES:

WHEREAS, The time limitation of the authorization has expired for a specified committee to arrange for sets of twenty-one Seventh-day Adventist books to be distributed in public avenues; and

WHEREAS, The results of past distribution have been gratifying, the books having been distributed on a North American-wide basis to all leading universities, colleges, seminaries, Bible institutes, and public libraries, and now there is still need for smaller libraries and others to receive these books; and

WHEREAS, There is provision in the budget for this service year by year;

We recommend, That the Officers appoint a Committee to study the plan of placing certain denominational books in public libraries and other institutions as has been done in the past.

VOTED that we recommend that modifications be made in accounting procedures as pertain to income and expense accounts, as necessary to meet recommendations of the American Hospital Association, without basic changes in the Balance Sheet.

VOTED that in instances where it is desirable to inaugurate a system of Fund Accounting, we recommend that the Balance Sheet be so constructed as to make possible a consolidation capable of producing a result comparable to the established denominational pattern.

VOTED classification of accounts numbers be assigned as follows:

### Non-Denominational Income and Expense:

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### DISTRIBUTION OF INDIRECT EXPENSE

In the Chart of Accounts shown on page ___, the series of accounts in the 700 group are designated as "Indirect" expenses. It is the requirement of the departmental cost system that the total of all these expenses be exactly distributed among the revenue departments each month. The following paragraphs set forth a brief explanation of how this is to be accomplished.

At the time of compilation of the operating budget for the ensuing year, a budgeted figure of total annual expense for each account in the 700 series is available. At that time and as a part of the preparation of the budget, steps are taken to determine the participation of each revenue department in each indirect expense.

A work sheet is prepared listing a vertical column for each expense to be distributed and a horizontal line for each revenue department. The administrative staff in consultation with interested department heads will then indicate on the work sheet the percentage of each distributed expense to be absorbed by each department. The basis on which these percentages are determined will vary with the nature of the expense itself.

For example, utilities might well be distributed on a basis of space and type of premises occupied, but due consideration should be given to heavy users of electric current, etc. This same basis could be applied to such items as property insurance, domestic and janitor, building depreciation, building maintenance, and possibly others.

On the other hand, such items as Business Administration, Provision for Bad Debts, Health Education and Social Service, etc., could well be based on total budgeted income, budgeted income from patients, or budgeted patient days.

The foregoing are only examples of the possible approach to the problem of distribution. The important thing to remember is that the basis of distribution should be varied so that each department is charged with its portion of each class of expense, as far as is practical, on the basis of benefit received.

After all these individual percentages are determined, an actual distribution of the budgeted indirect expense is made. When this step is completed, a cross-addition of the work sheet reveals the total (budgeted) indirect expense allocable to each department. These departmental totals are translated back into a percentage of the grand total of all indirect expense, and the resultant composite percentage figures can then be used throughout the year in the monthly distribution of indirect expense. PLEASE NOTE THAT THIS WORK SHEET OPERATION NEED BE PERFORMED ONLY ONCE, PRIOR TO THE BEGINNING OF THE YEAR. Percentages thus determined are then used throughout the year in making distribution of the actual expense month by month.

The entry each month will be to debit each revenue department's expense classification .81 (example: 529.81 for Pharmacy) for the amount allocable to the department, crediting account 700 Provision for Distribution of Indirect Expense for the total. After this distribution is performed each month, the 700 section should balance, the credit in account 700 equaling the total of the debit balances in all the other accounts in the 700 group.

### DEVOTIONAL SERVICE

K. H. Emmerson sounded a new note for world evangelism in the Devotional Meeting on April 6, 1960, by using the story of Jonah to bring home to his listeners the results of disobedience and of obedience to the calls of the Lord. Evangelist Jonah was disobedient to the first call (Jonah 1: 1, 2). He didn't want to leave home. He was nationalistic. Surely the Lord had a Ninevite who could preach to his own people. Jonah was unconcerned for the lost Gentiles. More than that, he feared Nineveh would repent and God would spare it; then he would be called a failure as a prophet. But the Lord had to bring him to a severe crisis, and at the second bidding (Jonah 3: 1, 2) Jonah arose and preached repentance and the salvation of the Lord to the Ninevites. World evangelism might have had its beginning in that only great revival in the Old Testament which took place on foreign soil and for the Gentiles.

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V. G. Anderson, Chairman, called to order the third Business Session of the Spring Meeting.

