oseph Owusu, the Personal Ministries leader of the First Ghana church, was recently interviewed by a NY Times reporter concerning how his faith affects his life in the workplace.

The article profiled the personal experiences of a number of workers

and professionals. Reporter Janny Scott selected Mr. Owusu from a list of several Greater New York Conference members supplied by the Communication Department.

Scott identifies Joseph as a Seventh-day Adventist accountant and immigrant from Ghana who is raising a family in the Bronx and who invested \$35,000 from personal savings and a loan in 1989 to buy a small grocery store. As it became known that cigarettes and beer wouldn't be sold, and the store would be closed from late Friday afternoons and Saturdays until evening, longtime customers soon stopped coming. The reduced clientele at the store, a place where residents had been accustomed to visiting or playing dominos, had an effect on neighborhood life. After six months, Joseph closed the store with a total loss of his investment.

A seemingly lost investment may well yield rich returns in the lives of readers moved by an individual's commitment to the Sabbath and not selling harmful substances. In addition, simply continuing on in faith, without bitterness or despair despite significant financial loss, conveys a strong witness to both believer and unbeliever alike.

MERIDEN SPANISH CHURCH DEDICATES CHURCH BUILDING

S abbath, January 14, 1995, was a day the Meriden Spanish family had been looking forward to for several years.

About nine years ago Sister V. Sanchez attended the Meriden English church. She was very desirous of having a Spanish church in her own language. While going to the church one morning she noticed a woman sitting alone in the park on a bench listening to the singing. She invited her to go with her. The woman was later baptized and the two women, along with the Mateo family, began the Meriden Spanish church, Elder Aleksander Davidovich was the first pastor.

What a joy it was for the members and guests to watch Southern New England Conference treasurer Dennis Millburn light a match to the mortgage, indicating the mortgage was paid on their church building and they could now dedicate themselves to soul winning and evangelism.

Elder Edison Gonzalez, pastor of the church, led out in the daylong celebration. Elder Aleksander

Davidovich spoke during the church service and Southern New England Conference president Charles C. Case, Sr., spoke during the afternoon dedication. Also assisting in the program were Mildred B. Case, wife of the president, who cut the ribbon, inviting the members to a newly dedicated church, Elder Marco Valença, Southern New England Con-

ference ministerial director, and Elder Osvaldo Utz along with many members assisted to make this a memorable day in the history of the Meriden Spanish church. "We are excited when a church family pays off the mortgage for a church building. Our members have been very faithful over the years and we have only about 20 church families that do not have their own church home,

SPANISH LAY PERSONS' FESTIVAL HELD IN MANHATTAN

Elder Griffin challenged the lay persons to target in their outreach during 1995 at least two new areas in which there is presently no Adventist presence.

Elder Torres noted that the goal of Greater New York Spanish churches is to win 1,000 souls for Christ in 1995; 660 were baptized in Spanish churches during 1994. At the time of the meeting, some 150 small groups were already prayerfully at work on the landmark goal.

Responding to a call to prayerfully unite with fellow members of all language groups in Greater New York, some 1200 persons stood in commitment to the work of evangelizing in the metropolitan New York area.

CARING FOR CREATION

D rotecting our environment is very much in vogue these days. It was not always so. On April 22, 1970, when Earth Day was celebrated for the first time, hardly anybody paid more than passing attention to the handful of people who paused to express their concern for our environment. Back then, environmentalists were summarily and disdainfully dismissed as eccentric tree-huggers whose message of preservation and conservation appealed only to longhaired freaks and arm chair intellectuals. Today, this is not the case. Environmental concerns are now high on the world's agenda. Politicians of every persuasion and environmentalists of every nationality voice their fears about our air, earth and oceans. When April 22 rolls around now, ceremonies commemorating the environment blossom around the world.

Not surprisingly, religious leaders have jumped on the environmental bandwagon, injecting into the issue a moral dimension. Standing up for the earth is viewed as Christian witnessing consistent with Jesus' opposition to oppression and exploitation. Thus, in his 1990 New Year's Declaration, Pope John Paul II summoned Roman Catholics to action in the ecology movement even as he prayed for peace with God and all creation. Later that year a major American Protestant denomination adopted a Statement of Faith in which it declared that Christians who endanger the environment deserve the condemnation of God.

