## REACH OUT AND TOUCH OUR YOUTH

What can we expect from young people during the next ten years? An article in Fortune magazine (April 1980) gave the findings of research done to clarify the values and thinking of twenty-five-year-olds who would be at the helm in the business world on the eve of the twenty-first century. The study was eye opening. They believe to be successful one must be financially independent, and to accomplish this is to be at the top of a major corporation.

There is no "humble talk" among them. They believe in themselves, and that their abilities and capacities are superlative. They believe the corporate world and its institutions to be most worthwhile. They view marriage as "a drag on success," and an acceptable option if it does not interfere with their "success" aspirations.

Loyalty is not at the top of their list of values, and they are ready to move frequently to maximize upward mobility. They are convinced that they are more serendipitous and imaginative than those who currently hold top corporate positions, and that there isn't much they can learn from them before pushing them aside.

Don't panic! Don't let the survey drive you to a no-confidence vote on all youth. On the weekend of April 8 to 10, 1994, I met with the members of the President's Youth Commission in this Union. Listen to Christen Higby a college student, who wants youth to reach out and touch each other. "I would also like to encourage the adults. Not all of the youth are leaving the church, and some of us are as concerned as you are. I want to see a fire lit in the youth that can't be put out!"

The 1980's and 1990's have been difficult periods to establish an effective ministry to youth. It is often difficult to find someone who

will take the initiative to reach out and touch them.

If we are to develop successful youth ministries in the church that will prepare our young people to be well rounded spiritually, mentally, socially, and physically, we must look for ways to do so (see Luke 2:52). Let me suggest ways I have discovered in my personal contacts with youth that have worked: (1) Seek out dedicated people who will give of themselves. (2) Bible Study—Central to any successful youth ministry is creative serious Bible Study that is relevant and interesting. Without it, the program amounts to little more than entertainment. (3) Involvement—The future of our church depends on how adequately youth are involved as they prepare to assume leadership roles. If your church has a student who plans on Christian service, arrange to have that young person speak at one of the scheduled times of worship. (4) Inform the parents, churches, communities, and conferences of youth projects. (5) Make your ministries appealing. Youth are inundated by radio, television, and a variety of other media means to capture and shape their attitudes and values. Offer them alternatives. (6) Know what youth are interested in and plan with them events around those interests. (7) Discussion-An effective youth ministry can provide for the airing and discussion of a number of problems peculiar to modern youth. (8) Watch for evangelistic opportunities. And (9) Pray for the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

A viable youth ministry is difficult, but not impossible. It demands creative thinking and planning. Long hours will be involved in meeting their special needs, but the rewards are great. Won't you reach out and touch our youth?

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## First Ghanaian Adventist Pastor in North America Ordained in the Bronx June 11

The First Ghana Seventh-day Adventist Church, which is the first Adventist Ghanaian church organized in North America, was the scene for another spiritually significant "first" on Sabbath afternoon, June 11. Members, friends, denominational leaders and guests from the community gathered at the church in the Bronx for the ordination of Pastor Brempong Owusu-Antwi, the first Ghanaian pastor to be ordained to the Adventist ministry in North America.

The church sanctuary rang with the music of the congregation's youth and choral groups, who came forward in impressive processionals. The service was conducted in the Twi language, with simultaneous translation via small FM radios. Speaker for the occasion was Elder Matthew Bediako, a general vice president of the General Conference, and a native of Ghana.

Among those participating in the service of ordination were (l. to r.) Elders William McNeil, Church Ministries director of the Atlantic Union Conference; Robert Connor, then Conference Personal Ministries director, Pastor Brempong and Mabel Owusu; Elders Bediako, Merlin Kretschmar, then Conference president; and Willie Oliver, Atlantic Union Youth Ministries director. Elder Dionisio Olivo, Ministerial director, presented the Certificate of Ordination, and

Juanita Kretschmar, Conference Community Services director, officially welcomed Mrs. Owusu-Antwi to her special role in ministering as the wife of her newly ordained pastor-husband.

The numerous tributes shared throughout the afternoon service included words of support from local Ghanaian Methodist and Presbyterian pastors, as well as a consular official from the Ghanaian Embassy in Manhattan.

And even if you don't have downlink equipment, it's possible that someone could tape it for playing the following evening in your facility. Evangelist Billy Graham used this method last year with great success throughout Europe.

Already more than 350 pastors across North America have subscribed to the Net '95 concept, but lay members can also be evangelists with the satellite/video technology.

Materials for advertising and promotion, how to organize the meetings and much more how-to-do-it information is available by calling 1-800-253-3000. Tell the operator you want to join the Net '95 project. If you're ready to go and want a starter kit, call 1-800-982-3344.

In addition, a series of lay training events have been schedule, each tailored to your specific needs.

One mass lay training program has been scheduled for Keene, Texas, August 5 to 9, in connection with the annual ASI Convention. The program focuses on how you can assist your pastor in presenting the Net '95 program.

Other regional lay evangelist training events have been scheduled throughout North America, all designed to help laymen to conduct their own meetings using the video crusade series.

