RESOLUTION OF GRATITUDE 88h The meeting of the Council came to order and after singing, "Wonderful Love of Jesus," was led in prayer by G. D. Keough.

The remaining items on the report of the Plans Committee were considered, and the report was adopted as follows:

VOTED, That the following Resolution of Gratitude be adopted:

WHEREAS, God has been very good to us during the past year, both in fulfilling His promises and in answering our prayers; having given us increased baptisms and literature sales; helping us to establish the Middle East Press, the Division headquarters, and the Nile Union headquarters; and enabling us to reach thousands through the radio broadcasts and the Voice of Prophecy Bible Correspondence schools; and advancing our work in other departments, giving us the greatest enrollment our schools ever had and good patronage in the Dar El Salaam Hospital; as well as preserving the life and health of workers in the field; and has sent encouragement to our field by giving us several additions to the working force both of national and overseas workers; and

WHEREAS, God has not only kept the doors open for our work thus far even in difficult regions, but also providentially has opened new doors of opportunity and has held in check the winds of war to a large measure, and prevented strife from stopping the work, therefore it is

Resolved, That we give thanks and praise, and express gratitude to our Heavenly Father, and that we as workers and members of the Middle East Division assembled in council in Beirut reconsecrate and rededicate ourselves fully to Him, seeking whole-heartedly for His guidance and help and for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, and that we determine to join together in one united effort to glorify God by endeavoring to do all that He shall enable us to do toward finishing His work throughout the year 1954, and that we ask His pardon for any failure and neglect in 1953, giving Him the honor and glory for every success we have had at any time or in any place.

EVANGELISM FOR WINTER OF 1953 AND SPRING OF 1954 885 WHEREAS, There is need for frequent short revival and evangelistic efforts to be held in our churches; and, WHEREAS, Such combined short revival and evangelistic efforts are a mighty factor in establishing our members in the faith as well as in leading many to a definite decision who have been on the verge of the kingdom, but who have not taken a definite stand for Christ; and,

WHEREAS, Through this means many backsliders are reclaimed and hundreds of children of Adventists are gathered into the churches,

VOTED, To adopt the following resolutions:

1. That during the coming winter and spring a supreme effort be made to conduct revival and evangelistic meetings of seven to ten days duration in every Seventh-day Adventist church throughout the Division, in a mighty effort to gather as many as possible into the church during this period.

2. That as far as possible, these meetings be launched on Friday night, Dec. 4, 1953, and that this work be carried forward until every church is reached.

3. That wherever possible, church officers and qualified laymen be associated with the ministry to assist in home visitation, Bible work, etc.

4. That an effort be made to conduct a baptismal service in every church on December 26, before the close of the year.

5. That offerings be taken in the respective churches to defray the expense of these special meetings as far as possible.

6. That such subjects as the following be covered: Righteousness by Faith The New Birth The Church Triumphant The Judgment The Judgment The Perpetuity of the Law The Sabbath and Its Meaning The Spirit of Prophecy The Second Advent Signs of the Approaching End The Hope of the Resurrection The New Earth

7. That our entire office force in the respective fields, and as far as possible institutional workers, be urged to join our pastors, evangelists and laymen in conducting these meetings.

8. That public efforts be conducted wherever possible in every district during the winter and spring preceding the General Conference Session, as may be arranged by the respective committees involved.

9. That we set a goal of gathering 300 new members into our churches throughout the Division during the period between December 4, 1953 and May 1, 1954.

10. That beginning with the first Sunday in January, 1954, a supreme endeavor be made to have an evangelistic sermon preached in every Seventh-day Adventist church throughout the Division where it is possible to hold public meetings and on every Sunday night thereafter.

SPECIAL OFFER OF REVIEW AND HERALD 886 DRAMA OF AGES WHEREAS, The Spirit of Prophecy indicates that largely through the publishing work will be accomplished the work of that "other angel" of Revelation 18, and

WHEREAS, This can be done only by the whole body of Adventist believers giving their fullest support and heartiest endeavor to plans that will ensure the scattering of our message-filled literature as the leaves of autumn; and

WHEREAS, Drama of the Ages has been designated as the missionary book for 1953 and has already proved to be of real value when used by our evangelists and believers,

VOTED, 1. That we urge our local and union leaders to emphasize the use of Drama of the Ages by our workers and church members in connection with their soul-winning endeavors.

