"Small At First" to "Clear Round the World"

In November, 1848, the servant of the Lord, after coming out of vision, said to her husband:

"I have a message for you. You must begin to print a little paper and send it out to the people. Let it be small at first; but as the people read, they will send you means with which to print, and it will be a success from the first. From this small beginning it was shown to me to be like streams of light that went clear round the world."

The first printing of Seventh-day Adventist literature was carried to the post office by Elder James White himself, who was also the writer. A small beginning. Today there are 50 publishing houses around the world—a number of them have the latest printing presses. Last year \$134,000,693 worth of Christian literature was printed and sold "clear round the world." The church also prints 370 different periodicals. Who can estimate the value of a single periodical or a single article in a periodical.

We cannot forget the touching story related many times by Elder Theodore Carcich of one of our periodicals being picked up from a street and was read. More literature was requested. The individual was baptized and then went back to the Roman Catholic Church and talked with his friend, Theodore Carcich, and started Bible studies with him. Elder Carcich was baptized and became a giant among the leaders in the Seventh-day Adventist Church—all because of a single journal, and maybe a single article in that journal, found on a street in New York City.

Yes, the publishing work was small at first and today it has gone "clear round the world." In almost every country where the Adventist Church is working, we first entered with our literature ministry.

From the first literature evangelist over 100 years ago, we have grown to nearly 3,000 around the world. BUT—we need many more. The servant of the Lord said the literature ministry is a blessed work and a blessing will attend the efforts of those who engage in it. She says further it is a most successful way to save souls. Will you not try it?

In 1980, 19,900 people were baptized who were first contacted by a literature evangelist. The promise is that thousands will soon be converted in a day, *most* of whom will trace their first conviction to the reading of our publications. Brothers and sisters, let's help circulate our literature. Let the Holy Spirit do His work as the people read the message. THE HOUR IS LATE AND THE NEED IS GREAT!

MUCH MORE THUNDER NEEDED

One Component of President Earl Amundson's keynote address to the Executive Committee members relative to the



"Barely 20 percent of the world population is Christian" said Elder Amundson, "and the number of people today who have never heard of Christ is 10 times greater than in the first century." There are many doors yet to be opened whose occupants would greatly welcome the Advent message of hope.

fulfilling of our objectives as a church in the territory of Bermuda, New York, and New England, dealt with population statistics. "Seventh-day Adventists," he said "need to grow fourteen times our present membership to equal just one percent of the world population." Another mind-boggling statement was uttered when Elder Amundson said, "The number of Christians in the world is reduced by ten percent every 40 years."

Indeed these statements make the topic of nurturing a timely one. We need more than a little thunder or sporadic blast from the pulpit of our churches. When souls respond to the invitation to become baptized members and join a church, the pastor and members both have a joint responsibility to sponsor a balanced nurturing program

just as a wise mother would provide for a newborn baby.

The following statistical report is printed to reinforce the need of much more thunder in public and personal witnessing and a continuous nurturing program.

Figures speak for themselves. Each person must give answers for themselves to such questions as: When I thunder, am I heard? Have I conducted a public evangelistic series? Have I done any consistent personal witnessing? Have I been a caring, giving, helping, loving person in my church, or has my influence been negative?

We repeat this statement as we have in the previous three releases, for you, the readers of these articles. The following recommendations were submitted by Subcommittee IV to the Atlantic Union Conference Executive Committee. (In typing the rough drafts of handwritten, abbreviated reports, some phrases or sentences may not be worded as the subcommittees intended—especially after needed proofreading).

A. Recommended:

That the Atlantic Union Conference leadership provide a practical living demonstration in the return to diligent Bible study and apostolic seeking of the Holy Spirit through agonizing and prevailing prayer and that a similar example be demonstrated by local conference leadership, pastors, and church members.

How this can be accomplished:

- I. Union Administrative Level:
 - a. That periodic prayer retreats be held—all night prayer services.
 - That we encourage the implementation of the Bible and Spirit of Prophecy principles in our lives, policies, and work.

II. Local Conference Level:

- a. That prayer retreats on conference-wide level or by districts, be held.
- That periodic Bible conferences be held where current theological, hermeneutic, and pastoral issues are discussed.
- That we reinstate/continue two weeks of prayer in conferences and churches.

- III. Local Church Level:
 - a. That regular prayer meetings and Bible study groups be conducted.
 - b. That the major books of prophecy be studied— Daniel and Revelation—as interpreted and adhered to by the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

 That revivals and/or weeks of prayer be continued in our churches.

