In Hebrews 9:27, 28 the certainty of the second coming of Christ is supported with two unquestionable facts: Christ's first coming and death in relation to the judgment: "As it is appointed unto men once to die but after this the judgment, so Christ was once offered to bear the sins of many; and unto them that look for him shall he appear the second time without sin unto salvation."

At His first coming Christ made an invasion into history that will never be eradicated. By becoming our elder Brother He has linked Himself with humanity with a tie that cannot be broken. Through human flesh He became a part of the family of Adam. By His divinity Christ demonstrated the possibility of redeeming men from the world.

During the days of His flesh, Christ was a Prophet and Teacher of mankind. By His word He established the Kingdom of grace and made it a reality in Čhristian thought and manner He also became our of life. faithful High Priest whereby an inseparable moral relationship was established with the human family. This relationship was based upon God's unchangeable and immutable moral law. By giving His life in vindication of this law Christ established His right to rule and to receive the lost dominion of this earth.

At His second coming Christ will set up His dominion over the whole world. He will enter upon the inheritance acquired through His sacrifice. Failure to come again would mean that His first coming had been in vain. It would mean failure to inherit the final fruitage of His suffering and death.

The other fact has to do with man in his state here upon earth. and his only chance of having a part in the kingdom of glory: "It is appointed unto men once to die, but after this the judg-Man is under appointment.' ment to die once, as a memento that he is a transgressor. There is no exception in this appointment. It makes no difference how good or bad one is, as far as this life is concerned death is a certainty for every member of the human race. Natural death comes only once. Thereafter comes the judgment. Therefore whatever preparation is made for the judgment must be made before death, once and for all. As a man who is to cross the ocean but once, never to return to his home, should make the right kind of preparation before he goes, so man must prepare now, while life is given to him, for the judgment.

Those who have accepted Christ and entered into the covenant relationship with Him will make the needed preparation for the judgment. To them death comes but once, for their life is hid with Christ in God, and when Christ who is their life shall appear they shall also appear with Him in glory. (Col. 3:2, 3.)

It follows, therefore, that those who have made prepara-

tion for the judgment will be eagerly expecting the return of their Lord. The hope of Christ's second coming will always be bright in their hearts. How is it with you, dear reader? Is your preparation for the judgment so complete that you are eagerly, sincerely, longing for Christ's second coming?

ATTENTION—all those who are interested in coming to campmeeting. Favorable consideration has recently been given by our committee permitting members of the conference to build cabins at the camp ground at Hope at their own expense. These cabins can be built with the understanding that they are to be built according to conference specifications and to be used during conference sponsored gatherings only, and that they can be sold to the conference only.

The following letter is one she recently received from Finland, which made her very happy to know she had a small part in helping others. "Dear Sister Torfason:

Three days ago my family got from our church distribution a very good and warm woollen blanket, which was very needed to our bedding clothes. I am not sure if the word blanket is quite right. It is a bed-cloth with wool wadding inside and double clothes outside. But you surely know the right name of this fine bedding article. As we opened the blanket in our home we found your name and address.

"And now we will write to you and thank you most heartily for your gift as we were so happy to get it. As you see my English language is very poor, I can use it only a little. Therefore I make in my letter many

DORCAS ACTIVITIES IN NEW GLASGOW

The Lord has wonderfully blessed the Dorcas activities in New Glasgow during the last six months. Up until this time the work was carried on by three or four faithful members, but we are overjoyed now to see every lady of the church also an active member of the Dorcas Society. There is such a wide scope of missionary activities included in this work that we found some type suited to each member according to their time and interests. Our association together each week has brought many blessings, not only in the making of plans and sewing but in uniting our efforts in soul winning. Week after week we have pleaded with the Lord for certain names with whom we were studying. We experienced great joy when these dear ones were baptized and also became members of the Dorcas Society. This experience in soul-winning brought about beautiful unity to the Society and was in turn reflected in the homes and the church. Truly it is that only as we work for others in the unselfish cpirit of love will our own lives radiate something of the life of Christ to others.

We had an experience in true Dorcas service just the week before Christmas. A write-up appeared in the local paper in which the urgent need of some poor families in town was re-We immediately conported. tacted the welfare worker for the county and then investigated at the little home where she said help was desperately needed. What a pitiful situation we discovered! The husband was ill, the children were barefoot, there was no bedding of any kind except coats that were thrown over the bare mattress, and there was one bed and a couch for parents and four children. The mother wept as we spoke to her-she was afraid that we were coming to take her children from her. The Dorcas Society called a meeting to decide what to do. The simplest and easiest thing to do would be to send an order of food and a bundle of clothing down to them, but that was only a small part of the need and so very impersonal. The mother had become completely debecome completely demoralized and she must be encouraged to look after her home better. We set to work the following day. A local store cheerfully donated wallpaper, and the ladies papered, scoured, scrubbed, painted, hung curtains, etc. That night after a short prayer meeting the men of the church came over and constructed a room in the attic so that the children would have an extra One of the members room. donated a bed and spring, and others brought bedding, pillows and pillowslips. The last act of the evening was to give the children a badly-needed bath before tucking them into bed. They look so surprised when a little prayer was offered and said they had never heard one before. It was a wonderful jov to see their wonder at sleeping under sheets and blankets for the first time. Our plans were to take the juniors of the church over the night before Christmas with gifts of toys and candies. but it turned out to be a blinding snow storm and the hilly roads became impassable. Brother Tattrie and

two of his boys braved the strom and walked through drifts and swirling snow so that the children would not be disappointed in the morning. Later when we called on the family, they said, "We never had a more wonderful Christmas." The welfare worker remarked, "What a noble work your women do—I haven't heard of welfare work being done just that way."

The Lord has also blessed the New Glasgow Society in a financial way. We had planned a spring sale just recently but found it impossible to secure a suitable location. After praying about it a place was pointed out to us and we interviewed the owner. After learning who we were, he remarked, "Why yes, you may have it; your denomination does a great work. You certainly have some fine people and wonderful medical institutions. I have been a patient at Melrose Sanitarium." He not only gave the place to us free but provided heat, light, and had it cleaned for us. It was one of the most prominent and suitable buildings on Main Street. We had a lovely window display for three days prior to the sale. With plenty of empty floor space we were able to use tea tables and decorate with bright spring flowers which gave an atmosphere of dignity and Soft classical music beauty. made an appropriate background for the serving of luncheon. The proceeds from this sale will help to carry on welfare work in some of the needy places.

The New Glasgow Dorcas Benevolent Service sincerely prays that their name might be their watchword for the future truly a benevolent service performed as to the Master Himself. Dorothy McLean, R. N.