2. That on December 12 an announcement be made in all our churches drawing attention to Drama of the Ages and urging its extensive use by our English-speaking people in their missionary work. The price to the purchaser is \$1.00 (or its equivalent in local currency) plus the postage from the publishers in America to the purchaser.

VOTED, That the two Unions and one Detached Mission comprising the Middle East Division arrange for Home Missionary workshops of at least three days duration to be conducted in their respective fields in 1954, the exact time to be arranged, at which plans and methods for conducting cottage meetings can be studied.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION POLICY 893 The first educational commandment is restoration--salvation. The second is the joy of service--training laborers for the Lord's vineyard.

Like the schools of the prophets, our schools have a purpose:

"These schools were intended to serve as a barrier against the widespreading corruption, to provide for the mental and spiritual welfare of the youth, and to promote the prosperity of the nation by furnishing it with men qualified to act in the fear of God as leaders and counselors." Education, p. 46

Section I -- Organization

The Division Educational Board is the administrative body by whose authority the educational policies of the Division are established and administered after Division Committee approval. Membership of the board is composed of the Division Educational Secretary, Chairman; the officers of the Division; all union educational secretaries; the union presidents; secondary school principals; and others who may be appointed by the Division Committee at its Biennial Session. It is planed that this board shall meet once every two years, with an interim meeting being held by the members present at any intervening Division Council.

The Division Educational Committee, composed of the Division officers and the Educational Secretary, will give study to any routine educational problems arising during the interim between regular sessions of the Educational Board. The recommendations of this committee will be referred to the Division Committee in cases of special problems.

The Division Board of Regents, a seven-member executive body of the Middle East Association of S. D. A. Schools, shall constitute the final authority in the evaluation and execution of Division educational policies.

Section II -- Activities

1. The Division Department of Education shall act in an advisory capacity in assisting the field in the establishing and maintaining of all kinds of schools; provided, moreover, that no school shall be raised above the elementary grades, nor shall the grade of work offered by any school above the elementary level be raised or lowered without first securing approval of the Division Board of Regents.

2. It shall formulate basic courses of study in general outlines within which instruction in all classes of schools shall be confined.

3. It shall lead out in the preparation, translation, and adoption of suitable textbooks and teaching material.

4. It shall establish standards for elementary schools, secondary schools, and colleges in equipment, teacher certification, buildings, and school factors in general upon which accrediting and the school rating shall be based.

5. The Board of Regents shall provide for the periodic inspection of schools and issue certificates for teachers.

6. It shall supervise the work of training teachers, and in standardizing the institutions and courses that give this training.

7. It shall give counsel on the interpretation of educational policies, and shall publish or exchange facts and ideas which will further the work of this department.

8. It shall arrange for the publication of school policies and miscellaneous actions bearing on educational work, and for the preparation of blanks necessary for an adequate reporting system.

9. It shall work in cooperation with the union secretaries in planning secondary and elementary teacher institutes.

10. The Division educational office shall record all final grades earned by students in schools for missionary children.

Section III -- Control and Supervision of Schools

1. No new elementary school may be opened without mission, union, and Board of Regents approval.

2. All schools shall be conducted in harmony with regulations and policies adopted by the Division Educational Department as approved by the Division Executive Committee.

3. Subject to such recommendations as may be voted by the Division Committee, union committees are free to formulate in detail educational policies to regulate the schools within their fields. It is understood that all General Conference actions, and subsequent regulations shall be the guiding principles in the formation of all school policies.

4. The local educational secretary shall have supervision over the elementary schools of the mission, under the counsel of the mission committee and the union educational secretary.

5. The Division, Union, and Local Educational Secretaries shall have general supervision of all educational work within their respective fields.

Section IV--Teachers

1. Teachers in our S. D. A. schools shall be members of the S. D. A. church in good and regular standing.

2. All teachers are to hold valid denominational credentials and teaching certifications.

3. Teachers are employed on a twelve-month basis, their summer employment programs being planned jointly by the school administration, mission, and/or union officers in cooperation with the local and/or union educational secretary. Teachers not wishing summer employment shall arrange with their employing organization at least thirty days before the end of the current school year.