- d. That weekly meetings of the Adventist youth be encouraged in our churches.
- IV. Personal Level (leaders, workers, and members):
 - a. That we return to meaningful morning and evening worship in our workers' and members' homes, with the husband leading out in this practice so far as possible.
 - b. That time be given daily to reflection on the scenes of Calvary, our personal relationship with Christ, and seeking a deeper experience through prayer.
 - That our use of television be controlled and all questionable forms of amusement be eliminated.

B. Indoctrination:

- Recommendation to Atlantic Union pastors and evangelists:
 - a. That all prospective members be thoroughly indoctrinated and that an ongoing program of indoctrination be carried on. This can be emphasized by:
 - 1. Sabbath morning pastor's Bible class.
 - 2. Doctrinal seminars on prayer meeting night.
 - 3. Other meetings as the pastor deems possible.
 - b. Regarding baptism of children and young people: That thorough preparation be given to children and young people desiring baptism and church membership, that a continued program of indoctrination be carried on, and that counsel and support of the parents or guardians be sought in connection with the baptism.
- II. Recommendation to the Ministerial Secretary of the Atlantic Union Conference:

In view of some of the current problems facing our congregations concerning dress reform, health reform, home school programs, and style of worship (particularly mid-week prayer service):

It is recommended that background material for study on the above subjects be made available to all pastors and church board members.

C. Involvement:

Recommendation to all pastors, conference leadership, and members:

- That encouragement be given to the above mentioned, to attend all church meetings as a matter of priority, with special emphasis on attending Sabbath school and prayer meetings.
- 2. That members get involved in personal witnessing.
 - Recognizing that before witnessing can be entered into, preparation for witnessing should be carried out. Recommended—conducting spiritual growth seminars.

- b. Implementing the spiritual guardian system—when a new member selects an older church member as his spiritual guardian in addition to the pastor and Bible worker.
- Parish Plan coverage:
 Where a local church elder is assigned a section of the church membership—sometimes by Sabbath school class.
- d. Promotion and participation in church fellowship dinners and socials.

D. Shepherding:

- I. Resolutions and recommendations:
 - a. That the preparation of our people for the shaking and the anchoring of them in our church as the remnant church must be reinforced by our pastors as shepherds, by:
 - Preaching the Word in the divine Sabbath service and holding to the truths which have made us unique. (We are encouraging that all of the major doctrines be preached during the course of the year.)
 - Feeding the flock through continual emphasis on God's Word from the Scriptures and Spirit of Prophecy.
 - Ministering to members' needs through member visitation, by the pastor's personal awareness of problems, and the enlistment of his church members in the guardianship program.
- II. Recommendations to pastors and churches:
 - a. That pastors and churches be challenged to an awareness of problems requiring professional counseling, i.e.:
 - 1. Marital and family problems.
 - Drinking, smoking, and use of drugs in adult membership, in youth on the street (our youth) and in our academies.
 - Because of this awareness, areas of counseling are suggested.
 - Trained counselors who follow Christian principles.
 - 2. Retreat areas for long-term education.
 - 3. Pastoral involvement.
- III. Recommend the discouraging of the glorification of sin by not featuring sensational testimonies of individuals highlighting life and activities of sin before his conversion.

The annual Secondary School Music Clinic was hosted by Atlantic Union College February 3 to 6, 1982. Two major concerts were presented on Friday and Sabbath evenings by 152 students-76 each in the band and the choir.

Dr. Jack McClarty, Director of Development at Southern Missionary College in Collegedale, Tennessee, since 1980, was the band clinician. McClarty was the band director at Southern Missionary College for eight years. His bands have been featured at professional games in the Houston Astrodome, the Atlanta Omni, State fairs, various types of conventions, parades, church rallies, and many other miscellaneous functions.

McClarty also has been a clinician in Oklahoma, Tennessee, Florida, and Indiana, and has judged the N.B.T.A. World Championship Corp Competition at Notre Dame University. At the close of the Saturday night band concert, Dr. McClarty said, "I have been involved in at least 10 music clinics, and I want you to know that this is a fine group of young people. You in the Atlantic Union have nothing to be ashamed of." He also said, "There are many fine trumpet players in this group who could have played in the first chair position. But they were willing to step down and play in the second and third chair positions rather than being the hot dog, which made this one of the best balanced trumpet sections I have worked with."

