## Voice of Prophecy Offering - October 13

What a great blessing the Voice of Prophecy is bringing to many sections of each conference within the Canadian Union! Our own hearts are inspired as we listen to the program each week, and we can know that a large number of listeners throughout Canada are just as deeply impressed with the message of Elder Richards, Brother Olsen, and the King's Heralds.

Then, too, there are hundreds in each conference who are enrolled in the Voice of Prophecy Correspondence School. There comes regularly to my desk each week reports of interest in the conferences. Let me cite just three or four paragraphs from the excellent reports I have received:

"As long as I can remember we have kept Sunday as the Sabbath; but even before I took your lessons, I believed that Saturday was the true Sabbath. There is no Sabbath-keeping church here, so how can we keep the Sabbath holy? Please tell us as I feel it is the right day to observe." (New Brunswick)

"We have no church here, but I do keep the Saturday Sabbath. I would like to have the privilege of going to church. If you people can do anything to help me, I would appreciate it." (Ontario)

"I am doing my best to keep the Sabbath alone, and I am praying that my husband will join me in this experience." (Manitoba)

"It is clear to me that Sunday is man-made. Please pray that

God will show me His will in this matter which you have presented so well." (Saskatchewan)

The workers in each field follow up the interest, and each year a goodly number of new converts throughout the Union are won to the message.

Two of our conferences were blessed with the Voice of Prophecy group in attendance at their camp meetings.

This year the Voice of Prophecy has extended the number of stations over which it is heard in Canada. Already

we are learning of good results.

Our members everywhere are happy to support the Voice of Prophecy program. The offering is to be taken in all our churches on Sabbath, October 13. We know that you will be happy to make as generous a contribution as you are able to give. We are praying for a large offering throughout the Union.

Let me again emphasize the importance of every one of our church members calling the attention of their friends and neighbours to the regular Sunday Voice of Prophecy broadcast, and securing enrollments for the Voice of Prophecy Correspondence School.

By all of us giving of our means, and doing everything we can to widen the field of radio

listeners, the Voice of Prophecy will do for us here in Canada an increasingly important work in our soul winning program.

### SEARCHING LOCAL LIBRARIES FOR ELUSIVE ITEMS

This is to report good progress in the writing of Volume IV of the important Prophetic Faith of Our Fathers set. Hundreds have spoken or written of their deep interest in this really vast undertaking, going forward under General Conference sponsorship, and of their willingness to help. The findings are really amazing. The writing of this last volume, as planned, is up to schedule. Half of the manuscript is written and much of the rest is outlined.

Part I (the pre-Millerite and non-Millerite writers on prophecy from 1789 to 1840) is completed, and proves to be of vital importance to us. The foundations are deeper and more solid than we had ever supposed. The writing of Part II (the Millerite movement itself) is half finished, and presents a strong and fascinating case to the world. We already have the most important source materials. And Part III (our own early decades) is already outlined. The unfolding of the sanctuary, Sabbath, and Spirit of prophecy features is tremendously important both for us and for the world. This is not only the climactic volume, but the crucial one of the series, and is being awaited with much interest by many noted scholars—preachers, teachers, editors, and librarians—not of our faith.

A number of valuable items have been located as the result

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of my appeal through a few union papers several months ago. Letters and long distance calls have brought desired information. For this fine cooperation please accept sincere thanks. And now, just before leaving for a month's extensive search throughout the New England states and New York, seeking certain elusive items in the Millerite literature, I make this further appeal for help from our trained laymen—school teachers, doctors, scientists, lawyers, lay preachers—as well as our workers. We need your help in searching anew your local libraries, together with historical societies, University and Seminary libraries, and noted personal collections in your vicinity, for the missing items which follow, and are greatly needed:

1. Complete file of "The Day-Dawn," (Canadagua, New York: 1845-'47), edited by O. R. L. Crosier. This is our greatest need. We have some individual copies.

2. Complete file of "Hope of Israel," (Topsham and Portland, Maine: 1845-'46), edited by Joseph Turner and J. Pearson.

3. Complete file of "Voice of Elijah," (Montreal and Sherbrook, C. E.: 1842-'44), edited by Richard Hutchinson, M. D.

4. Complete file of "Voice of Truth," (Rochester: 1844), edited by Joseph Marsh.

5. Complete file of "Trumpet of Alarm," (Philadelphia: 1844), edited by Josiah Litch.

6. "The Old Countryman," (New York City: Nov. 20, 1833), editorial by Henry J. Pickering on the Falling Stars. Very important, as an original copy is not now available.

