#### DEVOTIONAL MESSAGE

D E Robinson reported on the status of Adventist World Radio-Asia, the only General Conference institution outside North America. In spite of unseasonable torrential rains, construction has gone forward. Six engineering students from Walla Walla College have been working on the site. The antennae have been anchored well to withstand winds of 160 miles per hour. At present it is anticipated that the work will be completed within the capital expense budget in spite of delays.

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Programs are being prepared in Hong Kong and other locations in various languages. In the English transmission some time slots could be used for broadcasting the Bible or portions of the Spirit of Prophecy on casettes. Formal opening of the radio station is scheduled for the end of January 1987.

## REPORTS REGARDING GIDEON OLIVEIRA FAMILY, NORMAN WOODS AND ELINOR WILSON

Neal C Wilson announced that Gideon Oliveira, his wife and daughter met with a serious automobile accident on Friday, October 10. Mrs Oliveira was killed and Gideon Oliveira suffered internal injuries. The daughter was unhurt. Funeral services for Mrs Oliveira were held today in Sao Paulo. Gideon Oliveira is the brother of Enoch Oliveira, one of the vice-presidents of the General Conference.

Norman J Woods, President of Loma Linda University, injured his foot some time ago and infection has set in. He is hospitalized at Silvestre Adventist Hospital (Rio de Janeiro) and is resting comfortably.

Elinor Wilson, wife of President Neal C Wilson, also in the Silvestre Hospital, is improving rapidly.

Neal C Wilson reviewed the steps that have been taken to determine the extent of literary borrowing by Ellen G White in the book <u>Desire of Ages</u>.

Fifteen chapters of the book were selected at random by Fred Veltman and a careful analysis made which involved searching through some 500 possible sources. He was assisted in this task by donated help in research support and in other similar aspects of the project. The results of this careful, intensive study provide the Church with adequate material with which to meet critics on the writings of E G White. A summary of the findings will be provided to those who request it. The complete study will be available for examination in the Ellen G White Research Centers.

AUDITING SERVICE AND ITS RELATIONSHIP TO TREASURY

Moreover, concern was expressed that the relationship of the Auditing Service and the Treasury be

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maintained separately in order to preserve the integrity of the Treasury and to ensure the ethical independence of the Auditing Service.

VOTED, To amend the Adventist Development and Relief Agency Bylaws to read as follows:

BYLAWS

OF

ADVENTIST DEVELOPMENT AND RELIEF AGENCY INTERNATIONAL, INCORPORATED

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# ARTICLE I

The name of this corporation shall be Adventist Development and Relief Agency International (hereinafter referred to as ADRA International).

# ARTICLE II Offices

The principal office of this corporation shall be located in the City of Washington in the District of Columbia. The corporation may also have offices at such other places as the Board of Directors may, from time to time, designate.

## ARTICLE III Membership

Membership of this corporation shall be the members of the Executive Committee of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists. For the purpose of membership of this corporation, these members shall continue in office until other General Conference Executive Committee members are chosen to succeed them.

## ARTICLE IV Meetings

A meeting of the membership may be held in conjunction with any General Conference Executive Committee meeting, as necessary. There shall be a meeting of the membership in conjunction with the Annual Council of the General Conference Executive Committee. Notice of the annual general meeting shall be sent to the members at least sixty days prior to the opening of the meeting. All meetings of the membership shall be conducted in accordance with the rules and procedures of the General Conference Executive Committee.

# ARTICLE V Board of Directors

Section 1. Powers -- The business and property of the shall be conducted and managed by its Board of Directors which may exercise all of the general powers granted to non-profit corporations enumerated in Section 29-505 of the District of Columbia Non-profit Act including

subsequent amendments thereto, including, but not limited to, the power:

- a. To control and manage the affairs, property, and funds of this corporation;
- b. To authorize and cause to be executed mortgages and liens upon the real and personal property of this corporation;
- c. To declare vacant the office of any officer or director or agent who does not conform to the bylaws of this corporation. Vacancies shall be filled in harmony with Article V, Section 5; Article VII, Section 7, or Article IX Section 7.
- Section 2. Board of Directors Election -- The Board of Directors shall be elected quinquennially by the members of the corporation and shall hold their offices until their successors are duly elected and enter upon their duties, unless otherwise determined by the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors shall consist of up to a maximum of sixty (60) members. The election of the Board of Directors shall take place at the first Annual Council of the General Conference Executive Committee following a quinquennial session of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists.
- Section 3. Vacancies -- Vacancies occurring in the Board of Directors shall be filled by the members.
- Section 4. Meeting -- The Board of Directors shall meet at the call of the Chair on/or at the time of the Annual Council of the Executive Committee of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists, and such meetings shall be held at the principal office of the corporation or at such other place as the Chair may determine. The Board reserves the right to provide for such standing committees as it determines desirable, and to discontinue same at its pleasure. (As set forth in Article VII, Section 10.)
- Section 5. Quorum -- At all meetings of the Board of Directors nineteen (19) members of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Except as otherwise provided by law, the charter or these bylaws, the vote of a majority of such quorum at a duly constituted meeting shall be sufficient to conduct business. Voting on all matters shall be by viva voce unless otherwise determined by the Chairman or requested by a majority of the Directors present. In the absence of a quorum the Directors present, by majority vote and without notice, may recess the meeting until a quorum shall attend.

## ARTICLE VI Officers of the Board

- Section 1. Officers of the Board -- The Officers of the Board shall be the Chairman of the Board, one or more Vice-Chairmen, the Secretary and the Assistant Secretaries, who shall be duly elected members of the Board of Directors, and such other Officers as may be appointed by the members in accordance with the provisions of Sections 5 and 6 of Article IX.
- Section 2. Election, Term of Office -- The Officers of the Board specifically designated in Section 1 of this article shall be elected quinquennially by the members. Each such Officer shall hold office until his successor shall have been duly elected and has entered upon his duties, unless he shall earlier have resigned or have been removed. A vacancy in any office because of death, resignation, removal, disqualification, or otherwise, may be filled by the Board of Directors for the unexpired portion of the term.
- Section 3. Chairman of the Board -- The Chairman of the Board shall preside at all meetings of the Board of Directors and the membership meetings.
- Section 4. Chairmanship of the Board -- The Chairman of the Board shall be a Vice-President of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists. The first Vice-Chairman of the Board shall be the Treasurer of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists. A second Vice-Chairman shall be a Vice-President of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists. A Vice-Chairman, at the request of the Chairman, or in his absence, or during his inability to act, shall perform the duties and exercise the functions of the Chairman and when so acting shall have the powers of the Chairman. The Vice-Chairman shall have such other powers and perform such other duties as may be assigned to him by the Board of Directors or the Chairman.
- Section 5. Chairman Pro Tempore -- In the absence of the Chairman and a Vice-Chairman at any meeting of the Board of Directors, said Board of Directors shall appoint a chairman pro tempore who shall preside at its meeting.
- Section 6. Secretary -- The Secretary of the Board shall be the President/Executive Director of ADRA International. His duties shall include the following:
- a. Make and record the minutes of the meetings of the members and of the Board of Directors in books provided for that purpose and record therein all votes of such meetings;