## CRUISING THE INFORMATION HIGHWAY

W ouldn't it be great if you could pose a question to someone at the Ellen G. White Estate office and get just the piece of information you need overnight or download a copy of an out-of-print Ellen G. White article or book? Or search for every article published in one of our magazines on the Sabbath, salvation by faith, or any other topic and then be able to retrieve those articles to your own computer? Or be able to join in on a live town hall meeting with Robert S. Folkenberg, president of the world church, Alfred McClure, president of the North American Division, or Mark Finley, speaker at It Is Written?

If you have a computer and a modem, you now can do all these things and much, much more. The Seventh-day Adventist Church now has an on-ramp to the information superhighway that you've been hearing and reading so much about the last few months.

Last April the General Conference and North American Division signed a contract with CompuServe to set up a Seventh-day Adventist forum on CompuServe that can be accessed by virtually any Seventh-day Adventist leader or member around the world. CompuServe was selected because of its rich, basic resources, ease of operation, low cost, and local access by 90 percent of the U.S. and Canadian population. Opening date for the forum was July 5.

In anticipation of this event, church leaders and members every-where were asking questions about the new SDA forum and how they can start driving on the information superhighway. What follows are the answers to some of the most frequently posed questions about the new SDA forum.

## What exactly is an "on-line service?"

An on-line service is to computer users what a CB radio is to 18-wheel

truckers. On-line services such as Prodigy, America Online, and CompuServe (the three most popular services) make it possible for computer users to post (or send) messages to other computer users anywhere in the country or (in the case of CompuServe) around the world.

On-line services are also excellent resources for getting all kinds of questions answered in a relatively short time. They have gigantic libraries of information that users can tap in to without leaving their living room chairs.

#### What does CompuServe offer?

CompuServe's "Basic Services" package includes anything from late-breaking news from the Associated Press and Reuters on-line, to answers to health questions on HealthNet.

CompuServe Mail processes regular E-mail, E-mail with a return receipt, fax, telex, paper mail in an envelope to a postal address, and connections to other popular networks and services (such as Internet and MCI) through a single interface. The \$8.95 monthly charge for the Basic Services package provides 180 single-page E-mail letters (or 60 three-page letters) for free.

#### What is a CompuServe forum?

In addition to the basic services, CompuServe has more than 600 special-interest forums. Included are more than 250 computer hardware and software forums, with some 400 computer-industry vendors ready to provide on-line help with their products.

It also has 4,000 software libraries and 2,000 databases (including Phone\*File, a national phone directory not found anywhere else) that users can access. In addition, CompuServe has full-text articles from more than 200 magazines and 60 newspapers.

### What does the SDA forum contain?

Like the other 600 forums on CompuServe, the SDA forum has 17 sections. Each of those 17 sections has a message area, a library area, and a conference room.

#### How will the forum work?

In addition to sending E-mail messages to another user (messages which only you and the recipient can read), CompuServe forums let users post messages for anyone to see and, of course, reply to. In the message areas of each forum, members may post a message, make a statement, or raise a question about any topic they choose.

#### How much does it cost?

Since this is a private forum, the cost will be a flat \$7 per month for unlimited use (instead of the \$4.80 per hour charged for using the other 600 public forums). The \$7 price is in addition to the \$8.95 monthly charge for CompuServe's 70-basic-services package (which includes 180 free pages of E-mail). CompuServe also offers an optional rate of \$2.50 per month (instead of \$8.95) if you do not want the Basic Services package.

#### How can I join the SDA forum?

You can join the SDA forum by calling (800) 260-7171 if you live in America, or (616) 471-6083 if overseas. You will need two pieces of information before you place the call: a Visa, Discover, or Master-Card, and which PC platform you plan to use to access the forum: Windows, DOS, or Macintosh.

After you have placed the call, the Adventist Information Ministry at Andrews University will bill your account \$15 and mail you a packet containing the CompuServe Information Manager.

As soon as the software arrives, install the software on your computer and follow the instructions

for signing up to CompuServe. The New Member Signup card enclosed in your packet will include a serial number, a temporary I.D. number, and a password. A few days later you will receive a permanent I.D. and password in the mail.

As soon as you sign up, the \$15 you spent for the software will be given back to you as a \$15 usage credit. In addition to the \$15 usage credit when you sign up, CompuServe provides the first month of basic services (\$8.95) and the first month of SDA forum usage (\$7) free. So you spend \$15, but end up getting back more than \$30 worth of on-line credit.

Conferences, unions, and church institutions planning to order 10 or

more software packets at a time can purchase them at a significant discount. (Contact the GC Communication Office at (301) 680-6300 for more information about bulk orders.)

Most people who have taken a drive on the information superhighway agree: once you have tried it, you will like it. You will meet people with vast experience in many areas of Christian life and work. You will appreciate chatting with the editor of your favorite SDA magazine, a professor at one of our colleges or universities, or a departmental leader at your own local conference office. You will find weekly current event updates for the Sab-

Menu plans are low-fat, no fat, low cholesterol, no cholesterol, and vegetarian. For those who eat meat, Hurd offers suggestions on how to make its preparation as healthful as possible.

The group's plan includes a Bike Hike, MS walk, nature walks, Healthy Weigh Banquet, Community Exercise Program, and Vegetarian Cooking School.

"One hundred years from now," he said, " it won't matter if you got that big break or bought that Mercedes. But one hundred years from now it will matter a great deal whether you made a commitment to Jesus Christ and kept it."

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
