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"Bind up with Christ."

THE powers of Satan are mustering for battle. Stern conflicts are before us. Press together, my brethren and sisters, press together. Bind up with Christ. 

Let us cease the conversation that is so unprofitable, and spend our time learning lessons from the Word of God. Christ has told us that we are to be united in love. A Specific Work for All of God's People.

Civil law and arts, sciences, and letters may come through Greece and Rome, but religious knowledge only through the true church, the pillar and ground of the truth.

Through Abraham and his seed all the nations of the earth are to be blessed. Gen. 12: 1-3; 18: 18; 22: 18; 26: 4. "If ye be Christ's, then are ye Abraham's seed," and so channels through which blessings are to flow to the world. Gal. 3: 29. God sent Jesus to bless the world in turning it from its iniquities, Acts 3: 26, and so Jesus has sent His followers into the world. "Even so have I also sent them into the world." John 17: 18.

God's people are "a chosen generation, a royal priesthood (I Peter 2:9), called to preach the gospel to

The Best Investment.

An energetic life-insurance man called the other day to inquire the reason why Seventh-day Adventists were so difficult to approach in his business.

He was apparently a Christian man, who acknowledged that it was good to trust in the Lord, who says, "Leave thy fatherless children, I will preserve them alive; and let thy widows trust in me."

However, it seemed to him, as a practical man of the world, that the father was wise who invested his surplus in a policy, making provision, say, for his little son, so that, when grown to manhood, the boy would find something laid up with which to establish a business, or take a college course. I asked him what he would think, as a practical business man, of a people who invested their all in the gospel commission, and who taught their children that the best of all investments was to devote life and means and all to carrying the gospel to the world, so that the end might come, and death and misfortune forever cease.

This seemed ideal to my friend, but altogether impossible and impractical. He expected the end to come some time, surely, but not in our day. Pressed to the Scriptures, however, he was forced to admit that if the Christian church would throw itself without reserve into the work of evangelising the world, it might hope to do it within a very few years; and it seemed to him possible that the church did not desire the Lord to come, else the work would be accomplished.

Then I asked him if Seventh-day Adventists, who believe that they are called out to bear a final message to all the world within one generation, might not reasonably be expected, as a practical, business-like people, to invest their all, and their children as well, in the divine commission, rather than in life policies for the next generation. It was strong doctrine for a life-insurance agent, but is it not good doctrine for the believer in the soon coming of Jesus?

The Lord is coming in this generation. Some must now enter in. The very stones would cry out, the angels would carry the message, if Seventh-day Adventists held their peace. The surest and grandest investment in all the world is the Third Angel's Message. Even the mites multiply rapidly in these pressing times if given quickly. As "Testimony," No. 33, says, "One dollar now is of more value to the work than ten dollars will be at some future period." No investment company can offer such high interest as that.

We do not live in a heroic age. Somehow the world expects to hear the church talk about the coming of the Lord and about going to heaven, and then to see it planning as though to live indefinitely in the world. But nothing so arrests the attention of practical men as the spectacle of believers actually investing life and family and all in the promise of the Lord's second advent in our time, just as the man of the world invests his surplus in securities to make provision for the future.

A VOICE FROM HONAN, CHINA.

DURING the last four months we have been able to sell nearly thirty thousand Bibles, New Testaments, and portions of Scripture in Honan. I have not made any long trips into the interior for some time, but have been working at home. I go out early in the morning in order to meet farmers from the country, who are coming into town on business, and hand them portions of the Holy Book. These humble farmers are very thankful for the Word, and often sit down in the road and begin to read, and invite me to sit by them and teach them, which I gladly do.

We have rented a good house in this place, and could easily accommodate two families, and they are needed. We have started a Bible class—a real Bible class; for we read only the Bible. We have a good teacher in our employ, who has opened his heart to the truth as far as I have been able to explain it to him. He not only sees the Sabbath of the Lord plainly, but also keeps it with gladness. He takes great delight in the Bible truth. He is a child of God, and I hope that he may remain firm as the first fruits of our work here. He could engage in evangelistic work, as he is a highly educated man.