- b. Give or cause to be given all notices, including those of the meetings of the members, the Board of Directors, and the Executive Committee in accordance with the provisions of the bylaws or as required by law;
- c. At all times during the existence of said corporation, have custody of such records and minutes as may be necessary to faithfully record all the transactions of the corporation;
- d. Keep the seal of the corporation. Where required, affix the same to all papers and instruments:
- e. Perform all duties incident to the office of a secretary of a corporation in general and such other duties as from time to time may be assigned by him by the Board of Directors or the Chairman.
- Section 7. Assistant Secretaries -- The Assistant Secretaries of the Board shall be the Executive Vice-President and the Vice-President for Finance of ADRA International. When the Secretary cannot perform his duties and at the request of the Chairman of the Board, the Executive Vice-President shall act as the Secretary of the Board with the same duties as stated in Section 6 of this article for the Secretary. When the Secretary and Executive Vice-President cannot act as Secretary of the Board, the Vice-President for Finance shall be the Secretary of the Board.
- Section 8. Compensation -- The Officers of the Board and the Directors of the shall receive no compensation for their services as such or for expenses of attendance at any meeting of the Board of Directors. The Secretary and Assistant Secretaries shall be compensated for their services in their capacity as President/Executive Director and Vice-Presidents of ADRA International, respectively.

# ARTICLE VII Executive Committee

Section 1. Between meetings of the Board of Directors, the Board shall conduct its business through an Executive Committee. The Board shall determine any limitations on the authorized power of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. Number, Election, and Term -- The Executive Committee shall consist of up to twenty-one (21) members who shall be elected quinquennially by the Board of Directors from among their members. The Executive Committee shall be organized and shall perform its functions as directed by the Board and shall report periodically to the Board. Any

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action taken by the Executive Committee within the course and scope of its authority shall be binding to the corporation.

- Section 3. Quorum -- At all meetings of the Executive Committee seven (7) of the members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The vote of a majority of such quorum at a duly constituted meeting shall be sufficient to conduct business. Voting on all matters of business shall be by viva voce unless otherwise determined by the Chairman or requested by a majority of the members present. In the absence of a quorum, the members present, by a majority vote and without notice, may recess the meeting until a quorum shall attend.
- Section 4. Chairman -- The Chairman of the Executive Committee shall be the Chairman of the Board of Directors.
- Section 5. Vice-Chairman -- The first Vice Chairman of the Executive Committee shall be the Treasurer of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists. A second Vice-Chairman shall be a Vice-President of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists as appointed by the General Conference Executive Committee.
- Section 6. Chairman Pro Tempore -- In the absence of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman at any meeting of the Executive Committee, said Committee shall appoint a Chairman pro tempore who shall preside at its meeting.
- Section 7. Secretary -- The Secretary of the Executive Committee shall be the President/Executive Director of ADRA International. The Assistant Secretaries shall be the Executive Vice-President and the Vice-President for Finance of ADRA International. The order of precedence for the Assistant Secretaries shall be the same as outlined in Section 7 of Article VI.
- Section 8. Meetings -- The Executive Committee may hold a meeting at the call of the Chair or his designee at any time or place when a quorum is present.
- Section 9. Vacancies -- Vacancies occurring in the Executive Committee shall be filled by the Board of Directors.
- Section 10. Committees -- The Executive Committee may, by resolution, provide for such special or ad hoc committees as it determines desirable and discontinue the same at its pleasure. Each such committee shall have such powers and perform such duties, not in conflict with law, as may be assigned to it by the Executive Committee.

# ARTICLE VIII Administrative Committee

- Section 1. The Administrative Committee shall be the administrative body for ADRA International for the following day-to-day operations.
  - a. Administration of the approved operational budget;
  - b. Purchasing of budgeted equipment;
  - c. Authorize investment of funds;
  - d. Approval of programs and projects;
  - e. Approval of training programs for ADRA staff.
- Section 2. The Administrative Committee shall make recommendations to the Executive Committee in the following matters:
  - a. Hiring of personnel;
  - b. Annual budget;
- e. Approval of contracts when ADRA assumes major financial responsibility;
- d. Recommendation of ADRA administrative structure to the Board of Directors.
- Section 3. The members of the Administrative Committee shall be the administrative officers of ADRA.
- Section 4. The Chairman of the Administrative committee shall be the President/Executive Director of ADRA International.
- Section 5. The Administrative Committee is always in session with no adjournment ever taking place.

# ARTICLE IX Administrative Officers

- Section 1. The Administrative Officers of ADRA International shall be the President/Executive Director, the Executive Vice-President and the Vice-President for Finance.
- Section 2. The Administrative structure of ADRA/International shall be composed of Divisions, and Departments as determined by the Board of Directors.
- Section 3. The administration of a Division shall be the responsibility of a Vice-President. The administration of a Department

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shall be the responsibility of a Department Director.

- Section 4. All administrators within the ADRA administrative structure as stated in Sections 1 and 3 of this article shall be appointed by the Board of Directors and shall remain in their positions until such a time as the Board of Directors shall approve their dismissal and/or replacement. In any case, all administrators shall be subject to replacement or reelection at the end of the quinquennium as fixed by the Executive Committee of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists.
- Section 5. Removal -- The Officers specifically designated in Section 1 of this article may be removed, either with or without cause, by the vote of a majority of the Board of Directors at a meeting called for that purpose. However, in case such removal involves the President/Executive Director, removal shall become effective only upon ratification by the Executive Committee of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists.
- Section 6. Other Appointments -- The Board of Directors shall annually appoint:
- a. Auditors, whose duty shall be to audit the books of the and to prepare and submit to the Board of Directors an annual written report;
- b. Other officers and agents as necessary, to perform specifically assigned duties as the Board of Directors may determine. The Board of Directors may delegate to any officer or committee the power to appoint other officers or agents, specifying their authority and duties:
- Section 7. Vacancies -- A vacancy in any office, except those provided for in Section 5 of this article shall be filled for any unexpired portion of the term by the Executive Committee at any regular or special meeting. In the case of a vacancy occurring in an office filled in accordance with the provision of Section 6 of Article IX, such vacancy may be filled by any committee or superior officer upon whom such power may be conferred by the Executive Committee.
- Section 8. Appointment and Compensation of Personnel -- The Executive Committee shall have power to fix the compensation of all employees of the corporation in harmony with denominational pay schedules. It may authorize any committee upon whom the power of appointing and determining rates of renumeration for employees may have been conferred to fix the compensation of such employees.

