"ADVENTIST EDUCATION HAD IT FIRST!"

o-booze dormitory wing a big hit" screamed the Worcester, Massachusetts, newspaper headline recently. The news report went on to say, "A 'substance-free' dormitory wing at Holy Cross College, where cigarettes, alcohol and other drugs are banned, has been so successful in its first year that the space will be tripled next fall."

What gave rise to this "novel experiment"? In the words of their campus newspaper editor, "It doesn't bother me that men down the hall drink, but it's the things that happen around drinking, like breaking windows, pulling out sinks, the senseless vandalism. It happens enough for me as a student to be ashamed of my peers. If you walk through one of the halls on Friday or Saturday night, you'll hear music blaring and see underage people with beers, which is against college policy, and the next morning you'll see the empty pizza boxes and pizza smeared on the walls."

I'm not surprised that students who wanted an education rebelled and that this new solution to the problem is catching on. And I'm sure it is worth the extra \$350 they'll have to pay to get into the experimental dorm (making a total of \$6050 for board and room

next year).

But the really good news for our constituency is that this is the kind of dormitory that Adventists have been running at Atlantic Union College for more than a hundred years, and next year the equivalent cost for board and room will be only half what Holy Cross charges!

In this as well as in so many other areas, Adventist education and Atlantic Union College can be seen as not only first, but also

actually as ahead of our times.

Recently, the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching issued a major report on American undergraduate education. It spoke about its loss of mission, confusion over values, absence of vigorous intellectual exchange, faculty and administrative distance from student life, separation from civic and social obligations in neighborhoods and the world, and the lack of a sense of wholeness.

The report's recommendations included advocacy of teachers caring about students, an integrated core curriculum, viewing the academic and non-academic life as interlocked, teachers being active with students in campus events, holding of all-college convocations, a "wellness" prerequisite to all else (good food, exercise, caring for body), searching for common values to share, attempting to build community, and even the college president becoming more directly involved in student residence halls.

Doesn't this sound like a blueprint of AUC's approach to education, thanks to the Adventist philosophy of education shared, incidentally, by all the elementary and secondary schools in the Atlantic Union Conference sponsored by the Seventh-day Adventist Church? Of course, it does. And again, we had it first. In so many ways, AUC is out in front of some of its more prestigious neighbors. Are you convinced of that? What are you doing to help spread the word? Should your son, daughter, grandchild, friend, student be at Atlantic Union College next fall? If so, tell them this: if they will get their application, Financial Aid Form, and supporting materials into us by May 1, 1991, they will automatically get a \$2,000 earlybird scholarship for the 1991-1992 school year! FORTY BAPTIZED AS "FIRST FRUITS" OF SPANISH QUEENS SERIES

The meetings were conducted by Elder Louis Torres, Conference Evangelist, and Elder Cabral. Half of the people baptized from the meetings were teens and young adults, according to Pastor Cabral.

The new young members are

already busy in a prison ministry. Each Sabbath, ten different young persons go to a prison to witness. Twenty prisoners, both Englishand Spanish-speaking, have already indicated an interest in studying the Bible as a result of the ministry. "Everybody is working for the Lord," Pastor Cabral reports happily. The influx of new members from the fall series brought the total number of persons baptized during 1990 into the Spanish Queens church to 90.

FEAST OF TABERNACLES CELEBRATED AT CO-OP CITY

It was a first for the Co-op City church in the Bronx. A "sukkah"

was built of lattice woodwork and covered partly by leaves. A group of believers, some of them of Jewish origin, met to mark the beginning of the eight-day Feast of Tabernacles or Sukkot in a service





lighted by candles, lamps, and parking lot lights.

(The word "Sukkah" is the Hebrew word describing the small, temporary dwelling booth that symbolized Israel's pilgrim life in the wilderness.) By constructing the booth and entering into the celebration, Co-op City members and friends were responding to Spirit of Prophecy encouragement:

"Well would it be for the people of God at the present time to have a Feast of Tabernacles—a joyous commemoration of the blessings of God to them. . . . Gratefully call to mind the various ways He has devised for bringing us out from the world, and from the darkness of error, into the precious light of His grace and truth . . . The Feast of Tabernacles . . . pointed forward to the great day of final ingathering, when the Lord of the harvest shall send forth His reapers to gather . . . the wheat into His garner" (Patriarchs & Prophets, pp. 540, 541).

Songs of joy and praise opened the service. Pastor Charles Corno and Mitchell Greenbaum, head elder, shared readings from Patriarchs and Prophets and The Desire of Ages, as well as texts in Hebrew and English.

Hanging pieces of fruit decorating the Sukkah were an object lesson for the children to help them understand that they are to be part of the Lord's harvest. A hymn of thanksgiving and three small prayer circles closed the meeting. The celebration served as a congregational reminder of Revelation 21:3: "Behold, the tabernacle of God is with men, and He will dwell with them, and they shall be His people, and God Himself shall be with them."

The first Pine Tree Academy, founded in Auburn, Maine, was a victim of the Great Depression, closing in 1932. In 1973 the academy reopened in Freeport, sharing the grounds with the Northern New England Conference campground, with the Freeport church, and an eight-grade church school. Will it be a victim of an "economic

downturn" in the 90's?

Some Seventh-day Adventist schools are having enrollment and tuition shortfalls. Providing affordable housing for faculty and students could make a difference between maintaining the only senior academy in Northern New England, or reverting to an eightor ten-grade church school.

For many years, non-commuting students have lived with teachers or host families from the local churches. Such housing is limited, and prevents the school from accepting additional students. A student home, to be built on six acres of school property, will house two faculty families and eight students. The projected cost is \$125,000. With \$36,000 already received, we need \$19,000 to break ground in May of 1991.
