This mission was started in the spring of 1928. Brother and Sister C. B. Miller and Brother and Sister Dallas White were the ones who first moved to Yunnanfu to live and teach the truth. They met many obstacles as they began the work, but God blessed their efforts and in a remarkably short time a church was organized in the provincial capitol. The new church began to work in earnest to lead others to Christ, each member working for some definite friend or acquaintance.

In a letter written from Yunnanfu, dated April 9, 1929, the follow-

ing word of cheer is found: "Our few church members are zealous workers and are anxious to enter into any line of personal work suggested, and are suggesting new methods themselves."

As a result others have been gathered in, and although we owned & Bible House and use every spare no property in Yunnan, still God

watered the seed sown and has given this increase.

Brother and Sister White are both nurses, and Brother White has had some fine opportunities to bring the truth to some while helping them with their physical ailments. Several have been reached in this way, who otherwise might never have heard about the truth.

It is an inspiration to hear of the progress of the gospel in new stations like this. Surely we would enjoy a visit to their Sabbath school. The hymns and prayers and offerings would all reveal the fact that the love of Jesus abides in the hearts of these new believers, even as it does in our own hearts. After the Sabbath school, one of our Chinese brethren, Evangelist Feng, often helps with the church service.

Will you not remember to pray for the work in Yunnan, and try to help swell the Thirteenth Sabbath Offering this quarter?

# HOME MISSIONARY EXPERIENCES

[Related by Elder M. R. Bailey at the New York campmeeting.]

Quotations from "Christ's Object Lessons," page 220: "We are not to wait for souls to come to us, we must seek them out where they are." "The word that is preached in the pulpit will never reach all the multitudes of people in the world unless it is carried to them." I repeat again...."There are multitudes who

will never be reached by the gospel unless it is carried to them." Who then will carry it? The ministers, who are in harmony with the words of Sister White, together with the lay members will carry the gospel in printed form to them.

Our church in Rochester decided to distribute at least 1000 Present Truth each week. After blocking out the territory, the bands are taken to this part of the city each week for seven weeks. Each person visits about fifty homes, and as far as possible the same homes each week. This gives opportunity for becoming acquainted with the people and locating the interested ones. At the end of seven weeks, we take subscriptions for Present Truth for one year. In this way, our good paper is brought into a number of homes

for a whole year without added expense to the church. We have found several interested people and some are ready for baptism. We plan to continue this systematic distribution of *Present Truth*.

In addition to this, the Missionary Volunteer Society sends out 100 Signs of the Times each week to these interested families. This gives us a calling list for the Bible worker. We find many who are eager to know more about the third angel's message. I feel that unless we carry the truth to the people, many will go down into a sinner's grave without a knowledge of the saving power of the gospel.

I repeat again, "There are multitudes who will never be reached by the gospel unless it is carried to them." Let us carry the Word to them!

However, the remittances for the month of November have not yet come in, so we are unable to give a detailed report at this time. Suffice it to say, that we believe the Investment returns will help materially to make up the shortage of our Sabbath school funds for the conference as compared with last year's record to date. Our Sabbath school quota for the quarter is \$4438.20. Our offerings for the third quarter totalled \$4101.-85, making us \$336.35 short of reaching our 30 cent quota. So near, and yet so far! Dear Northern New Englanders, let us not fall short this last quarter of the year. Let us all lift a little harder this coming Thirteenth Sabbath than we have done before. I am sure that if we stop for a few minutes to meditate on the experience of our poor Brother Smith, one of our young missionaries in China, who stood up as a target before bandits and was shot to death, we shall feel that the little we can do in the way of giving a few dollars on the thirteenth Sabbath can never measure up to the sacrifice which he made.