#### ARTICLE X

# Divisions of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists: ADRA Board, Executive Committee, and Officers

#### Section 1. Designation and Election --

- a. The ADRA organization in each of the Divisions of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists should be closely patterned after the ADRA International organization.
- b. The Division Executive Committee may function as the Division ADRA Board.
- c. Where a separate Division Board is appointed, the Division Executive Committee shall make the appointment.
- d. The Division ADRA Board shall be made of up to twenty-five (25) members and the Division Executive Committee shall appoint ADRA Division Officers, as required, such as the ADRA Director for that division.
- e. The Division ADRA Board is responsible for ADRA work within the division territory.
- f. The Division ADRA Board authorizes the approaches and applications to aid donor organizations through ADRA International if the donor organization is located in another division.
- g. The Division ADRA Board shall exercise such other powers and perform such other duties as may be assigned by the Division Executive Committee.
- Section 2. Division ADRA Director -- The Division ADRA Director will be associated with and assist the President/Executive Director and/or the Vice-Presidents and the Department Directors of ADRA International. The Division ADRA Director will:
  - a. Be appointed by the Division Executive Committee;
  - b. Assist in establishing Division/Union ADRA Offices;
- c. Work with and serve as Secretary of the Division ADRA Executive Committee:
- d. Secure and maintain a file of on-the-scene reports and photos of all operations;

- e. Recruit personnel through regular channels and coordinate personnel support groups including the Adventist Aid Volunteer (AAV) activities through the division and ADRA International:
- f. Exercise such other powers and perform such other duties as may be assigned by the Division Executive Committee and/or the Division ADRA Board.
- Section 3. Division ADRA Executive Committee -- A Division ADRA Executive Committee may be appointed, where necessary, by the Division ADRA Board consisting of up to eleven (11) members and shall have the following duties:
  - a. Deal with emergency matters;
- b. Authorize the establishment of legal relationships between ADRA and the donor organizations within their respective territories:
- c. Authorize the establishment of subsidiary legal entities within their respective territories when required by law or other necessity and upon prior approval by the ADRA International Board of Directors.
  - d. Care for matters referred to them by ADRA International;
- e. Authorize the release of denominational relief and aid funds:
- f. Provide, on a regular basis, statistics and reports to the church and public on the activities of ADRA Regional and International:
- g. Exercise such other powers and perform such other duties as may be assigned by the ADRA Division Board.

## ARTICLE XI Finances

- Section 1. Checks, Drafts, etc. -- All checks, drafts and orders for the payment of money, notes and other evidence of indebtedness issued in the name of the shall be signed by the President/ Executive Director or one of the Vice-Presidents of the or, in their absence, by such other officer or person as the Board of Directors may appoint.
- Section 2. Fiscal Year -- The corporation fiscal year shall be the period from January 1 to December 31.

# ARTICLE XII Sundry Provisions

Section 1. Seal -- The Board of Directors shall provide a suitable seal bearing the name of the corporation which shall be in the charge of the Secretary of the Board of Directors.

Section 2. Amendment of the Bylaws -- Any and all provisions of these bylaws may be altered, amended, repealed or added to only at an annual general meeting of the membership of ADRA International. In order to make such changes in the bylaws, a two-thirds majority of the members present and voting membership shall be required.

Section 3. Meetings by Conference Telephone -- Members of the Board of Directors may participate in a meeting of the Board of Directors or a Committee of the Board by means of a conference telephone or similar communications equipment if all persons participating in the meeting can hear and speak to each other at the same time. Participation in a meeting by these means constitutes presence in person at a meeting.

# ARTICLE XIII Directors Indemnity

## ARTICLE XIV Dissolution

In the event of the liquidation, dissolution, or termination of the corporation, whether voluntary, involuntary, or by operation of law, any surpluses of money or assets remaining after the full payment of all corporate obligations shall be paid and delivered to the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists or its designee.

275-86G TITHE TO LOCAL CHURCH - POLICY REVISION (Paid to Local Church)

VOTED, To revise GC V 05 20, Tithe to Local Church, to read as follows:

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V 05 20 Tithe to Local Church -- The tithe is to be turned in to the local church in which membership is held. An exception to this policy may be made in regard to the tithe of denominational employees, as determined by the division committee.

278-86G HEALTH-CARE EXPENSE ASSISTANCE - POLICY REVISION

VOTED, To revise GC Y 20 15, Health Care Expense Assistance, to read as follows:

- Y 20 15 Health-Care Expense Assistance -- 1. Amount of Assistance-Employees having outpatient health-care expense may be allowed 75 percent of such expense and up to 90 percent of the cost of inpatient care. The assistance shall be granted only on evidence of actual payment made by the employee for medical bills.
- 2. Physicians' Orders--Assistance on the purchase of pharmaceuticals, including vitamins, shall be allowed only if purchased on a physician's prescription or with a physician's written order in the case of nonprescription purchases. Prescription purchases must bear the prescription number or other identifying marks. Assistance as provided for above may also apply on the expense of medical and orthopedic appliances when prescribed by a qualified physician.
- 3. Dependents--Each division shall determine the eligibility of the employee's spouse and dependents. Dependents shall be defined as members of the immediate family--husband, wife, and unmarried dependent children.
- 4. Eligibility--This policy shall become operative for regular full-time employees at the beginning of such employment. Institutions or organizations may establish a probationary period for various classes of workers before considering their employment to be on a permanent basis.
- 5. Arrangements--Employees are asked to make their own arrangements for medical attention and be responsible to the institution or doctor for the expense involved. Except in cases of emergency, workers should take counsel with the organization concerned before arranging for major operations or other medical attention calling for heavy expense.

6. Net Expense--The denominational Health Care Assistance Policy shall apply only to such medical expense as remains after first deducting sums reimbursed to the worker as medical payments by policies of insurance provided by the employing organization. In case of accidental death or total disability, the corresponding benefits shall accrue to the next of kin or designated heirs.

280-86G ADOPTION EXPENSE - POLICY AMENDMENT

VOTED, To amend GC Y 20 35, Adoption Expense, to read as follows:

Y 20 35 Adoption Expense -- Employees may be granted assistance of up to 75 percent of the medical and legal expenses incurred in the adoption of children up to a maximum allowance as set by the division in harmony with division adoption policies.

398-86G FREIGHT ALLOWANCE - POLICY AMENDMENT

VOTED, To amend GC Q 20, Freight Allowance (Interdivision Permanent Returns), to read as follows:

Q 20 Freight Allowance

- 1. The base division No change
  - a. Freight, cartage, and handling No change
- 1) After two thirds or more of the initial full term of service--50 percent of a Class A freight allowance.
- 2) After more than one third but less than two thirds of the initial full term of service--40 percent of a Class A freight allowance.
- 3) After less than one third of the initial full term of service--30 percent of a Class A freight allowance.
  - b. Provision for shipment No change

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- c. If a worker does not elect to take home the full freight allowance provided in this policy, the unused freight settlement shall be on the same basis as specified in N 55 15-g.
- d. When missionaries return by air to their base division on permanent return, they shall be granted a baggage allowance of \$200 for each adult ticket, and \$100 for each child.
  - e. "All risk" marine insurance No change
  - 2. Missionaries returning permanently No change
  - 3. The base division No change
  - 4. Workers are requested to No change

400-86G TRANSFER OF PERSONAL FUNDS - POLICY AMENDMENT

VOTED, To amend GC M 17, Transfer of Personal Funds, to read as follows:

#### M 17 Transfer of Personal Funds

M 17 05 Regular Transfer Provision -- 1. At the time of midterm leave, furlough, or permanent return, interdivision workers shall be eligible to transfer funds to their home country at the current rate of exchange according to the following provisions:

- a. Up to 30 percent of the actual denominational earnings for both the employee and spouse, including expatriate allowance of the country where serving since the midterm leave or last furlough.
- b. The funds invested in one car at the time of purchase, and in the currency in which the car was purchased. At time of permanent return or transfer to another country, customs and import fees may be added.
- M 17 10 Sale of Furniture and Equipment -- At the time of permanent return or transfer to another division, an additional amount equivalent to the original investment or verified replacement cost of necessary home furnishings and equipment in the home or new division may be transferred.

