

DOUBLE OUR MEMBERSHIP

We have set before us the doubling of our membership in Canada during the next few years. Our missionary paper "The Canadian Signs of the Times" is to have an important part in this objective.

We have learned from experience that the "Signs of the Times" is a soul-winning magazine and the larger the cir ation of the "Signs", correspondingly larger is the number of souls brought to the Truth through this medium.

The Publishing House Board, in cooperating with our soul winning objective, has reduced the missionary price to our members to 50c per "Signs" subscription. We have wanted for a long time to have such low cost literature, and now the day is here when we can send a year's subscription to our friends, relatives, and to every interested person, for 50 cents.

So often we talk with some one who is interested to know what the Bible says about present day conditions. Now we have the opportunity of following up that interest with the "Signs", and who would not be willing to deny himself such a small amount in order to send the Message into the home of that interested one for a whole year? Here, too, is a medium that we can now use at little cost as a follow-up to the Ingathering work, in sending a year's subscription to those who give a more liberal contribution to the Ingathering.

This low cost "Signs" should again revive in a larger way the Church club plan with a specified

number of "Signs" coming each month to the church. These are then distributed to homes in the community. Let me tell of an experience that one of our members recently related to me.

He worked with a culb of twenty-five "Signs". These "Signs" he passed out in a certain community each month. When one f**a**mily moved **a**way he carried the "Signs" to a new home. The mother of that home said that she was burdened for her children to go to Sunday school, but that she had kept putting this off. Well, our brother said: "We have a church just a short distance from here. We should be glad to have your children attend our Sabbath school." He explained about our keeping the Sabbath, and offered to take her and the children to Sabbath school the next Sabbath. She accepted the invitation, and today she is a member of the church, and her children are regular attendants at the Sabbath school.

This very same brother, in his weekly visits, found a man who was very much interested in the Message. Our brother, in telling this experience, and others that he had, is a firm believer in the "Signs" as a soul-winner.

These experiences can be duplicated many times. We are thankful that the "Signs' is available at such low cost, let us seek to place "The Canadian Signs of the Times" into one hundred thousand homes every month. With the blessing of God this will be accomplished and the conversion of souls will be multiplied many times,

THE INGATHERING WORK

The Ingathering work is going wonderfully well throughout the Union. The reports for the week ending May 5 give a total of \$63,806.50. This is an increase of \$11,646.50 for the corresponding week of a year ago. This amount represents an increase of 22%.

Our present per capita for the Union is \$5.72. The conferences leading in per capita are Maritime, \$9.75; Ontario - Quebec \$9.24; Manitoba-Saskatchewan \$6.31. Many of the churches, large and small, have well over \$15.00 per member. It is thrilling to listen to the reports in various churches as I meet with them on the Sabbath.

The Ingathering reports from all sections of the world field indicate the total receipts for 1951 will go well beyond the record heights of last year. Here in the North American field a few of the leading Unions have per capitas for the week ending May 5 as follows; Southern: \$13.34; Central, \$13.29; Columbia. \$12.75; Atlantic, \$10.32; South-western, \$10.24. New Jersey at this early date is a minuteman Conference with \$22.39 per member. Other conferences will have this standing in a week or two. some of the sparsely settled conferences report high per capitas follows: Wyoming, \$20.70; as Montana, \$14.79; Nevada- Utah, \$14.03; South Dakota, \$12.07; and South Dakota, \$12.07; and Texico, \$12.16.

We are thankful for the large increase already indicated in this Union. 1951 is a very strategic year in our foreign mission work, and the foreign mission fields need every possible increase to meet the present demands of advance. We know not how much longer we shall be

EVANGELISTIC EFFORTS BRING IN MEMBERS

Following is a report from the "Pacific Union Recorder" on an evangelistic effort. The report was written by Fred Osbourn. This experience may be duplicated in many places where the individual minister and the church work together in evangelism

Note that the effort was held in a small town where we had a membership of 75. Note, too, that in a little over a year the membership was nearly tripled:

"We here in Grass Valley have certainly been enjoying the 'showers of blessings' about which we so often sing.

