During the Silver Anniversary of Pathfinders a special slogan was introduced: "Smile, You're a Pathfinder!" This really represents the smiles of thousands of boys and girls around the world who belong to the Pathfinder Club.

The Seventh-day Adventist Church provides an active, well-rounded Christian program for boys and girls. Just as the only way to influence a stream is to treat it at its source, so the only way to improve the human race is to pay attention to boys and girls. To neglect them is to utterly fail. The Pathfinder Club has sought to fulfill this role for more than a quarter of a century.

The Pathfinder Club is a voluntary association of youth 10-15 years of age with trained adult counselors. It was officially authorized by the General Conference of Seventh-day Adventists in 1950 and since then has encircled the globe.

It gives junior youth opportunities to accept responsibility that leads to trustworthy citizenship and steadfast church affiliation. It is vitally important for the church to augment the influence of the home and the school in shaping the ideals, attitudes and character of growing youth. The Pathfinder Club does this through interpreting Christian ideals to junior youth in the setting of activities that satisfy normal desires for adventure and achievement. Club members are often heard to exclaim, "It's fun to be a Pathfinder!"

Pathfinders get involved in construc-

tive activities such as Bible study, nature exploration, crafts, hobbies, camping, excursions, hikes, field games, etc.

Objectives of the Pathfinder Club are:

1. To lead boys and girls to commit their lives to Christ and their church.



2. To demonstrate the attractiveness of Christian ideals in a positive, church-centered activity program.

3. To guide boys and girls into active Christian witnessing and community service.

4. To develop good character, citizenship and physical fitness in young Christians.

5. To teach a variety of practical skills and recreational pursuits.

Pathfinder Clubs are found on all continents of the world. When the Silver Anniversary of Pathfinders was celebrated in 1975 there were 125,000 members and 6,000 clubs around the world.

Many clubs participate in parades, public ceremonies, and national events. Once in the Solomon Islands, the Pathfinder Clubs made an honor guard during a visit of the Queen of England. A heavy rain fell that day, and other personnel left - but not the Pathfinders. They were there to greet the Queen.

Pathfinder Day is celebrated in churches on the last Sabbath of September every year, focusing the attention of the entire church on this youth organization. The members of the club profit by the recognition given them, and church members and visitors become acquainted with the activities of the club. New leadership and club members are also recruited.

Make September 24 Pathfinder Day in your church. If you don't have a club - start one. If you do have a club - use it. Have the Pathfinders take the church service. You will appreciate it.

Voice of Prophecy Wins Seven in Newfoundland

It was almost forty years ago that Ruth Lawrence, as a little girl, was dedicated to God by P. A. Rick, minister of the St. John's Newfoundland Seventh-day Adventist congregation.

A few months later her father was called to serve his country in World War II. While he was away, Ruth's mother died. The child was placed in the foster home of Robert and Adelaide Hamilton, members of the United Church.

When Ruth was 18, she was listening to the Voice of Prophecy broadcast one day when she heard an announcement about the Bible Correspondence course. She enrolled, searched the scriptures, and accepted the teachings of God's Word. Ruth encouraged some of her friends to sign up for the course. One of them, Irene Butler, also accepted the teachings of the Bible.

In 1959 Ruth met and married George Smith. Each Sunday morning they would tune in to the Voice of Prophecy. This was their "church" until the spring of 1977, when the broadcast went off the air on that particular station. The Smith's disappointment over losing their favorite program caused them to write to the Voice of Prophecy.

Ruth could not forget the truths she had learned some 18 years previously while taking the Bible course. In her letter to the Voice of Prophecy she asked for the address of the closest Seventh-day Adventist church. The Voice of Prophecy informed her that the Marystown, Newfoundland, church was located just 15 miles from her home.

Soon the Smiths were in contact with Pastor Dennis Wysong, who told them about a series of meetings soon to be held by Elder Lawton Lowe, Canadian Union evangelist. Mr. and Mrs. Smith and their two teenage daughters, Annie and Violet, not only attended the meetings themselves, but also invited others to come.

Ruth extended an invitation to Irene Butler Miller, the friend she had enrolled in the VOP Bible course 18 years earlier. Irene and her teenage daughter, Jessie, faithfully

attended the meetings. "Grandma" Hamilton, Ruth's foster mother, also accompanied the Smiths to the crusade. Before the four-week campaign was ended, all seven were baptized by Pastor Wysong.

