"Well Done"

It always brings joy and gladness to our hearts to read Matthew 25:21: "His lord said unto him, Well done, thou good and faithful servant: thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things: enter thou into the joy of thy Lord." It is easy for all of us to quote this text, and to sit back and feel the warmth of this wonderful promise without thinking carefully about what it means to be a faithful servant.

Luke 12:40-47 gives the picture of God's requirements for His servants. He says:

Be ye therefore ready also: for the Son of man cometh at an hour when ye think not. . . . And the Lord said, Who then is that faithful and wise steward, whom his Lord shall make ruler over his household, to give them their portion of meat in due season? Blessed is that servant, whom his lord when he cometh shall find so doing. Of a truth I say unto you, that he will make him ruler over all that he hath. But and if that servant say in his heart, My lord delayeth his coming; and shall begin to beat the menservants and maidens, and to eat and drink, and to be drunken; The lord of that servant will come in a day when he looketh not for him, and at an hour when he is not aware, and will cut him in sunder, and will appoint him his portion with the unbelievers. And that servant, which knew his lord's will, and prepared not himself, neither did according to his will, shall be beaten with many stripes.

It would be very easy to read these texts and then sit back and say: "Well, I'm not drinking, I'm not smoking, I'm not dancing nor carousing as the world does." But I'm wondering if we are meeting the requirements of a faithful servant of God?

The *New English Bible* translates Luke 12:47, "The servant who knew his master's wishes, yet made no attempt to carry them out, will be flogged severely." I believe that every Seventh-day Adventist who accepts the message must clearly understand that he is accepting Christ not only for his own soul salvation, but that he has accepted the message in order that he might unite with a group of believers who wish to carry out the gospel commission, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel."

It is much easier to give our money for the advancement of God's cause than it is to give ourselves, or our talents, or our energies. Sometimes it entails a sacrifice in order to be in the work of the Lord.

Christ's Object Lessons, page 86, says:

"And all who would bring forth fruit as workers together with Christ, must first fall into the ground and die. The life must be cast into the furrow of the world's need. Self-love, self-interest, must perish. But the law of self-sacrifice is the law of self-preservation. The seed buried in the ground produces fruit, and in turn this is planted. Thus the harvest is multiplied."

Some time ago Joseph R. Sizzo, noted clergyman, was quoted in *Sunshine Magazine*. He said:

"Our civilization is apparently not concerned in giving service, but in demanding and getting 'rights.' Today,

man wants what he hasn't earned, reaps what he hasn't sown. All too common is the philosophy that a man is entitled to anything he can put his hand on. It is the gospel of irresponsibility. It is freedom gone mad. Life needs to be measured in terms of higher loyalty. The fundamental principle of human society should not be self-will, but self-surrender. Without a higher law of service and good will, neither democracy nor civilization can survive."

Someone else has said, "What we have done for ourselves alone, dies with us; what we have done for others and the world, remains and is immortal."—*Quote*, Vol. 34, No. 4.

As God's work grows larger and larger to encompass the entire world, more dedicated men and women are needed in all avenues of service to finish His work. We must have more young women who will devote themselves to the profession of nursing, as our hospitals are in great need of nurses to help us take care of the sick. The health work is the right arm of our message and it is one of the avenues whereby we can break down prejudice in communities where our faith is little known. The church has many opportunities just now for service through our various medical institutions. May I appeal again to our young people and our professional workers out in institutions of the world, to volunteer your services for the cause of God even though the wages may be a little smaller. By this dedicated giving of ourselves to Christ we will be preparing our characters for the kingdom of heaven.

The world has grown selfish and greedy. Seventh-day Adventists must not partake of these worldly traits. George S. Stevenson and Harry Milt wrote some time ago in "Master Your Tensions and Enjoy Living Again" in

Quote, Volume 39, Number 3, page 14:

"As you give to others in time and in energy, in consideration and attention, in acceptance and love, in service and devotion, in material goods—you will win the appreciation and love of those to whom you give or those whom you help. You will also win for yourself much greater peace of mind, much greater relief from tension."

There is no joy and satisfaction like the joy of knowing that we are living an unselfish life, a life devoted to others and to the finishing of God's work, and to the hastening of that day when we shall be together in the glory land. May I appeal again for dedicated skilled workers to volunteer their services to staff the institutions that God has caused to be turned over to us. By the proper execution of this work we can publicize the Advent message and quickly proclaim a soon-coming Saviour to the entire world.

C. H. Kelly Retires

C. H. Kelly has announced his retirement after forty years of executive work in the denomination, the past four years of which have been spent as secretary-treasurer of the Atlantic Union Conference.

Mr. Kelly began work for the denomination in 1922 when he became secretary-treasurer of the old Virginia Conference at Richmond, Virginia, but soon moved to Takoma Park, Maryland, when the former District of Columbia Conference and Virginia Conference merged to become the present Potomac Conference, where he was manager of the Book and Bible House.