The time will soon come when I shall be free to give my entire time to teaching present truth, which is my delight. A few days ago I had a letter from my superior officer in Shanghai, warning me not to tell the missionaries or the Chinese that the seventh day is the Sabbath, and not to tell the people that pork is unsuitable for food. I replied, "When you intrusted me to be a distributer of your society's Scripture, I promised on my part to do my best to let the people of all classes know what is in the Book you intrusted to me." The truth must be known, even if we suffer for bringing it to the front. John lost his head for preaching the truth to a certain king, and the time may come when we must seal our faith by our blood. But let us be loyal to our God, firm in the wildest tempest. I know that the Lord will stand by me while I proclaim His Word.

We have great reason to be thankful that with God's help a deficit of over $\pounds 400$ has been wiped out in the past two years. We desire to express our thanks to all the dear brethren and sisters for their co-operation in bringing about this good result. During the past six months one or two quite large amounts have been paid in, which have materially aided in placing our finances on a solvent basis. We cannot expect such large amounts to come in very often from single individuals, but if each member of each church will faithfully render to the Lord His dues, we hope to be able to maintain our work on a solvent basis in the future. "Debt is demoralising."

"The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof." He is the great Landed Proprietor, and we are His tenants. He owns all the land and everything else, and allows us to occupy His land, and use all His blessings for only one-tenth of the proceeds. The Egyptians after a seven years' famine, during which they had mortgaged their lands and themselves to the crown, were only too glad to give Pharaoh a double tithe of their entire income in recognition of his ownership. The Lord has a far better claim on us than Pharaoh had on the Egyptians. We have been redeemed by the precious blood of Jesus, and all we have and arc is His by right of creation and redemption. How glad we ought to be to return a tenth of all in recognition of His ownership.

We would hardly expect to live year after year on another man's property, and give him only a tenth of what we had left above all expenses. We would not think it too bad to give him a fifth of the entire crop, and pay all expenses besides. The Israelites used to round up their sheep after they had been to the expense of raising them, and drive them along a narrow passage, marking every tenth sheep for the Lord. This is the true principle of an honest tithe, and if we are solid on the principle, the Lord will help us to adjust all minor details with a clear conscience.

By the time this reaches you, my wife and I will probably be on the broad Pacific. We are sorry to leave so suddenly, but a recent examination revealed what I already suspected,—a return of my old lung trouble. It seemed best to those of the brethren with whom we have counselled, that we should return while there is some hope of recovery from a change of climate. We are sorry to leave the work so soon, and just at a time when the prospects for the future are beginning to brighten; but the success of this work does not depend on any one man or committee. It depends upon our individual cooperation with God and each other. We shall not cease to labor and pray for the Lord's blessing to rest upon His cause in this field, and we believe we shall also have an interest in your prayers.

I will close by briefly calling attention to a few important matters which ought to receive the earnest active support of every member of the church.

We ought to push the sale of "Christ's Object Lessons" to the point of selling our quota of ten copies per member, on an average, before winter sets in. The Lord is testing His people in this matter. It is His plan for "rolling back the reproach" from His people, and when the reproach rolls off it will fall heaviest on those who have been content to let others do the pushing.

We have started a religious liberty fund for the circulation of "Rights of Man;" and other similar literature. The donations thus far have about covered the cost of supplying each member of parliament with the book. The fund ought to be swelled to ten times the present amount, so that we might send copies to editors, lawyers, ministers, doctors, etc. This is the very heart and soul of our message, so let us do all we can to give it a "loud voice."

Our good papers, the Australasian Signs of the Times and Good Health, ought to be sold by thousands everywhere by all our people. Even the children can do a grand work by selling these papers. This is a noble work that we have scarcely touched with the ends of our fingers. Let every church begin to plan at once for an active campaign, in which every member should be a volunteer. I might add much more, but I leave the rest with you and the Lord. Address all communications to J. Hindson, 56 George Street West, Sydney.

THE CHRISTCHURCH TRACT SOCIETY.

At the last quarterly meeting of the Christchurch tract society, the librarian read the yearly report of the workings of the society. Others will be interested in the amount of work that this one society has done:—

"Throughout the past year we have much to be thankful for. God has blessed our efforts in many ways, and our literature has been freely scattered abroad. At the commencement of the year there were a few tracts on hand and the society was taking a club of four dozen *Echoes*, which after a few months was stopped. In August it started again with a club of *Echoes*, one dozen, which has since been increased to one and a half dozen. Besides this, several church members have each taken one dozen *Echoes* to sell on the streets Saturday evenings. During the year there have been sold or given away $102\frac{1}{3}$ dozen *Echoes*.

