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The Day of Visitation

In his first letter, chapter two verses nine to twelve, the Apostle Peter clearly states the conditions the church must meet in order to bring about a revival of religion. In verse twelve he writes: "Having your conversation honest among the gentiles: that whereas they speak against you as evildoers, they may by your good works, which they shall behold, glorify God in the day of visitation."

The "day of visitation" doubtless refers to the time when many heathen will accept Christ, the time often spoken of in connection with the finishing of God's work upon earth. This expression was commonly used in connection with the mighty works of the Spirit at the time of Christ's first advent (Luke 1:68; 7:16). The day of visitation is to be repeated when Christ comes the second time. God, through the Holy Spirit, will again come to bless mankind, to pour out His Spirit upon all flesh, to revive true religion. As the gospel is being preached with power the results of the observed conduct of Christians will be to lead those around them to glorify God by yielding their hearts to Him. The honest, consistent lives of God's children will be the means of the revival and rapid extension of the true religion.

This "day of visitation" is now. The question whether or not the gospel of Jesus Christ should be carried to every heathen land has been settled. World War II clarified the atmosphere on that point. The

whole world has now come to realize and know for a certainty that Christianity is not merely another worth-while religion, but an entirely different religion from all others, and the only religion that can save the world. The "Laymen's Enquiry" into missions of some eighteen years ago has been replaced by a second "Laymen's Enquiry" made up of soldiers, sailors, pilots, and others of the armed forces who found the church in heathen lands when they arrived there. Their answer is that Christian missions not only pay, but must be vigorously carried on if the world is to remain a fit place to live in.

Mission doors in many parts of the world have been swung wide open. Never since Pentecost has there been such an opportunity to preach the gospel as is offered the church today. A whole world is in the throes of revolution. Mankind everywhere is grasping for spiritual anchorage. Wherever Christ's representatives move into action for Him the power of the Holy Spirit is manifestly felt. The question now is: are we as Christ's ambassadors measuring up to His expectations? Are we moving into open territories as rapidly as we should in this day of fleeting opportunity? Is the spirit of missions manifest in the Church? Or are we merely marking time and allowing the anti-Christian forces to consolidate against the work of God? These are questions pertinent to this "day of visitation."

God's people are being weigh-

ed in the balances of heaven. Whether or not we will triumph with the gospel will depend upon how we respond to the great mission challenge presented to us now. This is the day of visitation from the Lord. There is no time to lose. This day must become a time of great power and rejoicing for God's people.

Men and women all over this vast dominion during the last year have been willing to quit good paying jobs in response to the Holy Spirit's call and have joined the ranks of our great literature army and gone forth to win souls for the Master.

1947 has been the best year in the history of the colporteur work in the Dominion of Canada. For the first eleven months we delivered more than thirty-five thousand dollars worth more of our truth-filled books and magazines through the colporteur department than during the same period in 1946, and by the time our December reports are all in we will quite likely be closely hovering around the three hundred thousand mark for the year.

God has bountifully blessed our faithful church members who have had a part. Numerous souls have been won. Many contacts have been made which we feel sure will eventually lead to more souls being baptized. Scores of our consecrated young people are now attending school as the result of the scholarship benefits they received in addition to their regular colporteur commissions. Employment has been provided for dozens, even hundreds, of our members who have worked untiringly in our Publishing Houses to prepare the literature for the field. Thousands of dollars in Tithes and Mission Offerings have come into the treasury as a result of this great literature program, and as we begin another new year for God and our fellow-men we are of good courage, but we need help.

In every conference in Canada we need a greatly enlarged army of Literature Evangelists devoting all their time to this great work. Many who are now bound down with worldly occupations and enslaved by jobs and positions ought to break the shackles and enter God's great soul-saving work. God is a good paymaster, and He

assures each one "Go work today in My vineyard and whatsoever is right that shall ye receive." Labor Unions, and other worldly enterprises and restrictions are already making it very difficult for Seventh-day Adventists to work at public works and be true Christians, and faithfully keep God's commandments, but when we work for God all our labor union problems cease, for as a colporteur the only union we ask you to join is a Union with Christ and His Holy Spirit.

WORK IN NORTHERN B. C.

Greetings from northern B. C. Since coming to this district and getting acquainted with isolated families and companies, who are "cut off to a degree from contact with and dependence upon men, and separated from the world's corrupting maxims and customs and excitements," we recognize that they truly have "come nearer to the heart of nature." M. H. p. 192.

Twenty-two miles north of Burns Lake is beautiful Pendelton Bay on Babine Lake, the longest lake in B. C. Here we have 20 members who have come from all parts of Canada to engage in the lumbering industry. There is also a growing group at Topley Landing thirty-five miles further along the lake. Then south, at Francois Lake, there is another company of believers, and as is typical of our people, they have awakened a ripening interest in the Message among their neighbours.

The members at Burns Lake have organized and meet together for regular Sabbath services. At Prince George a church building project is under way; and further east, at Lamming Mills, the members have purchased projection equipment for more effective missionary endeavour.