It amazes each of these seven people to see how God used a Bible course, a Voice of Prophecy broadcast, the cancellation of a broadcast and an invitation to a crusade in leading them into the Seventh-day Adventist church.

To the "team members" who were used by God to touch their lives, they say, "Thank you for being there when we needed you. You have opened our hearts and minds to a new world. You have given us an important message in a way that we understand, and we thank you from the bottom of our hearts."

This column is devoted to the presentation of current information, trends and events in the wide field of health especially as it relates to the mission of the church.

I will purposefully avoid a "purely objective and neutral position". On the contrary I shall make an effort to express opinion, to persuade, to convict, to provoke a change in understanding and behaviour.

Health is an exciting subject! Properly presented it captivates the imagination of the young who are intrigued with the mysteries of their own bodies. It dominates the attention of the older who face the risk of losing it. It reaches people through a subject close to their heart — their stomachs.

Most people enjoy eating something. The careless are interested in eating anything that moves. The careful are interested in eating anything that moves them; closer to Christ.

Health includes much more than food, of course, but this article considers one aspect of food. We are preparing some

cooking-school programs complete with lectures, demo-suggestions and recipes for use to the church and from the church.

In view of the following counsel: "Let the people be taught how to prepare food without the use of milk or butter. Tell them that the time will soon come when there will be no safety in using eggs, milk, cream, or butter, because disease in animals is increasing in proportion to the increase of wickedness among men." *Testimonies*, vol. 7, p. 135.

—if you have recipes (low fat, low sugar and no cholesterol) of entrees, desserts, or salad dressings, etc. that are enjoyed by more than we health reformers only (not heavy, doesn't taste like a feed store) please share them with us to be shared with the field. Be advised, I am not saying that the time has come to dispense with milk and eggs; only that the time has come to begin learning to cook some things without them. . .like it said in 1902. We can always add milk or eggs in our own home if we wish.

One of my favorite breakfast recipes that every man and growing child enjoys:

Mixed Grain Waffles

1-2 C quick oatmeal
1 C rye flour
1 C barley flour
1 C nutmeal (walnuts, pecans, etc.)
½ tsp. salt
2 heaping Tbsp. soy milk powder

ADD to above ingredients enough water (hot from tap) to make runny batter. MIX thoroughly and let set 2-3 minutes. Then ADD more hot water to batter till pourable. Waffles will be light and crisp if enough water is used. The more water used, the lighter the waffles.

Max Mercer, presented the public relations director of a province-wide TV network, who although not yet a Seventh-day Adventist, was on hand to tell how our radio VOAR, its fine programs, and the broadcast witness of announcer Jim Tilley, was largely respon-

sible for saving him from alcoholism, helping him hold his job, and restoring happiness to his home.

Pastors and volunteers worked for nearly three weeks to provide eight new rooms, two buildings for the children's divisions, an enlarged kitchen and improved lake-front facilities. The camp has to generate its own electricity, and even though the wiring was completely renewed, it was a difficult task for Pastors George Lanto and Dennis Uffindell to keep the generators operating. The camp urgently needs a reliable diesel operated electric generator to make development and programming practical.

Knechtle, who not only shared his dynamic Christian experience, but provided a valuable counselling service. The efficient food service was directed by Darlene Reimche assisted by a fine youth group. Glen Wade set up and operated the sound equipment.



Disaster Hits Cobalt

On the fateful holiday, of May 23, 1977, fire raged in the north end of Cobalt destroying about 60 homes.

Approximately 140 families or roughly 400 people were left homeless by the fire. Injuries resulting from the fire were only minor and none of the 25 people treated at the Haileybury Hospital had to remain in hospital.

The Cobalt arena was prepared to billet the homeless, but it was never used. Residents in the three towns — Cobalt, Haileybury, New Liskeard — opened their homes to the victims.

By Tuesday night, tens of thousands of articles of clothing were piled up in the Cobalt arena and other clothing depots. These came from local residents and from communities throughout the North.

Help also came from our Community Services Van from Toronto. The van full of clothes supplemented what was already in our local Community Services Depot.

The Dorcas Leader, Ruth Blum, and other church members set up tables in the Haileybury arena. Many hours were spent in organizing and sorting clothes and numerous articles were given out. Clothing packages were also prepared and taken to the Cobalt fire victims.

