here are lessons for members of the Atlantic Union Conference in the history of God's dealings with ancient Israel which must never be forgotten. 
> alive, and healthy. They called upon the God of the Israelites for help. He was their source of strength and

MESSAGE TO THE DISCOURAGED

BEFORE YOU QUIT CHURCH

Recall the first time you entered the church building. You had a lot to look at . . . the pastor's face, the deacons, the faces of those seated near you. None of these concerned you. It was the face of the Invisible you were looking at. You were there because you were seeking God with the burning ardency of first love.

Having found God, you accepted Him by accepting His life as standard for your own and that was how you came to love those people around you. With your adoption into the church family, you became familiar with the fine features of this family . . , and the faults as

well. One day you were rubbed the wrong way too roughly and the faults had magnified in your eyes since then. You began looking at nothing else.

Meanwhile, there exists a class of people in the church who look not upon anything but the face of the Invisible Almighty. How do you tell that they do? From the steadfast seriousness with which they regard their church membership. To them, their membership is God's designation as to where and with whom they will serve Him according to a particular purpose of His in a particular time frame. They are not "freelance" churchgoers. They know that it is not a commitmentfree religion Christ is calling them to. These church members comprise the true community of faith.

The community of faith is personified in the Scriptures by Moses who "feared no wrath because he kept looking at the face of the Invisible Almighty" (Heb. 11:27). This piece of Scripture carries a lot of weight especially nowadays when conflicts and contradictions take place not only in the home, not only in society . . . but even in the church. It describes how Moses remained unmoved by the most painful of tribulations. The pharaoh threatened to kill him but that did not stop him from going where God designated him to go. The Israelites rebelled, murmured against him in the wilderness but he never gave in, never looked back. Tempted to leave God's service, he must have asked himself what is more important: this world or the world to come? Likewise today, there are people in church who ask the same question, and, like Moses, endure where God wants them to be even though they may face criticism or censure. Not intimidated by visible pharaohs around them but rather

they wait for God to fulfill the purposes for which He called them to such a place.

Look only at temples, at altars, deacons, elders, or at church leaders, and you will be in trouble. The agenda of the church is not the deacons, not the elders, not the pastor, not you, not your favorite brethren. The agenda of the church is the Lord.

Things in church may go wrong, many times. Rest, if you must, but do not quit. You might succeed through the next blow. Success is

actually failure turned upside down. The quitter never wins and the winner never quits. Never look back, never back off. Hold out in the midst of unpleasant circumstances and by tomorrow's miracle, you may not see them any more.

You may make mistakes but still, God is saying to you, 'I need you here."

Do not let anyone write you off, or let anyone else be written off. You may make mistakes but still, God is saying to you, "I need you here." To your fellow blunderer, you should likewise say, "Brother or sister, we love you, we do not want to lose you."

Mountains of difficulties may be before you. There is always something you may not like in your home or workplace, but you hold on. Now if difficulties occur in the church, you may not like this or that, are you to hold out less firmly? Or shall you 'endure and keep looking at the face of the Invisible Almighty"?

There is no kind of weakness, no curse God's grace cannot handle. His grace is not something set in the biblical past; it is available to you in the now, enabling you to remember no other motive in churchgoing except to have the reality of God's face ever before you, to even sing through your irritation and vexation, through tension and friction: "By the grace of Christ . . . I'm holding on!"

News Update from March 17 Plenary Meeting in Florida Conference Office

NET '96 is taking on an intercontinental flavor and may become the largest multichurch and multilingual evangelistic crusade in the history of the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

The telecast originating from Orlando, Florida, October 5 through November 9, will be seen by people in an expected 2,000 churches in North America. The present count is 1,600, according to Coordinator

Don Gray, but he expects the final total to be 2,000.

Added to the churches in North America, are 1,000 churches using English, Spanish and French languages in the Inter-American Division.

Two hundred Spanish- and Portuguese-speaking churches in the South American Division are expected to be on line. NET '96 will be carried also to at least 300 more con-

gregations of the Euro-Africa and Trans-European Divisions using the German and Romanian languages. This makes a total of six different languages for NET '96 in Europe.


