lished small clusters of new believers among previously unentered groups in their territories within the past few months, motivated by the vision of Global Strategy and energized by the plans

they have been laying.

What is our part in this daring dream? First, to PRAY. William Carey saturated his shoe repair shop with prayer before he ventured into the mission field. Every great advance of the Gospel arises out of the tears and petitions of God's people on their knees. Won't you pledge to pray daily for Global Strategy?

Secondly, to SHARE. Global Strategy isn't all overseas. While we may not have an unentered "people group" of 1 million people in our towns or states, we have hundreds of cities, villages, neighborhoods, houses, and individuals to whom God is sending us personally. The Global Strategy process invites each church to analyze the people within its community, learn if some of them belong to groups we are overlooking, and seek to develop a ministry for them. Overlooked "people groups" in some of our areas may include high school, college, and university students and teachers; prison inmates (read Matthew 25!); the lonely elderly; AIDS patients; professional and business leaders; certain groups of immigrants, such as Cambodians or persons from India; the handicapped; native Americans, and -you finish the list! Sometimes our next door neighbors, or even family members, haven't heard what Jesus has done for us! If so, they should be our first priority for Global Strategy.

Thirdly, to GIVE. We expected that, didn't we? Beyond our tithes and regular mission giving, even beyond placing extra dollars and checks in envelopes, we need to develop bold new ways to be a part of Global Strategy. Some conferences—or even churches—may choose to adopt a city, or a special ministry among some particular "people group." You'll have other ideas of how to get involved. Why not share your suggestions with your conference leaders or soud them to mo?

leaders, or send them to me?

Where in the world does Jesus look for His church? EVERYWHERE! He has sent an angel to fly in midair, shouting God's message and looking for His people among every nation, kindred, tongue, and **PEOPLE**. That's God's Global Strategy. Let's be a part of it!

prided ourselves on the achievements of the church's mission program in reaching the world with God's message for these days. Today, we

can rejoice that more than 86% of the world's nations are hearing the Gospel as proclaimed

by Seventh-day Adventists.

But our commission does not stop with the command to preach the gospel to all nations. We are children of Revelation 14:6 as well as Matthew 24:14. And our marching orders are to proclaim God's good news to "every nation, and kindred, and tongue, and people."

Today, Christian researchers look at the world's population according to "people groups." Frequently, this is more realistic than studying nations. As recent news reports about Eastern Europe and the USSR remind us, many nations are composed of groups of people who do not share common languages, customs, and traditions. Frequently, mission workers can make more realistic and practical strategies for evangelizing by looking at "people groups" rather than by entering only new nations. Also, many "people groups" within a nation are overlooked if we study only political divisions.

There are currently about 25,000 "people groups" in the world, 5,000 of them composed of more than 1 million people each. About 1,800 of these large groups are still unentered with the Adventist message. Together, they represent more than 2 billion people!

The vision of Global Strategy focuses upon these unreached people throughout our planet, knowing that the Good Shepherd longs to gather His sheep from everywhere into His own fold. It challenges every Adventist to think big—in the billions—about God's family, and our brothers and sisters, who haven't yet experienced the joy of anticipating Jesus' soon return and sharing His Sabbath rest. It urges us to reach out our arms to these billions, and shout, "Come with me! Welcome home!"

The goal of Global Strategy is to establish some Adventist presence in each of the 1,800 unentered groups of 1 million or more people during the decade of the 1990's. Already, our fellow believers in scores of countries have developed plans for reaching out to untouched groups near them. Some have actually estab-

WORCESTER CRUSADE REAPS 22 BAPTISMS!

hen a retired pastor, administrator, and evangelist gets a vision of expanding the work of God in his territory, things begin to happen. Such was the case in July and August 1990, in Worcester, Massachusetts, where Pastor Isaac Jean-Baptiste gives leadership to the Haitian work in Worcester, Clinton, and Boston.

Pastor Baptiste and the laypeople decided to invite Elder William McNeil, ministerial director for the Atlantic Union Conference, to conduct a four-week evangelistic crusade in Worcester. McNeil had already held a series of meetings for the French-speaking people in the Boston area in August of 1989.