What about the Seventh-day Adventist Church? Do we have anything to say about protecting our environment? Is environmental stewardship or caring for creation high on our agenda? Yes. At our last General Conference session, position statements addressing social issues at home and abroad were released by our church. In the posi-

tion statement that spoke to the issue of the environment, former General Conference President Neal Wilson wrote: "With our strong belief in creation—a doctrine that lies at the heart of the message of Revelation 14—Seventh-day Adventists should stand at the forefront of the struggle to save the planet." Wilson went on to say that "ecological responsibility and the belief in the imminent Advent are not mutually exclusive."

Our former General Conference president was on target. A bornagain Christian will not bury his or her head in the sand when it comes to social issues. Spirituality and social consciousness go hand in hand, and we err grossly whenever we attempt to drive a wedge between them.

So Christians in general, and Seventh-day Adventists in particular, have a responsibility to lead in caring for our earth. We are stewards of the environment, keepers of the garden, care-givers to creation. This is not an option we can either accept or reject, but a mandate that we must execute.

The Christian's ethic of ecology is based on the fact that this is still our Father's world, the devil's claims notwithstanding, and that our Lord wants us to occupy until He comes (Psalm. 24:1; Luke 19:13). Such an ecology of care will reject as patently absurd the idea that because God gave humankind dominion over the earth we can plunder and pillage the environment as we please. These actions are not only reckless and irresponsible but also immoral.

Some Christians fear standing in solidarity with those who champion environmental causes, believing that to do so gives tacit, if not outright, hospitality to pantheism. Still others mistakingly equate engaging the environment with earth spirituality, an untenable notion that should not be embraced. Environmental justice issues are patently compatible with the Christian dynamic and perspective.

How may we demonstrate stewardship of the environment? We can raise the consciousness level of others to environmental issues. We can challenge government and industry leaders to behave in ways that do not threaten our present and future world. We can lobby our legislators to enact laws and statutes which protect our environment. Industry must know that it is wrong to dump toxic waste into our water, to indiscriminately pollute our air, et cetera. A growing cadre of credible scientists currently claim that the "greenhouse effect," due in large part to industrialization gone awry, is to be blamed for the climatic extremes now plaguing our earth. Industry must not only answer to these charges, but also challenged to end its wanton and destructive ways.

There is much more we can do on an everyday, personal level to show our abiding concern for our environment. We can recycle, conserve energy, save water, use efficient transportation, et cetera.

For years, stewardship has been conceived of in terms of time, talent, body temple, and treasure. The latter has been thought of as dealing with money only. But treasure contemplates infinitely more than money. Our earth, made inhospitable by our recklessness, is a resource that must be treasured by us. Not to do so incurs the wrath and condemnation of God (Revelation 11:18). We must never forget that "The Lord God took the man

and put him in the garden of Eden to work it and take care of it." (Genesis 2:15 NIV)

EDUCATION DIRECTORS ATTEND COMPUTER SCHOOL

n February 13 and 14, two supervisors of education in the Atlantic Union Rosemary Tyrrell, associate director of education Atlantic Union, and Gary Temple, education superintendent for Southern New England Conference, observed firsthand the Virgil Hauselt Memorial Christian School (VHM) in Santa Cruz, California, in operation. This model technology school hosted the winter meeting of the North American Division and union education directors.

Marilyn Eggers, director of the Model Technology School project office, guided the educators through the school's philosophy and curriculum. She recruited several teachers and students to demonstrate the classroom instructional techniques using computers and video.

Three students directed by Pastor Marlan Knittel demonstrated their use of computer-generated visuals projected on a screen and presented in a Revelation Seminar which began in January.

"Our teachers have learned to change from being the sage of the stage to the guide on the side," Eggers remarked.

They are no longer intimidated by the computers but have learned

to use them to enhance the learning process, she added.

