

PRAYER AND SACRIFICE

WORLD events in 1960 have, without doubt, been watched by Seventh-Day Adventists everywhere with very deep concern: Agadir, Chile, Cuba, the Congo, the Paris Summit, and now as I write, the seriously divided United Nations Assembly in New York. Surely these developments and so many others, all crowded into the short period since our last annual Week of Prayer, are of extraordinary significance to those who believe and preach as we do. And we are probably not assuming too much when we regard them as Heaven's reminders that the days we have left in which to work are rapidly ending, and what we still have to do must be done quickly.

This thought should cause every one of us to solemnly review both our denominational and our personal programme, and decide whether and where we have been remiss or negligent or indifferent in the discharge of the responsibility that God has placed upon us. If we have been remiss we must surely determine to put our house, service-wise, in order, and address ourselves to a task that will measure fully to the demands of this hour.

But it is not the salvation alone of others that should be weighing very heavily upon us: we ourselves also have a very personal interest in the events that are happening in the world. Are they arousing within us feelings of joyful hope and of assured confidence, or is there a degree of uncertainty, perhaps even fear, as we contemplate their full import? Of the danger the apostle Paul makes us tragically aware when he says, "Lest that by any means, when I have preached to others, I myself should be a castaway." 1 Cor. 9:27. And again, "We ought to give the more earnest heed to the things which we have heard, lest at any time we let them slip. For . . . how shall we escape, if we neglect so great salvation?" Heb. 2:1-3. How appropriate also to our time, and especially to a Week of Prayer like this, are the words of the beloved disciple who declared: "Look to yourselves, that we lose not those things which we have wrought [margin, gained], but that we receive a full reward." 2 John 8.

With the day of that reward now so obviously near at hand, shall we not during the coming Week of Prayer determine that no neglect, either of our mission or of our own soul's individual need, will place in jeopardy the glorious reward that God has for each one of His children? And ought not the words of our Saviour Himself to be sounding afresh in our hearts: "What is a man profited, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?" Matt. 16:26.

In addition to a re-dedication of our lives and service, the Week of Prayer gives opportunity also to dedicate our means to the advancement of the message we preach. On Sabbath, November 19th, the greatest free-will offering of the year will, as in previous years, be received from our church membership in all the world. To this offering both workers

and lay members alike are invited, where they possibly can, to contribute a week's income for the cause of missions, and how comforting it is to know that God can still use these material things of ours as agencies in hastening His coming kingdom.

We wish for our workers and members throughout the Northern European Division God's rich and abundant blessing, as we unitedly dedicate to Him our lives and service and means in this momentous yet still urgently needy hour of earth's history.

Revival and Reformation

THE Week of Prayer affords a golden opportunity for us to seek and enjoy the pardon and peace of God's love. This is an ever-recurring need for each of us. The Lord's messenger wrote, back in 1902: "God calls for a spiritual revival and a spiritual reformation. Unless this takes place, those who are lukewarm will continue to grow more abhorrent to the Lord, until He will refuse to acknowledge them as His children."—The Review and Herald, Feb. 25, 1902.

I am sure that this call for revival and reform is no less needed today than sixty years ago. It is especially at this time, during the Week of Prayer, that we should personally seek for a revival of spiritual warmth and a reformation of life and habits that will bring a deepening of the spiritual experience.

In this connection I have before me a paper called *The Reformation Herald* which purports to be the "General Church Paper of the Seventh-Day Adventist Reform Movement." This slavishly copies our official church paper, *The Review and Herald*, and it contains many quotations from Sister White's writings. It also gives a picture of a "Brother Herrick" who represents the Reform Movement in Britain. It would appear from this magazine that the reformation required is of the denomination rather than the individual, and that what the member must do is to transfer from the parent body to the splinter group.

Doubtless these so-called reformers are sincere and earnest men. A perusal of their standards would suggest this, but we must ask in all seriousness, Does the Advent movement need to be reformed? Is the revival called for by the Lord's messenger one for the individual or for the organization? Let us examine the call that Sister White issued.

"A revival and a reformation must take place, under the ministration of the Holy Spirit. Revival and reformation are two different things. Revival signifies a renewal of spiritual life, a quickening of the powers of mind and heart, a resurrection from spiritual death. Reformation signifies a reorganization, a change in ideas and theories, habits and practices. Reformation will not bring forth the good fruit of righteousness unless it is connected with the revival of the Spirit. Revival and reformation are to do their appointed work, and in doing this work they must blend."—*Ibid*.

A prayerful study of this important statement should convince us that this is a personal and individual work. The organized movement has not departed from any basic doctrine; it still proclaims the saving truths that have characterized the church from its inception. A study of the so-called "Reform" paper does not elicit any vital teaching that is not part of the Advent message. The Lord's messenger has stated that "the truth that God has given for His people in these last days should keep them firm when there come into the church those who present false theories. The truth that has stood firm against the attacks of the enemy for more than half a century must still be the confidence and comfort of God's people."—Testimonies, Vol. 9, pages 69, 70.

blue-print. "Let none entertain the thought that we can dispense with organization. It has cost us much study and many prayers for wisdom that we know God has answered, to erect this structure. It has been built up by His direction through much sacrifice and conflict. Let none of our brethren be so deceived as to attempt to tear it down, for you will thus bring in a condition of things that you do not dream of. In the name of the Lord I declare to you that it is to stand, strengthened, established, and settled.... Then let everyone be exceedingly careful not to unsettle minds in regard to those things that God has ordained for our prosperity and success inadvancing His cause."—Testimonies to Ministers, pages 27, 28.

