Duty of Delegates

A delegate to a conference session or constituency meeting is not chosen to represent merely the church or conference electing him. When he is seated he should view the work as a whole, remembering that he is responsible for the welfare of the work in every part of the field. It is not permissible for church or conference delegations to organize or attempt to direct their votes as a unit. Nor is it permissible for the delegates from a large church or conference to claim pre-eminence in directing affairs in a conference session. Each delegate should be susceptible to the direction of the Holy Spirit and cast his vote according to his personal convictions. Any church or conference officer or leader attempting to control the votes of a group of delegates would be considered disqualified for holding office. —Church Manual, p. 179.

Unfinished Lessons

"It really is partly your fault that I have not sent in answers to your course for about five months (I think)—but wait until I explain a bit and then you will understand that I do not 'blame' you for what appears to be remissness on my part.

"I found Mr. Andreasen's book *Following the Master* (received from your program October 20) extremely interesting but quite upsetting, for I am an Episcopalian and have been for the 60 years of my life, and some of the ideas and doctrines mentioned in his book were quite upsetting.

"However, the following sequence of events has occurred since then. I now own and have read all but one or two of Mr. Andreasen's books; I got in touch with Mr. O. J. Ritz of the New Haven church (S.D.A.) about December 1, on which day he came up the 25 miles to my home and talked with me for a couple of hours (although I was a perfect stranger to him); starting with December 5 last, I have missed only two Sabbath day services (December 12 and 26) held in Waterbury, and have been a frequent attendant at Sabbath school sessions as well; Mr. Ritz has come up to our house and talked with my wife, son and me for the past seven consecutive Tuesday evenings; he has loaned me Mr. Froom's rather massive three volumes on *The Prophetic Faith of Our Fathers*, and I am now up to about page 150 in Volume III; I now own (and have read nearly all of) some 30 or 40 books and pamphlets obtained from the Southern New England Book and Bible House.

"Perhaps you will now understand why I have not been as regular as I should have been about sending in answers to the Bible Course in which I am still greatly interested and which I hope to resume in the reasonably near future—and I hope to be back with 'the class' soon."