Before beginning meetings in the Burns Lake Community Hall, we visited the local ministers in their homes, with gratifying results. Hard feel-

ings and prejudice were overcome as we told them of our purpose to help spread the gospel in the district. One minister was effusive in offering to us the use of his church, also his organist, whose efficient services we were glad to accept.

The meetings are attended by people from a radius of twenty miles and there are many openings for studies in the homes.

If you are interested in moving away from congested areas, there is plenty of room here. Property is low-priced, the land is fertile. There are unlimited opportunities for soul-winning among a hardy, pioneer-type of people who respond readily to friendliness and the gospel of Christ.

Advance! This is the call of God to all M. V.'s of Alberta. This year, 1948, is upon us with its New Year's resolutions and a clean page to start out with. Your M. First, in **MESSAGES TO YOUNG PEOPLE**, page 204 we are told to "work for youth." Second, in the same book page 25 we are to "help the church." Sometimes I wonder if we do not get the idea that the church is to help us all the time and that it does not need our help. Third, we are to "work for those not of the faith." This counsel is found in **FUNDAMENTALS OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION**, p. 488. Here God has outlined our work.

First, let us enlist in the "Volunteer Now" movement that was started at the Youth's Congress last September. It calls for us to "Share our Faith" with a million people in 1948. Every Alberta missionary volunteer

Let us purpose to do more this year than we have ever done before by distributing literature, holding youth's efforts, reading the reading courses, sending packages of food and clothing, studying the progressive class work in master comrade classes.

MAN.-SASK. NEWS NOTES! !

During the past summer thirty-five students and prospective students of our schools spent their time presenting our books to thousands of homes in the Manitoba-Saskatchewan Conference. Twenty-five of these are now attending our schools as a result of their summer's work, Canadian Union College, 19; Oshawa Missionary College, 2; Union College, 1; Walla Walla College, 1; and College of Medical Evangelists, 2. These faithful workers delivered nearly \$30,000 worth of books and earned in commission and bonuses, over \$18,000. Not only have these twenty-five students earned their school expenses, but they have left behind them a trail of light, which will brighten as the people read their way into the message.

January 2-10 found the colporteurs from Port Arthur to Hudson Bay and Regina gathered for united study at 355

Young Street, Winnipeg. Each day began with a devotional study. These studies were presented by Elders White and Ilchuk, and Brother Nachreiner. Following this study, the group divided into bands for a fifteen minute prayer band. Elder R. G. Campbell, Union Publishing Department Secretary, led out in the instruction which was conducted through the day and evening. Brother B. H. 

The Day of Visitation

H. L. Rudy

In his first letter, chapter two verses nine to twelve, the Apostle Peter clearly states the conditions the church must meet in order to bring about a revival of religion. In verse twelve he writes: "Having your conversation honest among the gentiles: that whereas they speak against you as evildoers, they may by your good works, which they shall behold, glorify God in the day of visitation."

The "day of visitation" doubtless refers to the time when many heathen will accept Christ, the time often spoken of in connection with the finishing of God's work upon earth. This expression was commonly used in connection with the mighty works of the Spirit at the time of Christ's first advent (Luke 1:68; 7:16). The day of visitation is to be repeated when Christ comes the second time. God, through the Holy Spirit, will again come to bless mankind, to pour out His Spirit upon all flesh, to revive true religion. As the gospel is being preached with power the results of the observed conduct of Christians will be to lead those around them to glorify God by yielding their hearts to Him. The honest, consistent lives of God's children will be the means of the revival and rapid extension of the true religion.

This "day of visitation" is now. The question whether or not the gospel of Jesus Christ should be carried to every heathen land has been settled. World War II clarified the atmosphere on that point. The

whole world has now come to realize and know for a certainty that Christianity is not merely **another** worth-while religion, but an entirely different religion from all others, and the only religion that can save the world. The "Laymen's Enquiry" into missions of some eighteen years ago has been replaced by a second "Laymen's Enquiry" made up of soldiers, sailors, pilots, and others of the armed forces who found the church in heathen lands when they arrived there. Their answer is that Christian missions not only pay, but must be vigorously carried on if the world is to remain a fit place to live in.

Mission doors in many parts of the world have been swung wide open. Never since Pentecost has there been such an opportunity to preach the gospel as is offered the church today. A whole world is in the throes of revolution. Mankind everywhere is grasping for spiritual anchorage. Wherever Christ's representatives move into action for Him the power of the Holy Spirit is manifestly felt. The question now is: are we as Christ's ambassadors measuring up to His expectations? Are we moving into open territories as rapidly as we should in this day of fleeting opportunity? Is the spirit of missions manifest in the Church? Or are we merely marking time and allowing the anti-Christian forces to consolidate against the work of God? These are questions pertinent to this "day of visitation."

God's people are being weigh-

ed in the balances of heaven. Whether or not we will triumph with the gospel will depend upon how we respond to the great mission challenge presented to us now. This is the day of visitation from the Lord. There is no time to lose. This day must become a time of great power and rejoicing for God's people.

I used to be a colporteur and I have never lost my interest in this important branch of the Lord's work. Herculean is the task and short is the time. Conditions all about us declare in trumpet tones that the end is near at hand. Indeed, 'we hear the footsteps of an approaching God to punish the world for their iniquity.'
