Wayne and Diane Castellerin listened to the Voice of Prophecy radio program and mailed a request for the Nu-Life Bible Course in August of 1978. They did not know that these were from the Seventh-day Adventists.

A non-Seventh-day Adventist neighbour told Diane about Janet Geortzen who goes to church on Saturday. Diane walked by her house to the mail box each day that week hoping that Janet would invite her into the house. When she was not invited in by Friday, Diane went to Janet's door, and introduced herself. They became friends and in conversation discovered that Janet's husband was a roommate of one of Diane's teachers in public high school. Diane says, "He did a lot to help me. God works in so many ways."

Diane's mother was in Hudson Hope at this time and picked up a card in a doctor's office advertising the Bible Story and health materials. She put Diane's name and address on the card and mailed it. Mr. Lee Dunbar contacted Diane and wanted to explain the health materials to her. As he held the card to read her name she saw the other side which advertised the Bible Stories. This is what she wanted. Mr. Dunbar invited her to attend the Adventist church, too. God was working through another person to prepare the way.

Wayne and Diane did not attend church immediately, but they did begin to study the Bible with Ron and Janet who invited them to the It Is Written Revelation Seminar in the Bayshore Inn in Vancouver in October of 1978. They continued the seminar studies with Pastor Les Sayler and were baptized in February of 1979. They are members of the Aldergrove church in B.C.

This story shows how many people and programs are used by God to lead seekers of truth to Him. The Voice of Prophecy radio program and correspondence lessons, friendly neighbours, a dedicated school teacher, a prompt literature evangelist, dedicated lay workers to give Bible studies, the It Is Written Revelation Seminar, and a consecrated pastor were all used by God to lead these people to Christ.

The work of God will be finished quickly when the laity and the ministry join in God's work. Let us make the 1000 Days of Reaping fruitful with this type of co-operative venture with the Lord so that the Holy Spirit can work with great power.

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Media Evangelism — It Is Written, Destiny, ARTS

Many of you have wondered "What is the present relationship of It Is Written to ARTS and Destiny?" I will try to explain this as we see it at the present time. As you know, adaptations must be made to meet changes in our society and to spread the gospel. These adaptations may take several months to complete. Our main purpose is to reach as many people with the gospel for the dollars we have available.

First of all I will try to define these three ministries. It Is Written and Destiny are television ministries which are on the air presenting the gospel. ARTS (Adventist Radio-Television Services) is a production facility used to produce Destiny, It Is Written, Portuguese television programs, radio and TV spots, evangelism spots for pastors and evangelists, and hopefully, health and other productions. The staff at ARTS is also part of the evangelistic follow-up program. I will explain this a little later.

Television time is very expensive. Our budget for telecast time for IIW is more than \$350,000 a year in Canada, with a total budget of \$450,000. This pays for one or two major stations in each Conference or province. We have the following major stations: BC — CHAN or BC TV network, Alberta — CFAC and CFRN, Saskatchewan — CFQC and CKOS, Manitoba — CKY, Ontario — Global Network, Maritime Conference — ATV network. We have a few small stations — Swift Current, Sask., Thunder Bay and Wingham in Ontario, and Plattsburg, New York which comes into southern Quebec and into Montreal by cable. We are on three small stations in the large province of Quebec with the French *Il Est Ecrit*. Due to lack of funds we dropped seven stations early in 1982. We need better coverage in Ontario than we have now.

The Destiny program is at present on a small station in Toronto and in Red Deer, Alberta. We are unable to pay for two separate television programs with our present income at It Is Written, ARTS and Destiny. Therefore, we have decided to discontinue the Destiny program. We wish we did not have to do this. There is room in the TV market for both, but we do not have the money to buy the air time. Therefore it was decided that Pastor Henry Feyerabend would be doing the book offer and prayer alert segments on the It Is Written program when new programs are taped. We have 19 of these which will be telecast in the early part of 1983. We still have to repeat a few until we can produce more new programs. At present the plan is to do some more in May.



