Gathering Shadows

WARNED by the Spirit of prophecy we, as a people, have long expected that there would come a time of fiery trial, when the opposition of the enemy would reach a crescendo of hate toward true commandment-keepers.

We live to-day in a world in which anything may happen. Even now we can see "coming events cast their shadows before them." A recent issue of the *British Weekly* carried a striking article on the state of evangelism in Italy. Describing the persecution and restrictions imposed upon evangelicals the writer goes on to say:

"The Seventh-Day Adventists received orders to close their stations, but have been temporarily spared through the intervention of a high foreign official and personal friend of the official charged with carrying out the work."

Reading these words brings vividly to mind the statement of Sister White in *Great Controversy*, page 610:

"God also has His agents among the leading men of the nation. The enemy moves upon his servants to propose measures that would greatly impede the work of God; but statesmen who fear the Lord are influenced by holy angels to oppose such propositions with unanswerable arguments... When the final warning shall be given, it will arrest the attention of these leading men through whom the Lord is now working, and some of them will accept it, and will stand with the people of God through the time of trouble."

Referring to the persecution of one particularly aggressive group of believers in the above-mentioned country, the writer of the same article remarks:

"These persecuted people still manage to maintain their meetings in secret places, such as caves and other secluded spots."

We are told that this will yet be the experience of God's faithful people.

"As the decree issued by the various rulers of Christendom against commandment-keepers shall withdraw the protection of government, and abandon them to those who desire their destruction, the people of God will flee from the cities and villages, and associate together in companies, dwelling in the most desolate and solitary places. Many will find refuge in the strongholds of the mountains."—"Great Controversy," pages 625, 626.

Let us be forewarned. Let those of us who enjoy unrestricted liberty improve the swiftly passing opportunity to win souls to the truth. The night cometh!

Another Training School for South America

ONWARD, forward, that is our world motto and every Seventh-Day Adventist believes in it. We are a missionary people with a message, and it is our solemn charge to proclaim it. We must be ever advancing in spite of difficulties. These will never be less, yet promises of victory are given to God's people.

South America offers unique opportunities for the preaching of the Advent message. The two main languages spoken are Spanish and Portuguese; the latter, however, is only spoken in Brazil, which comprises nearly half of the South American continent and includes twenty states with a population of over forty-four millions. Of these a little over half a million are Indians. Brazil is a progressive country, with large modern cities dotted along the extensive Atlantic coastline. Rio de Janeiro, the capital of Brazil, and famous for its beauty, is surrounded by evergreen vegetation, kissed by bright sunshine, bathed by the blue sea, and is attracting tourists from all over the globe, and challenging our people to more aggressive work among its unwarned millions.

Brazil is organized into three Unions with about eighty workers. It has one publishing house and one training school, both located close to the industrial city of Sao

Paulo. To give the message to these millions in Brazil is one of our great problems. As in other countries nationalism is coming more to the front and we must look to the youth of Brazil to carry, in a large measure, the message to its own people. Our training school has furnished a number of workers, yet it is the conviction of the leaders that, due to the immense territory, only a limited number of our young people can attend the school. The South American Division, during its annual meeting in December, has approved of the establishment of another training school more to the north, which can serve the northern field with a population of about seventeen millions. Elders E. E. Andross and D. A. Ochs, representatives of the General Conference, were present at this council and described this resolution the most outstanding and progressive decision.

The Thirteenth Sabbath Offering on September 25th will benefit this project. We are indeed thankful that its overflow will help us to swell our funds, and that a new educational centre may soon benefit hundreds of young people in the northern part of Brazil.

We appeal for a liberal offering for Brazil. The need of the hour demands it. The Spirit urges us to go forward and blesses you as you share with us in helping to solve the problem of a more rapid advance of the message.

Good News from Spain

ONE of our evangelists from Spain, who recently passed through London, brought the good news that none of our people have been killed in the insurrection.

Some of the Spanish believers have had to seek refuge away in the hills. One was hiding in a cornfield when, just a few feet away, the soldiers were burying others they had slaughtered.

Our evangelist himself was in great danger. Four armed men seized him; the fanatical officer raved and threatened him. "This man is a Protestant; send him out of the country! Turn the Fascists loose on him," he commanded. Only the prompt action of the consul saved him from assassination.

One of our believers is doing good work in the hospitals of beleaguered Madrid, where he has opportunity to help the wounded and care for the dying. While shells are screaming around and bombs are falling he is carrying on his work of mercy and compassion.

Until the war broke out almost a score of colporteurs were at work selling Gospel literature in Saragossa, Valladolid. Spain. Toledo, Valencia, Madrid-these centres were all visited by colporteurs with the Spanish This Mighty Hour! Half the edition had been sold before the fires of revolution flamed up. "People have been reading This Mighty Hour! and Great Controversy. Many souls in Saragossa are waiting to be baptized," declares our evangelist. "There will be a harvest of souls from Spain," he avers.

The great power pointed out in prophecy will soon endeavour to hinder Adventists from spreading the Gospel in our own free land. Let our believers scatter tracts and papers in every city, village, and town, and thus foil his purpose.

"This Mighty Hour" Colporteur Opens His Work in **Portuguese Islands**

In fact Brother Freire gathered a group of interested people together and instructed them in the Sabbath truth and other points of faith before coming back to Lisbon. Since his departure, this little group has continued in the "lighted way" and now they beg for a missionary and pastor.

The Temple Bells

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THEY have to wake their gods with bells, these priests in saffron robes. Their bodies are painted with holy ashes by the temple wells. Then, like children at their play with dolls, the priests pretend the gods awake. The gods of stone or brass or gold are bathed carefully, then rubbed with oil and perfume, and robed most tenderly in broidered cloth of silver tissue, silk, or gold. Then they are decked with jewels rare and jasmine flowers fair. [Ring bells.]

This is the early morning hour before the sunrise. The priests begin the ringing of the bells. They walk around the gods three times and shake their bells vigorously. Then the ablutions of the gods proceed reverently. Now the gods are ready to receive the homage of the villager who jumped up from his earthy bed when he first heard the bells proclaiming that the hour of worship was at hand.

The villager also goes to the village well to bathe if he is poor. If not, his women folk and servants bring him water in brass jugs, and he bathes upon his doorstep. He then rubs his body with ashes, also his forehead, and combs his raven locks. Then he goes to the temple to pay due homage to the gods and leave his offering.

Before his favourite god he throws himself upon his face. He says, "To-day I go to work in that new field. Oh, god, let not the evil spirit there oppress me! If thou wilt keep away these vile spirits, I'll give to thee a silken shawl most costly. And unto thy holy servants give I the firstfruits of that field. God, hear my humble prayer; bless

The sightless eyes in the god's stony head stare on. The stony ears hear nothing, nor is the stony heart moved. Beneath silken robes and jewels, a million gods like these in India's land fail to defend the poor from evil spirits or to give comfort. Nor can they whisper in a still small voice, "This is the way, walk ye in it." Only the God who made earth and heaven, and all that in them is can whisper thus to the human heart. Hear His loving voice.

He whispers now to you: "Will

you not send help to My dear people in far away India's land, who still bow to idols? They, too, must hear the Gospel news, these children of Mine who have suffered long in chains of caste and superstition."

Isaiah said of old: "Lord, here am I, send me." Perhaps you cannot go, but you can send your gold that others may be sent to tell the glad news of salvation to the poor in the land of India.
