en families were represented at this year's Re-Entry Retreat for returning missionaries held at the Crosslands Convention Centre in Sydney, beginning on January 3. It concluded on January 7 with a recommitment and dedication service, as all the attendees take up new roles and positions in Australia

The volunteers were returning from a range of countries including Albania, the United States, Fiji and Papua New Guinea, but represented a combined total of 225 years of overseas mission service.

Cheryl Doss from the Institute of World Mission, with her husband, Gorden, was the key presenter, supported by Dr Brad Kemp, Pastor Graeme Humble and Pastor Ray Coombe, director of Adventist Mission for the South Pacific Division (SPD).

The weekend also featured a physicalactivity challenge and afternoon river cruise. "The returning missionaries also enjoyed the quiet bushland surroundings at the Crosslands centre, which allowed families time to unwind and process some of the challenges of returning home," reports Pastor Coombe. "Time was also spent in group discussion and understanding the transition that occurs as people move back home across cultures."

The SPD has conducted re-entry programs now for several years, which are a highlight for those returning from mission service overseas.—*Adele Nash*

Church damaged by flames

WINDSOR, NEW SOUTH WALES

ire severely damaged the Windsor church (NSW) in the early hours of January 18. According to preliminary reports, the fire broke out in the church building at around 5.30 am and took five teams of firefighters 90 minutes to extinguish.

"It was a very sad day," says church pastor James Fletcher. "It was hard to believe such a thing could happen."

For the past six months church members have been working on a new kitchen and toilet block, which were nearing completion. Thankfully these areas, along with children's Sabbath-school rooms and the church hall, were not damaged by the flames.

"We now face a much larger challenge," says Pastor Fletcher. "It will take most of the year to rebuild and repair the damage."

While the Gothic-styled building and its contents were insured, several irreplaceable items-including the original marriage register, an old piano and the hand-carved pulpit—will be lost forever.

The fire comes as the church prepares for its 50th anniversary. The cause of the fire is still under investigation but it is thought that arson or an electrical fault may be to

Church members will continue to meet in the undamaged church hall and Pastor Fletcher describes their first Sabbath there as a somber "time of reflection."

"It proved to be a blessing as the members have given each other support," he says. "While the church building has been destroyed, the church family will be stronger and will work together to face the challenge of rebuilding."

The building includes seven lecture/tutorial areas including, a 185-seat auditorium, computer lab, microbiology classroom, and practical lab with facilities for nursing practice, diet and nutrition training, and physical and hydro therapies.

PAU now offers a four-year Bachelor of Nursing degree and training in two specialty areas—Bachelor of Health Science (Maternal and Child Health Nursing) and Bachelor of Health Science (Rural and Community Health). An additional specialty in Acute Care Nursing is planned for 2007.