4. S. D. A. teachers are recognized as mission workers in interpreting sustentation, medical, or other benefits approved for denominational workers of the mission.

5. Employment of all S. D. A. teachers is on the same basis as employment of other mission workers. In no case is a teacher employed directly by the local church or local school.

Section V -- Students

1. It is recommended that the number of students from non-Seventh-day Adventist homes be limited to a number not to exceed in regular elementary church schools, 50%, in secondary or training schools, 20%, and in colleges, 10% of the total enrollment.

2. Children who have not had their sixth birthday (European reckoning) by the date of the opening of the school are not to be admitted into our regular elementary first grade school program.

3. Students who are manifestly not in harmony with the purposes of our schools, and whose influence is harmful shall not be admitted or retained.

Section VI--Finance

1. All teachers are paid directly by the respective employing mission organization in which they teach.

2. The setting of teacher salaries and the auditing of their accounts shall be done in harmony with the policies adopted by the Middle East Division.

MEDIUM OF INSTRUCTION ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOLS 894 (Education, 1. p. 234); and

> WHEREAS, The student should early acquire the mastery of basic principles, skills, and appreciation of language as a communicative art; therefore it is.

VOTED, That the medium of instruction of all elementary and secondary schools be the language of the country in which the school is located. And, further,

WHEREAS, In the Middle East a knowledge of the second language is considered beneficial and in some cases a necessity; and

WHEREAS, It is most desirable that all youth have a reading knowledge of English to enable him better to read and understand the Spirit of Prophecy; therefore, it is

VOTED, That the teaching of a second language, or English language and literature, be pursued with the object of having the students gain a sound theoretical and practical knowledge of the language, giving them proficiency for further education and source study. MEDIUM OF INSTRUCTION COLLEGE 895

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WHEREAS, Basic principles of language should have been early acquired; and

WHEREAS, In higher education the emphasis may be on survey of language fundamentals, literary appreciation, rhetoric and composition, individualistic style, and creative composition both oral and written, therefore, it is

VOTED, That the medium of instruction on the college level shall be determined by the nature and objectives of the subject taught, the availability of teaching materials, the mother tongue of the students, and the talents and skill of the teaching staff; and further, that so far as practicable, the Bible classes be taught in the Arabic language.

In order to strengthen our work in the Arabic Language and Literature and to raise the quality of the spoken and written knowledge of the Arabic language,

VOTED, That controlling boards of our secondary schools and Middle East College carefully select their teachers of Arabic Language and Literature, and wherever necessary arrange their teaching schedules and loads so as to enable them to pursue further study in their field under the best Arabic scholars available. The amount of time to be given to such advanced study and the arrangements for it shall depend upon existing conditions.

VOTED, That the Division appoint the following representative committee to conduct for at least six weeks at Middle East College during the summer of 1954 an Arabic Language Workshop to improve the teaching of the Arabic Language and Literature in our schools by providing a sequence of teaching materials for all teaching levels and a study of improved current methods of language teaching: G. A. Keough (Chairman), Miss Adeeba Isaac, Habib Ghali, I. Swaidan, Ibrahim Ayoub, Yacoub Nashed, Selim Nougaim, Naim Awais, George Esper.

CONSTITUTION FOR <u>VOTED</u>, To adopt the following Constitution: MIDDLE EAST ASSOCIATION OF S. D. A. SCHOOLS

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CONSTITUTION of the MIDDLE EAST ASSOCIATION OF S. D. A. SCHOOLS

I. Name

The name of the Association shall be, "The Middle East Association of Seventh-day Adventist Schools."

II. Purpose

It shall be the purpose of the Association to: -

2. Encourage continual improvement in teacher training, curricular development, and the physical facilities of the school plant.

3. Maintain an official educational body whose recognition, evaluation, and endorsement of scholastic credits will make possible an international exchange of credits among Seventh-day Adventist schools of the Middle East.

III. Executive Body

A seven member Board of Regents shall constitute the executive body of the Association.

