Rocky Mountain House Vacation Bible School

There were seventy registered pupils at Rocky Mountain House where a church has been organized for only one year. Of those seventy, only twenty were from Adventist homes.

Some churches are blessed with perfect facilities. The new Rocky Church, just six months old, has three large classrooms in the basement for workbook activities and crafts. Outside, acres of green grass provided opportunity for every wiggle and giggle to be worked off in games and hikes.

In many areas, pupils had to commute several miles to Vacation Bible School. At Rocky, a bus transported fifty pupils a distance of more than thirty miles each morning for eight days. Three helpers from the Burnt Lake Church drove a round trip of seventy miles to assist. Considering their heavy household schedule helping outdoors as well as attending to inside domestic duties — in this very busy time of the farmers' year, some very real self-sacrifice went into their efforts.

Rocky could not be called unique in its early organization of the event. All successful Vacation Bible Schools depend on a great deal of advance preparation. But starting immediately following Camp Meeting did add a burden to the invariable last-minute rush. Out of a membership of twentytwo, eight persons were available to help. Part of this number had no previous experience in Vacation Bible Schools. They spent hours studying their material and preparing the lessons. It was inspiring to see the enthusiasm and earnestness with which they worked, knowing exactly what was required of them, and performing with a confidence and ability equal to and surpassing many of the "pros".

Regardless of the best-laid plans, weather can never be trusted. During our Vacation Bible School session, Rocky was blessed with a wonderful display of Alberta sunshine. Parents were taking such advantage of this unusual phenomenon, that a closing night at Vacation Bible School dissolved into insignificance in comparison with the hay bales. In order to afford the least amount of disappointment to the children, a special programme, complete with Biblical costumes, provided a closing day thrill.

Follow-up plans consist of the Sunday School at Stauffer and the Sabbath School at Rocky. While we may not have operated the BEST school in Alberta, we did have the BEST behaved group of children I've worked with in twelve years of experience. While our staff may not have been the most professional, they could not have been more devoted, dedicated, and dependable. While we may not have run as many days as some, the eight days we did operate were longer than necessary to reduce us to the usual VBS prostration! And, moreover, we had some immediate results -- on the very last day - one acute appendix and two cases of chicken pox!

Branson Hospit Fifth Grad

The grand climax of three years' concentrated study in nursing came on the weekend of September 9 when twenty graduates received recognition of their achievements in the presence of their instructors, relatives and friends at the fifth commencement exercises of the Branson Hospital School of Nursing, increasing the total number of graduates from this school to 78. Services were held in the Willowdale Seventh-day Adventist Church and recreational centre auditorium.

On Friday evening Pastor J. W. Bothe, president of the Seventhday Adventist Church in Canada presented the Consecration address. He upheld before the graduates the example of Christ who devoted more time to healing than to preaching and cited examples of dedicated people who gave of their best in service to humanity. He pictured the opportunity and the need of dedicated service to man and stated that their service ought to be trademarked "the mark of the BEST". In conclusion he admonished the graduating class to uphold their allegiance to God in all things and to give of themselves to His service.

In response, Mrs. Celeste Osgood Corkum expressed the dedication of the class, James A. Bruce, assistant administrator of the hospital, offered the dedicatory prayer, and a song of dedication was sung by the class.

A. George Rodgers, hospital administrator and father of graduating nurse Anita Rodgers, based his Baccalaureate address on the class aim, "Dedication in service and love," and the motto "Serving in humility". He admonished the nurses to be bearers of the lighted lamp and stated that humility distinguishes Christian nurses — they have acquired a spirit of service to God and their fellowman because they believe they have been saved to serve. Mr. Rodgers did not paint a rosy picture of nursing service from the standpoint of material benefits but stressed the value of aid to those in spiritual, mental and physical need. "As a Christian nurse," he said, "you have come to the kingdom for such a time as this."

The topic of the Commencement address presented by Pastor H. Ward Hill on Sunday afternoon was based on Phillips translation of Romans 13:11: "the present time is of the highest importance—it is time to wake up to reality." Pastor Hill, who was former Bible teacher of the graduating class, suggested that one of the nurses' most difficult tasks in life would be to keep their vision clear, their spirit alert and their experience fresh. He said that their years of concentrated learning would evaporate unless it was constantly replenished by fresh knowledge. He admonished the nurses to be sure they were always fighting the right battles. "Our days are never unbearably tedious," he said, "when we are ardently pursuing a noble purpose. This is being awake to reality."

Miss Louise Christo, a nurse from New Delhi, India, and valedictorian of her class, encompassed study, association, learning, and

Colporteurs Were First in Alberta

"Seventh-day Adventist teachings were introduced into Alberta in May, 1895, by two colporteurs, Thomas Astleford and George W. Sowler. Astleford, preceding Sowler by two weeks, began working in Edmonton. Sowler sold 200 copies of Bible Readings, in Calgary. He also canvassed north of Calgary and in the towns along the Canadian Pacific Railroad to the east, and among the ranchers from Calgary to Fort McLeod, and from the Bow River to the foothills of the Rockies. On one trip he travelled in the saddle twenty-five miles without seeing a house.

Astleford, working in Edmonton and in the towns along the railroad to the south, was responsible for the first converts in the province. These included Gustave Litke of Leduc (The *Northern Union Gleaner* Aug. 14, 1906 calls him John), and Dr. Menzel and his family, of Stony Plains. Litke shared his new faith with his German friends, and soon H. J. Dirksen was sent from Manitoba, who organized a church at Leduc on May 14, 1898, the first SDA church in the Northwest Territories."*

Think of it, three years later the first Seventh-day Adventist Church was organized. Today we have thirtytwo churches, six organized companies, with a total membership of 3,372. This represents forty-nine new souls each year since the work opened from this humble beginning.

When we look back over the years and bring to mind how God has blessed the work here in Alberta, it is then we appreciate more fully this gift to the church, the literature ministry.

May it be our prayer in this momentous time for God to increase our number of Literature Evangelists; men such as Brother Thomas Astleford and Brother George W. Sowler, men with a conviction and a vision.