M 17 15 Unusual Situations -- Transfer of funds not covered by the above provisions shall be made only upon approval of the division officers in consultation with the General Conference Treasury.

115-86GN METHODS OF BIBLE STUDY COMMITTEE (GCC-A) -- REPORT

VOTED, To approve the Methods of Bible Study Committee (GCC-A) report. which reads as follows:

Bible Study: Presuppositions, Principles, and Methods

#### 1. Preamble

This statement is addressed to all members of the Seventh-day Adventist Church with the purpose of providing guidelines on how to study the Bible, both the trained Biblical scholar and others.

Seventh-day Adventists recognize and appreciate the contributions of those Biblical scholars throughout history who have developed useful and reliable methods of Bible study consistent with the claims and teachings of Scripture. Adventists are committed to the acceptance of Biblical truth and are willing to follow it, using all methods of interpretation consistent with what Scripture says of itself. These are outlined in the presuppositions detailed below.

In recent decades the most prominent method in Biblical studies has been known as the historical-critical method. Scholars who use this method, as classically formulated, operate on the basis of presuppositions which, prior to studying the Biblical text, reject the reliability of accounts of miracles and other supernatural events narrated in the Bible. Even a modified use of this method that retains the principle of criticism which subordinates the Bible to human reason is unacceptable to Adventists.

The historical-critical method minimizes the need for faith in God and obedience to His commandments. In addition, because such a method deemphasizes the divine element in the Bible as an inspired book (including its resultant unity) and depreciates or misunderstands apocalyptic prophecy and the eschatological portions of the Bible, we urge Adventist Bible students to avoid relying on the use of the presuppositions and the resultant deductions associated with the historical-critical method.

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By contrast to the historical-critical method and presuppositions, we believe it to be helpful to set forth the principles of Bible study that are consistent with the teachings of the Scriptures themselves, that preserve their unity, and are based upon the premise that the Bible is the Word of God. Such an approach will lead us into a satisfying and rewarding experience with God.

## 2. Presuppositions Arising From the Claims of Scripture

## a. Origin

- 1) The Bible is the Word of God and is the primary and authoritative means by which He reveals Himself to human beings.
- 2) The Holy Spirit inspired the Bible writers with thoughts, ideas, and objective information; in turn they expressed these in their own words. Therefore the Scriptures are an indivisible union of human and divine elements, neither of which should be emphasized to the neglect of the other (2 Peter 1:21; of <u>The Great Controversy</u>, pp v, vi).
- 3) All Scripture is inspired by God and came through the work of the Holy Spirit. However, it did not come in a continuous chain of unbroken revelations. As the Holy Spirit communicated truth to the Bible writer, each wrote as he was moved by the Holy Spirit, emphasizing the aspect of the truth which he was led to stress. For this reason the student of the Bible will gain a rounded comprehension on any subject by recognizing that the Bible is its own best interpreter and when studied as a whole it depicts a consistent, harmonious truth (2 Tim 3:16; Heb 1:1, 2; cf Selected Messages, Book 1, pp 19, 20; The Great Controversy, pp. v vi).
- 4) Although it was given to those who lived in an ancient Near Eastern/Mediterranean context, the Bible transcends its cultural backgrounds to serve as God's Word for all cultural, racial, and situational contexts in all ages.

#### b. Authority

- 1) The sixty-six books of the Old and New Testaments are the clear, infallible revelation of God's will and His salvation. The Bible is the Word of God, and it alone is the standard by which all teaching and experience must be tested (2 Tim 3:15, 17; Ps 119:105; Prov 30:5, 6; Isa 8:20; John 17:17; 2 Thess 3:14; Heb 4:12).
- 2) Scripture is an authentic, reliable record of history and God's acts in history. It provides the normative

theological interpretation of those acts. The supernatural acts revealed in Scripture are historically true. For example, chapters 1-11 of Genesis are a factual account of historical events.

- 3) The Bible is not like other books. It is an indivisible blend of the divine and the human. Its record of many details of secular history is integral to its overall purpose to convey salvation history. While at times there may be parallel procedures employed by Bible students to determine historical data, the usual techniques of historical research, based as they are on human presuppositions and focused on the human element, are inadequate for interpreting the Scriptures, which are a blend of the divine and human. Only a method that fully recognizes the indivisible nature of the Scriptures can avoid a distortion of its message.
- 4) Human reason is subject to the Bible, not equal to or above it. Presuppositions regarding the Scriptures must be in harmony with the claims of the Scriptures and subject to correction by them (1 Cor. 2:1-6). God intends that human reason be used to its fullest extent, but within the context and under the authority of His Word rather than independent of it.
- 5) The revelation of God in all nature, when properly understood, is in harmony with the written Word, and is to be interpreted in the light of Scripture.

#### 3. Principles for Approaching the Interpretation of Scripture

- a. The Spirit enables the believer to accept, understand, and apply the Bible to one's own life as he seeks divine power to render obedience to all Scriptural requirements and to appropriate personally all Bible promises. Only those following the light already received can hope to receive further illumination of the Spirit (John 16:13, 14: 1 Cor 2:10-14).
- b. Scripture cannot be correctly interpreted without the aid of the Holy Spirit, for it is the Spirit who enables the believer to understand and apply Scripture. Therefore, any study of the Word should commence with a request for the Spirit's guidance and illumination.
- c. Those who come to the study of the Word must do so with faith, in the humble spirit of a learner who seeks to hear what the Bible is saying. They must be willing to submit all presuppositions, opinions, and the conclusions of reason to the judgment and correction of the Word itself. With this attitude the Bible student may come directly to the Word, and with careful study may come to an

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understanding of the essentials of salvation apart from any human explanations, however helpful. The Biblical message becomes meaningful to such a person.

d. The investigation of Scripture must be characterized by a sincere desire to discover and obey God's will and word rather than to seek support or evidence for preconceived ideas.

#### 4. <u>Methods of Bible Study</u>

a. Select a Bible version for study that is faithful to the meaning contained in languages in which the Bible originally was written, giving preference to translations done by a broad group of scholars and published by a general publisher above translations sponsored by a particular denomination or narrowly-focused group.

Exercise care not to build major doctrinal points on one Bible translation or version. Trained Biblical scholars will use the Greek and Hebrew texts, enabling them to examine variant readings of ancient Bible manuscripts as well.

- b. Choose a definite plan of study, avoiding haphazard and aimless approaches. Study plans such as the following are suggested:
  - 1) Book-by-book analysis of the message
  - 2) Verse-by-verse method
- 3) Study that seeks a Biblical solution to a specific life problem, Biblical satisfaction for a specific need, or a Biblical answer to a specific question
- 4) Topical study (faith, love, second coming, and others)
  - 5) Word study
  - 6) Biographical study
- c. Seek to grasp the simple, most obvious meaning of the Biblical passage being studied.
- d. Seek to discover the underlying major themes of Scripture as found in individual texts, passages, and books. Two basic, related themes run throughout Scripture: (1) The person and work of Jesus Christ; and (2) the great controversy perspective involving the authority of God's Word, the fall of man, the first and

second advents of Christ, the exoneration of God and His law, and the restoration of the divine plan for the universe. These themes are to be drawn from the totality of Scripture and not imposed on it.