Jere D. Smith led in prayer.

ATTENDANCE AT 1960 AUTUMN COUNCIL:

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The Committee appointed to bring in recommendations regarding attendance at the 1960 Autumn Council presented the following report, which was adopted:

We recommend, 1. That in addition to the General Conference Committee members the following be invited to attend the 1960 Autumn Council from the North American Division:

Local conference and mission presidents Union conference secretary-treasurers 2 editors--A. S. Maxwell and K. J. Holland.

2. That the Officers of the General Conference be empowered to name and invite 5 college presidents, 5 hospital administrators, and up to 8 others, to attend the 1960 Autumn Council.

### CANADIAN UNION SIGNS OF THE TIMES:

Consideration was given to a request made by the Canadian Union Conference that they be given permission to resume printing The Signs of the Times for Canada. The Pacific Press Publishing Association has indicated their willingness to let them have the plates used for their regular Signs of the Times each month. Certain changes would be made for the Canadian Union Conference. The expense would be minor as the plates would be supplied at a minimum cost by the Pacific Press. Suggestion was made that it would be well to have a wider representation from the field at the time this matter is considered.

VOTED, To refer to the 1960 Autumn Council the item of the printing of The Signs of the Times by the Canadian Union Conference, and that the General Conference Officers be requested to set up a group to consider this request and report to the Autumn Council.

### DEPARTMENTAL ADVISORY MEETINGS -- SCOPE OF:

Various departmental leaders reported briefly on the scope of the work accomplished in the Departmental Advisory Meetings. These meetings are helpful in binding together the workers in the different parts of the field, so that similar plans and policies are followed. The program for the following year is outlined. Plans for large meetings are shared in detail. Information and ideas are exchanged. Study is given as to how to co-operate more closely with other departments and the ministry in winning souls into the church. Plans are laid for working together in a unified way. Implementation is given to the plans and policies voted at the time of a Spring Meeting or Autumn Council.

In conclusion, a statement was made that before new plans and policies adopted at the time of an Advisory Meeting are implemented, these should be brought to the General Conference Committee or an Autumn Council for adoption.

### DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS--ADVISORY COMMITTEE:

At the 1959 Autumn Council a recommendation was passed that the work of the Religious Liberty Department, the Bureau of Public Relations, and Industrial Relations be co-ordinated and integrated in one departmental service, named the Department of Public Affairs; also that a group be appointed to survey and supervise the working out of the plan. In order to effect a closer co-ordination and integration of the work of these two Departments, the group appointed with the Officers presented the following recommendation, which was--

VOTED, That a combined Advisory Committee for the Department of Public Affairs be appointed, consisting of the two Advisory Committees for the Religious Liberty Department and Bureau of Public Relations, and including the union departmental men serving as Religious Liberty and Public Relations Secretaries.

### SERVING OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES ON AIRLINES:

The following recommendations was presented by the Committee on Organization of the Temperance Department, which was authorized by the 1959 Autumn Council, and with an amendment was adopted as follows:

WHEREAS, The serving of alcoholic beverages on commercial airlines constitutes a social problem to the total abstainers using the airlines, and involves the safety of airline passengers and drew; and

WHEREAS, There are bills pending in Congress to prohibit the sale of alcoholic liquors on commercial airlines;

We recommend, 1. That personal letters be written to the various airlines setting forth our individual convictions on this matter; these letters to be addressed to the Director of Traffic Safety and the board members of the respective airlines.

- 2. That letters be written to the chairmen of the Senate and House Interstate Commerce Committees and also to Congressmen requesting that steps be taken to bring the bills dealing with the serving of alcoholic beverages on airplanes out of committee for action by Congress.
- (A leaflet was distributed giving detailed information as to whom to write making known our attitude on these matters.)

### DEPARTMENTAL MOTION FILMS -- REPORT OF COMMITTEE:

The Departmental Film Production Committee appointed at the 1959 Autumn Council presented recommendations which with certain changes were adopted as follows:

We recommend, 1. That the Film Production Committee, appointed at the 1959 Fall Council, be responsible for the production of all films, of whatever length or for whatever purposes, for the respective departments, and that all other committees that have been appointed for the production of films be discharged.