Thanks go to our local members who volunteered their services and for the help provided from our Community Services system. Times like these show the value of this great service.

Over four hundred delegates were present for the annual Constituency Meeting held at the Keswick Adventist Conference Camp chapel on July 10, 1977. After presentation of reports by Elder Beck, of work related to the departments and the entire conference operation, the constituency was divided into nine groups. The departmental secretary whose department was being discussed met with each of these groups, and one of the pastors served as its chairman. After approximately one and one-half hours of discussion, dinner was served and then reports were rendered to the entire constituency. Some of the decisions that were voted by the constituency are reported as follows:

1. Sabbath School Department

a) In order that the church be informed of Sabbath School activities a report be made by the secretary at the end of each quarter to the entire church.

b) It was also voted that we encourage Sabbath School secretaries to send in their reports regularly and on time to the Conference.

c) That, within the first quarter of each church year a training course be conducted for Sabbath School teachers, and that Sabbath School teachers be urged to take class records accurately and regularly.

d) The Conference was asked to try to

make available more trained Bible workers to assist the local churches in following up interests at the conclusion of evangelistic efforts.

e) That we have a special song service program fifteen minutes before every Sabbath School to encourage attendance on time.

f) That we have a grading system to be worked out by the Sabbath School Department.

2. Lay Activities Department

It was voted that the Conference Executive Committee give study to subsidizing the use of visual aids for church lay activities work.

3. Youth Department

It was voted to ask the Conference Committee to give study to the following matters dealing with Youth work in the Ontario Conference:

a) In order to establish more effective communication between the Youth Department of the Conference and the youth of each church, it was recommended that there be appointed a youth sponsor, and a youth communication secretary in each local church.

b) It was recommended that the Ontario Conference study the matter of securing the services of an assistant youth director for the Toronto area.

c) It was also recommended that each issue of the Canadian Adventist Messenger include a message from the Youth Department of the Ontario Conference.

d) It was felt that study should be given to limiting the size of churches in order that more personal contact between church members and active involvement of church members be made possible.

e) That there be greater involvement of our youth in the Sabbath School Service of the church, as well as in community service projects.

4. Department of Health Ministries

It was recommended:

a) That in harmony with the high standards of health that the Seventh-day Adventist church endorses, and the spiritual objectives that are being pursued at campmeeting and at various camps of the Conference, that sale of ice cream, soft drinks, candy and other empty-calorie snacks be discontinued, and fresh fruits, fruit juice, dried fruits, and nuts be available instead.

b) In view of the fact that physical fitness is part of healthful living, that a physical fitness and aerobics program be introduced at campmeeting next year, under the supervision of qualified personnel.

c) That a Health Ministries secretary be appointed by the nominating committee of each church.

5. Trust Services Department

It was recommended:

a) That the concept of Trust Services as a means of furthering the cause of God by the investment of members' financial resources with the church to be used by the church, instead of by banks, et cetera, for worldly pursuits; be presented more often to our membership.

b) Whereas, we as the remnant of God realize our security should be placed in the hands of God, the church has established ways whereby total estate planning can be made through the avenues of the church, and thereby provide security for the member as well as provide means to advance the cause of God, it was recommended that a Trust Services education committee be established in every church, comprised of the pastor, head elder, treasurer and Stewardship secretary whose responsibility it will be to become knowledgeable in the Trust Services field, and to educate the full membership by every possible method.

6. Finance Committee

In this committee there was considerable discussion regarding the tithe exchange program for non-tithe funds. In 1976, \$300,000.00 of tithe monies were exchanged for non-tithe funds, primarily for carrying on church school programs and church building projects. Elder Suiter informed the group, however, that the current budget reveals an expected exchange of only \$78,000. It was voted:

a) to recommend that the tithe exchange procedure should be totally eliminated if possible, and as soon as possible, so that all tithe monies would be retained within the Conference for the employment of more workers; that is, pastors, evangelists, et cetera.

b) Since the Christian Education program is benefited from the tithe exchange facility, it was voted to recommend that the Conference Executive give study to alternate means of financing Christian education, and that the concept of the church combined operating budget, including the support of Christian education, be promoted in the churches throughout the Conference.

c) It was voted to recommend that Conference Executive work toward reversing the declining trend in working capital ratio.

