My dear Mr. Administrator:

Reports have reached me that some young people who had planned to enter college this fall, as well as a number of those who attended college last year, are intending to interrupt their education at this time because they feel that it is more patriotic to work in a shipyard, or to enlist in the Army or Navy, than it is to attend college. Such a decision would be unfortunate.

We must have well-educated and intelligent citizens who have sound judgment in dealing with the difficult problems of today. We must also have scientists, engineers, economists, and other people with specialized knowledge, to plan and to build for national defense as well as for social and economic progress. Young people should be advised that it is their patriotic duty to continue the normal course of their education, unless and until they are called, so that they will be well prepared for greatest usefulness to their country. They will be promptly notified if they are needed for other patriotic services.

Ingathering Program Launched

We have been made very happy by the encouraging Ingathering reports that are coming from all sections of the field, showing that the churches are actively working even before our scheduled program begins the first of September. With the vacation period over, we have now launched fully into the Ingathering program and are planning to raise our entire quota before the last Sabbath in October. In later issues of the Gleaner we will give more detailed reports of the work in the various churches.

Most of the conferences in North America started their official work several weeks ago, and indications are that the total received in North America this year will exceed that of any previous year. I know that this will be

good news to all of our membership, for we have been much burdened to make up to the mission treasury the loss resulting from the European war. We don't know how much longer we are going to have the privilege of carrying the Ingathering work in this country, and we urge all our members in every church to make the most of their privileges and do everything they possibly can for Ingathering this year. The Lord has blossed us in such a wonderful way that surely it is a small thing for every member to do his full part, - and, in view of world conditions, to do a double share. In some sections the members have not only set their hearts to do what they did last year, but to raise at least one goal for some one else. After they have raised their own goal, then they work to raise a minuteman quota for an aged or afflicted member of the church who cannot get out to solicit, or turn in an extra minuteman goal for some one in Europe who is denied the privilege of Ingathering work.

What a blessing would come to a'l of our churches if every one of us, after raising what we did last year, or our own minuteman goal, would work to help some one else! This is the spirit of Isaiah 41:6 and 7.

"They helped every one his neighbor; and every one said to his brother, Be of good courage. So the carpenter encouraged the goldsmith, and he that smoothest with the hammer him that smote the anvil, saying, It is ready for the sodering: and he fastened it with nails, that it should not be moved."

A voice over the telephone fairly shouted for joy as the speaker informed another that the organ was on a truck in front of the college building.

Yes, the organ is now in the process of installation on the platform of the Atlantic Union College chapel.

In last week's GLEANER we promised to tell you something of the organ which we have purchased, and we shall fulfill that pledge now.

We had originally planned to get an electric organ of a small variety in order to meet the limited amount of money that we planned to raise. But while we were pricing organs, Brother Brad Braley of the Boston Temple, heard of a fine used pipe organ, and put us in touch with the man who was selling it.

As a result of this contact we have bought a recent model Wicks electric pipe organ. The instrument has four ranks of pipes, a set of Deagan 4-40 chimes, and is the latest type of Wicks magnetic controlled equalized pressure organ.

Before purchasing the organ the Alumni Association sent a committee to inspect it. The committee was composed of Miss Madge Gould, head of the music department of Atlantic Union College; Mrs. Myron Cross, instructor in piano; Professor Bela Urbanowsky, President G. Eric Jones, and the writer.

The organ is no longer a hope; it is a reality, and now with the installation of the instrument we expect to see an influx of dollars in order that the full amount of our drive may be realized.