7. Any copy or copies of these lesser papers—"Second Advent Witness," (New York City: 1842), edited by Henry Jones; "Herald of Truth," (Nova Scotia: 1843), edited by Martin; "Faithful Watchman," (Sherbrook, C. E.: 1843), edited by Skinner and Hutchinson; "Glad Tiding of the Kingdom at Hand," (Rochester, New York: 1843), edited by L. D. Fleming; "Babylon the Great Is Fallen," (Oswego, New York: 1844), edited by L. D. Mansfield; "World's Crisis," (Kingsville, Ohio: 1844), edited by G. W. Eastman; "Voice of Warning, (Utica, New York: 1844), edited by Orlando Squires; "Gospel Stanard," (Cabotsville, Mass.: 1844), edited by Silas Hawley, Jr.

I still lack the following highly desirable items mentioned in my former appeal:

1. William C. Davis, "Lectures on the New Testament," Vol.1. (copy righted at Lexington, Ky., in 1820). He taught the 2,300 years end around 1847.

2. Nathan Bangs, D.D., Introduction to Christianity, (New York: Methodist Publishing House, 1833).

3. David McGregor (1771-1845), pastor of Presbyterian Church, Bedford, N. H. (Title of book, publisher, and exact publishing date unknown: probably between 1830-'40). Very important, because though not a Millerite he held similar views on the 2300 years.

4. A. J. Krupp, "of Philadelphia." (Title, publisher, and date likewise unknown but probably 1830-'40). Likewise very important because he too advanced a position similar to Miller.

5. Charles B. Wheeler, of West Virginia, founder of Rector College, Pruntytown, in 1838 incorporated as "Western Virginia Education." About 1823 wrote important book fixing upon 1843 for the close of 2300 years.

If you locate any of these items kindly communicate this fact to me here at headquarters, and directions will be given as to how to arrange for photostats, or a microfilm, and just how to complete the arrangement. I shall be grateful for your aid, and the cause we love will benefit by your help. Thank you. Address me—L. E. Froom, General Conference of S. D. A., Takoma Park, D. C.

### FAITH FOR TODAY IN CARNEGIE HALL

Faith for Today television group appeared on the opening program of Carnegie Hall's 1951-52 winter season in New York City on Sunday, September 9. Elder Roy Allan Anderson, secretary of the ministerial department of the General Conference, was the speaker, supported by a corps of workers, some from various sections of the United States,—and other from as far away as England and Australia.

The afternoon overflow meeting at 3 p.m. opened with Elder Charles Keymer, choral director, leading a choir of over 150 voices. Elder Fagal welcomed the hundreds of friends of Faith for Today, introducing Elder Anderson as his personal friend.

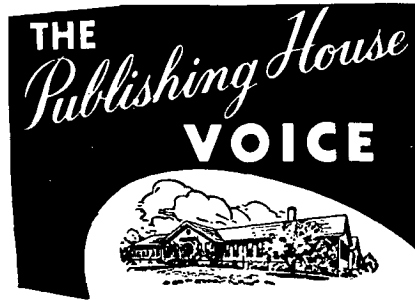
At 5:30 the hall was cleared for another appointment, and then again at 8 p.m. Faith for Today came on with the advertised evening program. This was a repeat performance of the afternoon meeting. An estimated crowd of between 3,500 and 3,700 heard the message, "Is Peace Possible?"

At the close, throngs of interested people crowded about the great organ to greet the Faith for Today staff, Elder and Mrs. Fagal and the quartet. Hundreds who had never written for literature took this opportunity to see and hear the people responsible for the telecast. Residents of beautiful nearby hotels were in the audience, having heard the announcement of the meetings at the 12:30 telecast. It seemed that each listener had a special story that he wanted to relate. All were impressed with the message of the evening. One enthusiastic soul asked for 25 reserved seat tickets for next Sunday night.

Eventually the endurance of the Carnegie Hall regular staff

of ushers was exhausted, the lights were dimmed, and the doors closed, ending this meeting which Elder Fagal declared to be a spearhead of a great advance to the kingdom of God.

