The unusually critical days through which the world is now passing, wherein the peace of the world seems balancing on a knife-edge, remind us of the imperativeness of pressing evangelism in every corner of the earth. Every means at our command must now be brought up to swell the forces of good for the salvation of the lost.

But how far beyond us is the need before us! How much we are reminded of our spiritual feebleness before the mounting demands of our soul-winning work.

In every field, church, and institution among us, there must come the revival that will not only awaken within us our responsibility and our need, but will lead us under the deep movings of God's Holy Spirit, that we may measure now with the waiting task.

Someone has said, "God will do just as much for us as we let Him do in us." But how often we simply think of what we want God to do for us without paying much attention to having Him do much of anything in us.

The magnitude of the great task before us appalls us. The gigantic forces against us dismay us. The opportunities now opening challenge us, and we cry out, "How much we need God to do for us!"

Let us then diligently seek Him that might do great things within us. Let us open our hearts that we might more fully receive Him and enthrone Him in our lives.

Paul assures us of God's plan

to work in us (Phil. 2:12-13) "for His good pleasure." We cannot make, of ourselves alone, any changes within. God does not expect this of us for He knows that it is just as impossible for us to accomplish as it is for a leopard to change his spots.

Our part is to be truthful to God and come to Him in Christ, tell Him of our real situation and need. He would have us reveal by our own confession to Him that we know, as best we can, our own weak attitude of heart and life toward Him and the things of God.

This must receive His help. In Acts 5:31 we are reminded that God gives repentance and remission of sins. All this is done by God working in us, as we will to receive His help. We must now seek Him for enabling power within. He will bestow that power when we arise in faith and act. We must act in faith believing not only that He has the power, but that He will put within us that power that we lack. Just to the measure that we believe, will power be given. "He that cometh to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him." Heb. 11:6.

There is reason to believe that were we what we should be, the results of the efforts we now are making would be multiplied a hundred fold. This bears close study by each one for himself. What a tragedy it is if we are retarding the reaping of the harvest by our own unsatisfactory attitude and spirit in God's work!

This is a time when all of us need to examine carefully everything in our lives that has any relationship to Jesus Christ. Our lives are now to manifest to angels and to men that we are rising up to full strength in the Lord to bring to completion the ministry which the Saviour gave in His great commission.

How can we do less in the light of the great upsurge of the forces of evil with their determination to put an end to the exaltation of Christ before men? How can we think of the tremendous price paid for the souls of men and hold anything back of ability or possession that Christ Jesus may be fully glorified in the completion of the great plan of salvation?

This is our hour — let us not miss the mark or fail to fulfill all that God would have us do for the great unsaved multitudes.

May we be an awakened ministry and people in this hour of our visitation. Let, both leaders and people, seek God now for such a revival of spiritual power and missionary zeal that every life will be aflame for God and every church an evangelistic agency in its every plan and program.

world the school is the most important." F.C.E. p. 226.

"Nothing is of greater importance than the education of our children and young people." C.T. p. 165.

"Upon mothers and fathers devolves the responsibility of giving a Christian education to the children entrusted to them. In no case are they to let any line of business so absorb mind and time and talents that their children are allowed to drift until they are separated far from God." F.C.E. p. 545.

THE HOUSE THAT GOD BUILT

One of our sisters, now living in Clermont, Natal, belonged to a certain denomination before this message came to her knowledge. She became spiritually hungry and longed for something to satisfy her heart. She started to visit different churches, but she met no satisfaction until, upon one day, she met a Seventh-day Adventist minister. She heard him preach of something that gladdened her heart. Soon after that, an effort was conducted in a big tent. She started to attend the meetings with her two children— a boy and a girl. As a result of that effort, she with her children, accepted the Truth.

Now, the husband who had forsaken her and was living with another woman, began to persecute her. He tried to persuade her to give up this Truth, saying she had joined the devil's church, but she prayed earnestly for him, asking the Lord to soften his heart and to help her to pay for her children's school fees at the Bethel Training College.

Indeed, the Lord heard her humble prayers. At the end of each month her husband used to come home and throw the money on the table to pay for his daughter's school fees. To pay the son's school fees, the mother had to work very hard. After the daughter had passed Std. VIII, and was ready to take up her nurse's course, one day she went to speak to her father about the Truth. It was the first time she had spoken to him about it, and she added that she would be a Seventh-day Adventist until she was taken by death.

The father was so infuriated that he got a man to buy the site and house where they lived The mother's furniture and household goods were thrown out into the rain. She asked for shelter from other people for a little while. Then, a thought came to her.

