The Brotherhood of Man

A timeless truth that across the centuries has fitted many contexts, now walks into our day as though the words were from God Himself: "Ye shall not see my face, except your brother be with you." Gen. 13: 3. Perhaps no other statement in the Bible drives home the truth of the brotherhood of man as emphatically as these words which Joseph spoke to his brethren.

The truth concerning the brotherhood of man is the third basic element in the Christian religion. Christianity is a triangular religion: first there is "God," then the "Soul," and thirdly "My Brother." Christianity starts with the love of God, but it does not stop there. Christianity meets the deep needs of the individual soul, but it cannot end there. "My Brother" must become a living reality in our relationship to God and to our fellow men.

At no time in man's history has there been a greater need for the practical demonstration of human brotherhood than today. Louis M. Mann has stated the need correctly: "Science has annihilated time and space, and this world thus made physically smaller must become spiritually larger. Isolation is now an impossibility, and if it were a possibility, it would be a repudiation of the principle that a man is his brother's keeper. When he refuses to be his brother's keeper, he becomes his brother's killer. Brotherhood, once a dream and a vision, now has become a dire necessity."

New Testament religion leaves no doubt as to the place brother-

hood must hold in the life of the Christian. "He that loveth not his brother whom he hath seen, how can he love God whom he hath not seen." 1 John 4: 20. "Whosoever hateth his brother is a murderer and ye know that no murderer hath eternal life abiding in him. Hereby perceive we the love of God, because he laid down his life for us; and we ought to lay down our lives for the brethren." 1 John 3: 15, 16.

How vital and true the spirit of brotherhood becomes in our personal relationship with God is shown by certain conditions for spiritual blessing. Note first our appearance before God in prayer. Here God says to us: "Ye shall not see my face, except your brother be with you." Expressed in New Testament language He says: "If thou bring thy gift to the altar, and there rememberest that thy brother hath ought against thee; leave there thy gift before the altar, and go thy way; first be reconciled to thy brother, and then come and offer thy gift." When seeking God's forgiveness the same truth walks into our path: "If ye forgive not men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses." Matt. 6: 15. And finally in the day of judgment the question will be asked: "Where is thy brother?"

To those who have lived up to the great truth of the brotherhood of man God will give the benediction: "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me." Matt. 25: 40.

In addition there will be, of course, Elder Rudy, from the Canadian Union, and others. A full program is planned for the entire ten-day period. We are looking forward to a record crowd at campmeeting this year.

One of the most important phases of our message is that of Health Reform, and in health reform, food is the biggest single item.

Recently I was called to take

charge of the Culinary department at Rest Haven and am now deeply in my work. There are great possibilities in this work. We can do much to make friends for our cause by making others like our food.

I would like to tell our believers in Canada some of our aims in our Culinary Department.

1. We want to serve a well-balanced, tasty, appealing and nourishing menu to our patients.

2. We want to feed our workers well prepared and tasty food that will furnish them with all the elements for health and strength to carry on their duties.

3. We want to put the kitchen on an efficient, well organized basis and make working conditions pleasant and profitable to all.

In order to carry out our aims we need a few more items of equipment. The management is very cooperative and is supplying some items, but the demands from other departments are so heavy that we cannot expect everything for the kitchen. Some of the things we must have are: Electric fruit juicer; electric toaster; large bread mixer; food chopper; potato peeler, and steam copper kettle.

This is our only medical institution in Canada and I believe all our people are interested in its success. Those of our people who have a little extra money could put it to no better use than to help us give our workers and patients a diet that will aid in healthful living and spread our health message.