A. Membership of Board of Regents.

1. The Board of Regents shall be composed of the following permanent members:

Division Educational Secretary, chairman

Educational Secretary, East Mediterranean Union Mission

Educational Secretary, Nile Union Mission

President of Middle East College

2. And the following elected members: Three elected at large.

B. Election

The elective members are appointed by the Division Committee

C. Term of Office

1. The permanent members continue indefinitely by virtue of office.

2. The elective members are appointed for terms of two years.

D. Frequency of Meeting

1. The full Board of Regents shall meet each year at a time selected by the Division Committee.

2. Interim meetings of all available members shall convene at the call of the chair.

E. Duties of the Board of Regents

1. To set up criteria for the evaulation of schools and certification of teachers.

2. To rate member schools and to pass on applications for membership, basing decisions on reports from the inspection committees provided in the Division Educational Policy Manual.

3. To evaluate and certify teachers.

4. To sponsor educational surveys, projects, and to distribute statistical data, reports, etc., to member schools.

5. To make provision for endorsing the international exchange of credits of member schools.

6. To give counsel to schools in matters of academic policy.

7. To make a progressive study of academic and general school standards and needs in the consistent development and maintenance of a sound educational policy.

IV. Membership of Association

A. All schools operated by the church, mission, union, or division must be members of the association. The following provisions shall be the basis upon which the Board of Regents will rate schools:

A. Schools are classified either as Class A, Class B, Class C, probationary, or unaccredited.

B. Schools applying for membership and meeting the requirements will be given probationary accreditation for one year.

1. Any school failing to measure up to the requirements during this probationary period may be dropped at the end of the year.

C. Schools having successfully passed the probationary time will be given fully accredited standing and membership.

D. A school having established full membership may not be dropped without a warning notice of at least one year.

E. Delinquent schools are subject to any of the three following actions by the Board of Regents:

1. Warning--This is a statement of caution calling any deficiencies to the attention of the school administration and board.

2. Probation--This is a more severe notice of deficiency and will lead to loss of accreditation if not heeded.

3. Drop--This action may be taken only after the school has been either warned or put on probation for one year, and has failed to satisfy the Board of Regents that all possible steps have been taken to remedy the deficiencies specified.

PUBLISHING DEPARTMENT RECOMMENDATIONS 901 VOTED, To recommend to the Literature Committee:

(1) That the book <u>Better Living</u> by Mrs. E. G. White be prepared in the Farsee, Arabic, Armenian, and Turkish Languages, and if at all possible that it be ready for the student colporteurs in the summer of 1954.

(2) That Steps to Christ be translated into the Turkish language, and if at all possible that it be ready for the student colporteurs in the summer of 1954.

(3) That the book <u>Colporteur Evangelist</u> be translated into Arabic and supplied at a very low cost to colporteurs.

PUBLISHING DEPARTMENT POLICIES 902

VOTED, To adopt the following as policies for the Publishing Department:

(1) That the freight on all books from the Book and Bible House to colporteurs be paid by the Book and Bible House.

(2) That Publishing Secretaries do not take their annual vacations during the summer months when student colporteurs are in the field.

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(3) That from successful student colporteurs some be selected as might be needed for instructors and put on mission payroll to assist in training student colporteurs during the summer months.

(4) Realizing the great value of the colporteur ministry to the students in our college and to the work of God,

That we request our College Board and faculty to give earnest study to the incorporation of a student colporteur class into the school curriculum and that time be made available to the Publishing Department for the holding of a student colporteur institute in our college near the close of the school year, and further

That the college authorities stimulate and foster practical colporteur ministry by the students during the school year as may be arranged, and that time be given to train as many prospective student colporteurs as possible during the school year, to relieve the tension at the beginning of the summer.

(5) That Colporteur Beginner Licenses, Colporteur Licenses, and Colporteur Credentials be prepared by the Division Publishing Department and issued to the colporteurs by the local mission in the language used in their field.

(6) Whereas, The Voice of Prophecy Correspondence Schools can become a mighty auxiliary to every department,

That our Voice of Prophecy schools be advertised in all the books and magazines that we print and that application cards be inserted into each book or periodical sold by colporteurs. These application cards are to be inserted by the colporteur after he has stamped his number (assigned by the Union Publishing Secretary) on the card. The colporteur's number will be used by the local Bible school to notify the colporteur as to the progress of the students enrolled by him.