- 2. That films be produced in harmony with the following procedures:
- a. Major Departmental Films: The procedures governing the operation of the Committee in relation to major departmental films shall be in harmony with the 1959 Autumn Council action, the leading features of which are as follows:
- (1) That not more than two major departmental motion films of not more than thirty minutes' duration be authorized each year, with the understanding that no department will produce a film oftener than once during a quadrennial period.
- (2) That the Film Committee determine which departments will produce films, give general supervision to the production of the films decided upon, and serve as a counselling committee with the departments concerned in their production.
- (3) That a representative of this Film Production Committee be appointed to negotiate with the producers of the films.

### b. Short Films:

- (1) Sabbath School Mission Films. A Thirteenth Sabbath color-sound promotional missions film of approximately fifteen minutes' duration may be produced annually.
- (2) Other Short Films. In the event of other short films of approximately ten minutes duration being desired, authorization for same shall be obtained from the General Conference Committee, and the production of such a film shall be under the supervision of the Film Production Committee.

### DEPARTMENTAL MOTION FILMS (concluded):

3. That budget provision be made before the Film Production Committee proceeds with the production of any film.

INTERNATIONAL TEMPERANCE ASSOCIATION AND AMERICAN TEMPERANCE SOCIETY:

At 4:20 P.M., a legal meeting was called of the International Temperance Association and American Temperance Society. W. A. Scharffenberg stated that H. L. Rudy, who was formerly President of these two organizations, has been called to the Oregon Conference. On motion of W. A. Scharffenberg, it being seconded, it was

VOTED, That M. V. Campbell be elected President of the International Temperance Association and the American Temperance Society.

On motion of W. A. Scharffenberg, it being seconded, it was

Further VOTED, That W. E. Murray be elected to serve as Vice-President of the International Temperance Association and the American Temperance Society.

The Council resumed its business, at 4:25 P.M.

Announcements were made of meetings to follow.

Adjourned at 4:30 P.M.

Satan would have us believe that the law could not be obeyed; that man could not be forgiven, Quoting from The Desire of Ages, pp. 761 and 762, it was made very clear that man was in a different position from that of Satan. "Lucifer in heaven had sinned in the light of God's glory." Man, on the other hand, had been deceived; he had not known as yet the height and depth of the love of God. "By beholding His character he might be drawn back to God." Christ imbues, or saturates, man with the attributes of God. "He builds up the human character after the similitude of the divine character." This is done through the work of the Spirit. ### SPRING MEETING

April 7, 1960, 9:30 A.M.

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The fourth Business Session of the Spring Meeting was called to order by M. V. Campbell, Chairman.

### REORGANIZATION OF TEMPERANCE DEPARTMENT -- COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS:

Reference was made by R. R. Figuhr to the recommendations passed at the 1959 Autumn Council regarding the reorganization of the Temperance activities into a Department. The recommendations provided for the implementation of the reorganization. The Committee on Reorganization of the Temperance Department presented recommendations which with certain changes and amendments were adopted as follows:

### CROANIZATION OF DEPARTMENT:

In harmony with the decision reached at the time of the 1959 Autumn Council, that the Temperance work should be operated as a regular Department in the General Conference;

We recommend, 1. That the Temperance Department have an Advisory Committee, and that all ideas and plans in respect to the Temperance work be processed through this committee and brought to the General Conference Executive Committee for approval as in other Departments.

- 2. That the temperance work in our churches be promoted through the Temperance Department. With respect to organizations and individuals outside the church, the Temperance cause will be promoted through the International Temperance Association, and the American Temperance Society.
- 3. That with a view to bringing the organization of the Temperance Department into harmony with the organization of other Departments, the following appointments of personnel in the Department be made by the General Conference Committee: Secretary of the Department, Associate Secretaries.

### TEMPERANCE DEPARTMENT PERSONNEL:

Carrying out the foregoing recommendation, it was

VOTED, That the following be elected to serve in the Temperance Department: Secretary of the Temperance Department: W. A. Scharffenberg; Associate Secretaries: F. A. Soper, J. O. Gibson, and J. V. Scully. Further recommendations from the Committee on Organization of the Temperance Department were presented and with changes adopted as follows:

### TEMPERANCE PUBLICATIONS:

We recommend, That a suitable Committee be appointed by the Officers to study the list of Temperance publications with the thought of simplifying the supply of Temperance literature.