We are also planning to have Pastor Feyerabend do one complete program each month on the IIW telecast. We hope to be able to begin his monthly program about June. In this way he will receive good exposure in Canada.

It is impossible for Pastors George Vandeman and Roland Lenhoff to follow-up the telecast successfully in all of North America. Therefore, we have asked Pastor Feyerabend to appear on the It Is Written program and do the evangelistic follow-up for Canada.

Now, this is where ARTS fits into the evangelistic picture. Pastor Feyerabend will produce his programs at the ARTS studio as he has always done. Also, plans are underway to bring the IIW set from Montreal to the ARTS studio for Pastor Vandeman to tape at ARTS in late spring or early summer. We will need about \$50,000 of work done at the ARTS studio to make this possible. The ARTS staff will assist in the production of the IIW telecasts.



The ARTS staff will produce evangelism spots for pastors and evangelists advertising their crusades. In this way the whole staff becomes involved in a form of evangelism. We have a very dedicated staff who are interested in serving our Canadian churches.

The ARTS staff will also be involved in direct evangelism. Pastor Feyerabend is scheduled for 4 crusades a year. The first two in 1983 are in Lacombe, Alta., and Toronto, Ont. Two are planned for the fall. Pastor Frank McMiller will be with him at the beginning of each crusade. He also produces the handbills for the crusades, does the public relations and fund raising for ARTS.

No doubt you are now wondering about the financing. The donations for IIW are for air time, books, and taping new programs. The ARTS facility is a production studio operated by a staff who are also involved and interested in evangelism. The donations to ARTS keep up the studio so we can save money in taping IIW, evangelism advertising spots and other programs for the church. Your donations to ARTS help to keep the taping costs to a minimum and help keep the evangelistic follow-up program functioning. Monies received from commercial work help to keep the studio operating. The total annual ARTS budget is over \$400,000. Both IIW and ARTS need our support — IIW for air time and literature, ARTS for production and follow-up evangelism. Some people are able to support both, some want to support ARTS, some IIW. We appreciate the support of our members. We also receive support from non-Adventists.

Luchaks Honoured at 70th Wedding Anniversary Dinner

A 70th wedding anniversary buffet dinner in honour of Nick and Mary Luchak was hosted by the family in the Ukrainian Manor residence in Vancouver, British Columbia.

In early childhood, Mr. and Mrs. Luchak, with their respective families, migrated to Canada in August of 1903 from Bukovina, Austria (now Ukraine). Arriving in Edmonton, Alberta, the families constructed box-like scows, tarred the seams, and ventured east on the North Saskatchewan River. Since there were no roads, this form of transportation was the only answer for getting to their destination in the now Stry-Ispas-Hamlin area.

Nick and Mary Luchak were united in marriage on February 1, 1912. Their new homestead was in the Hamlin area where they farmed for fourteen years leaving for Vancouver in 1926 with their seven children – Doris, Sadie, Bill, Michael, Janice, Violet and John. The eighth child, Alec, was born in Vancouver.

They were toasted as the true pioneers who came to a wilderness of trees and tall grasses; who endured the hardships of severe winters without adequate clothing or housing; who cleared the land, built homes, cultivated and planted with homemade tools and machinery to make Canada a better place to live in for their children and all future generations.

In the late 1930's the Adventist message came to the family through the evangelistic efforts of Elder Demchuk. Mr. and Mrs. Luchak are members of the Vancouver Central Seventh-day Adventist Church. Mr. Luchak is now 90 years of age; Mrs. Luchak, 84. They are presently residing in the Ukrainian Manor in Vancouver.

New Start Retreat Held at Camp Hope, B.C.

N.E.W. S.T.A.R.T., a health retreat, was held at the Camp Hope Lodge, November 7-14, with nine guests participating. The program includes a variety of features designed to help guests make the kinds of positive lifestyle changes that would lead to optimal health.

