## Millions Will Read the Bible

Led by citizens of the United States, people in over forty countries will follow the 12th annual observance of Worldwide Bible Reading, sponsored by the American Bible Society.

Starting Thanksgiving Day, November 24, and continuing through Christmas, thousands of families will be reading identical passages of Scripture from the greatest chapters in the Bible. Lists of the passages, in convenient bookmark form, are provided by the American Bible Society, free of charge, to all who will use them. Again this year the Society has prepared the passages in Braille so that sightless people may join in following the readings.

President Dwight D. Eisenhower, who is honorary chairman of a national sponsoring committee of laymen, has issued a strong endorsement of the observance, as follows:

Please accept my best wishes for the greatest possible success for this year's Worldwide Bible Reading Campaign, to take place between Thanksgiving and Christmas. In this period between the two holidays, when Americans give thanks for their blessings and renew their hopes for a just and lasting peace in the world, all of us, of whatever religious belief, may well turn to the *Bible* for guidance and inspiration for the tasks which lie ahead. I hope that many individuals and many families will do so, and that they will continue this practice in the New Year, joined by men and women of faith and good will in other lands.

### Dollars for Servicemen

Men who served in the military sometime after June 27, 1950, but were discharged before the president signed the Korea G.I. Bill on July 16, 1952, are eligible for mustering-out pay if they have not already drawn it, according to the *Army Times* of August 27, 1955. Men who served during any portion of the above mentioned period of time, but who are still in service, should contact their base finance officer, while those not on active duty should write to the services' finance centers, according to the *Times*. These centers are as follows:

Claims Section, Settlement Division, Air Force Finance Center, 3800 York Street, Denver 5, Colorado; U.S. Navy Finance Center, Cleveland 14, Ohio; Settlement Division, Finance Center, U.S. Army, Indianapolis 49, Indiana; and Commandant, U.S. Marine Corps (CDD), Washington 25, D.C.

the following basis: \$100 for service of less than 60 days, \$200 for more than 60 days, and \$300 for more than 60 days any part of which was spent overseas or in Alaska.

Survivors of veterans who died after leaving the service are said to be eligible for this pay, while survivors of those who died while in the service are not.

### First S.D.A. Lawyer in Bermuda

Brother Eric Arthur Jones, in the tradition of the British Bar, was recently called to practice in the Bermuda courts. The ceremony was impressive, with the Hon. David Huxley, acting Chief Justice, the presiding judge, in scarlet robes, and the members of the Bermuda Bar, wigged and gowned as in the ancient customs of the British courts.

The leading Bermuda newspapers carried the story on the front page. Mr. E. T. Richards, Member of Colonial Parliament, introduced Mr. Jones. I quote from the *Royal Gazette*:

Mr. Richards said Mr. Jones was called to the Bar at Lincoln's Inn in February, 1955. Mr. Jones, had, he added, had a distinguished academic career.

At the Central School he won a secondary school scholarship. After several years at the Berkeley Institute he passed the Cambridge School Certificate, coming first in his class. Then Mr. Jones won the Bermuda Technical Scholarship and used it to attend the University College of London. He qualified as a Bachelor of Laws in 1953.

"I am glad to sponsor him," Mr. Richards said. "I am sure he will be a credit to the bar."

The *Royal Gazette* further states:

"With your numerous academic successes," Major Huxley continued, "which show great ability, I am certain you will find your practice at the Bar a fruitful and happy one."

Brother Jones is the first Seventh-day Adventist lawyer to be called to the bar in Bermuda. Since the Bermuda courts meet on the Sabbath, Brother Jones met numerous difficulties even before being called to the bar. God has given him wisdom to overcome these, but, of course, he will be under constant pressure and temptation, and needs the prayers of our faithful people.

We trust and believe that Brother Jones may demonstrate before these influential men with whom he associates from day to day, the priceless worth of true Christian character. We trust that he may be able to show in the courts of Bermuda, those principles of godliness which Daniel displayed in the courts of Babylon and Medo-Persia.

Behind this attractive front is one of our conference tents neatly arranged, and with a seating capacity of one hundred twenty-six. Elder L. H. Cox, pastor of the Olean district, has one objective in mind as he continues his Bible lectures—to make the Bible plain to all who enter in at the Canvas Auditorium.