North American Hispanic Coordinator, Louis Torres, reports 92 Hispanic churches are presently enrolled in NET '96. He expects the final total to be 200 churches out of the 400 in North America.

churches in the state of Connecticut. (In some of these places our publications are very well known.) Our books and videos have been announced on television and during different radio programs, making the work of the literature evangelists a little more enjoyable. The Holy Spirit motivates for success. We are convinced that 1996 will be the year of great victory now that we are going to have the Bible Story series in animated videos. A set of 15 videos will be available in English and Spanish.

A few months ago we were able to have one of the most successful training schools for new literature evangelists. Laying to rest rampant rumors about the immediate future of Atlantic Union College, Seventh-day Adventists in the Atlantic Union registered a strong vote of support for the college, declaring that church members certainly intend for the school to be fully operating next year and will take responsibility for the challenges and risks attached to maintaining a Seventhday Adventist college in the northeast.

By a margin of more than 4 to 1, delegates to a special constituency meeting of the Atlantic Union Conference voted to continue operations at the 114-year-old institution.

Following a full day of frank reports about the school's financial troubles, the Atlantic Union constituents also voted to commit \$1 million beyond the Union's regular subsidy annually for the next five years. This will lay the foundation for a strong turnaround for Atlantic Union College. Adventist

constituents further voted for college administration to explore affiliations with other Adventist educational institutions.

With this in mind, Union delegates voted to give AUC the go-ahead to operate on what administrators described as a "survival budget" for the 1996-1997 school year. The budget calls for reducing operation costs by nearly 40 percent, and includes a possible sliding-scale faculty sacrificial pay cut of up to 17 percent.

Alfred C. McClure, president of the North American

Division of Seventh-day Adventists, reaffirmed the Division's belief in the power of Adventist education: "The North American Division wants Adventist higher education to flourish in the northeastern part of the United States as much as Atlantic Union constituents do. But," he added, "Faith without works is dead. And God works through you and me—

The answer is in your hands."

Over the next few years, however, the focus of the evening broadened as the guest list began to include friends from the Chandlers' jobs and church. And so, the "Chandler Annual Family Dinner" was born.

Eight dinners later, the highly anticipated event has taken on a life

HURRICANES HUGO AND ANDREWS, MISSISSIPPI FLOODS, GREAT BARRINGTON TORNADO— WHERE WERE WE?

We were right there as part of the Adventist Disaster Response (ADR) team helping the victims of these disasters. But we can't do it alone!

Sixty Adventists gathered in February at Camp Winnekeag for Disaster Training presented by Adventist Community Services (ACS). Southern New England Conference invited Larry Buckner, Director of Disaster Planning & Response, to lead this training.

The objective was to teach Seventh-day Adventists how to respond to the needs of people in times of disaster as an ADR volunteer (a volunteer network organized by ACS). Lectures on disaster preparedness & emergency disaster distribution were given. The group discussed in detail the steps to effective collection of necessary goods—receiving, processing, sorting, and packaging them for distribution to disaster victims.

In agreements with the Federal Emergency Management Agency and the American Red Cross, ACS is recognized as the major organization responsible for emergency distributions. Such commodities as drinking water, groceries, diapers, clothing, and personal items are just a few of the items distributed to disaster survivors by the ADR teams. Mass feedings, disaster child care and door-to-door visitations to victims are other services provided.

Attendance this year increased 300 percent. By 1997 we hope to

increase attendance and have functioning Disaster Teams and Centers in the SNEC. Our ultimate goal is to have every church within the NAD with a functioning team. This means that we all have heeded the charge to help the weak, the poor, the sick and the needy. You may think that a Tsunami or a volcanic eruption are no need for worry in New England, but are you ready to deal with a fire, a winter storm, a thunderstorm? Are you ready to handle a disaster in a nearby community? Are you ready to help?

At age 66 when most of us would be thinking about retirement and settling into the easy chair, Mrs. Hulda Crooks strapped on her boots and backpack and made her first climb to the top of Mt. Whitney. That was in 1962. To date she has made the 14,495 foot ascent 23 times, astonishing younger hikers on the trail and inspiring others around the

world with her healthful lifestyle and simple faith in God.

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