The group consisting of four non-Adventists and five Adventists are already finding rewards from the Lord's N.E.W. S.T.A.R.T. (see *Ministry of Healing*, p. 127) lifestyle that offers the best in nutrition, exercise, water, sunshine, temperance, air, rest, and trust in Divine power.

Ron Ruskjer, program director, Reuben Matiko, medical director, John Irvine, health educator, Mrs. Evelin Lewis, food director and Walter Eaton, lodge host, were responsible for the retreat. It began with a risk evaluation for heart disease, cancer, and stroke which are Canada's three leading killers for each participant. Also included in the evaluation was a dietary history, blood pressure measurement, blood testing to determine serum cholesterol, high density lipoproteins, triglycerides and glucose levels, testing to determine various aspects of physical fitness, lung capacity measurement and a computerized longevity projection.

Supervised group exercise came daily, together with tasty and attractive vegetarian meals, a complete cooking school, medical lectures, films, recreational activities and a look at the spiritual side of health.

One Thousand Plans and Methods Discuss

The B.C. Camp at Hope was chosen as the venue of the Evangelistic Council for the Canadian Union Conference and the North Pacific Union. Elder W.R. Bornstein, Ministerial Secretary of the Canadian Union Conference and W.H. McVay, Ministerial Secretary of North Pacific Union Conference laid the foundation for this important council to discuss better methods and plans to cooperate with the Holy Spirit to win souls during the 1000 Days of Reaping.

A warm welcome to the delegates was given by P.F. Lemon, Secretary of the Canadian Union and G.E. Maxson, President of the British Columbia Conference. Elder Lemon also made several other presentations.

The keynote address Thursday evening, December 9, 1982 was given by Roland Lenhoff of It Is Written in the United States. He pointed out the increase in knowledge from the time of horse travel in antiquity to rocket travel to the moon when we broke the gravity barrier to travel into space. He said "we can blast man into eternity but we do not have the spiritual means to take him there. We have not yet broken the thought barrier totally successfully." Right thinking produces right actions and habits, he said. Using the parable of the ten virgins he reminded us that we must have a full supply of the Holy Spirit to be ready for the Bridegroom, Jesus Christ.

The main emphasis during this council was on public evangelism. However, lay involvement was given great importance.

Personal preparation of the evangelist and team is very important. This is accomplished under the direction of the Holy Spirit. The success to soul winning depends on creating and holding interest and meeting a felt need. It was pointed out that meeting a felt need had more lasting results than just satisfying an interest.

W.C. Scales, Ministerial Secretary for the North American Division, gave some success secrets for gospel fishermen. You must prepare properly to go fishing which includes preparation of the evangelistic team, church and community. We must go to where they are running and launch out into the deep. You must put faith into action. "If you want to catch fish, you must go fishing," he concluded.

In another meeting, Scales stressed the importance of loving the members first and foremost. Then the pastor and evangelist should challenge, enlist, train, assign, guide and encourage them.

A special feature of the council was the small group concept. The whole group divided into small groups to discuss questions on evangelism and its relationship to the 1000 Days of Reaping. W.R. C.U.C. Library Adapts to Modern Technology

Recent years have witnessed a major change in both school and public libraries. The emergence of new reproduction methods and space-saving techniques have revolutionized the library so that the term "library" is almost out-of-date. The new term is "media centre."

Reflecting this change, Canadian Union College recently reported the accession of its eleven-hundredth audio-visual program. There are on file audio-visual items "ranging from a set of filmstrips on nutrition and fitness to a video-tape discussing ancient Chinese philosophy."

Also, in harmony with this change to multiple types of reading, viewing, and listening, the library has recently installed a set of carrels wired for electricity. These provide easier accessibility to the audio-visual materials for students as well as for those college professors who may wish to preview them before use in the classroom.

The five carrels contain a stereo record player, a slide-tape viewer, a sound filmstrip projector and a microfiche reader/printer. A video monitor has just arrived and will be installed in the fifth carrel so that teachers and students can study or preview video tapes in the library.