NATIONAL COMMITTEES FOR THE PREVENTION OF ALCOHOLISM AND INSTITUTES OF SCIENTIFIC STUDIES FOR THE PREVENTION OF ALCOHOLISM --ORGANIZATION:

With a view to the strengthening of the plan for the organization of National Committees for the Prevention of Alcoholism and Institutes of Scientific Studies for the Prevention of Alcoholism, and in order to insure a proper continuation of this activity once it has been started;

We recommend, That when a Division Committee proposes the setting up of a National Committee for the Prevention of Alcoholism or an Institute of Scientific Studies for the Prevention of Alcoholism, careful consideration be given to the entire project, and that the Division work out a plan assuring active financial support and participation in the project.

When the Division's plan and application to commence has received the approval of the General Conference, the Division involved may approach the International Commission for the Prevention of Alcoholism to obtain their support in organizing a National Committee for the Prevention of Alcoholism and an Institute of Scientific Studies for the Prevention of Alcoholism.

### TEMPERANCE DEPARTMENT PERSONNEL--TRAVEL:

We recommend, That planning and authorization for travel on the part of the Temperance Department personnel follow the regular procedure for travel at the General Conference office.

As regards travel overseas, the Secretary of the Temperance Department will approach the chairman of the Overseas Travel Committee with his suggestions. Plans for travel in North America will be brought by the Secretary of the Temperance Department to the Secretary of the North American Travel Committee.

NATIONAL COMMITTEE FOR THE PREVENTION OF ALCOHOLISM FUNDS -- AUDIT:

Inasmuch as the General Conference and the Seventh-day Adventist church generally are important contributors to the financial support of the International Committee for the Prevention of Alcoholism, the North American National Committee for the Prevention of Alcoholism, and the Institutes of Scientific Studies for the Prevention of Alcoholism held in North America;

We recommend, That we request the Temperance Department Secretary to endeavor to make it possible for the General Conference Auditor to examine the accounts of the International Committee for the Prevention of Alcoholism, the North American National Committee for the Prevention of Alcoholism, and the Institutes of Scientific Studies for the Prevention of Alcoholism which are held in North America.

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### APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

The MINUTES of the General Conference Committee held March 31, 1960 were approved.

### NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT:

The following recommendation was presented from the Nominating Committee and adopted:

We recommend, That Miss Maxine Atteberry of the College of Medical Evangelists be elected to connect with the General Conference Medical Department as an Associate Secretary.

### ROBERT W. BALDWIN--COLLEGE OF MEDICAL EVANGELISTS:

VOTED, To pass on to the Columbia Union and Ohio Conferences the call for Robert W. Baldwin, of Mount Vernon Academy, to connect with the College of Medical Evangelists to serve as Instructor in the Occupational Therapy Department.

### ANDREWS UNIVERSITY CONSTITUENCY MEETING:

At 11:50 A.M. a meeting of the Andrews University Constituency was called.

On motion of Richard Hammill, it being seconded by A. V. Olson, it was

VOTED, That the Constituency of the Andrews University amend the By-Laws of the Andrews University in which the name Potomac University appears; that the name Potomac University be struck out, and the name Andrews University be inserted in its place.

On motion of R. S. Watts, seconded by J. O. Gibson, it was

VOTED. To adjourn the Andrews University Constituency meeting.

The Spring Meeting resumed its business.

### MAX V. BARKHURST -- WHITE MEMORIAL HOSPITAL:

VOTED, To pass on to the Pacific Union and Southern California Conferences the call for Max V. Barkhurst, to connect with the College of Medical Evangelists as Assistant Chaplain in the White Memorial Hospital.

### HARRIET SMITH-SOUTHERN MISSIONARY COLLEGE:

VOTED, To pass on to the College of Medical Evangelists the call from the Southern Union Conference for Miss Harriet Smith, Assistant Dean in the School of Nursing, to connect with Southern Missionary College, to head the Division of Nursing.

### WALTER C . UTT -- ANDREWS UNIVERSITY:

VOTED, To pass on to the Pacific Union Conference and Pacific Union College the call for Walter C. Utt, to connect with the Andrews University as head of the History Department.

LUIS RAMIREZ -- CENTRAL AMERICAN UNION:

On request of the Inter-American Division, it was

### SPRING MEETING

April 7, 1960, 1:30 P.M.

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W. B. Ochs, Chairman, called to order the fifth Business Session of the Spring Meeting.

Opening prayer by J. I. Robison.

### TEMPERANCE DEPARTMENT OFFERINGS:

Counsel was sought as to how to handle the Temperance Department offerings which are received. It was

VOTED, To request that the entire amount of the Temperance Department offerings be sent to the General Conference office through the regular channels, with the understanding that the funds will be divided according to policy, and the union and local conference and church portions be reverted to the field; effective January 1, 1960.

