

JUNIOR INGATHERING AT SASKATOON

"And who s this young lady?" asked Elder R. E. Metcalfe, after the church dedication at Saskatoon. "This is Florence Koseruba, one of my junors who raised \$33 for Ingathering this year," I answered. "Good work! ought to put that in the Messenger." he suggested. "It is \$34.19 now," whispered Florence as Elder Metcalfe turned to greet someone else.

Surely the Lord did bless the juniors in their Ingathering here in Saskatoon this year. It was a new experience for most of them.

There are only four juniors and two primary children in the new Saskatoon church school. Two other members in the junior Sabbath school class who do not attend church school, were ill at the time of our Ingathering and could not go with us.

When the goal of \$50 was given to the juniors, it seemed immense. Russell Spangler, the smallest member in the group,

felt sure he could not reach the primary goal of \$4.50 before leaving with his parents on a trip two days later. After going out twice, about an hour each time, he needed only 74 cents to have his \$4.50, so he went out alone after supper around his home and had \$4.83 when he finished.

As befitted the son of the Conference Home Missionary Secretary, Bobby Rick raised the most the first time we went out; a touch of the "flu" kept him from going with us each time, but he had \$14.14 for his total.

In addition to Russell Spangler, Connie Lebedoff had her junior goal of \$9 at the end of our second afternoon's work. Working about an hour and a half after school, squeezing in a few minutes canvassing around the church school during the noon hour, and the brave ones who "did their blocks" around their homes after supper, took us "over the top" the third afternoon. We went out about two hours Friday afternoon and brought our total to \$76.11, although Florence became a casualty with a bad cold which prevented her from going with us a number of times.

The juniors wanted to go out another week "to double our goal." With enthusiasm running high, several dollar donations and a \$5 offering which Connie received, we raised over \$80 the second week, which more than tripled our goal and gave us a total of over \$156. David Igler overcame the mumps in time to go with us twice and raised \$7.31; Vern Monson went out once with us and got \$3.25 in an hour, but it did not help his pleurisy and we were sorry he had to spend some time in the hospital after that.

It was Junior Stickle in the second grade who wanted a smaller lunch to take to school so he could finish it sooner and go Ingathering. He raised \$13.83, tripling the primary goal. Connie Lebedoff's splendid total of \$55.86 was more than the entire original junior goal. Betty Heinrichs, sixth grade, raised \$25.02.

Miss Polishuk, the church

school teacher, and I enjoyed going with the juniors. Their enthusiasm was an inspiration to the entire church.

"I wish I could get more dollar bills," said Betty. "Do you pray?" asked Florence. "Yes, I do," answered Betty, and then they all told of praying for offerings as they ran from house to house and while they waited for the offering. They all wanted to continue Ingathering but music examinations and school "finals" called a halt to their work at present.