The reform and revival, therefore, are for the members of the church. It is easier to find fault with the church than to put right the wrongs in one's own life. But God calls "for a spiritual revival and a spiritual reformation." We need to examine our Sabbath-keeping, our tithe-paying, our Bible study and prayer life, our practice of health reform, our attitude to our neighbours and fellow-members. In these areas there is room for reform. Our missionary zeal, our fervent devotion to the Lord Jesus, our testimony to a living and fresh experience in faith and grace need reviving. No-one is called to reform his brother and revive the church so much as to reform his own "ideas and theories, habits, and practices." The spurious reformer seeks to disrupt the organization and sit in judgment on his fellows. The genuine reformer cries out, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner."

Prayerfully meditate on these pointed testimonies from the Spirit of prophecy:

"There is certainly great need of a change in the present order of experience; for the sacredness of present truth is not realized as it should be, but *the change we need is a change of heart*, and can only be obtained by *seeking God individually* for His blessing, by pleading with Him for His power, by fervently praying that His grace may come upon us, and that our characters be transformed. *This is the change we need today*, and for the attainment of this experience we should exercise persevering energy and manifest heartfelt earnestness."—The *Review and Herald*, March 22, 1892. (Italics mine.)

The message which Christ sends to His church, which is the one object on earth on which He bestows His supreme regard, is, "As many as I love, I reprove and chasten: be zealous therefore, and repent." Rev. 3:19. We live in the time, not of Ephesus, which was the apostolic age; nor of Sardis, which was the reformation age; but of Laodicea, which is the age of the judgment hour. And knowing the time of our visitation, we should know the maladies that afflict us, and the remedy offered by the Great Physician. The Spirit of prophecy applies this interpretation: "But let these murmurers see their hearts, and compare their lives with the practical teachings of the Bible, let them humble their souls before God, let the grace of God illuminate the darkness, and the scales will fall from their eyes, and they will realize their true spiritual poverty and wretchedness. They will feel the necessity of buying gold, which is pure faith and love; white raiment, which is a spotless character made pure in the blood of their dear Redeemer; and eyesalve, which is the grace of God, and which will give clear discernment of spiritual things, and detect sin."-Testimonies, Vol. 3, page 254.

It is God's plan that every member should be a personal soul-winner, and to this end we shall devote our lives in the year to come.

The soul-winning activities of the remnant church were shown to Sister White in a vision, which she described in the following words:

"Hundreds and thousands were seen visiting families, and opening before them the Word of God. Hearts were convicted by the power of the Holy Spirit, and a spirit of genuine conversion was manifest. On every side, doors were thrown open to the proclamation of the truth. The world seemed to be lightened with heavenly influence. Great blessings were received by the true and humble people of God. I heard voices of thanksgiving and praise, and there seemed to be a reformation such as we witnessed in 1844."—Testimonies, Vol. 9, page 126.

We earnestly believe that this prophecy will be fulfilled, and we are also aware of the fact that we are the ones to fulfil it. The human race is living in its closing hour of probation, and the time has

come when we, as God's people, ought to unite our efforts in doing God's work in the power of God's Spirit.

Probably none of us are conscious of having received many talents with which to work for Him, but all of us have been given at least one talent so that we can work for the salvation of that one soul around whom we are concentrating our efforts during this coming year.

Souls are not won by haphazard efforts. It requires great sacrifice and great effort on behalf of the worker. In the Gospel we have the beautiful example of Jesus who went out in search of the one lost sheep. He realized that it was missing. He knew that it was not in the fold, so He set out to find it, and He kept on searching until His efforts met with success, and the sheep was brought home.

Dear fellow believers, we appeal to you now to do the work of a good shepherd. We ask you to go and seek for that one sheep. Take this upon you as a special burden during the year to come, and plead with God that He might give you strength, love, patience, and endurance enough, so that your searching will not be in vain, and then your own heart will also be blessed by seeing a sheep brought home to the fold.

Can You Help Me?

"CAN you help me, Doctor? My baby isn't growing. He is now eleven months old and weighs only ten and a half pounds. Can you help him?" I looked at the little bundle of misery. Its legs and arms were only skin over bone. It had never stood, had only two or three teeth, could hardly raise its head, and whined piteously.

"Just another case of malnutrition," I thought, and yet there was something especially appealing about the young Hindu mother.

Yes, we have many East Indian people here. Many years ago the British attracted quite large numbers of people from India to work on the sugar planta-

tions. Also there were many brought in from Africa, and the two races have lived here together. There has been some intermingling between them, the Chinese and Portuguese and the native South Americans resulting in an extremely mixed population, but this little mother was apparently pure East Indian.