### TEMPERANCE DEPARTMENT WORK:

VOTED, That a representative Committee be appointed to meet in connection with the 1960 Autumn Council to study further the implementation of the Temperance Department work and reaching out into the field.

The Committee on Ingathering, which had been appointed by the Officers on March 2, 1960, presented recommendations, which with amendments were adopted as follows:

### USE OF INGATHERING FUNDS:

WHEREAS, Careful consideration was given to a number of problems that have arisen in the field in respect to the handling and use of funds that are raised through the annual Ingathering Campaign; therefore,

### We recommend to the forthcoming Autumn Council,

- 1. That paragraph e of Section 6 of the Ingathering policy appearing on page 228 of the Working Policy be amended to read as follows:
- "All income resulting from the Ingathering effort shall be considered General Conference funds, and shall be reported in the regular way to the General Conference Treasury. All Ingathering funds held over from the Autumn campaign shall be sent from the local conferences to the unions and the General Conference in the January remittance, and the balances to apply on the goal for that year at the end of each month thereafter."

- That paragraph f of the same section be amended to read as follows:
- "In the North American Division all funds received in the Ingathering campaign above the basic goals are divided on the following basis:
  - a. 40 per cent to missions; and
- b. 60 per cent as an appropriation to the respective union conferences to be distributed by the union conference committee for projects determined by this committee; it being understood that these funds are not to be used for regular recurring or regular operating expense."
  - That the following paragraph be added to section 6 of this policy as i:

"Even though churches have exceeded a recommended per capita for Ingathering, church boards shall not use any portion of the Ingathering funds. Conference committees may appropriate to local churches for specified local needs, money from the Ingathering reversion funds which has been assigned to the conferences by the Union conference committee."

4. That with a view to sustaining The Message Magazine, the Regional Conferences be urged to use it more widely in connection with the Ingathering.

We recommend to the Spring Meeting of the General Conference Committee,

1. a. That the following covering letter be sent to pastors in the North American Division in connection with the Ingathering Rally program:

"Dear Pastors:

"Kindly share this letter with your entire church membership. May we suggest that you read it at a Sabbath church service? You will note that it answers four questions frequently asked during the Ingathering Campaign.

"May the Lord richly bless your church in its Ingathering Campaign this year, making it the most successful in homes contacted, funds raised, and souls won.

### Very sincerely,"

b. That the following letter referred to above be read in all of our churches in the North American Division in connection with the Ingathering Rally Day program:

### To be Read to Your Church on Sabbath Morning

Dear Believers:

Soon your church, with three thousand other churches here in North America, will be launching its Ingathering Campaign. Knowing that information is the basis of clearer understanding, fuller co-operation, and inspired action, we are sharing with you the answers to four pertinent questions concerning the Ingathering:

(1) In view of Bible teachings and the Spirit of Prophecy counsel what should be the basis of our Ingathering appeal?

Our church patterns its ministry after the example of Jesus Christ who went about doing good, healing the sick, teaching the people, and preaching the gospel. Therefore, the Ingathering appeal is based on the welfare, medical, educational, and evangelistic projects of our world-wide program. As one carefully studies the entire counsel of the Spirit of Prophecy pertaining to Ingathering, compiled in the Home Missionary Leaflet #28, at least four references on pages 5, 14, 27, and 28 indicate that Ingathering should benefit the work in the homeland as well as in overseas mission fields.

(2) What proportion of the Ingathering funds collected reach the General Conference?

Our denominational policy requires that all Ingathering funds be passed in through regular denominational channels to the General Conference Treasury. The policy reads: "All income resulting from the Ingathering effort shall be considered General Conference funds, and shall be reported to, and remitted from the local conferences to the unions and the General Conference."

(3) How are the Ingathering Funds allocated?

Ingathering funds are allocated by the General Conference Committee to foreign and home work. The portion that is assigned to overseas fields is distributed by the respective Division committees, and the portion assigned to North America is distributed by the union conference and local conference committees.

In the 189 countries in which our work is carried forward, all of the Ingathering funds raised in these overseas divisions are reappropriated by the General Conference for use in their fields. The larger portion of all Ingathering funds raised throughout the world goes to foreign missions.

(4) What projects benefit from Ingathering?