- e. Recognize that the Bible is its own interpreter and that the meaning of words, texts, and passages is best determined by diligently comparing Scripture with Scripture.
- f. Study the context of the passage under consideration by relating it to the sentences and paragraphs immediately preceding and following it. Try to relate the ideas of the passage to the line of thought of the entire Biblical book.
- g. As far as possible ascertain the historical circumstances in which the passage was written by the Biblical writers under the guidance of the Holy Spirit.
- h. Determine the literary type the author is using. Some Biblical material is composed of parables, proverbs, allegories, psalms and apocalyptic prophecies. Since many Biblical writers presented much of their material as poetry, it is helpful to use a version of the Bible that presents this material in poetic style, for passages employing imagery are not to be interpreted in the same manner as prose.
- i. Recognize that a given Biblical text may not conform in every detail to present-day literary categories. Be cautious not to force these categories in interpreting the meaning of the Biblical text. It is a human tendency to find what one is looking for, even when the author did not intend such.
- j. Take note of grammar and sentence construction in order to discover the author's meaning. Study the key words of the passage by comparing their use in other parts of the Bible by means of a concordance and with the help of Biblical lexicons and dictionaries.
- k. In connection with the study of the Biblical text, explore the historical and cultural factors. Archaeology, anthropology, and history may contribute to understanding the meaning of the text.
- l. Seventh-day Adventists believe that God inspired Ellen G White. Therefore, her expositions on any given Biblical passage offer an inspired guide to the meaning of texts without exhausting their meaning or preempting the task of exegesis (for example, see Evangelism, p 256; The Great Controversy, pp 193, 595; Testimonies, vol 5, pp 665, 682, 707-708; Counsels to Writers and Editors, pp 33-35).

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- m. After studying as outlined above, turn to various commentaries and secondary helps such as scholarly works to see how others have dealt with the passage. Then carefully evaluate the different viewpoints expressed from the standpoint of Scripture as a whole.
  - n. In interpreting prophecy keep in mind that:
- 1) The Bible claims God's power to predict the future (Isa 46:10).
- 2) Prophecy has a moral purpose. It was not written merely to satisfy curiosity about the future. Some of the purposes of prophecy are to strengthen faith (John 14:29) and to promote holy living and readiness for the advent (Matt 24:44; Rev 22:7, 10,11).
- 3) The focus of much prophecy is on Christ (both His first and second advents), the Church, and the end-time.
- 4) The norms for interpreting prophecy are found within the Bible itself: The Bible notes time prophecies and their historical fulfillments; the New Testament cites specific fulfillments of Old Testament prophecies about the Messiah; and the Old Testament itself presents individuals and events as types of the Messiah.
- 5) In the New Testament application of Old Testament prophecies, some literal names become spiritual: e.g. Israel represents the church, Babylon apostate religion, etc.
- 6) There are two general types of prophetic writings, nonapocalyptic prophecy as found in Isaiah and Jeremiah, and apocalyptic prophecy as found in Daniel and the Revelation. These differing types have different characteristics:
- a) Nonapocalyptic prophecy addresses God's people; apocalyptic is more universal in scope.
- b) Nonapocalyptic prophecy often is conditional in nature, setting forth to God's people the alternatives of blessing for obedience and curses for disobedience; apocalyptic emphasizes the sovereignty of God and His control over history.
- c) Nonapocalyptic prophecy often leaps from the local crisis to the end-time day of the Lord; apocalyptic prophecy presents the course of history from the time of the prophet to the end of the world.

- d) Time prophecies in nonapocalyptic prophecy generally are long, e.g. 400 years of Israel's servitude (Gen 15:13) and 70 years of Babylonian captivity (Jer 25:12). Time prophecies in apocalyptic prophecy generally are phrased in short terms, e.g. 10 days (Rev 2:10) or 42 months (Rev 13:5). Apocalyptic time periods stand symbolically for longer periods of actual time.
- 7) Apocalyptic prophecy is highly symbolic and should be interpreted accordingly. In interpreting symbols, the following methods may be used:
- a) Look for interpretations (explicit or implicit) within the passage itself (e.g. Dan 8:20,21; Rey 1:20).
- b) Look for interpretations elsewhere in the book or in other writings by the same author.
- c) Using a concordance, study the use of symbols in other parts of Scripture.
- d) A study of ancient Near Eastern documents may throw light on the meaning of symbols, although Scriptural use may alter those meanings.
- 8) The literary structure of a book often is an aid to interpreting it. The parallel nature of Daniel's prophecies is an example.
- o. Parallel accounts in Scripture sometimes present differences in detail and emphasis (for example, compare Matt 21:33,34, Mark 12:1-11, and Luke 20:9-18, or 2 Kings 18-20 with 2 Chron 32). When studying such passages, first examine them carefully to be sure that the parallels actually are referring to the same historical event. For example, many of Jesus' parables may have been given on different occasions to different audiences and with different wording.

In cases where there appear to be differences in parallel accounts, one should recognize that the total message of the Bible is the synthesis of all of its parts. Each book or writer communicates that which the Spirit has led him to write. Each makes his own special contribution to the richness, diversity, and variety of Scripture (The Great Controversy, pp v, vi). The reader must allow each Bible writer to emerge and be heard while at the same time recognizing the basic unity of the divine self-disclosure.

When parallel passages seem to indicate discrepancy or contradiction, look for the underlying harmony. Keep in mind that

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dissimilarities may be due to minor errors of copyists (Selected Messages, Book 1, p 16), or may be the result of differing emphases and choice of materials of various authors who wrote under the inspiration and guidance of the Holy Spirit for different audiences under different circumstances (Selected Messages, Book 1, pp 21, 22; The Great Controversy, p vi).

It may prove impossible to reconcile minor dissimilarities in detail which may be irrelevant to the main and clear message of the passage. In some cases judgment may have to be suspended until more information and better evidence are available to resolve a seeming discrepancy.

p. The Scriptures were written for the practical purpose of revealing the will of God to the human family. However, in order not to misconstrue certain kinds of statements it is important to recognize that they were addressed to peoples of Eastern cultures and expressed in their thought patterns.

Expressions such as "The Lord hardened the heart of Pharaoh" (Ex 9:12) or "An evil spirit from the Lord . . ." (1 Sam 16:15), the imprecatory psalms, or the "three days and three nights" of Jonah as compared with Christ's death (Matt 12:40), commonly are misunderstood because they are interpreted today from a different viewpoint.

A background knowledge of Near Eastern culture is indispensable for understanding such expressions. For example, Hebrew culture attributed responsibility to an individual for acts he did not commit but that he allowed to happen. Therefore the inspired writers of the Scriptures commonly credit God with doing actively that which in Western thought we would say He permits or does not prevent from happening, e.g., the hardening of Pharaoh's heart.

