### CORRECTION

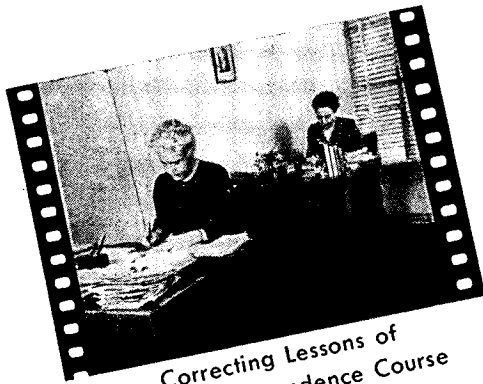
