

T a special foreign workers' meeting held in New York City recently, at which a number of colporteurs working in foreign languages were present, one colporteur bore a most remarkable testimony, giving his experience in accepting the truth about



twelve years ago in Philadelphia. This experience shows the power of the truth in changing an entire life and how the Lord has wonderfully blessed him in the literature ministry.

When this truth found our brother he was a bootlegger and a peddler of cocaine and her-

oin. His brother had just been murdered, and he himself was determined to avenge his brother's death by taking the life of his murderer.

On hearing the truth he was converted, his whole program of life was immediately changed, and the hatred within his heart removed. When he rolled out into the street several barrels of wine and poured it down the sewer his family and relatives thought he was crazy. His wife left him, taking with her three of their five child en.

Following his conversion this young men entered the colporteur work and through the years has been wonderfully blessed in selling "The Great Controversy." He later brought his father and mother into the truth.

He is still a young man, and in relating his experience before this foreign workers' council he stated that while he has had to be a mother as well as a father to his two boys, the Lord has wonderfully blessed him in the colporteur work. He now has a nice apartment, neatly furnished. Both of his boys are in the church school. He has his own car that he uses in his colporteur work, and he is neatly dressed. This brother, in the face of many difficulties, has demonstrated that when one dedicates his whole heart and life to the Lord and the literature ministry, it is possible for one to support

himself and family in the colporteur work. Scores of faithful, full-time colporteurs everywhere are living testimony to the same fact.

The secret of success in the literature ministry is consecration, a burden for souls, and an earnestness in full-time service. May the Lord lead many of our faithful, successful members to dedicate their lives as colporteur evangelists, in an earnest endeavor to carry the message of hope to the multitudes of this great area who are groping about in the darkness of this troubled world.

Spreading Heaven's Propaganda In Satan's Strongholds

THE last World War brought into our common speech the word "propaganda." That word is used even more freely in connection with the present World War. Every nation in the conflict is busily engaged in sending out propaganda. So important is this phase



of warfare considered that leaflets a r e sometimes dropped f r o m planes instead of bombs. And why do the nations spend their heavily taxed dollars on the printed page? Because they know that this is one of the most effective aids to winning the war.

Every time I have thought on this point I have asked myself the question, Shall we let the children of this world be wiser in their generation than the children of light? It was no mere accident or coincidence that this advent movement virtually started on its way from a printing press, The earliest accounts of the promotion of the advent teachings by the pioneers have to do with the printed page. We think of Elder James White taking the first copies of Present Truth in a carpet bag down to the post office. We recall the first issue of the Review published in Paris, Maine, in 1850.

In other words, Adventists have been propagandists from the beginning. We have been waging a war for the kingdom of God. We have sent forth our men and women right into the strongholds of Satan and spread the propaganda of heaven where it was sure to be read. That has been our steady program through the years of this movement. And great have been the result. This propaganda has opened the eyes of multitudes to see that they should break their allegiance to the devil. We have caused many a rebellion in the ranks of Satan.

But here we are in the closing days of 1940, and our task is not yet finished. The world is being literally deluged with every kind of propaganda for

every sort of political theory or ism. The situation is really unparalleled. Is this a time for us to slacken our activity? Is this a day for us to leave the field to every man-made scheme and plan for reorganizing the world? We have God's plan for world reorganization. We know of the divine plan to create a new heavens and a new earth wherein dwelleth righteousness. I believe we should redouble our propaganda program for God.

And how? Well, there are various ways, but probably the most effective is the colporteur work. The colporteurs have always been the advance guard of the advent army. We need more recruits today. calling of equal importance, namely, evangelistic canvassing. And the fact is, in the colporteur work they would no doubt reach more people every day than they would by preaching from the pulpit. Furthermore, they would meet people on their own ground, in their own homes. They would be using a



book that in most cases would present the message in a clearer and more concise way than they could by their own presentation. Then, too, where the book is sold, it is always present to answer questions, but never antagonizes by arguing the points of truth.

When we advertise our meetings we get a very small percentage and as a rule only those somewhat interested. The colporteur reaches the "every creature." He contacts the one that does not attend church, those that are prejudiced and will not attend services to listen. He finds the sick, the discouraged, and brokenhearted. In fact, I know of no line of service that so completely resembles the work of Christ as that of the colporteur.

Our conference needs evangelists, but the great multitudes will only be reached by house-to-house work. May God inspire many to give their lives to this most important line of service.

"WHEREAS, Conditions in the world today proclaim in no uncertain tones that we are noaring the end of the days left for the finishing of the work committed to us, and that what we have to do in warning the world must be done quickly; and, recognizing the large place that colporteur evangelism is to occupy in the closing work of the message; therefore.

"WE RECOMMEND, 1. That our union and local conference executive committees give special study to the needs of the colporteur work in their respective fields in its relation to the great task of evangelism.

"2. That pastors, district leaders, and church elders be requested to keep before our churches the importance of the literature ministry, through sermons and other public references to this work, and that they seek out and encourage suitable individuals to take up colporteur evangelism in order that throughout the field the number of workers engaged in this line of soul-winning endeavor may be quickly and greatly increased.

"3 That each pastor, district leader, and church elder be requested to put forth special effort during 1941 to secure at least one recruit for regular full-time colporteur work and others who can work part time, the names of these thus received to be placed with the conference field missionary secretaries."

Recommendation unanimously and enthusiastically adopted by the Autumn Council and voted by our union conference committee, November 20, 1940.

other hand, the following is said of a certain sect who call themselves Jehovah's Witnesses: "It is well known how they have scattered their books far and wide. Not only in the English language, but in eighty-seven other tongues and dialects. Over a period of twenty years they have distributed more than three hundred million books and pamphlets. Last year, they doubled their yearly average in books distributed, besides twelve million magazines. In June of this year, a booklet was issued and already four million have been circulated. Forty-four thousand workers were employed in house-to-house work last year.'

Surely this should stir us as never before to be about our Father's business in a very definite way. You note they place special emphasis upon the publishing work, not only in so many words, but by actions. Mark well what the Catholics have to say as to the importance of literature work:

"However one strives towards the triumph of the Catholic cause this will never be achieved if the press, which is the principal means, is forgotten. The Catholic who does not protect, help, defend and make known the Catholic press may be pious, but he does not take into account the times in which he lives nor has he yet reached the stage to see clearly the present hour." The above is engraved on the walls of the Vatican.

The hour has struck when greater and still greater emphasis must and will be placed on the circulation of our literature. To begin to meet the crying need of the million within the confines of the Atlantic Union Conference, we should have at least two hundred fulltime and several hundred part-time workers hastening from door to door. At this time will you not earnestly pray, "Lord, what wilt thou have me to do?" and at the same time while looking out upon the fields white and already to harvest, may you hear that still small voice saying, "Go ye also into the vineyard."

Medical Cadet Corps

A FULL meeting of the medical cadet corps will be held on Sunday morning, beginning at 9:30, December 8, at the Temple Church. This will be the first instructional meeting, and full credit will be given every one present toward securing medical cadet credit. The instruction period will continue until twelve and will include both drilling and medical lectures. This is in addition to the Red Cross classes that are being held at different dates, and is a part of the full medical cadet corps training.

The course will cover a period of three or four months, and will be of such a nature that the knowledge gained will be of great value even for those who may not be called to army service.

There will be a nominal charge of \$1 a month to cover incidental expenses such as the textbook, pamphlets, emblems, etc.