"Saturday night, April 14, marked the baptism of thirteen, in the third such ceremony since January 1, bringing the total for 1951 to twenty-six.

"Three years ago Elder J. V. Schull came to this district to

pastor four churchs. The group in Grass Valley consisted of approximately 75 faithful and devout believers meeting in the school. The new pastor surveyed the situation and immediately set to work. Soon the group out grew the school and moved to the Episcopal church annex for their Sabbath assemblies. Elder Schull, beiny evangelis-tically minded, next conceived of the plan to build a tabernacle, and, with the willing help of an enthusiastic church, a structure seating over 500 was soon erected. Let it here be noted that without the earnest support of a consecrated and energetic church, there would have been no harvest to speak of.

"A little over a year ago the first evangelistic campaign was launched. The company with Elder Schull consisted of Brother and Sister H. H. Rupert and Sister R. Sanders. The results were nothing short of phenomenal, for no less than 87 surrendered hearts accepted the Lord Jesus Christ as their personal Saviour. In fact, the outcome of this campaign was so heartening that the conference brethren voted that a second effort follow as soon as possible.

"Again Elder Schull began a series of meetings, this time supported by Brother and Sister Earl Wright, and Sister Jessie Casterline, and the writer. Again we have been abundantly blessed.

"Elder Schull points out that like results can be expected in most any community if pastor and church will prayerfully join hands in a strong program of evangelism.

"The church membership is now at 212 and there is yet another baptism to come before the close of the campaign, not to mention the long list of names of interested persons to be left to incoming Pastor A. F. Wellman.

"When one considers that the church membership will have been almost tripled in three years and this in a town of a scant four thousand population he must indeed exclaim, 'Surely God's Spirit is eager to work through man for the finishing of this work.'"

A PERSONAL LETTER TO YOU

Asuncion, May 11, 1951.

Dear Brethren and Sisters in Christ:

For some weeks I have received letters from many parts of the world asking for information about the needs of the work of God in Paraguay. I am deeply moved by the interest among God's people for finishing the work rapidly, and especially is my heart touched, knowing that at the close of this quarter so many dear advent people are going to make a special sacrifice for the work of God in this young Paraguay Mission, and that you too are praying earnestly for the progress of the work in this needy and revolutionary Paraguay.

The land for the sanitarium is kilometers from Asuncion, the Capital of Paraguay, on the main road to the interior of the country. Daily thousands of vehicles pass the place and everybody who leaves the Capital must see the big poster we have placed on the front of our land. The land is 7 hectars and we have payed for it only (U.S.A.) \$1,500.00. Almost ten times cheaper than other lands at the same place. But it costs \$75,000.00 (U. S.) dollars to build a simple sanitarium. I hope that God will enable us to get more than this sum by the 13 Sabbath overflow. Other funds we do not have.

Just now while writing this letter a governmental representative to an Indian district. a descendent of an English family, came to my office pleading for a nurse or teacher, who would be willing to go to the savage "Guayaki" tribe. He said "I have pleaded with many Catholic and Protestant denominations, but nobody is willing nor able to go save these cannibals. You folk can do it, because you pray and obey and therefore God in heaven hears your pravers. Are vou willing to do something for this people?"

I trembled. Willing we are. But we do not have nurses nor teachers whom we could send. I am very much troubled with the fact that we do not have the needed personnel. We have only 250 members and they have not vet been prenared sufficiently for this kind of work. But worst of all is that the time passes and thousands more dear Paraguayans sink to their graves without having heard the saving message of Jesus. Therefore we are hurrying to our task and I am sure that if we get started quickly with the planned sanitarium and nursing school, Paraguay will have an effective instrument for a quick finishing of the work of God in this country.