Another aspect of Scripture that troubles the modern mind is the divine command to Israel to engage in war and execute entire nations. Israel originally was organized as a theocracy, a civil government through which God ruled directly (Gen 18:25). Such a theocratic state was unique. It no longer exists and cannot be regarded as a direct model for Christian practice.

The Scriptures record experiences and statements of persons whom God accepted but were not in harmony with the spiritual principles of the Bible as a whole, for example, incidents relating to the use of alcohol, polygamy, divorce, and slavery. Although condemnation of such deeply ingrained social customs is not explicit, God did not necessarily endorse or approve all that He permitted and bore with in

the lives of the patriarchs and in Israel. Jesus made this clear in His statement with regard to divorce (Matt 19:4-6, 8).

The spirit of the Scriptures is one of restoration. God works patiently to elevate fallen humanity from the depths of sin to the divine ideal. Consequently we must not accept as models the actions of sinful men as recorded in the Bible.

The Scriptures represent the unfolding of God's revelation to man. Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, for example, enlarges and expands certain Old Testament concepts. Christ Himself is the ultimate revelation of God's character to humanity (Heb 1:1-3).

While there is an overarching unity in the Bible from Genesis to Revelation, and while all Scripture is equally inspired, God chose to reveal Himself to and through human individuals and to meet them where they were in terms of spiritual and intellectual endowments. God Himself does not change, but He progressively unfolded His revelation to men as they were able to grasp it (John 16:12; Seventh-day Adventist Bible Commentary, vol 7, p 945; Selected Messages, Book 1, p 21). Every experience or statement of Scripture is a divinely inspired record, but not every atatement or experience is necessarily normative for Christian behavior today. Both the spirit and the letter of Scripture must be understood (1 Cor 10:6-13; The Desire of Ages, p 150; Testimonies, vol 4, pp 10-12).

q. As the final goal, make application of the text. Ask such questions as, "What is the message and purpose God intends to convey through Scripture?" "What meaning does this text have for me? How does it apply to my situation and circumstances today?" In doing so, recognize that although many Biblical passages had local significance, nonetheless they contain timeless principles applicable to every age and culture.

## 5. Conclusion

In the "Introduction" to The Great Controversy Ellen G White wrote:

"The Bible, with its God-given truths expressed in the language of men, presents a union of the divine with the human. Such a union existed in the nature of Christ, who was the Son of God and the Son of man. Thus it is true of the Bible, as it was of Christ, that 'the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us.' John 1:14" (p viii).

As it is impossible for those who do not accept Christ's divinity to understand the purpose of His incarnation, it is also impossible for

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those who see the Bible merely as a human book to understand its message, however careful and rigorous their methods.

Even Christian scholars who accept the divine-human nature of Scripture, but whose methodological approaches cause them to dwell largely on its human aspects, risk emptying the Biblical message of its power by relegating it to the background while concentrating on the medium. They forget that medium and message are inseparable and that the medium without the message is as an empty shell that cannot address the vital spiritual needs of humankind.

A committed Christian will use only those methods that are able to do full justice to the dual, inseparable nature of Scripture, enhance his ability to understand and apply its message, and strengthen faith.

401-86GN 1888--REEMPHASIS AND COMMEMORATION

VOTED, To approve the following plans in connection with the centenary commemoration of the 1888 Ministerial Institute and General Conference Session:

## 1. Scope of Participation

Because Minneapolis is in the North American Division the commemoration will probably be primarily a North American Division concern. However, the interest and implications are fundamentally international and the world Church should be included in the programming.

## 2. Purpose of Commemoration

The commemoration of the 1888 conference will be understood as an attempt to affirm the Church's confidence in and commitment to the doctrine of righteousness by faith as stated in our official documents and not an effort to exonerate or condemn specific personalities or positions involved in the Minneapolis experience.

#### 3. Targeted Results

Results intended include:

- a. Involving General Conference leadership in discussions vital to Church beliefs.
- b. Clearly establish General Conference interest and concern regarding the 1888 message.
- c. Taking the initiative and limiting the influence of critics of the Church's attitude and understanding regarding righteousness by faith.
- d. Raising the level of sensitivity and appreciation of our members worldwide regarding this paramount doctrine.

e. Effecting in the lives of laity and denominational employees alike the renewal of faith and fervor which accompanies full trust in the merits of Jesus Christ.

## 4. <u>Implementation</u>

Suggestions for programming include:

- a. Briefing proper organization personnel
  - 1) Division leaders to brief leaders of union fields
- 2) Union conference leaders to brief leaders of local fields
- 3) Local conference leaders to brief leaders of churches, companies, and institutions.
- b. Highlighting the theme at the Annual Council in Nairobi 1988 (October 4-11) with appropriate devotional messages and discussiona
- c. Planning 1988 NAD Year-end Meeting to accommodate the 1888 experience as much as possible by incorporating the following factors:
  - 1) Date: November 1-10
  - 2) Place: Minneapolis, Minnesota
  - 3) Special Features planned are
- a) Three-day convocation (November 3-6) emphasizing the theme of righteousness by faith
  - b) Historical reenactments
- d. Encouraging and assisting every world division that wishes to adopt the above plan or adaptation thereof
- e. Designating 1988 world Church Week of Prayer as November 5-12 with readings to ephasize righteousness by faith. November 12, 1988 is to be planned as a special day of commemoration and commitment
- f. Encouraging special readings and discussions in worship periods in conference offices, hospitals, schools, publishing houses, etc, during the Week of Prayer

## 5. Preparation of Materials

- a. Materials for Week of Prayer readings to be prepared under the auspices of the General Conference Ministerial Association.
- b. Materials for special Bible class discussion in academies and schools of higher education to be prepared by the General Conference Department of Education.
- c. Materials for special worship periods in conference offices and denominational institutions to be prepared by the Ministerial Association.
- d. Preliminary articles for <u>Adventist Review</u> and union papers to be prepared by Biblical Research Institute.
- e. All above materials to be approved and coordinated through Commemoration Committee.
- f. Programming and materials for Annual Council (Nairobi) and division meetings (including convocations) and to be planned by General Conference and division leadership respectively.

- a. The activities described should be tied to an appropriate quotation from the pen of Ellen White such as her statement: "Christ and His Righteousness--let this be our platform and the very life of our faith."--Evangelism 190.
- b. Convocation and discussion themes should focus upon such questions as:
  - 1) What really happened in 1888?
  - 2) What were the doctrinal issues involved?
  - 3) Who were the personalities involved?
- 4) What were the events leading up to the Ministerial Institute and the session?
  - 5) What were the results that followed?
  - 6) How is righteousness by faith involved in specific

doctrines of Adventism, i.e. the second coming, the state of the dead, the true church, the Sabbath, the sanctuary, etc?

7) What is the contemporary significance of this doctrine?

#### 7. Planning Timetable

a. A precise schedule for release of announcements, preparation and release of study materials, articles, sermons and other materials shall be submitted to the General Conference president and officers by the Commemorative Committee no later than Spring Meeting 1987.

VOTED, 1. To accept the plan for study to be given to the role of intramural and interschool sports in SDA academies and colleges.