(7) That we implement the General Conference policy of having in each Union and in the larger Local Missions a Publishing Department Committee. The membership of this committee to consist of Mission or Union President (chairman), Treasurer, Publishing Department Secretary, and the manager of the local Book and Bible House (secretary), meeting at least once a month, and the Union or Division Publishing Secretary meet with this committee as frequently as possible. Three members to constitute a quorum.

(8) That the publishing secretaries give each student colporteur a minimum of three days help (24 hours) and sell with each a minimum of L.E. 40.00 or EEg. 5. worth of literature during the summer months, and that no new recruit be permitted to report canvassing hours before he has spent at least eight hours in canvassing with a publishing secretary.

(9) That a student or prospective student of Middle East College, recommended by his local Mission or Union Mission, be granted as student aid by the Union and local Missions the sum of L.E. 400.00 to be applied on his college expenses for the following school year, provided he spends at least 400 hours spread over 11 weeks in the territory assigned to him by the Publishing Department Secretary in consultation with the controlling committee, and provided he sells at least L.E. 350.00 (or the equivalent in local currency) worth of literature.

COLPORTEUR EVANGELIST VOTED, To adopt the following policy governing the FUND POLICY Colporteur Evangelist Fund:

1. That three classes of colporteurs be recognized; namely, beginners, licensed colporteurs, and credentialed colporteurs.

2. That the following conditions govern the classifications of colportears:

a. A beginner is a new recruit who holds a card of identification.

b. To be eligible for a license, a beginner shall have worked 420 hours if a man and 360 hours if a woman, within the limits of three consecutive months, and shall have demonstrated success in salesmanship to the point of being able to earn a livelihood in the colporteur field. The account of the colporteur with the Book and Bible House shall be in balance or show a credit, and the general record of the worker shall be satisfactory. The renewal of the license shall be conditional upon the worker qualifying as a regular colporteur, working a minimum of 1,200 hours a year in the case of a man and 1,000 hours a year in the case of a woman.

c. To be eligible for credentials, a colporteur shall have held a license for at least 12 consecutive months. Within these limits of time before eligibility for credentials is established, there shall have been turned in at least 44 weekly reports, totaling at least 1,500 hours if a man, and at least 1,200 hours if a woman, with satisfactory results in sales. The general record must also be satisfactory. These standards shall also determine the renewal of credentials from year to year.

d. In the application of these standards due allowance shall be made for physical handicaps.

3. That colporteur licenses and credentials be issued by the mission committee.

Basis of Distribution

4. That the following courtesies be extended to the beginner, provided he qualifies for a license within six months of beginning work:

a. Transportation to and from institute and maintenance while there.

b. Transportation to territory

5. That the following courtesies be extended to licensed colporteurs:

a. Transportation to and from institute and maintenance while there.

b. Transportation and moving expenses when change of territory is ordered by the Publishing Department Committee.

c. That emergency assistance may be granted in sickness and accident; also such financial aid for time lost due to emergencies beyond his control as conditions may warrant.

6. That in addition to the courtesies granted the licensed colporteur, the credentialed colporteur receives the following courtesies on the condition that he currently qualifies on the basis of 1,500 working hours per year and a minimum in sales of L.f. 2,000 (or equivalent units in the currencies of other countries for items where L.f. are indicated below) worth of denominational literature per year in the case of a man; and 1,200 working hours per year and a minimum in sales of L.f. 1,700 worth of denominational literature per year in the case of a woman.

a. Campmeeting travel and lodging.

b. Employment or daily allowance while at campmeeting.

c. Medical allowance on the same basis as that granted other mission workers.

d. An allowance of L.E. 3.00 a day while in attendance at annual institute for the heads of families, with a maximum of L.E. 15.00.

e. A vacation of two weeks a year on the following basis:

(1) The colporteur to have worked a full 12-month period, turning in at least 44 weekly reports, and who is currently qualifying on the minimum hourly and sales requirements as stipulated in No. 6. The year in which a colporteur establishes the record upon which he is granted credentials shall be the year upon which his eligibility to a vacation is determined, providing he has met the above financial requirements and his account is satisfactory to the mission Publishing Department Committee. A new colporteur is entitled under the provisions of this policy to receive his first vacation after 15 months of service if he has met the requirements all along the way of a three-month period of service for license, plus the twelve month period of service for credentials and vacation.