"In addition to the tracts on hand at the beginning of the year, others have been given away to the value of $\pounds I$ 45 IId, and besides this number 1950 copies of the tract, entitled 'Religion in the State Schools,' have been received and either sold or given away.

"For several months a club of *Joyful Tidings* was taken and all given away or posted, and were very much appreciated.

"At the beginning of the year several in the church pledged themselves to give a certain amount each week to help the tract society. These amounts were from 1d to 1/- each per week. From this source £5 13s have been received to help in God's work of distributing literature.

"The account for *Echoes*, tracts, and books during the year amounts to $\pounds 20$ 15s, and the amount received in cash was $\pounds 18$ os 4d. Paid to the Wellington office, $\pounds 16$ 15s 11¹/₂d. Cash in hand, $\pounds 1$ 4s 4¹/₂d. Including a debit balance at the beginning of the year, there is still owing to the Wellington society $\pounds 5$ 9s 11¹/₂d. The indebtedness of the members to the local society is $\pounds 6$ 1s 9¹/₂d, leaving a credit balance of 11s 10d."

Do not be afraid to ask the people to buy it," said a lady to one of our trembling sisters. "You could not do a grander work or for a more worthy object."

Why should we hesitate to invite the best people to buy when they respond so readily and willingly to our appeals? God has promised success if we carry forward the work hopefully, cheerfully, and in the right manner. Shall we not make 1903 a record year, and quickly finish the sale of the remaining 10,000 copies and thus have this work off our hands? Now is the time, while the days are long and the evenings light, to call upon our neighbors and talk "Object Lessons" to them. If all would only now do their share, the remainder of the books could be easily sold during the next few months. THE CANVASSER'S CAPITAL.

Most of our canvassers when starting out in the field are possessed of but little more than their canvassing outfit and a firm conviction that the mission before them is worthy of the best efforts and the greatest sacrifice that man can make in order that perishing souls may hear God's message of mercy and love.

To all who thus go forth God says, "I know thy poverty, but thou art rich," and to every man, however poor he may appear, God has committed a treasure that, if rightly used as a talent of which he must some day give account, will prove an almost inexhaustible source whence may be drawn in abundance, means, knowledge, and true happiness; while if allowed to lie idle, or if used carelessly, it will be certain to bring disappointment, weariness, and discontent, utterly unfitting the holder of this, the greatest of all treasures, for the place of usefulness God would have him fill. The name of this treasure is TIME.

A few statistics of one month's work in the canvassing field will'illustrate how important it is that we should recognise that, as we are not our own, our time belongs to God, and how the right or wrong use of our stewardship affects the cause in which we labor and possibly the salvation of souls as well as our own best interests:—

Number of agents working, 64.

Average time reported for each agent, $10\frac{1}{2}$ days. Amount of business for each agent, 26 orders. Value of orders for each agent, £21 165 2d. Profit on orders for each agent, £10 188 1d. Earnings per day for each agent, £1 os 8d. This report is encouraging, inasmuch that it shows that God always pays His workmen well for the time they work, and therefore no one need hesitate in responding to the call for active service in the great harvest field; but it also shows that "much more efficient work can be done in the canvassing field than has yet been done," and that if every worker would make up his mind to put in five full days every week, we could almost double our present output of books, thus sowing a seed that would speedily strengthen the cause and bring prosperity to our agents and tract societies.

Many of our workers are putting in excellent time and make the most of every opportunity, and their reports are always filled with precious experiences that speak of a courage and hope ensuring the success of their efforts and bringing courage and hope to the hearts of the people they meet.

"Success is not the result of chance or destiny; it is the outworking of God's own providence, the reward of faith and discretion, of virtue and persevering effort," and while it is true that there are difficulties and obstacles all along the way, it is equally true that to the one who, with faith in God makes the most of time and opportunities, every difficulty, instead of being a stumblingblock and a cause of discouragement, becomes a source of strength and a means of a richer and deeper experience in God's power to give us the victory and success in our work. RESOLUTIONS OF THE TASMANIAN CONFERENCE.

THE following resolutions were adopted at the recent camp-meeting. They should have appeared in an earlier issue, but were crowded out of the issue of January 15.

1. We recommend, That in view of the present prosperity of the North-west Coast, tent-meetings be held in some town of that district immediately after this conference, preferably Devonport.