## Scope of Study

The General Conference Officers and Education Department leadership recommend that since the issue is also a concern of school administrators in other divisions, all divisions will be invited to participate in this study.

## Focus of Study

The primary concern of this request is athletic competition between Seventh-day Adventist schools. However, since this activity is considerably influenced by practices in local churches and denominational institutions, the focus of this study and subsequent recommendations should address activities within those units as well. The study should therefore include a review of the following:

- a. Competition between Adventist schools
- b. Competition between Adventist and non-SDA schools
- c. Competition between Adventist churches
- d. Competition between Adventist churches and non-Adventist churches
- e. Competition between Adventist institutions and community organizations
- 2. a. To request the General Conference officers to appoint a General Conference Interschool Sports Study Coordinating Committee to coordinate the studies presented by each division on competitive sports in denominational institutions.
- b. To request the world divisions to work with the General Conference Interschool Sports Study Coordinating Committee.
  - 3. The following time schedule is suggested:
- a. First meeting of the full GC coordinating committee January 1987

- b. Study and research efforts by the division committees January to June 1987
- c. Report of division committees to the GC coordinating committee July 1987
- d. Second meeting of the full GC coordinating committee July 1987
- e. Report of GC coordinating committee to General Conference Officers September 1987
- f. Report to General Conference, Annual Council October 1987

T 40 40 Education Expenses -- For the employee:

  - a. Tuition
  - b. Registration fees
  - c. Local transportation
  - d. Graduation fee
- 2. Textbook Allowance--Textbook allowance shall be granted at the rate of up to \$100 per semester.
- 3. Thesis Expense--The following allowances shall be given for thesis/dissertation/project preparation:
  - a. Master's degrees--Actual cost up to \$400
  - b. Ph.D., Th.D., Ed.D. degrees--Actual cost up to \$1,000
  - D.Min. degree--Actual cost up to\$500
- 4. Scholastic Deficiencies--Full financial assistance under the above policies shall be made available for make-up/equivalency studies as required, provided the employee is enrolled for full-time study and when certified by the Dean. The Dean shall notify the employee's division regarding the projected normal time required to complete the

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degree for which the employee is being sponsored, including any make-up of deficiencies required for entering the degree program.

5. In cases where a study program is approved for an employee's spouse, the above provisions shall apply.

- 2. Education Expenses—Unless other arrangements are made, the sending organization shall reimburse the employee for regular tuition charges and grant assistance on the expense of preparing a thesis/dissertation/project as follows:

- a. Master's Degree--Actual cost up to \$400.
- b. Doctor of Ministry Degree -- Actual cost up to \$500.
- c. All other doctoral degrees--Actual cost up to \$1,000.
- d. Textbook and syllabus allowance at the rate of \$100 per semester.
  - 3. Housing No change
  - 4. Special Living Allowance No change
  - 5. Missionaries No change
  - 6. Overseas Divisions No change
  - 7. National Workers--Rent Subsidy No change
  - 8. National Workers--Adequate Support No change
- 9. Graduate Study for Ministers--Amortization and Reimbursement Schedule--A minister who is approved by his controlling committee for a leave of absence for advanced study under the above provisions shall be under obligation to serve the sending organization four years for the first full year of graduate study and two months for each additional one month of study leave. At the time he returns to his field of service the controlling committee and the minister shall come to a written and itemized understanding regarding the total amount of the obligation, which shall include salary, living and educational allowances (also travel if he is not enrolled in the Theological Seminary), which shall be amortized by service on the schedule indicated above. In case a call is placed for the employee before the obligation is fully amortized, the amount uncared for shall be assumed by the calling organization. In case the call is to overseas service, this provision may be waived.

#### GENERAL CONFERENCE HEADQUARTERS OFFICE - PROGRESS REPORT

Donald F Gilbert reported on the progress made in plans for the construction of a new General Conference headquarters office.

The General Conference has owned the property on Route 29, Silver Spring, Maryland for some time and this is the site selected for the new headquarters office. On July 25, 1986 application was made for the building permit. By submitting the plans early the General Conference avoided becoming subject to the Impact Fee which since then is being charged by Montgomery County for companies building in that area.

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Because of heavy traffic in the area, the County has proposed that the General Conference agree to split shifts for employees. Inasmuch as this is not satisfactory, it may be necessary to erect the office elsewhere. An alternate site on I 95 has been investigated and should a change in location become necessary, the present architectural plans could easily be adapted to the new location. A meeting with the Montgomery Country Park and Planning Commission is scheduled for October 23, 1986. After that meeting it will be determined whether or not the office can be located on the Route 29 property.

The present General Conference building and properties have already been sold with the provision that they can be occupied by us until mid-1988.

This report was followed by a slide presentation on the General Conference headquarters offices past and future.

#### EL SALVADOR EARTHQUAKE - REPORTS

George W Brown, President of the Inter-American Division, passed on the information received in regard to the earthquake in El Salvador on October 10, 1986. The center of the city of San Salvador has been almost completely demolished with great loss of life and property. Thus far, information indicates that two Church members have lost their lives and two more are missing. No report has been received concerning the homes of members which have been destroyed.

Ralph S Watts, Jr, Director of ADRA International, reported that the loss of life is estimated at 1,000 with the number of injured about 10,000. Homeless could reach 25,000. This is the fifth major disaster suffered by the Inter-American Division in the past 12 months. Ralph Watts encouraged other world divisions to give financial assistance, channeled through ADRA. ADRA International is supplying tents, clothing, blankets and water-purifying chemicals.

D E Robinson expressed appreciation to the owner and employees of Hotel Nacional and the Convention Center for their friendly assistance during the Annual Council, presenting each of them with a copy of Desire of Ages in Portuguese. He also paid tribute to the South American Division leaders and staff members who worked untiringly to prepare for the Annual Council.

#### HARVEST 90 - REPORT

Kenneth J Mittleider introduced the Harvest 90 campaign with the encouraging statistics that in 1888 there was one Seventh-day Adventist for every 58,058 of the world population which was 1,516,000,000 at that time. In 1984 world population had reached 4,757,000,000 and there was one Adventist for every 1,075 people.

He called upon Carlos E Aeschlimann of the General Conference Ministerial Association to give a report on the first year of Harvest 90. Over 133 percent of the yearly goal of 280,000 baptisms has been reached and 18.72 percent of the entire goal. Baptisms by world divisions for the first year of Harvest 90 are as follows:

#### GLOBAL STRATEGY FOR REACHING THE UNREACHED

The last barrier to the promised land of Canaan was the Jordan River. That is where the Advent

The Adventist Church needs to move together. We must not be satisfied with what God has done for us. The need is for a global strategy, a greater vision, to reach the unreached. There should be less time and energy expended in carrying on the routine of organization. There needs to be a redeployment of the financial resources of the Church as well as its personnel which includes Bible scholars, historians, analysts, sociologists, anthropologists and computer experts, etc.

VOTED, To authorize the General Conference President to develop a global strategy whereby the Seventh-day Adventist Church can reach the unreached.

The Appropriations Budget represents the involvement of the world family. The 1987 Budget is 4.1 percent larger than the 1986 Budget, amounting to \$6,000,000 more than last year.