On opening night, July 21, the crusade began with the subject, "The Day When Money Will Be Thrown into the Streets and Nobody Will Pick It Up!" A large attendance was recorded for this meeting and money in small bills was thrown into the audience by ushers. The advertising paid off well and the people enjoyed the presentation on last-day events.

Another highlight of the series of meetings was the night when Elder McNeil preached on the subject, "Birthday of the World." Using a large birthday cake and seven candles, McNeil showed that there is something very special about the seventh day of the week that sets it apart from the first six. He also proved the same point by using seven glasses, making the seventh glass special by adding lemon juice, sweetener, and coloring to the water. More than 35 people made decisions that night to keep the true Sabbath.

All of the sermons were translated simultaneously into French by Emanuel Joseph, a ministerial graduate from Atlantic Union College. Wordy Nicholas served as French Coordinator, Bernadette Chabot worked as coordinator for the English ministry, and Kennell Birmingham played the organ nightly. His wife, Myrielle, was the Prayer Time soloist. Mrs. W. Nicholas coordinated the young

people who served as ushers and receptionists. Josette Montrevil served as secretary/treasurer for the meetings. Bernadette Chabot, literature evangelist, sold \$4,000 of Adventist literature to many of the people who were later baptized.

The Worcester Mission gave strong support to the crusade and saw seven people added to their ranks through baptism. Pastor William Dudgeon baptized one lady on the closing night and she was added to the Worcester Airport church. Mrs. Gail Lamendola, along with her husband and parents, had her baby girl dedicated by Elder McNeil just before her baptism on the closing night.

As he reviewed the results of the crusade, which saw 22 precious souls added to the Adventist Church, McNeil said, "I am

amazed that 75 percent of those who came to the crusade were from contacts made by literature evangelist, Mrs. Bernadette Chabot. This should be living proof that public evangelism is still effective in the 1990s. When laypeople combine their energies and talents with those of the ministry, God can and will abundantly bless."

During the five years of HAR-VEST 90, Elder McNeil has seen 97 baptisms from his crusades in different parts of the Atlantic Union. Winning souls is always hard

THE VOICE OF PROPHECY REACHING AND TOUCHING MANY LIVES

laretta Nixon was an itinerant elder in the Methodist Church for 11 years, pastoring for seven of those years. Then someone introduced her to the New Life Bible Guides from the Voice of Prophecy. From Albany comes this letter: "I am 79 years old, and a life-long Roman Catholic, although not very devout. I correspond with some very good friends who are Seventh-day Adventists. Over time, I became more interested and asked about a Bible course. I really need to know more about religion and my God, as at 79, I hover on the brink of eternity.

"I don't know where this Bible course will take me," he continues, "but I am eager to acquire knowledge that I long avoided or ignored. God have mercy on me!"

LED BY THE HOLY SPIRIT

For eight years before coming to Bermuda, Brett Woolridge felt an uncomfortable restlessness and emptiness, as if something was missing in his life. Even the persons closest to him—his family; friends; and girlfriend, Elizabeth, could not fill the void.

A native of Cheltenham, 100 miles northwest of London, Brett felt that Bermuda might afford him refuge and peace. For two years he tried to secure employment on the island. Finally his persistence paid off. His family asked him, "What do you hope to find in Bermuda?" Brett says that a voice spoke out of his mouth with firmness and conviction saying, "God!" This response surprised everyone, even him.

Arriving in Bermuda in January 1989, Brett's job was underwriter with an exempt insurance company. But he still felt a certain lack in his life. Then, in August Brett read a newspaper advertisement concerning camp meeting, and, with encouragement from Marie Smith, he attended the meetings at the Warwick campsite.

Elder Henry Wright was the speaker that evening, August 22,

and by the end of the meeting Brett knew the message was truth. Elder Wright's sermons, "Lost at Home" and "Walking on Water," had a profound effect on Brett. He eagerly attended each evening.

When appeals were made to accept Christ, Brett was on his feet unhesitatingly. It was later, from a friend at work, that Brett heard he was involved with those "Seven-Day people." This had little impact on Brett for he realized that now he had found the truth. He was ready and willing to embrace it wholeheartedly—whatever was involved.

After the camp meeting, Brett started attending the Hamilton church. His exuberance in the truth and his participation in church life soon became obvious. Last April 14, he was baptized at Robinson's Cove on the north shore, Pembroke, by Elder Carlyle Simmons.

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

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