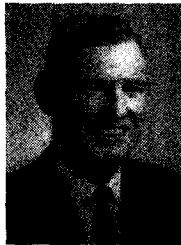

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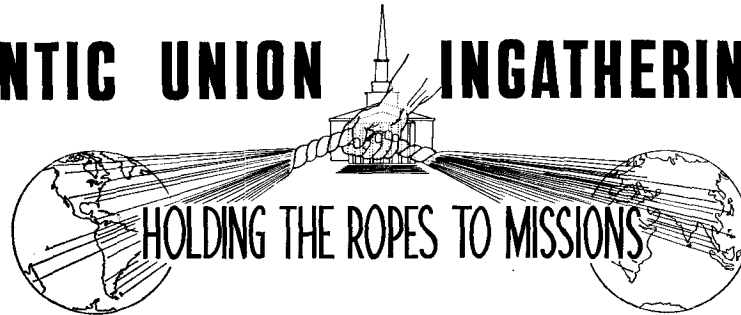

widow with a handful of meal in the bottom of a barrel scouring the land in an attempt to find two sticks for fuel to bake a small loaf of bread "for me and my son that we may eat it, and die" (I Kings 17:12).

Now listen intently, twentieth century friend o' mine, and you will hear down through the corridor of time the man of God saying to the widow:

Fear not; go and do as thou hast said; but make me thereof a little cake first, and bring it unto me, and after make for thee and for thy son (I Kings 17:13).

You want to cry out, "The test is too great! She has just explained her financial predicament; didn't you hear her? She said only a handful of flour and there are two of them; just enough for the last pitiful meal—then death."

But listen, the man of God is speaking again:

For thus saith the Lord God of Israel, The barrel of meal shall not waste . . . until the day that the Lord sendeth rain upon the earth (I Kings 17:14).

You knew it, didn't you? I did, too. God's requests are always accompanied

by a promise. Now see the blessings she will receive for giving her all to God.

But wait, there is no response. She says not a word. What is she thinking—"a bird in the hand. . . ." Breathlessly we wait. For an instant she stands in the valley of decision. Then slowly she turns and does "according to the saying" of the man of God. She met the test and passed it triumphantly.

A stirring story indeed of the widow who fearlessly faced the future because she remembered God's goodness and guidance during her past experience.

It happened in Zarephath, but it is happening again in New York City. Never a full barrel and usually only a handful, but your gifts in the hands of men and women of God with a message for the hour have provided the bread of life to television viewers for almost thirteen years. Faith for Today is truly a venture in faith day by day. The Lord is performing a miracle for us such as he did for this Phoenician widow through people who respond systematically to support the television ministry of Faith for Today.

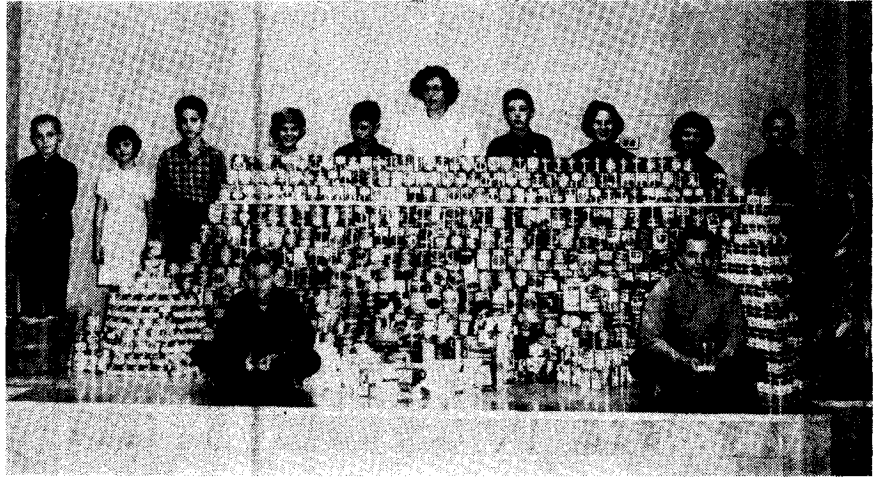

ship of the South Lancaster Village church.

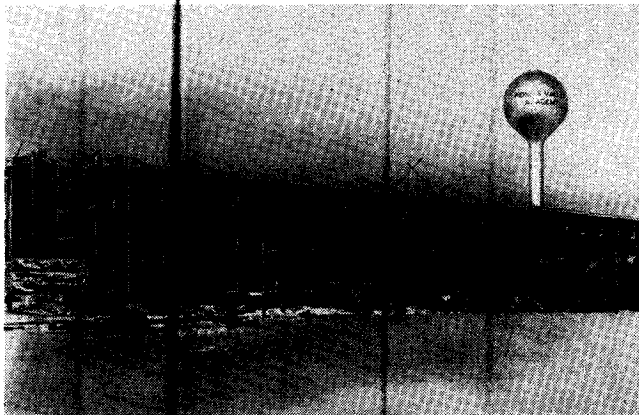