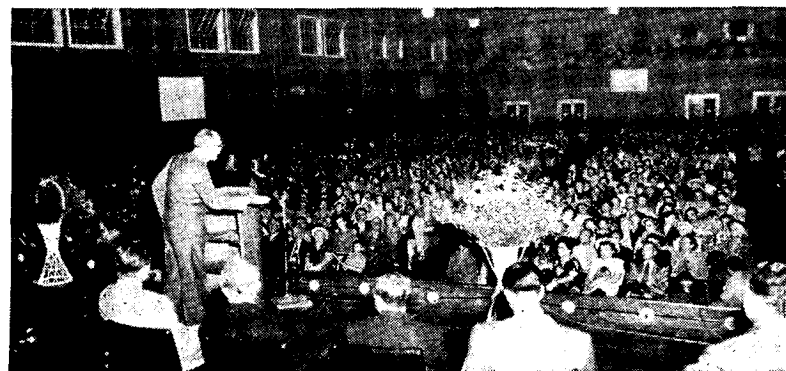

Nevada-Utah Camp Meeting



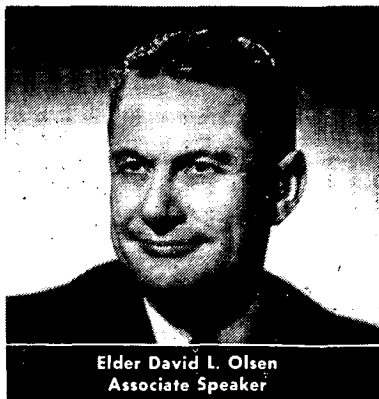

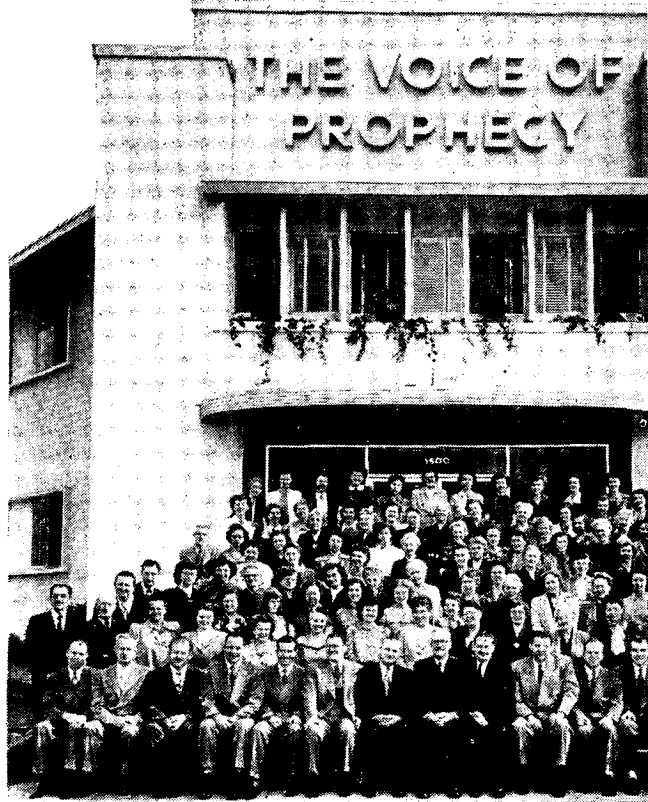
**Elder Richards addressing Illinois Conference Camp Meeting**

It was a little more than a year ago that the 250-watt radio station at Somerset, Kentucky, joined the Mutual Broadcasting System. One of our brethren, Jeff Hickman, heard of this merger and made available to The Voice of Prophecy the funds for a one-year contract for the releasing of our broadcast over the Somerset station.

Two ministers of another denomination listened to the broadcast on the very first Sunday. Both enrolled in our free Bible Course and in time completed it. Then they both enrolled in the advanced course, Daniel and Revelation. In the words of Brother Hickman: "By the time they had finished that, it had finished them; and both ministers and the wife of one of them were ready for baptism. They might have said, 'We will just come in by profession of faith, having already been baptized'; but they said, 'No, we want to be baptized into such a message.'"

Brother Hickman states that it was "a blessed experience" to see these three go down into the watery grave as a result of The Voice of Prophecy broadcast over the Somerset station, and he feels that \$1360 was a small price to pay for such rich dividends.

Both ministers know that it was Brother Hickman who put The Voice of Prophecy on the Somerset station, and when one of them meets him, he greets him with, "Here comes your \$1360."

### New Listeners Month

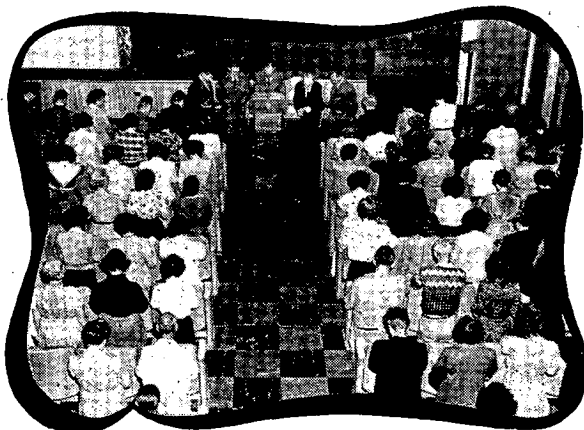