There were tears in her eyes as she pleaded for help. "O doctor, can he live? Will he die?" She wept piteously. I was happy to assure her that her baby probably would live. Some of the makers of baby foods in North America have been very kind in supplying us with a large number of samples which we can give away. One of these was given to this distressed mother. We were happy to see in her hand a copy of a tract that we provide in the rack in the waiting room. With many a "thank you," she left the clinic.

In the waiting room we provide truth-filled literature of many kinds which is freely taken by our patients. I saw one man with quite a handful. Our clinic Bible worker keeps an eye open for these people and visits them as she can. Just yesterday she told me of new interests and new decisions and requests for baptism. She told me of several with whom she is working who can hardly wait for her visits, and are eagerly accepting the message of the soon-coming Saviour.

About a week after the first visit, the little East Indian mother and her baby returned. The baby looked much improved, looked about at its surroundings, and the scales told the happy story of a gain of several ounces of weight. All was happiness now with the brighter outlook for the baby.

It's the same old story as is heard from every mission station over this broad world of the ravages of disease, pain, suffering, and death. The same mute cry arises from countless hearts who know not "Our Father," and have no knowledge of a Saviour. British Guiana is no exception to the rule. They are a people engrossed in the mad rush for gold, striving feverishly for gain, for power, for ease in this life, yet never gaining it. Here are a people who need, ob, so badly, a knowledge of God and His Word, and yet are totally ignorant of how to satisfy that need.

A young man, dressed in the garb of a Hindu teacher, knocked at our front gate. He was a bright, intelligent, educated-looking man. He said he had been seeking work in our city, but had found none. It was Sabbath morning, and we also had no work, but we brought him into the kitchen and he ate with very evident relish. Why had he had no food since Friday noon? His story was interesting.

He had come from his home near Georgetown to seek employment. While walking the streets during the day he returned to the Hindu temple at nightfall to spend the night. A new idol had just been received from India, and all the Hindus from far and near had come to see and worship. Our young friend was present at the ceremony. But a new and different light had been falling on his pathway for some months past. He had read, "Thou shalt not bow down thyself to them." So, when the signal was given for worship, he stood upright. The anger of the worshippers was immediately stirred, and he was expelled from the temple. Up to that time he had been getting one meal a day at the temple, but now that was cut off, and as he presented himself at our gates he was hungry.

After breakfast we invited him to go to church with us, and he was all eyes and ears at the service. Because of the presence of our young friend, and others similarly not too familiar with Christianity, the study that morning went back to some of the fundamentals of Christian belief. To bring out the point, the question had been asked, "What is the effect of Christianity in the individual life?" Several good answers had been given by our older members, when to my surprise our new friend stood, volunteering an answer. He said, "It puts new life in old bones." His answet seemed to show more knowledge than we had thought he possessed. That Sabbath afternoon he returned to his home in the interior. We contacted the pastor in his district who has been seeking him out for further instruction.

Is the field white, ready for the harvest? Is the Macedonian call audible in our ears? Would that every Seventh-Day Adventist could spend one day in a mission clinic, to hear the crying babies and children and see the tear-filled pleading eyes of the helpless mothers. Would that they could see the little starved bodies which have grown but slightly since birth, not so much because there is no food, but because mothers and fathers are bound by superstition and ignorance, and do not know how to use what they have.

This is the work of the limited clinic now operated in British Guiana. We need, yes, we must have, greater facilities for the care of these people. Please help us by planning now for a large Thirteenth Sabbath overflow offering, which is destined to come to Inter-America. DR, FLOYD BATES,

Health Education Centre

"KEEP the work of health reform to the front, is the message I am instructed to bear." (Quoted in *Evangelism*, page 263.) Again we are counselled "do medical missionary work and thus you will gain access to the hearts of the people. The way will be prepared for more decided proclamation of the truth."

Since January 1st this year, 596 applications for the health education course have come in through our advertisement in *Good Health*. During the same ten months of 1959 there were only 169 applications, an increase of over 300 per cent.

Since the beginning of September, Granose Foods Ltd. have been advertising the health lessons by inserting an advertising card in their products. In just two months 449 applications have been

received and are now coming in at the rate of about 75 a week. Those who complete the fifteen health lessons will be offered a Bible course. It is very refreshing to work with the various departments of the church as they co-operate together in an attempt to reach people with a knowledge of the truth.

Two week after we started broadcasting from Monaco, we started to receive more correspondence from Spain and other countries than we had ever received before. From hundreds and thousands of homes in the Peninsula Iberica many people write to us asking for Bible lessons, but it is not only from this place. We receive hundreds of letters as a result of the broadcast from Monte Carlo, from Germany, France, Switzerland, England, Portugal, North Africa, Yugoslavia, Italy, Holland, Belgium, and other countries—from people who understand the Spanish language.

We have received letters from U.S. Marines who were navigating in rough sea and heard our "La Voz de la Esperanza" programme and asked for Bible lessons and all that we offer.

We give thanks to God for these wonderful results and we trust many souls may be brought to the kingdom of God through this new outlet.