She would purchase a lot of ground and build a house for her children, however humble it might be. She heard of a site that was for sale, and for which a deposit of L5. 0. 0. (\$14) was required. Having no money, she sold her furniture and blankets to get this money, and so she was able to pay her first deposit.

How was she going to build a house? She had no money, only that which she earned each month. This was all used to buy food. She managed to get a couple of shillings to buy poles, but there were not enough. As she was walking on the road her toe stubbed against a shining half-crown (35 cents). She picked it up and went straight away to buy the rest of the poles for her house.

She got someone to build her house, and upon completion of the work, he charged her ten shillings (\$1.40). Where was she to get the money to pay him?

As she was again walking down the road, she picked up a neatly folded ten shilling note. She took it and paid the man, and thanked the Lord for His goodness.

Now the question came as to how she would pay the instalment for the site. She kept on praying, asking the Lord's guidance

The European lady for whom she worked had lost her husband and one day she called the sister to her and said: "Girlita, you have been doing good work for us for many years. What I have liked about you is your faithfulness. My late husband and I have never missed any money or anything else while you have worked for us. I want you to go home and stay there. Do not come to work anymore! I have heard that you are buying a plot of ground where you now have vour house. I shall pay you L1. 0. 0. (\$2.80) a month until it is all paid for. All you have to do is call round at the end of each month to take the money. and after the plot is paid for I shall continue to pay you the twenty shillings a month until I die."

The sister's daughter went to her father and told him all about, this. "Furthermore", she said, "we are living in a house on the site which God is paying for".

The father was surprised at " this. He said, "You are very lucky." He then went to a shop and bought her a Jeep coat and, further, he is giving her ten shillings (\$1.40) every month. They are happy in their little house built and given them by God. They praise Him for His goodness, telling this wonderful story to other people of what God has done for them.

"Be thou faithful unto death and I will give thee a crown of life." This sister is one of the faithful in our Clermont Church in Natal.

I hope that this story will encourage others to be faithful in serving the Lord.

GOD HAD A WAY

A dear 79-year-old lady, a shut-in who is almost blind, sat in her home one Sunday feeling very lonely. She was a regular listener to The Voice of Prophecy broadcast, but on this particular day her radio refused to work.

Disappointed and blue, she sat before her useless radio when suddenly her doorbell rang. As she went to the door, a finelooking gentleman stood before her with a tract in his hand. Handing it to her he said that he felt she would enjoy reading the little paper. She thanked him for it and returned to her chair. Picking up her magnifying glass, she read the title, "Keep Looking Up," and was amazed to see that the author of the tract was H. M. S. Richards, the Speaker on her favorite broadcast, The Voice of Prophecy. Notice what she later wrote to Elder Richards: "Wonderful! I can't tell you how much I enjoyed that tract. It seemed like a personal message from you, which I needed so much. So you see, your precious sermons have wings, radio or no radio!"

And here is another experience. A colporteur evangelist, while canvassing Oshawa, Canada, called on a lady who didn't seem particularly interested in what he had to sell. He finally talked to her about Bedtime • Stories and then introduced the book Bible Readings. Not knowing that he was an Adventist, she said with an air of finality, which she hoped would dismiss him, that she thought the Seventh-day Adventists were the nearest right. Then he made himself known and learned that

she had just completed The Voice of Prophecy Bible Correspondence Course.

Before leaving that territory the colporteur stopped again to visit this family. The husband was home very ill as a result of a drinking bout. The colporteur talked with him for an hour and a half, but even then the man would not let him go until he promised to return and give him more spiritual help. On writing to his conference president for permission to follow up this interest, he learned that the conference had already received this same lady's name from the Voice of Prophecy office as one to be followed up.

Soon afterwards, the husband improved in health and got hold of himself. The colporteur evangelist visited this home again and took the family to church one Sabbath. In response to a call for consecration, the entire family publicly acknowledged their need of God.

Word has come that the father and mother are to be baptized in three weeks, and the son is now a student in one of our Seventh-day Adventist schools.

So God has a way. He knows where His jewels are— those who will accept Him and His message of salvation.

May we ask that you, dear friend, continue to pray and to give that the Voice of Prophecy Bible Schools and broadcasts may continue on in their search for others such as these?

TRUTH-BY-YOUTH EFFORT

The young people of the Rutland Church are enthusiastic over the good success of the Truth-by-Youth effort that is being held in the Empress Theatre, Kelowna. Meetings have been held for five Sunday nights with an attendance holding around five hundred. It has been about seven years since an effort was held in this beautiful little city in the central Okanagan Valley where a small membership meet in a local hall, and providentially the Empress Theatre was secured for a series.