7. Evangelism Committee

Recommended:

a) That wherever possible two pastors work together to hold evangelistic crusades in the country or smaller, unentered areas.

b) Whereas, the pastor is the leader of his district, that all evangelistic thrusts either by the pastor or the dedicated layman in his district should be planned by the pastor and the church board, and further, that a master plan be submitted to the Ministerial Department of the Conference, showing that the proper groundwork has been carried out and proper follow-up work will be completed, and that the expenses of an evangelistic thrust by a layman be supported by the Conference and the local church, with the Conference matching the funds raised by the church on a dollar-for-dollar basis.

c) Recommended to ask the Conference Committee to give consideration and study to the possibility of hiring more Bible workers.

d) Every regular church board meeting should give first priority on their agenda to evangelism.

8. Publishing Department

It was recommended:

a) To continue the present insert "Bible Reference Library" advertisement for the Ingathering magazine for 1977, and in 1978 the insert be included as part of the magazine, either stitched or perforated.

b) That the Publishing Department explore all possible ways in advertising to help literature evangelists get the highest sales.

c) That our churches be encouraged to use low-cost Spirit of Prophecy books and our magazines such as *Life and Health*, *Ministry of Healing* and *Christ's Object Lessons* to be sold by the children and young people as a means of raising funds, the Publishing Department to work with the Education Department to promote this project.

d) We encourage every church to have a full-time or part-time literature evangelist.

e) That each church have a Publishing secretary to promote the activities of the Publishing Department of the Conference.

f) That we ask the Publishing Department to work with the Lay Activities Department to make available to the literature evangelists and the churches a low-cost piece of literature containing church doctrines for mass distribution with a Canadian return address.

9. Department of Stewardship and Development

Whereas the Ontario Conference has the highest per capita tithe in Canada, but one of the lowest per capita missions offerings, it is recommended:

a) To ask the Stewardship secretary of each church to promote mission offerings at least once a month by giving information on the church offering totals.

b) To inform the Sabbath School and church about where the offerings are going and the purpose for which the offerings will be used, to promote more liberal giving.

c) To ask the church board to request the services of the Stewardship secretary of the Conference to visit the church to promote the Stewardship program which would establish percentages of offerings.

10. Communication Department

Recommended:

a) That the church members involve themselves in local community projects such as Heart Fund, Cancer Society,

Smoking and Health Organization.

b) To give preference to young people with an aptitude for communication work, and to make available training in the communication field through seminars.

c) To utilize General Conference and Conference materials available so that items may be published in local newspapers and carried by local radio and television stations on a regular basis.

d) To submit current articles, with pictures, to the Conference Communication director for submission to the *Canadian Adventist Messenger* and other denominational publications.

11. Education Department

There was considerable discussion regarding the need for parents to be educated on the benefits of church schools in order that they might more enthusiastically support these institutions for our children. This could be accomplished by church school teachers, pastors in their sermons, visits of the conference personnel to promote church schools, and by emphasis on church schools in Sabbath School. It was recommended:

a) That the Conference encourage teachers in large schools which serve a number of churches to join various churches in order that the teachers' influence in promoting church schools may be distributed throughout the constituent churches.

After these reports from the various committees considerable time was spent discussing the Keswick Adventist Conference Camp and the New Frenda Youth Camp. It was quite clear, after this discussion, that the delegates who had assembled wanted both camps to be retained by the Conference, and that the members become involved in fund raising so that both camps could soon be paid for. A plan of finance was presented and is now being promoted in our churches throughout Ontario, as follows:

1. That every church accept a goal based on two-thirds of membership as of June 30, 1977, at \$60.00 a member for 1977; \$55.00 per member for 1978; \$50.00 for 1979; and \$45.00 for 1980. If this plan were followed consistently, by 1980 the camps would be completely paid for.

The Constituency Meeting indicated a strong feeling of interest in the work of God here in Ontario. We were pleased with the enthusiastic discussions that ensued, and we believe that as we move forward in faith and in the strength of

God, much can be accomplished before the next Constituency Meeting in 1978.





It is understood that TEN TALENTS is not stocked by the Adventist Book Centres in Eastern or Western Canada. However TEN TALENTS is presently being re-edited to clarify information on some of the controversial areas mentioned in the February 1 article. The revised edition is available from Dr. and Mrs. F.