Though I do not know you personally, I feel very near to you. Perhaps we shall never meet in this earth, but I hope to meet you in the heavenly home, where I shall be more able to tell you of the blessings and joy you conveyed to the Paraguayan people by your personal interest and sacrifice on the 13th Sabbath, June 30, 1951, for the construction of "Sanatorio Adventista del Paraguay", and a training school for nurses.

May God richly bless you and keep you faithful in the first love of Jesus until He comes to take us home to His heavenly mansions.

A correspondent for the Associated Press recently released the following information which the writer read in the "Minneapolis Star" of Friday, May 11, 1951.

would indicate to me that the people in the Northland are also interested in the Bible and in books pertaining to the Bible. An article in the "Collier's" magazine of March 31, 1951, says: "A great revival of interest in spiritual life finds millions seeking to understand and reach the Deity...People are gobbling up religious books as though they were spiritual headache tablets."

MANITOBA-SASKATCHEWAN JUNIOR CAMPS

The first Junior Camp ever conducted in the Manitoba-Saskatchewan Conference was held in the summer of 1941. Due to the tremendous distance in our conference, whose territory extends from Alberta border in the West to the Port cities in the East, it was difficult to select a suitable and central location. However, the beautiful Fort Qu'-Appelle Valley was finally chosen as the site for the camp and 63 young people met together at this, our first outdoor Youth's Camp. Although this was originally intended to be a Junior Camp the senior young people did not wish to be left out so 18 seniors were in attendance along with the juniors. Elder H. D. Henriksen was in charge.

The following year, the new Conference Missionary Volunteer Secretary, Elder L. R. Reile, sponsored a camp at Watrous, Saskatchewan, where 60 young people came together from all over the conference and enjoyed the blessings that such a camp can provide.

Then, in 1946 and 1947 Brother Teddric Mohr arranged to have the young people of our conference meet with the young people of the North Dakota Conference at the Lake Metigoshe State Park, North Dakota, testifying to the friendship and Christian fellowship between the youth and their leaders of our beloved countries. The men who had charge of the devotional features of the camp kept ever before the juniors the thought that they must give their hearts and lives whole-heartedly to their Master, and as a result of this concentration upon personal consecration, 24 juniors out of an entire enrollment of 90 stepped out and reconsecrated their lives to Jesus and indicated their desire to be baptized and join the church. Of this number, 14 were from our own conference.

In recent years the Junior Camp phase of our youth's program has been somewhat neglected in our conference but plans are now being laid for a Junior Camp at our Saskatoon campgrounds for July, 1951. We are anxious that our young people have the opportunity of camp life which has proven such a blessing in past years. H. D. Henriksen

1. William C. Davis, "Lectures on the New Testament", Vol. I. (Copyrighted at Lexington, Ky., in 1820). He taught the 2300 years end around 1847.

2. Nathan Bangs, D.D., "Introduction t o Christianity", (New York: Methodist Publishing House, 1833).

3. William Ramsay, D.D. of Philadelphia, "Second Coming of Our Lord . . . Before the Millenium" (1844).

4. (Anonymous). "Notes on Various Scriptures, (Boston: 1798).

5. David McGregor (1771-1845) pastor of Presbyterian Church, Bedford, N. H. (Title of book, publisher and exact publishing date unknown; probably between 1830-'40). Very important, because though not a Millerite he held similar views on the 2300 years.

6. Å. J. Krupp, "of Philadelphia." (Title, publisher, and date likewise unkown, but probably 1830-'40). Likewise very important because he too advanced a position similar to Miller. These two items are greatly needed.

two items are greatly needed. 7. Nathaneal S. Folsom, "Critical Interpretation of the Prophecy of Daniel" (1842).

8. Charles B. Wheeler of West Virginia, founder of Rector College, Puntytown, in 1838 incorporated as "Western Virginia Education." About 1823 wrote important book fixing upon 1843 for close of 2300 years.

9. An English writer by the name of Mann, (given name or initials unkown) who holds the 1260 years of the special papal epoch are from 538 to 1798 A.D. (Title, publisher, and date similarly unknown).