PROFESSIONALS DISCUSS YOUTH MINISTRY STRUCTURE

W hat can we do to bring youth ministry to the forefront of the Adventist agenda?"

More than 50 youth ministry professionals from across the division met to answer that question and discuss ways of meeting numerous issues confronting youth ministry during a Youth Ministry Symposium hosted by the Hancock Center for Youth Ministry at La Sierra University February 27 to March 1.

Participants included conference and union youth directors, three division youth directors-José Rojas (North American Division), Barry Gane (South Pacific Division), and Öle Kendel (Trans-European Division)-as well as youth pastors, chaplains, Bible teachers and others. Willie Oliver, youth director for the Atlantic Union,

was one of the many attendees.

"Youth ministry is not an option," said Barry Gane from Australia during a presentation of Valuegenesis data: "It's an imperative."

The group agreed that youth ministry is primarily local—it happens where youth are: at home, at school, at church; it is relational; and it is primarily accomplished by non-professional youth ministersparents, peers, teachers, church lay youth leaders.

"The primary task of professional youth ministry," suggested Stuart Tyner, Hancock Center director, "is document of 10 articles addressing the varied issues facing youth ministry. The most notable issues were the need to minister to Adventist students in public schools, the shared concern for "disavowed" youth ministry professionals, and the need for inter-cultural ministry, not just multi-cultural ministry. Other issues included the need for involving youth in the life of the church, uneven administrative

> support for professional youth ministry, confusion about salvation, the broad issues of standards and lifestyle, and many others.

So, what can be done to bring youth ministry to the forefront of the Adventist agenda? Participants concluded that a new appreciation of youth ministry must begin at the local church level.

The Hancock Center, as well as the Youth Resource Center at Andrews University, is prepared to help the local churches begin that educational process.

AUC'S UNIQUE ATHLETIC PROGRAM WINS NATIONAL ACCLAIM

"The Atlantic Union College way makes all the difference," noted WBUR's Bill Littlefield in his syndicated "Only a Game" radio program on March 11. Littlefield, writer and director of the program that is heard in thirty cities across the country, was impressed with Atlantic Union College's sports ethics program, and visited the campus to explore the ways in which competitive sports can work at a school that has traditionally avoided most forms of competition. The segment on AUC was picked up by National Public Radio for the next work day's issue of their radio news and magazine program, Morning Edition. "I was thoroughly impressed with AUC-with your students, your professors, and your administration," he added in a postproduction interview.

Stacy Nelson, AUC's physical education professor who founded the college's sports ethics program, directs and teaches physical education courses at the college-a multifaceted department that teaches classes in sports ethics, various athletic classes, and fitness and wellness. AUC's PE program also supports men's and women's basketball and women's volleyball at the varsity level, as well as men's club volleyball. Nelson's program has also been featured in the Worcester Telegram and Gazette.

When he founded the program eight years ago, Nelson was not convinced that sports really builds character; in fact he discovered research that indicated that the longer

a person participates in organized sports, the less honest, fair and responsible he or she becomes. Nelson adds, however, that, "There is nothing wrong with wanting to win-it's having to win and doing anything you have to to win that's wrong."

Striving for excellence is commendable: most Adventists have been raised with the idea that "Higher than the highest human thought can reach," is God's ideal for his people. Excellence in body, mind, and spirit has always been a goal for every Seventh-day Adventist, and there is excellence to be found in teamwork, cooperation and social relations, as well. AUC's PE Department teaches this high ideal in "Sports and Human Experience," a class in the ethics of sportsmanship. This is the only program in Seventh-day Adventist

education that specifically addresses the uses and abuses of participation in competitive sports while communicating the positive role that striving for common goals plays in a full Christian life.

Nelson has also been invited to lecture and present his program at the American Alliance of Health, Physical Education, Recreation, and Dance in San Francisco and Indianapolis and at the first International Sports Ethics Conference in Boise.

In the eight years since Stacy Nelson's program in sports ethics has been in effect, nearly six hundred students have benefited from AUC's approach to competitive sports, one of the few required classes of its type in the country. AUC's basketball and volleyball teams have won fourteen Colonial States and National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics trophies.

