Labour Unions and Sunday Laws

When in 1903 Mrs. White wrote that labour unions would be the agencies through which men would be prevented "from buying or selling except under certain conditions"—she quoted Revelation 13:11, 16, 17, historically, applied to Sunday laws—unions were in their infancy. The prophecy could well have seemed incredible. But today unions have joined with church interests to promote Sunday laws and a giant stride has been taken toward the abyss of religious intolerance and persuasion. Within the past few months:

Nor, remembering John's wording, "that no man might buy or sell," should the merger of the CIO and AFL into one great union in 1955 be passed over; for now for the first time in history, a nationwide boycott is not only possible, but eminently practical.

Only two or three years ago, a report

the sun and in the moon and in the stars" written by Russian rockets, increasingly stringent enforcement of restrictive licensing ordinances, the brainwashed willingness of many Canadians and Americans to abandon traditional barriers between church and state and to abnegate historic individual rights when all these are considered, who is to say.