W L Murrill, Undertreasurer, led in the presentation of the Budget.

VOTED, To approve the 1987 Appropriations Budget as presented. The budget appears on pages 86-459 to 86-481 of these minutes.

Joac Wolff, President of the South American Division, remarked that in the Budget the Biblical principle that it is more blessed to give than to receive is illustrated. He also made the observation that if the entire budget had been given to the South American Division, 30,000 new church buildings could be constructed which would house the entire world population of Seventh-day Adventists!

#### DEVOTIONAL MESSAGE

Calvin B Rock, Chairman, read Romans 1:14--"I am debtor both to the Greeks, and to the Barbarians; both to the wise, and to the unwise."

The Chairman enumerated our debts as human beings--to nature, to our benefactors, to the Church, and to humanity. Above all we are indebted to Christ through whom we are redeemed and restored. This debtor relationship involves complete surrender, all that we have and are, and still the debt can never be paid. There is not even time to do all we would like to do in service to God. The speaker read the following excerpt from the Review and Herald of April 6, 1886 as encouragement that even older workers continue to do their best in paying their debt to Christ:

"... The afternoon sun of ... life may be more mellow and productive of fruit than the morning sun. It may continue to increase in size and brightness until it drops behind the western hills."

Tulio R Haylock offered prayer.

#### INTRODUCTIONS

Elizabeth Sterndale presented Anna May Vaughan who served as a missionary nurse in Africa and upon her return organized the nursing education program at Kettering Medical Center where her most recent position was that of Vice-President for Patient Services. Since her retirement in July 1986 (after 40 years of denominational work) she has offered herself once again to Africa and arrangements are being made for her to serve under the Sustentation Overseas Service plan.

N R Dower introduced Harold Smith, newly arrived pastor of the Burnt Mills Church, Maryland who formerly served in Alaska.

A welcome was extended to Elvin Adams, associate director who has recently joined our staff in the General Conference Health and Temperance Department.

#### REPORTS

<u>Victor H Cooper</u> reported good coverage, not only in France but elsewhere, of the recent ICPA meeting held in Nice, France. The CBS-TV report of this gathering was released on 44 stations across the United States last Sunday. It is planned to secure a copy of the telecast for presentation to the General Conference staff.

Michael H Stevenson announced an opening to work among the Kwaio Fudanga tribe on Malaita, Solomon Islands, South Pacific Division. In obedience to spirits, a representative of this tribe killed our missionary, Brian Dunn, a few years ago. The tribe has resisted both religious and secular efforts to civilize them. A cyclone struck the area recently and destroyed their crops and the people were in need because of lack of food. Ira Dawson, Medical Director of the Atoifi Hospital, brought ADRA relief to them. He was able to move among the people safely and villages are now open for the Church to begin work among these primitive people.

J Robert Spangler passed on the good news that property has been assigned to the Seventh-day Adventist Church in the Soviet Union for the establishing of a correspondence school for ministers.

He also related his pleasant visit with Konstantin Kharchev, Chairman of the Council on Religious Affairs of the USSR Council of Ministers. He is expected to visit the General Conference office next week.

Ronald E Appenzeller told of his visit to the Brazil Publishing House. Four printing presses work 24 hours a day for 5 1/2 days a week in an effort to keep up with the demand for literature. Since 1979, 2,000,000 copies of Desire of Ages have been produced. Each month 210,000 copies of the Portuguese Our Little Friend (Nosso Amiguinho) are produced.

R W Olson related an encouraging development at Friedensau Theological Seminary (Eastern Germany). Arrangements have been made to send in 240 copies of the six-volume biography of Ellen G White by Arthur L White, much to the joy of the ministers in that area.

The Chairman welcomed all who were in attendance. In view of the business that was before the group, it was urged that members and invitees meet together through the day. The first meeting is a stockholders meeting of Harris Pine Mills. The General Conference Corporation is the sole owner of Harris Pine Mills, and the Trustees of the GC Corporation are the stockholders of Harris Pine Mills.

Special mention was made of the four guests listed above. The time taken by each of these men is much appreciated, and their contribution to the meeting will be especially meaningful in light of their areas of responsibility and experience.

#### REMARKS

The Chairman stated that in the experience of all there come times of special significance. Such a time has come for Harris Pine Mills. This organization was gifted to the church, it has provided employment to many young people, and has proved a blessing to the church for nearly thirty years. At present, Harris Pine Mills is facing very serious financial problems. The company belongs to God, and the Lord is the ultimate stockholder. He is able to do great things. The promises that He made to the children of Israel in Deuteronomy 28 are available to us today. If we lean not to our own understanding, seek His way, He will pour out His blessings. We must do all that we can to analyze and study, and ask God to do His part.

- 3. The Corporation Board may request semi-annual reports from the secretaries of the ISS and Equipment Committees, summarizing equipment purchased over the six-month period.

#### SURVEY OF NEW HAMPSHIRE PROPERTY

VOTED, To approve a survey of the New Hampshire property owned by the 86/114 GC Corporation. This is necessary due to the changes effected in our property following the new road that has been constructed through the property. Attempts are continuing to arrange sale of this property.

#### HARRIS PINE MILLS

VOTED, To record the following action: 86/115

1. To appoint a Harris Pine Mills "Survival Team" consisting of the following individuals:

Otis, Harold F Jr, Chairman Gilbert, D F and/or his designee, Secretary Cowley, A L or counterpart Dupper, Frank F McNeilus, G or counterpart

- 2. To recommend the following for the "Survival Team":
  - (a) That regular monthly meetings be planned for the next six-month period, this period being considered crucial.
  - (b) Minutes of the "Survival Team" to be sent to all General Conference Corporation Trustees.
  - (c) All payments made by the General Conference or the GC Corporation to Harris Pine Mills are to be approved by the "Survival Team." This is excluding the initial payment.
  - (d) The "Survival Team" is requested to prepare detailed guidelines which will relate the release of funds to Harris Pine Mills to timber sales, and also to specific reduction levels of inventory.
  - (e) While the "Survival Team" will be receptive to the recommendations of management, it is expected that management will be responsive to the guidance and direction given by the "Survival Team."
- 3. In view of their critical position as far as liquidity is concerned, to note a request from Harris Pine Mills for new capital in the amount of \$12 million. In view of this request, to record the following:
  - (a) To approve the purchase of all timber land and all timber rights presently owned by Harris Pine Mills by the General Conference Corporation. Subject to verification of asset value, to approve payment of up to \$12 million as requested by the "Survival Team" and outlined in 2 above. Transfer of ownership of the above-mentioned assets to be made into the name of the GC Corporation.
  - (b) Reaping of trees should commence as soon as possible, with cash proceeds from sales being used to reduce the loan and to fund interest costs.
  - (c) The General Conference is requested to advance and guarantee the interest, and to provide the capitalization through the Investment and Securities Committee.
  - (d) In view of the immediate need for cash, to authorize the release of \$3 million.
- 4. As a part of this minute, Warren L Johns, after the meeting, has made a written request that his negative vote be registered. He also asks that note be made of an alternative plan which he presented to the GC Corporation Board members. A copy of his proposals are on file with the official copy of these minutes.