"What font should I use?" "Save your file on my disk and I'll print it later." "Look at the screen saver she has!" "You can start that program by finding the directory in program manager and double-clicking on the execute file." "Do you want me to create and install an icon for that game?"



Icons, windows, batch files, delete, mouse—the pupils at Bay Knoll Seventh-day Adventist church school in Rochester are learning a whole new language!

Last year when the school received some unexpected funds, the school board at Bay Knoll, led by then chair Dr. Karen Radke, decided to use the money for capital improvements. Luis Cortes, current chairman, and Gilbert Hernandez led the way in finding the best possible prices on new 486 IBM-compatible computers with CD-ROMs and printers.

Sixteen pupils returned from summer break to find one computer for every two children.

What great learning experiences the pupils are having! From not knowing how to power up the computers, even the second graders can now create, save, transfer, format, and print simple documents on WordPerfect for Windows. It's exciting to watch fourth graders doing their language assignments on the computer, and to watch them use spellcheck.

The children spend some time each week with a keyboarding program, math drills, spelling programs, and the new Adventist science program disks. The CDs provide a wealth of information and pictures and videodisks. Third grade enjoy watching the space shuttle and moon landing clips as they study space. The atlas program on the CD has provided many bulletin-board-size maps. Reports are made more attractive by importing graphics. Even the mistakes have been beneficial, as everyone learned the hard way to back up and save files frequently!

With one computer for every two pupils, it is possible for each pupil to use word processing programs for every subject. Each class can easily be rotated through the spelling, keyboarding and science programs.

We are thankful for the foresightedness and sacrifice made to provide these computers in our classroom.

first Issues of Women's Magazine Dedicated

When the first copies of Women of Spirit, the new magazine for Adventist women, were ready for shipping on March 20, Review and Herald employees gathered for a morning consecration service.

"Today, as Women of Spirit is being dedicated," said Junell Vance, Atlantic Union Women's Ministries director, "we are

as happy as butterflies coming out of their cocoons. Dreams do come true!"

Some doubted that the Adventist Church would develop a magazine just for women. But these doubters are happy to eat their words now that the premier issue is in the hands of more than 17,000 women from Texas to Newfoundland. "I've never seen a product that generated so much excitement in the field," says Doug Sayles, Review and Herald marketing vice president.

Elizabeth Sterndale, NAD Women's Ministries director and a long-time supporter of the magazine told Review and Herald em-

ployees, "You have launched in a path that will directly benefit the 400,000 women in the North American Division. And it will indirectly bless the rest of our membership whose lives are touched by wives and by friends who read the magazine."

Reacting to what she saw in the premier issue, Ramona Perez Greek, assistant director of NAD Women's Ministries, said "I really began to see that it was grounded in individual experiences, that it was immensely personal and that it represented the spiritual needs of women all across this division-their strengths and their potential as well as their areas of struggle.

Philippines VOP Campaign to Involve NA Churches—Goal: 50,000 Baptisms

"Target: 50,000" is the theme for the Voice of Prophecy's 50th anniversary in the Philippines during the first half of 1996. Evangelists from the island nation and North America expect to baptize 50,000 persons during the six-month campaign.

The Voice of Prophecy will be joined by teams from the Quiet Hour and Amazing Facts, as well as college students, pastors, and laypersons. It Is Written, ADRA, and the Andrews Gymnics have also been asked to participate. Iim Zachary, recently retired from the GC Ministerial Department, is the project coordinator.

"It's mind-boggling to contemplate this largest-ever Adventist evangelistic campaign," says Lonnie Melashenko, director-speaker of the Voice of Prophecy. "But we know that with the Lord's blessing, what seems impossible will become the miraculous."

The Voice of Prophecy has been on radio in the Philippines since July 11, 1946, only seven days after the Philippine Republic achieved sovereign status. Bible courses were quickly developed, and in recent years, the VOP added TV programs.

During a recent trip to the Philippines, Pastor Melashenko learned from one union conference leader that 50% of all their baptisms are a result of VOP work.






