The Spirit of Sacrifice!

During the days of World War II there was a great amount of public relations work utilized by the federal government to arouse a sense of patriotism in the young men of America. Giant billboards were used to send the message to the hearts of America's youth. Magazines carried the same picture which verbalized the same message from the same man—Uncle Sam.

There he was, wearing his top hat and beard. Uncle Sam was sending out his message and his finger pointed at every reader. The words were inescapable. UNCLE SAM NEEDS YOU!!

In the Bakersfield, California, church which I pastored from 1962–68, we had a tall, gray haired local elder who delighted in telling a war-time story when he was assigned to make the appeal for offerings. His story went like this:

"When our country was involved in World War II, lots of billboards and posters were seen all over the country to get people involved in supporting the cause of America as she fought to make other nations free. One day a pig and a chicken were in a field and they read the big billboard message—'Do Something to Help Your Country Win the War!'

"The chicken came up with a great idea. She told the pig that she would donate a dozen eggs to help the cause if the pig would give a pound of bacon. After thinking about the proposal, the pig responded and told the chicken that her donation was simply an offering BUT for a pig to donate a pound of bacon, that would be a sacrifice!"

Our members in Bakersfield never tired of hearing Brother Jackson tell that story. They were a congregation that loved to give for God's cause. Whatever the appeal, our members gave to the Lord and His blessings followed. Thirteenth Sabbath offerings, evangelism, conference offerings, Christian education—it didn't matter. They were a giving, happy body of believers and needs were always met!

LEADING EDGE TECHNOLOGY POWERS LATVIAN STUDIO

n one giant step the Church in Latvia has leaped over several generations of audio studio techniques to embrace computer editing, CD players and DAT recorders.

"Wherever possible Adventist World Radio (AWR) encourages studios to adopt new technologies," reports AWR Program Director Allen Steele. "In Eastern Europe

many technicians will never know the older techniques like cut and splice editing. Nor will they learn to cushion the drop of needles onto a 33 1/3 inch disk."

Steele was commenting on the opening of a studio in Riga, Latvia, designed to serve the newly independent nations of Estonia. Latvia and Lithuania. About two million people speak Latvian, 3.5 million Lithuanian and 1.5 million Estonian.

"These are small language groups," commented Gordon Retzer, AWR president. "However the unique nature of the language and the recent history of oppression of the local culture make language a key factor in national identity. AWR and the Euro-Asia Division are studying ways of producing materials for the Central Asia nations of the division where similar problems exist."

The studio is small but very nicely appointed and compares very favorably to any studio elsewhere in Europe. Both Lithuanian and Latvian are unique languages, sharing no kinship with other European tongues. And while Estonian is closely related to Finnish, it is distinct enough to demand its own programming.

The Baltic Union has appointed Girts Rosners, a former volunteer with AWR in Darmstadt, Germany, to head up the studio. In addition a program producer is being appointed for each of the three languages and another one for Russian. Representatives of the Trans-European Division, the Baltic Union and Adventist World Radio joined

ference Session Offering dedicated to AWR in part for broadcasting in Eastern Europe. AWR has allocated funds to Russia, Ukraine, Romania, Poland, Hungary, the Czech Republic, Croatia, Slovenia, Yugoslavia and Bulgaria.



THE RETURN OF SLAVERY

here is a very subtle slavery settling over North America. It enslaves without regard to ethnic background, age, gender, marital status, or income level. I am speaking of the bondage of debt. The Bible says, "The borrower is the servant [slave] to the lender"; (Proverbs 22:7), Ellen White called debt "one of Satan's nets, which he sets for souls" (The Adventist Home, p. 392). It is an understatement to say that debt is bad.

The effect that debt has on Christian families is staggering. It is

reported that the divorce rate within the Christian church nearly parallels that of the non-Christian world. I mention this because studies show that up to 90 percent of divorced couples point to financial difficulties as the major factor in the dissolution of their marriage. It follows then that if couples can work out a good financial plan, including the avoidance of debt, that their chances of having a successful marriage are greatly improved.

If you are out of debt thank the Lord and those who trained you! If you are in debt the following outline will help you to begin a debtelimination process that will bring financial freedom to your family.

When God blesses you financially, use the money to reduce debtnot to purchase more things

The plan is simple. It has a basic premise and three steps.

