

New G.N.Y. President

Several months ago the Greater New York Conference Committee unanimously voted to invite Elder G. Eric Jones of the Ontario-Quebec Conference to become president of the Greater New York Conference. Within a few hours Elder Jones gave his affirmative answer.

Elder Jones comes to our field with a wide background of experience. He



has spent seven years as a foreign missionary in India, which was followed by nine years as dean of men at Washington Missionary College, before serving as president of Atlantic Union College for twelve years. More recently he has filled positions in the

Canadian Union, for a short time in union departmental work, and then as president of the Ontario-Quebec Conference for the past ten years.

Elder Jones is known by his associates as a man of sterling character and unquestioned integrity. His experience fits him to carry on in a strong and aggressive manner the work which was laid down by Elder Branson because of failing health. The entire conference membership expressed sadness at the thought that Elder Branson's health would not allow him to continue his service to Greater New York, but I am sure that all will be most pleased to have a man of so many years' experience and with such a strong background for the various phases of the work of the Seventh-day Adventist church come to the field to carry on the good work which has been in progress during the last few years in the Greater New York Conference. Elder Jones has been carrying forward his work now for the last several months and has proved capable in meeting the very perplexing problems of this great metropolitan area. He is a man who is interested not only in the educational work but in the evangelistic, medical, and departmental work of the denomination.

I am sure that the members of the Greater New York Conference rejoice with us here in the Atlantic Union that Elder Jones has responded to the invitation to join our union family. Let us pray together that God will give him more than human wisdom as he takes up the mighty tasks which confront him in the execution of the work in this tremendously challenging field.

Commitment Day

The 1959 annual pledge-signing campaign and membership drive of the American Temperance Society is to be launched on Commitment Day, February 28. On this day every Seventhday Adventist will be invited to renew his temperance vows.

Pledge signing is nothing new among Seventh-day Adventists. As far back as 1879 Sister White took an active part in launching such a campaign at one of our camp meetings. On that occasion 132 persons signed the pledge.

There are many statements in the Spirit of prophecy emphasizing the importance of our pledge-signing campaign. Here is one: "From the light God has given me, every member among us should sign the pledge and be connected with the temperance association."—*Temperance*, p. 197.

This indicates that Sister White apparently had a vision that a temperance organization would some day be launched by our denomination, for she encouraged them not only to sign the pledge but to be connected with our temperance association.

On Commitment Day every member of the church will be invited to sign the pledge and also to renew his membership in the American Temperance Society. Six types of membership are offered our members: the Regular Membership dues are \$2 per year; Family Membership, \$3 per year; Contributing, \$5; Sustaining, \$10; Supporting, \$25; and Life Membership, \$100.

Upon payment of the annual dues a membership card is issued, and every member of the society is placed on the mailing list for *Listen* magazine, which is recognized as the most outstanding temperance periodical published in the world today.

Your membership dues assist in financing not only our local temperance work but also our worldwide temperance program, for 10 per cent of the membership dues are credited to the International Temperance Association for the promotion of our temperance message throughout the world field.

We trust that every reader will respond to the appeals to sign the pledge and become active members of the American Temperance Society. Now is

the time for us as Seventh-day Adventists to make our influence felt by precept and example, by voice, by pen, and by vote in favor of total abstinence and complete elimination of this infamous traffic.

Pennies or Pounds

As I opened my mail this morning I was greeted by two advertising folders with interesting titles: "Penny Wise and Pound Foolish" and "Horse Sense and Pennies." Of course, these folders were not advertising Christian education, but as I pondered the implications of these titles my thoughts turned to the youth in our churches and the reasons ofttimes given why they are not enrolled at Union Springs Academy.

So often when I speak to parents about Christian education they say that they just can't afford to send their children away to an academy. True, some families are financially restricted, yet I find their homes nicely furnished and the car is usually up to date. Care has been taken to provide most of the modern conveniences and some of the luxuries. Somehow, I cannot help wondering if some are not penny wise and pound foolish in regard to the importance of Christian education.

It is my firm conviction, based on my own personal experience and on my observation of many other young people whose parents are determined to follow God's plan for their children's education, that where there is a will there is always a way. The pennies that are sacrificed for Christian education become pounds of satisfaction in Christian service. Conversely, the pennies saved or otherwise used when Christian education is neglected, ofttimes become pounds of regret as young people follow interests and associates found in outside schools.

No other investment will pay greater dividends than money spent for our youth in building Christian character. It is just good horse sense to educate the youth of the church in schools of the church for service in the church. If it happens that the parents are restricted financially, then the church should step in to assist the youth if they are willing to do their part to receive a Christ-centered education.

Perhaps pennies are not the great barrier confronting modern youth in securing a Christian education. The real reason so many S.D.A. youth receive their education outside the church-operated school is that parents and the church are not alert to the necessity to provide for their youth a Christian education. Listen as these words come thundering down from the Mount of God as recorded by the pen of inspiration: "Nothing is of greater importance than the education of our children and youth. The church should arise and manifest a deep interest in this work God has appointed the church as a watchman, to have a jealous care over the children and youth as a sentinel . . . and give warning of danger. But the church does not realize the situation. She is sleeping on guard. In this time of peril, fathers and mothers must arouse and work as for life, or many of our youth will be lost forever."-Counsels to Teachers, p. 165.

Further, we find that "the well-being, the happiness, the religious life, of the families with which the youth are connected, the prosperity and piety of the church in which they are members. are largely dependent upon the religious education that they receive in our schools." —*Ibid*, p. 497.

With this divine counsel ringing in our ears, let us not be penny wise and pound foolish. The youth who will remain in and serve the church and the cause it espouses *must* be educated in the schools of the church. 
have produced superior teachers and pupils. Many examples could be cited, but for the sake of sparing you a lengthy article I will tell you of two recent examples.

come director of the M. I. T. Symphony Orchestra.

The M. I. T. Band, which one newspaper critic described as ranking "among the best on the East Coast," is one of two concert bands in the country that plays only music written originally for band. As John Corley explains, a wind band "has a voice of its own," which is strangled when orchestral compositions are transcribed for it. "They invariably attempt to make violins out of clarinets," he adds.

Since most original band music has been written within the past two decades, the band's policy makes great demands on its members. They must be able to handle the tricky rhythms and unfamiliar tonalities found in much contemporary music. The reward of their policy comes in being described as a band that is "well known for fine music."

Mr. John Corley received the degree of bachelor of music from Boston University in 1947, and M. Mus. from the same university in 1955. He twice was selected in a nation-wide competition to receive a scholarship for study under Serge Koussevitsky at Tanglewood, although he was unable to accept either time. He studied cornet under a member of the Boston Symphony Orchestra, and from 1942 to 1946 he was a bandmaster in the U. S. Army. He is now director of music at Brookline High School, as well as assistant director of music at M. I. T.