The young people of the M. V. Society in the country church of Rutland have been organized into an able fifty-person "Voice of Youth Choir" under the enthusiastic leadership of Okanagan Academy principal Ted Mac-Donald. Other special music provided for each meeting by the mixed quartet, and ladies' trio, and solos by the young people. The youth in the choir and those serving as ushers are dressed in black and white. A literature band has been organized at the Academy to fold and address the literature being sent out.

An interesting feature of the advertising has been a newspaper called "Truth-By-Youth News" that serves in the stead of handbills. The young people of Rutland and Kelowna have been passing out four thousand of these to the homes in Kelowna and vicinity. The paper not only writes up the past meeting and tells about the attendance, music. and topic of the message, but also advertises the next meeting. Besides this it contains a Bible Answer Corner, and a column containing excerpts from Truth-By-Youth broadcasts.

The radio program, also called Truth - By - Youth, broadcasts from the Kelowna station CKOV, 630 kc., and provides an excellent advertising and good-will medium. This station is unique in that there is practically no interference from powerful outside stations, perhaps due to the surrounding mountainous country. The only time available was on 2:30, Thursday, and 3:30, Saturdays, and so the slogan "an upward look in the midafternoon" was adopted. Nearly all of those attending the theatre meetings have listened to the program.

A spirit of devotion seems to possess many of these young people as they realize that they are having a big part in spreading the everlasting gospel in their corner of the world field.

RIVERSIDE CHURCH ORGANIZED

Sabbath December 2 was a high day for our believers in Riverside, New Brunswick. On this date the Riverside Company was organized into a church. Sabbath School was opened by Mrs. R. B. Longard at 9:45 a.m. Elder J. W. Bothe followed with a study of the fundamental beliefs of Seventh-day Adventists and a reminder of the precious promise made to the church.

He then reviewed the providential leadings of the Spirit of God in the establishment of the work in Riverside.

It was on January 15, 1947 that the Maritime Conference Committee learned of the medical needs in Albert County. The following day several of the committee members visited the McLellan Memorial Hospital that had been closed because there was no doctor to serve the community. Further study was given to this important need and a few days later an option was taken on the former doctor's office and home.

It was not until the Spring of that year that Elder H. L. Rudy contacted Dr. M. R. Hoehn in Vancouver, British Columbia. In May, 1947, Dr. Hoehn spent one day in the Maritimes but during that time he made arrangements for the purchase of the former doctor's home and office and laid plans to locate in Riverside, New Brunswick. In the Fall of 1947 Dr. Hoehn and his family arrived in Riverside, and were followed by a staff of workers, to re-open the county hospital.

Among those who early joined the staff and are still with him are Miss E. McKeith, R. N., Mrs. A. Woodmansee, R. N., Mr. and Mrs. N. N. Tkachuk, and Mr. and Mrs. R. B. Longard.

Elder R. W. Numbers, assisted by Elder J. W. Bothe and M. O. Longard, conducted a short series of meetings in the Autumn of 1948. So the right arm of the

Message had made an entering wedge and the gospel seed was sown.

The harvest was yet future but the doctor and his associates launched a follow-through program by holding Bible Studies, bringing the interests to Sabbath School and other services.

The first baptism took place at our 1949 Youth Camp at Pugwash when two Missionary Volunteers were baptized. This was followed by a baptism at the 1949 camp meeting in Moncton when six souls were baptized, and still another baptism at the 1950 camp meeting when nine were baptized, making a total of seventeen new members. So truly it was a great joy when twenty-five members were organized for greater service.

In the afternoon Brother C. Wessman brought a message of hope and courage to the newlyorganized group.

During the noon hour the nominating committee met and rendered a full report to the church before the second meeting. Dr. M. R. Hoehn was elected elder and Brother N. N. Tkachuk, deacon. In an impressive service these two brothers were ordained to carry the responsibilities of their respective offices.

Elder E. M. Peterson, who recently accepted a call to connect with the British Columbia Conference, brought the closing message for the day. He led the group in meditation to the cross of Christ and the significance of His shed blood. Very appropriately the many members who were present from Moncton joined the members of the newly organized church in celebrating the ordinances of the Lord,s Supper.

A committee on entertainment had planned an interesting social program for the evening. The climax of this social period came when the Peterson family was presented with farewell gifts from the two churches.

In all the activities of the busy day a very fine spirit prevailed. The earnest desire was expressed that God's richest blessings might continue to rest on this newly organized church as it takes its place in this worldwide organization.