(2) The vacation allowance shall be based on the average net earnings of the colporteur over the 12 month period, with a ceiling of the maximum for a licensed minister for a man, and the ceiling of the maximum for a Bible instructor for a woman.

7. Where advisable licensed and credentialed colporteurs who are currently qualifying on the minimum hour and sales basis as stipulated in No. 6 be granted a rent subsidy not exceeding L.f. 30.00 per month.

8. That regardless of sales, all licensed and credentialed colporteurs be provided their transportation to and from the annual institute and maintenance while there.

9. That in the case of a qualifying colporteur who has bona fide travel expenses, he submit an itemized expense report monthly to his Book and Bible House manager for reimbursement, this not to exceed 5 per cent of the value of his sales in the period covered by the report, and not to exceed L.f. 25.00 per month.

10. That the Colporteur Evangelist Fund shall be held in the Book and Bible House and be administered by the mission Publishing Department Committee. INGATHERING CAMPAIGN 1954 904 VOTED, (1) That each Union and Detached Mission Committee determine the quantity of foreign supplies needed and forward the same to the division treasurer.

(2) To appoint a committee composed of A. R. Mazat, Henry Melki, S. Nougaim, Y. E. Berbawy, and M. J. McCulloch to study a pamphlet for Ingathering use.

(3) To recommend the use of a booklet instead of the calendar for Ingathering use.

(4) That the Ingathering goals be:

(5) Whereas, during the past three years definite individual goals have proved a great blessing in gathering funds during the Ingathering campaign,

VOTED, That we grant the same privileges as previously to ministerial and departmental workers, namely 50% subsidy on the Ministerial Book Club.

VOTED, That the Division Y.P.M.V. Advisory Council select the annual M. V. Book Clubs to be used in the Middle East Division.

VOTED, To recommend to the Unions and detached Mission that local or regional rallies be held in 1954, building up to a Division-wide Youth Congress in 1955, and that the arrangements and plans for such a Congress be prepared by the standing Division Y.P.M.V. Advisory Council.

VOTED, That a HOPE campaign be put on in each field where the HOPE magazine can be used, in an effort to raise the mailing list to at least 10,000 names, the Publishing Secretaries and Church Home Missionary Secretaries to promote the campaign February 13-20,1954.

VOTED, That the holidays for the Division be the same as previously voted, namely:

VOTED, To adopt the following policy on national furloughs:

A national worker, if called from his home country. to serve in another country of the Middle East Division, shall, after a period of six years' service, be granted a leave of three months to visit his home, and the travel expense to his home will be paid by the employing organization. In this case, after a reasonable period of time for visiting relatives and close friends at home, he shall be available to assist the homeland mission in such lines of service as he may be able to do. Should he desire to visit his homeland before the six years are completed, he may do so after three years of faithful service outside his home country, taking only six weeks' leave, and in that case the travel expenses will be shared by the worker and the employing organization on a fifty-fifty basis. If for some special reason the leave cannot be taken at the end of the sixth year of service, then definite arrangements should be made with the employing organization as to when it will be taken. This policy applies only when a worker uses the furlough to visit his homeland.

WHEREAS, We desire to encourage professional efficiency and good reading habits in current literature; therefore,

VOTED, That the Division Department of Education recommend annually a Book Club for teachers in the Middle East Division, and that the employing mission organization subsidize the book and subscription charges up to fifty per cent of the costs, 50% of the books to be Arabic and 50% to be English.

WHEREAS, The Union-sponsored Youth Leaders' Training Camps in 1953 were preparing the way for junior camps; therefore it was

<u>VOTED</u>, That each Union plan with their respective Missions the conducting each summer of as many junior camps as possible to meet the needs of their youth.

VOTED, (1) That Voice of Prophecy rallies be held once a quarter in each union, where diplomas will be given to graduates of the Bible course.

(2) That the Y.P.M.V. and Educational Secretaries of each Union and detached Mission cooperate in securing enrollments for the Voice of Prophecy Bible School.

VOTED, That in our Union and Division training schools consideration be given by the respective Boards of Control to the maintenance of a loan fund for worthy students, the making of such loans to be implemented by a governing policy to be worked out and adopted by the Division Educational Board at the time of the next Division Biennial Session.
