Featuring: 1969 MISSIONARY BOOK OF THE YEAR



Man's world today is spinning around him much faster than his mind can move. A thirty minute daily newscast worries him with the problems of Asian and Middle Eastern wars, gives him a twinge of concern about the stock market decline and the

country's ever-present campus riots, plus providing the distinct possibility that his wife may want to spend a future family vacation on the moon.

The church today is a body whose philoso-phy was born in the horse and buggy era. It endured the growing pains of a world war, a depression, and another world war. It muddled through the 50's and emerged in this decade, like the majority of other religious and secular organizations, regrettably un-prepared for the explosion of consciousness it must face.

Today one key thought is being fre-quently expressed, by both church laymen and leadership: It's time for the church to grow up. It must change, not simply for the sake of change, but for the sake of salvation. This involves exciting experimentation, perhaps some trial and error, and will hopefully re-sult in methods that can meet the evangelistic challenge of a complex

society.

This year the Southern Publishing
Aston a denominational Association has taken a denominational tradition, the Missionary Book of the Year, which has been published annually since 1952, and moved it to the evangelistic forefront. THOUGH THE WINDS BLOW is today's book, in approach and content, as well as in appearance. Its author, Robert H. Pierson, is president of the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists. He is in a position to constantly feel the pulse of the


worldwide church and the millions of souls

it seeks to reach. In planning this important book, Elder Pierson considered every complicated facet of human existence. As a result, he presents the gospel message in beautiful simplicity, using language and attitude which fit today's mode. Truth becomes a workable, tangible part of life in Elder Pierson's succinct daily de-

votional readings.

But a book is not just an author and a printing press. And THOUGH THE WINDS BLOW is not merely a book; it is a complete soul-winning program. Before this important volume ever reaches the counters of this country's Book and Bible Houses, it will have been touched, molded, influenced and improved by hundreds of dedicated Christian men and women.

As soon as Elder Pierson's manuscript reached the editor's desk, the long process began. Several editors were



asked to do preliminary work on the manuscript. Countless conversations took place between author and editors, between editors and printers, between artists and editors. A small development committee did the basic planning for the book. These people considered every aspect imaginable: How many pages would it have? Should it be hardbound? Paperback? Should the cover be realistic or symbolic? What colors would be the most appealing, attract the most attention? Even an item as seemingly insignificant as the placement of letters on the cover demanded a 45-minute discussion.

Since our age is an age of intense visual awareness, the selection of artists to illustrate THOUGH THE WINDS BLOW became an all-important consideration. James Converse, a well-known free-lance artist of Columbus, Ohio, designed the cover and did five original paintings to illustrate stories from the text. Paintings by Jim Padgett and Robert Ayres round out the inside illustrations.

As the book moved nearer completion, sales personnel set up a basic advertising program for it. By this time the manuscript had been copy edited and set into type. Elder Pierson received galley proofs which he corrected and returned to the editor. Then layout artists went to work cutting and pasting galleys into pages, exactly as specified in the original plan. The artists' original paintings were photographed and an intricate process of color separation prepared them for printing.

Then the book itself went to press. After printing, it was folded into signatures, bound and packaged,

ready for shipment.

Is that the end of the story? No, it is merely the very important first installment. For all the consecrated, concentrated planning and production will be of absolutely no value until THOUGH THE WINDS BLOW reaches the world.

The publishers consider this particular Missionary Book to be of such significance that they have decided to try an important experiment in communication. For the first time in denominational history, the Missionary Book of the Year has become the subject of a special art film program. A script that is both symbolic and specific presents in graphic detail the dilemma of contemporary man. Unusual color photography and a unique stereophonic sound track combine to make this program a distinctive mind opener for every church member. Book and Bible House managers will cooperate with church pastors and conference lay activities leaders to give this program unprecedented circulation throughout North America during 1969.

THOUGH THE WINDS BLOW, and the program that has been built around it, will make it possible for the church to reach a new frontier in evangelistic communication. It's time for every church member to expand his own consciousness, to commit himself to the challenge of reaching TODAY'S souls with TODAY'S methods.

Or, in the words of Christopher Morley, "When you sell a man a book, you don't sell him just twelve ounces of paper and ink and glue—you sell him a whole new life."

The session is called to consider and if deemed advisable to amend the general bylaws of the corporation, and for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before the session.



This gospel seed sown by the highways and in the cities of this Conference is having its effects on hearts and lives in every walk of life. Many denominations use our books for teaching purposes in their homes and schools. How encouraging it is to know that our inspiring literature is also bearing precious fruit. Working closely with their pastors, our leading soul-winners this year were J. H. Whalley of Montreal with seven of his interests baptized, and M. Coleman of Toronto, who saw six of his contacts

BRONZE AGE SHERDS PROVE AGE OF HESHBON

The discovery of pottery fragments from the Bronze Age at the site of ancient Heshbon has again verified Bible history. The find proves Heshbon was an important city in the time of Moses. The Heshbon expedition carried on last year by Andrews University is the largest ever to work in Transjordan. Sponsored by the Seventh-day Adventist Church, the staff included 42 foreign and five Jordanian members with about 140 local workmen. Further excavations are planned for 1970.

Highland Park Academy Sends Help to Honduras

Students at Calgary's Highland Park Academy had an unusual opportunity this past season to demonstrate their Christmas spirit. During a school assembly programme in the fall, Mrs. Ann Gimbel told of an Adventist acquaintance in Honduras, Dr. Stephen Youngberg, who was operating a selfsupporting hospital. One of the hospital's problems has involved the supplying of food to young children in that area, many of whom are on the brink of starvation. Dr. Youngberg reports that ten dollars would buy enough food to feed one child for a month.