2. We further recommend, That this Conference endeavor to complete the sale of its quota of "Christ's Object Lessons" before next April.

3. Resolved, That in view of the persistent efforts in other States to unite church and State, we anticipate a similar effort in this State by systematically distributing the tract, "Religion in the State Schools," and the pamphlet, "Rights of Man," and thus educate the people on right principles before the seeds of error are sown.

4. Whereas, It is stated in the Spirit of Prophecy that one reason why we do not enjoy more of the blessings of the Lord is that we do not heed the light God has been pleased to give us in regard to the laws of life and health, and that much of the prejudice that prevents the truth of the Third Angel's Message from reaching the hearts of the people might be removed if more attention were given to health reform,—in view of this,

We recommend, That all our people be encouraged to study carefully our health publications, especially the health journal, thus acquiring the knowledge so much needed by them, that they may be able to impart the principles of health to their neighbors and friends.

5. We further recommend, That all our people put forth earnest efforts to forward the cause of Christian education by encouraging and assisting all suitable young persons above fifteen years of age to enter the Avondale School for the purpose of fitting themselves for work in the Lord's vineyard.

6. Whereas, The Spirit of Prophecy has said that a fund should be raised in each conference to loan to worthy poor students who desire to give themselves to the missionary work, therefore—

Resolved, That we raise such a fund in this Conference.

7. Whereas, We recognise the value of early Christian training, we would urge upon all parents the importance of beginning this through the agency of home training and the church school.

8. Whereas, A proper education of our children being a duty highly incumbent upon us,

We recommend, That this Conference appoint an educational secretary whose duty it will be to labor for the establishment and upbuilding of this important branch of the Lord's work, and that the work of this secretary be carried on under the advice of the Conference Committee and the Avondale School.

9. Resolved, That the members of churches and companies be urged to take upon themselves the responsibility of circulating the Bible Echo and the Australasian Good Health in their vicinity.

10. Resolved, That the Conference Committee subsidise agents to the amount of fifteen dozen *Echoes* and two dozen *Good Healths* per week to act as pioneers, and that these agents be appointed by the Executive Committee and be under the direction of the State canvassing agent.

11. *Resolved*, That every church member be urged to become a reader of the UNION CONFERENCE RECORD.

12. Resolved, That the work of each church be so organised that every church member will have some definite line of missionary work assigned to him.

13. Resolued, That we set apart the last Sabbath in January of each year for a collection in the churches to go to the Tasmanian Tract Society for missionary work.

14. We recommend, That each church encourage one or more of its members to engage in canvassing for our large books under the direction of the State canvassing agent, and that these agents furnish their churches with the names and addresses of their subscribers, and that the churches follow up the work by correspondence, periodicals, and iracts.

15. We recommend, That as far as consistent, canvassers' institutes be held in every church.

16. Resolved, That we urge the importance of faithful daily study of the Sabbath-school lessons in the home, and that we suggest that such study occupy a prominent place in family worship.

17. We recommend, That earnest efforts be made by Sabbathschool officers, teachers, and members to secure the regular attendance at Sabbath-school of all church members, and that we unite in laboring to get all whom we can influence to join the school and share its blessings.

18. We recommend. That the practice of holding Sabbath-school conventions once each six months in each school be continued.

19. Resolved, That Pastor G. B. Starr be invited to connect with the Tasmanian Conference, and that we request the Victorian Conference to release him from their employ.

20. We recommend, That all our people adopt the plan of setting apart the second tithe as a regular systematic free-will offering to form a fund from which to make continual gifts to the various enterprises that are continually arising in the rapidly advancing work of God. And further—

21. We suggest, That each individual after paying the second tithe for one year to the Wahroonga Sanitarium, adopt the plan of paying one-third of the second tithe to the Union Conference, onethird to the Tasmanian Conference for the advancement of special enterprises, and to use one-third for personal donations to local educational, tract and missionary, or church funds.

22. We recommend. That plans be made to increase the sale of health foods in Tasmania as soon as possible, and that suitable young people be sent to Sydney to be trained for this work.

An interesting report of the proceedings of the New Zealand Conference will appear in our next issue. As our space is so limited, correspondents will please study brevity so that none will be crowded out.

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Items of General Interest.

SUCH stirring reports as come to us of late from the faithful missionaries at the front we have never listened to before. God is doing a great work among the heathen of China, of Africa, and of papal lands. We can see but little of all God is actually doing, still we see enough to know that the end hasteneth greatly.