The basic premise is a commitment to God to be faithful with His holy tithe to access His wisdom and blessing (See Proverbs 3; Deuteronomy 28; Malachi 3; Matthew 6, 25). No one would honestly expect God's blessing while robbing Him. He is eager to bless those who obey

Step one is to declare a moratorium on additional debt. No more credit spending! If you don't borrow money, you can't get into debt. If you don't borrow any more money, you can't get further into

Step two is to make a covenant (promise or agreement) with God that from this point on, as He blesses, you will pay off your debts as quickly as possible. Set a target date for being debt-free. When God blesses you financially, use the money to reduce debt-not to purchase more things. This step is probably the most critical. The reason is that when most folks receive unexpected money, they simply spend it. But if you have made a covenant with God, you will then know what

to do with the extra money. You will apply it to your debt-reduction plan.

Step three is the hands-on practical part. Make a list of all your debts from the largest to the smallest in descending order. For most families the home mortgage is at the top of the list and a credit card or personal debt would be at the bottom. Begin by making at least the minimum payment due on each of your debts on a monthly basis. Next, double up or increase in any way you can your payments on the debt on the bottom of the list. You will be happily surprised how quickly you can eliminate that smallest debt. Then use the money that you were paying on the bottom debt to add to the basic payment on the next debt as you work your way up the list. As you eliminate your smaller high-interest debts, you will free up a surprising amount of money to place on the next higher debts.

Obviously, God does not want us in debt, so once the covenant is made many families find that God blesses them in unexpected ways and the debt is reduced faster than they had anticipated.

Most families have accumulated a considerable amount of "junk" over the years. Much of which they will never use. Many have found that by having a yard sale they can get rid of the stuff and in the process free up money for debt reduction.

Once you reach the home mortgage at the top of your debt list, you can begin to make additional payments on the principal of your loan thereby saving considerable interest that you would have had to pay and, of course, also reduce the length of the loan as well.

By following these three simple steps, many families have become debt free. You can too! By putting God first, you will receive His wisdom and blessing for managing what he has entrusted to you. By eliminating debt we are more free to participate in advancing the cause of God and in helping others-thereby storing up treasures in heaven.

Viewers who watch 3ABN on one of the 65 network downlink stations WILL NOT be affected by this satellite change.



AUC EQUIPS CONFERENCES FOR LOCAL MINISTRY

Through an innovative one-year personal ministries program, AUC has found a new path to reach more non-traditional students in three Atlantic Union conferences. Religion professor Francy Duran is coordinating a program to prepare Seventh-day Adventists to assist their church leaders in spreading the Gospel.

"Our main goal is to equip lay people to help their local ministry," said Duran. Students take five sixweek seminars in subjects including preaching the Gospel, the plan of salvation, and church growth. Graduates of the program will have gained practical skills to help lead their church, and will also receive college credit and a personal ministries certificate from Atlantic Union College. Intensive classes meet each Sunday from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., allowing people with a variety of schedules to attend.

AUC has a number of special programs for nontraditional students. Here, Adult Degree Program student Christine Cushing takes a study break with fellow students during last summer's ADP session. ADP allows working adults to pursue their education by attending a two-week session in January and a two-week summer session where they take mini-courses and design their courses and assignments for the semester. ADP students complete classes at home with help from AUC professors who communicate with them by phone, mail, and sometimes through e-mail.

students in the Greater New York. Northeastern, and Southern New England Conferences are participating at three centers in New York (two English, one Spanish) and one center in Connecticut (English). Local conference programs are coordinated by Elder George Knight,

> Greater New York Conference; Dr. Erskine Bovell, Northeastern Conference; and Elder Marco Valenca, Southern New England Conference. "We haven't had time to advertise, but already are wondering where to place all the people," Duran said. "Applications in the Northeastern Conference are piling upthey don't know what to do."

Duran credits much of the program's quick success to excellent teachers and motivated students. "The courses are not easy-all of our instructors are well-qualified and first-class teachers," he said. "Many of our students are not only very satisfied, but also want to continue their education. One student has already enrolled at AUC, and at least five more are interested in attending our college. This can be an excellent preparation for AUC's Adult Degree Program."

Many churches are already assisting their members with the program's \$650 yearly tuition. In Connecticut, one church is helping to send 25 of its lay people to Duran's classes. Participating conferences are also deciding on ways that they can help students financially.



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

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
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