Robert Malin, our own director of choral and vocal activities at Thaver Conservatory of Atlantic Union College, was the choir clinician. Malin said "This is the finest choir to come to the Atlantic Union College Music Clinic in the six years I have been conducting the clinic choir. This combined talent speaks well for the music programs provided in the Atlantic Union Conference academies as well as for the hard work of the Union's music teachers.

The pianist was Star Stevens, a graduate of Columbia Union College with a degree in performance, piano. Miss Stevens, secretary to the president and treasurer of the Atlantic Union Conference, has been the pianist for three previous music clinics. She has been the accompanist for numerous choral groups, Thayer Conservatory Chamber Singers, Andrews University Collegians, college choirs, and senior and faculty recitals at Thayer Conservatory.

Mrs. Wilma McClarty, Professor of English and Chairman of the English Department at Southern Missionary College, was narrator for both the Friday and Saturday evening programs. Dr. McClarty is the wife of Jack McClarty.

Special honor and recognition were given to Charles and Jeri Zacharias of Union Springs Academy, who were selected this year as the Music Directors to lead out in the organization of the music clinic. Students participated from seven academies. These academies and music teachers are: Greater Boston Academy, Georgeann Peterson; Greater New York Academy, Barry Edwards; Northeastern Academy, Lloyd Chung; Pine Tree Academy, Patricia Butler and Doris Krueger; Pioneer Valley Academy, Gladys Robison and Jake Randall; South Lancaster Academy, Laurie Redmer and Helgi Douay; Union Springs Academy, Charles and Jeri Zacharias.

The organizer of the music clinic was Paul Kilgore, Director of Education for the Atlantic Union Conference, supported by

the principals and conferences involved.

Scholarship Awards Available for Freshmen at AUC

Awards available to Atlantic Union College freshmen were listed recently in the fourth edition of Robert Leider's *The As & Bs of Academic Scholarships*. Since the publication of Leider's book, AUC has expanded the help it offers freshmen.

A Freshman Merit tuition scholarship of \$1,000 is available to a high school or academy senior in the upper 10 percent of his/her graduating class.

High school or academy seniors who are not in the upper 10 percent of their class but who have earned a G.P.A. of

3.5 or better are eligible to receive a \$500 tuition scholarship.

National Merit finalists can receive 50 percent of their tuition their freshman year and 25 percent of their tuition during their sophomore and junior years. Semifinalists can receive 25 percent tuition for the freshman and sophomore years. Students who want to take the National Merit test should contact their high school or academy counselor.

High school or academy seniors who serve as student body presidents junior or senior year or as a senior class president are eligible to receive a \$1,000 tuition scholarship for their college freshman year.

Any student living in the geographic area of the Atlantic Union Conference who travels over 200 miles from home. one way, to attend Atlantic Union College and registers as a full-time student (12 hours) for the Fall or Spring semester is eligible to receive 15 cents per mile for every mile over 200 miles, one way, four times or two round trips each semester. Bermudian students receive excursion rate plane fare minus \$60 for one round trip per semester. Describing Collegiate Honors Programs, Robert Leider pointed out that bright and talented students obtain an indirect scholarship through an honors program: "A highquality education can be attained at schools other than the \$10,000 per year "most selective" colleges. In this sense, honors programs become a lower cost alternative for securing a first-class individualized, and highly challenging learning experience." Atlantic Union College's Honors Core Program offers such a high-quality education to freshmen with a high school G.P.A. cumulative of 3.2 or better and an ACT standard score of 22 or better. At 9:30 in the morning, Monday, the eleventh of January, members of the Paul Towne family awakened to discover their home engulfed in flames. They rushed from the house, able to save nothing but their purses. Three volunteer fire companies responded but the home was totally destroyed. Most possessions were gone. The home they had built themselves was no more.

Stunned, not even clothing for their backs, Paul Towne, his wife Melita, their twins and the three-year-old grandson turned to the community for help in their emergency. Both the Dexterville and Roosevelt SDA Community Services Organizations responded. They supplied the family with needed clothing and bedding. Help was also given by St. Michael's Church in Central Square.

When they were able to sift through the ashes, they made an amazing discovery. A large family Bible belonging to the daughter, who was home at the time of the fire, had been kept in a dresser drawer. The dresser was a charred ruins. The Bible, however, lay on the ashes, scorched just a bit on the back cover. A marker in the Bible, a King James Version, was placed in Psalm 25 and this was the only page that was a bit tinged with smoke. A New Testament lay on top of the dresser and was scorched only on the outside. Certainly God still preserves His Holy Word as He has done throughout the centuries!

Rice Named Residency Director; Danis Becomes President of Corpcare and Med-Ed Director