THE missionary spirit is plainly manifest among the students at Avondale, which is bringing bright experiences into the lives of our young people. Some of the boys are chopping wood during spare moments, while others are planning a missionary garden. The proceeds from this work are to be devoted to supporting a native worker in the island mission field.

Our hearts are made sad to lose from our already depleted force of workers the helpful presence and cheering admonitions of Pastor Geo. A. Snyder and wife. The reasons for their departure to another clime are no doubt good, but they will be missed none the less keenly. Will we not as churches and individuals make every possible effort to carry forward the work which others have laid down? By so doing experienced workers will be developed in our midst.

The Venezuelan Difficulty.—Christians can indeed be thankful that an unseen power has held back the elements of strife and brought about a peaceable solution of the Venezuelan difficulty, which a few weeks ago seriously threatened the world with war. While each of the great nations are determined to maintain their dignity and gain all possible advantage over rival powers, it is wonderful how they are restrained from getting at one another's throats in deadly combat. The reason is given in Rev. 7: I-3.

Preparing for the Battle.—Professor Carl E. Myers' electrical aerial torpedo, recently on exhibition at Madison Square Garden, New York, is a dirigible air-ship, perfectly controlled by an electrician on the earth. It is thirty-five feet in length, and is designed for use in warfare. It may be sent a long distance, and when the desired position is reached, a torpedo is released to carry destruction wherever it may strike and explode. Fearful indeed will be the last great war. "Every battle of the warrior" will be indeed "with confused noise, and garments rolled in blood."—*Selected*.

The Financial Outlook.—Our various institutions and conferences of Australasia have, with scarcely an exception, been clearing themselves of indebtedness during the past two years. For this we cannot but praise God and take courage, as the outlook is cheering. On the other hand, when we consider the institutions of the world, there are ominous signs of a soon coming financial crisis throughout these States. The drought and the wholesale borrowing policy of politicians have produced a strained condition in financial circles which forebodes disaster and confusion. The only safe place to deposit surplus money now is in the banks of heaven. Matt 16: 24-27; 6: 19-21.

The Eastern Question.—All readers of the daily press cannot fail to note the fact that trouble is brewing about the "sick man of the East," Turkey, and that the end of the Ottoman Empire in Europe will not be long deferred. Since the time of Peter the Great, Russia has desired to possess Constantinople, and has been planning with that end in view. Students of prophecy know that the downfall of the Ottoman Empire is one of the very last events in this world's history before the coming of the Lord; and over the Eastern Question, which is now a live issue, will come the great smash up of nations in the battle of Armageddon.

NOTES FROM TASMANIA.

OUR little chapel at Launceston is now completed, and we held our first meeting in it, Sabbath, February 7. Every one seemed well pleased with the building. We have seated it with chairs instead of forms. We were able to purchase them at about wholesale price, which cost no more than forms. They are fastened together with a narrow strip of board, which is screwed on underneath the seats. We have a small debt to pay before the church can be dedicated to God; but we trust that this will be a matter of but a few weeks before it will stand clear.

For some weeks we have had but two canvassing agents in the field and part of the time none. Our field agent, W. W. Fletcher, was called from his post of duty to work in the Echo Publishing office, and for over four months we have been without a general agent. Our work has suffered for lack of proper attention. Brother Harold Harker has recently arrived, and will take charge of the canvassing work. We trust that we shall see a revival of the work in this line. The prospects look cheering. There are several who are getting a burden for this work, and are offering themselves for service. Sisters Ella Hawkins and Annie Higgins, and T. House, and N. Harker will soon, we expect, be in the field, placing the pages of present truth in the homes of the people. These, with Brother J. Allen, Sisters Flora Horn and Edith Adcock, will make a good force of workers. A few others may enter the field a little later on.

Brother G. B. Starr, with his wife and mother (Sister Sisley), has been with us about three weeks. They spent one Sabbath in Launceston, and then Brother and Sister Starr joined Brother Teasdale and family to labor with them in Devonport. Sister Robertson is also laboring with them in the Bible work. At first there seemed to be but little interest, but by visiting from house to house and holding Bible readings the interest has increased, and a few have already accepted the truth. We believe that God is blessing the efforts being put forth on the North-west Coast. E. HILLIARD.