As the HPA students listened to the experiences of Dr. Youngberg and viewed pictures of undernourished Honduran children their own age, they thought about their own fortunate lives in Canada. Spearheaded by the HPA Student Council, students and faculty alike pledged to make certain sacrifices and bring the money saved to school for the "Honduras Starving Children Fund." Some teachers gave up their noon meals, some used dry skim milk rather than whole milk, children gave up desserts, birthday cakes, and other treats. Some gave a

part of their allowances, one girl decided to make her Christmas gifts to her family instead of buying them, a boy gave a part of the money he received for getting good grades on his report card.

As the project snowballed and the fund began to grow, the students decided not to exchange cards or gifts with each other at school but instead to bring the money they would have spent for the "Fund."

Climax of the drive came at the annual Christmas programme, when Roger Anderson, Student Council president, revealed that the fund had reached nearly \$150. At this point the audience was invited to sacrifice also for the project and the response was overwhelming. A Christmas cablegram to Honduras announced a gift of \$337.68 for the hospital.

We are looking for some good young people to work in Canada for the Lord. May God bless every one of the students at Adventist schools.



It was Thursday afternoon when I pulled my trailer into the little town of Creston. I had never been there before. I had an appointment to meet with the Pastor and the little church group of about forty members that evening at 7:30. The next night we were to start our evangelistic meetings. We must be ready.

I am sure that we were all a little discouraged with our opening night's attendance - four or five vistors, mostly children and teens. A couple of teen-age girls had wandered in. The second night wasn't any better. We launched a strong visitation programme but the first two weeks were rough. And then the night the subject of the "Mark of the Beast" was presented things began to change. The attendance began to swell. And our hearts rejoiced as we saw the evidence of the Holy Spirit. Where the church had been half empty earlier in the series of meetings, now on the closing night it was packed to the front pews. The first fruits of fourteen were baptized before the evening lecture, as a witness to that waiting congregation of the power of the Holy Spirit. At the close of the service another altar call was made, and more victories were in evidence as many more came down the aisle, walking all the way with their Lord.

As I pulled my trailer over the mountain that snowy evening, leaving behind for now, the little city of Creston, I realized that that city would never be the same again, neither would the church members, nor would I, for we had witnessed what the power of the Holy Spirit can do. At the end of four weeks the Lord had added twentyfive souls to His little flock there, twenty-two adults and three children. Even all of the children's parents were new converts. Of these twenty-five twenty-three were added by baptism, one was added by profession of faith, and one who had not been to church for many months, was reclaimed thank God for them all. Personally, I thank Him for Pastor Ferrier and his family, and the church members who so faithfully gave of themselves to help make it all possible.

Miss Lila Paul's programme for the little children, which made it easier for parents to come, played a very important part in the reaping of these souls for the kingdom.

I wish there was space to tell you the experience of each baptismal candidate. One couple told me, "all our lives we have been looking for this." Some read their Bibles far into the night to settle the question of Truth. One young mother had so much opposition from her home that under the threat of death, she made her will out the day before her baptism. Some

wives who were baptized in the first baptism had the joy of seeing their husbands follow in the second baptism. Two nurses were discussing blood transfusions at the hospital and decided to come "just one night." "One night wouldn't hurt anybody," they thought. They never missed again, except for a couple of nights when work prevented their coming to the meetings. A lovely elderly Christian couple decided they would come to a few meetings. "But we'll never change churches," they said. However, they

took their stand with God's Remnant Church. One sweet Christian lady came because her kind Adventist friend asked her to come and hear her sing. Her heart was convicted of the truth of the Sabbath, but she felt she just couldn't bear to leave her church. She put her faithful church pledge into an envelope and handed it to her minister at the church door. She thanked him for his sermon and then pleaded with him to change the day of worship from Sunday to Saturday. He retorted angrily, "Away with the Sabbath." It

nearly broke her heart, and tears flooded her cheeks. She had raised her children there, but now there was only one answer, she must walk with God's Sabbath keeping people.

"Members of the Seventh-day Adventist Church spent this morning packing Christmas and cheer baskets for distribution this afternoon to twelve needy families in the community and twelve shut-ins.

"The church Dorcas Welfare Society is just one of nine organizations in town that annually prepares Christmas hampers to bring a little brightness into some of the homes that otherwise would spend Christmas as just another day.

"The Adventists collected food contributions week by week over the past month or two, and church funds are used to buy some needed items to make the baskets suitable for the families to which they are going.

"Names are given each group packing hampers by the Central Welfare Agency to prevent any duplication of service.

"All requests and donations are received by the Volunteer Bureau this year which keeps a referral list of those in need of help and groups preparing to offer it.

"Many individuals and groups have contributed goods and money in addition to those preparing hampers.

"While the Adventists make this special effort once a year, they also operate a permanent welfare centre on Fairview Rd., where clothing and other items are disbursed as a community service, in an effort to provide more lasting aid to needy families."

Ron Buhler Awarded Top Scholastic Honor

Governor General Bronze Award

Ronald Buhler, a grade ten student at CUC, was awarded the Governor General's Bronze Award in Chapel on December 12. The medal, which was presented to him by Dr. Ted Giles, is given for outstanding marks in the grade nine examinations.

Ron received the highest grade point average of all grade nine students in the Lacombe County. The medal itself bears the likeness of the other similar medals given in Canada and is personally financed by the Governor General. It has been a number of years since a student from CUC has won the award.

The Governor General's award plan was established in 1875 by the Earl of Dufferin who was then Governor General of Canada, and it has been given every year since that time. The purpose was to stimulate educational development in Canada. There are now over 350 medals given throughout Canada, 60 being for Alberta.

Ron's score in the 1968 provincials were the highest aggregate scores of all the tests taken by the 324 students who took these 9th grade exams in the county of Lacombe.