Recognizing that the work is one in all the world, medical, educational, welfare, and evangelistic projects in North America and in mission lands benefit from the Ingathering. North America as a home base largely supports the work overseas, not only with funds but also with workers trained in our churches and schools.

To help the public understand the relationship between the Ingathering funds and the tithes and offerings given by Seventh-day Adventists, there will appear in the 1961 Ingathering Magazine a statement worded something like this: "Through this Ingathering appeal about five million dollars is raised annually. This is a little more than 6 per cent of the total contributions made last year by Seventh-day Adventists to maintain and expand their medical, educational, evangelistic, and welfare program."

Let us always bear in mind the soul-winning aspects of Ingathering. We suggest that you keep a record of the interested people found during the campaign. Millions of contacts will be made during the campaign and thousands of people, wistfully looking to heaven for light, can be found, noted, and personal follow-up started. Let us continue to emphasize this year this motto, "At least one baptism per church from Ingathering contacts."

Accept the challenge of the unfinished task! Enlarge the medical, educational, welfare work here and abroad by your Ingathering exploits. Make missionary contacts in your community. Respond to urgent calls to send teachers, doctors and nurses, and evangelical workers. Give second-mile service to God. As you resolutely affirm, "Lord, you can count on me," remember that Ingathering extends the work, enlightens the world, and enlarges one's own experience.

### Very sincerely.

- c. That in North America the following Fact Sheet be included as one page in the Ingathering publications:
  - (1) What is the Ingathering appeal:

It is an annual appeal sponsored by the Seventh-day Adventist Church gathering in funds for humanitarian activities -- which are being carried forward in nearly all countries of the world.

(2) How long has this campaign been conducted?

This appeal has been made every year since 1903. It has a more than fiftyyear record of community support throughout the United States and Canada.

(3) How are the funds solicited?

Solicitors are volunteers from among the church members and include doctors, lawyers, teachers, businessmen, students, housewives, and others who contribute their time without financial compensation.

(4) How are the funds used?

The funds are used for a world program that includes medical, educational, welfare, and evangelistic projects which bring relief and uplift to humanity and a living Christ to the world. Here in North America increasingly larger amounts are being used each year for Health and Welfare services, extending emergency relief irrespective of race, creed, or color. Welfare and educational services in North American communities, pressing needs in countries overseas, which include clinics, dispensaries, leper colonies, mission schools—which are often the only facilities available to large populations in many lands; the cost of these services is met almost wholly by the contributions made by Seventh-day Adventist members, whose contributions are supplemented by the funds gathered in this campaign which comprise approximately 6 per cent of the total cost of this work.

(5) What portion of the funds collected are used for administrative purposes?

Funds are handled through already existing organizational channels of the denomination with the result that there are no administrative expenses charged to this solicitation. (6) What is the basis of this world-wide humanitarian program?

The Seventh-day Adventist Church patterns its ministry after Jesus Christ who went about doing good, healing the sick, teaching the people, preaching the gospel. Therefore, its humanitarian program is based on welfare, medical, educational, and evangelistic projects.

### INGATHERING RALLY PROGRAM:

VOTED, That the letter to be sent to pastors in the North American Division in connection with the Ingathering Rally program be sent out by the General Conference Officers.

### CHURCH DEVELOPMENT SERVICE:

The Church Development Service which was set up at the 1958 Autumn Council was referred to by C. L. Torrey. W. J. Hubert was chosen to lead out in the education, training, and counseling of personnel for the establishment of this plan. He has been doing a very fine work in various unions throughout the field where he has gone. Certain of the unions have appointed a Church Development Service secretary. Elder Torrey encouraged the unions which have not secured a secretary for the Fund-Raising Service to do so. He expressed the hope that the leaders would follow this plan and do more to support the program for building up our work.

Appreciation was expressed by R. R. Figuhr to the delegates for their being present. He said, We can go from here with feelings of confidence in one another and in the work. In some lands, in these days of peace and prosperity here, our people are passing through severe trials. We must remember these lands from which we are cut off. We cannot work in those lands with much freedom. All that remains is what has been built up in the hearts of our people. There are faithful people in those lands. We must remember them in our prayers.

As leaders, we must be an example by word and influence to help win people to believe in the Lord, to believe in His cause, and move forward. God's hand is still protecting the work here. We are glad that from this land which God is blessing, funds can go out and people can be sent to the uttermost parts of the earth.