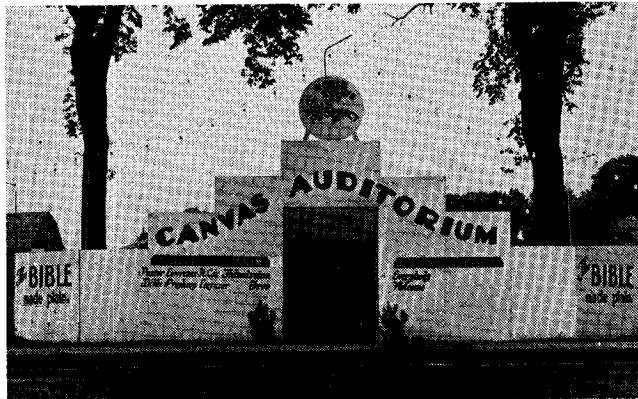
God has been giving wonderful success as the members of the Olean church have united in heroic efforts to get friends, neighbors, and relatives to come out to listen to Bible lectures made simple enough that all can understand the plain word of truth. People riding or walking by the tent have been impressed to stop in to listen. Some have come to scoff, and remained to praise God. Others have come to compare our belief with their own faith and are accepting this new knowledge wholeheartedly.

One reason to which we can directly attribute the success of the effort is the daily prayer circle inaugurated at the beginning of the effort. Every morning at 6:30 a.m. members meet at the church to pray for unity in the ranks of God's followers, for spiritual light and guidance, for loved ones not in the truth, and for others who are showing an interest in the teachings of the Bible. Then there is a short testimony service. Amazing evidence of the working of the Holy Spirit is shared that all might be edified in the knowledge that God's hand is guiding over all.

Attendance at the tent has been steady with an average of about 70

persons each evening. The highest attendance was 125 adults plus some children. At times those not of our faith have outnumbered our own people.

Already some have made known their intention to join the remnant church, and have asked that Brother and Sister H. E. La Mountain come out from Jamestown to attend their baptism. It is encouraging to us to see them take their stand. May we ever be faithful in taking the gospel message



to the world in these last days just before Jesus comes.

## HOW I DID IT

### When the Child Is Nervous and High Strung

*Parent 1:* "I find that the calmer the rest of the family is the better it is for the nervous child. I never speak to her in a loud or scolding tone or allow myself to appear to be in a mad rush. Neither do I make her feel more insecure by changing my mind frequently. When I have told her what to do and what not to do, she can count on things being just that way."

*Parent 2:* "My baby seemed to be very nervous. I found that gently rubbing his back soothed him more than anything else. A little lullaby song was a real help also. If he was more nervous than usual, I would put him in a nice warm bath."

*Parent 3:* "I find that interruptions in our daily schedule upset my children as much as anything we can do; therefore, I insist on following our regular routine whether company comes or not, whether it is the 4th of July or someone's birthday. Bedtime and mealtime is the same every day. Nothing can take the place of regularity for growing children."

### When the Child Wants to Feel Everything

*Parent 1:* "The young child learns a great deal through his sense of touch. Some of my neighbors will not allow their one and two-year olds to touch their flowers, but I think more of my baby than I do the flowers. I like to place the fragrant blossoms in his tiny hand and watch his facial expressions. To turn a baby lose in a posy bed might not be the best for either, I'll admit; but I do like to hold my little boy's hand and let him pluck the pretty petals himself and feel their loveliness to the full."

*Parent 2:* "Children like to feel their food. I notice in the Parents' Exchange that some are having trouble getting their children to eat. Tell these parents to give their children "finger foods" and they will not have any more difficulty. My problems with eating ceased when I changed from my fork-and-spoon method to the "finger" method. My children like to hold the carrot in their hands, or a midget sandwich, or a banana, or an apple stick. After all, fingers were made before spoons."

### Right Around Home

Mr. and Mrs. Kidwell were interested in a chart used by one of the speakers at the Home and School meeting which illustrated the estimated influence different individuals have upon a child.

THE AVERAGE CHILD IS INFLUENCED BY	
Mother .....	40%
Father .....	20%
School .....	20%
Church .....	10%
Self .....	10%

The Kidwells were impressed with the tremendous influence of the home upon the child and resolved anew to make their home all that it should be. They copied these notes from the speaker's talk:

1. Be what you wish your children to be.
2. Show them kindness and courtesy.
3. Combine affection and authority.
4. Have a mild yet firm manner, even with infants.
5. Teach them to be obedient and helpful.
6. Praise children when they do well.
7. Teach with kindness and affection.
8. Make the life of your children pleasant.
9. Give few commands, but see that these are obeyed.
10. Surround children with cheerfulness, courtesy, and love.

After studying the chart, one father took courage in the thought that his influence together with that of the church school would at least balance with the influence of the non-Christian mother.

The question arose whether it would be necessary to send a child to church school if both parents were Christians and took the family to church regularly. The speaker replied by saying, "Christian parents will obey the Lord in everything and will have their children in church school. If they turn a deaf ear to the counsels of God, they are influencing the child to disregard the word of the Lord."