A sample of the filmstrips available is *The Life and Work of Ellen G. White*. In this filmstrip, Arthur L. White uses paintings and photographs of places and people associated with his grandmother to illustrate his narration of her life in this sound filmstrip.

Campus visitors are encouraged to browse the media centre and to use these facilities which have been provided to make learning both modern and fascinating.

Important – Important – Important For Every Messenger Reader

We're throwing money away. That's right. Your Canadian Union Conference throws money away practically every day that mail is delivered. Why? Because we receive brown envelopes from the post office for each of which we must pay 30¢. (And postal rates are going up, they say.) These are notices from the post office that the Canadian Adventist Messenger cannot be delivered to the address on the label. At the post office they tear off the back page of the magazine, enclose it in a brown envelope and return it to the Messenger office. Today there were 100 such envelopes that had accumulated over the Christmas holiday.

You don't have to be a mathematician to calculate the loss –

30¢ for each envelope from the post office

20¢ for the original postage of the magazine

25¢ for the cost of the magazine which was never received

$75¢ \times 100 = \$75.00$

When we receive these notices that the Messenger is no longer deliverable to the address on the label, we enter this in our computer and this name is deleted. Invariably we will receive a letter in a few months or weeks inquiring as to the reason why we are no longer sending the Messenger and requesting us to mail back copies. This is another expense.

Please, fellow church members, please help us save your money that we would otherwise throw away. **Please** let us know you are moving by sending in your change of address about six weeks ahead of your moving date. If there is more than one magazine coming to your home, notify us of that also. Notice must also be sent when someone in your church is deceased. Always give your name in the same way, for example, either A. Jones or Mrs. Agnes Jones, or A.C. Jones, as it appears on your mailing address label.

Costs are being closely watched in these days of soaring inflation. The Union paper may have to be cut back to 12 issues a year instead of 24. A little care by each of us can eliminate to a great degree this unnecessary expense.

Use the address label inside of the back cover. Print plainly. Mail promptly to The Messenger, 1148 King St. E., Oshawa, Ont. L1H 1H8. Be sure the label with your address on is on the reverse side. The code is absolutely essential for the computer.

All S.D.A. church members residing in Canada should automatically receive the Messenger. If, for some reason, you have been receiving it and have missed 2 or more issues (allowing for lack of mail delivery) send us the label from a previous copy or your name and address **exactly** as it appeared on your former paper.

Thank you for helping us save **your** funds for the Lord's work in Canada.

This beautiful metal scotch-lite vinyl coated sign is available to our churches in Canada through the conference Communication Department. Your conference will send the orders through to us.

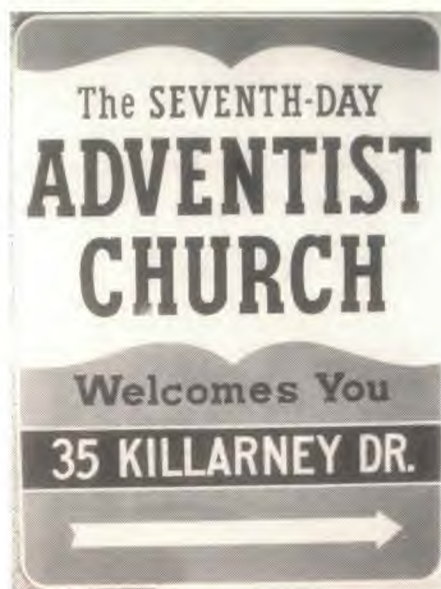

Seminary Announces Changes in Tuition and Admission

The 1982-83 academic year has witnessed some important changes in the program of the Seventh-day Adventist Theological Seminary at Andrews University. A new curriculum, under long study and development, has been put into effect with a greater emphasis on the practical aspects of ministerial training in almost every course taught. The major innovation in the curriculum is the *Pastoral Formation* section in which the student body is divided into groups of 8-12 and assigned to work and worship in churches within a radius of 45 miles of the University. Supervision is shared by the church pastor and a seminary professor who has become a member of that congregation. Each group meets with its Pastor and Professor on Monday mornings from 7:30 to 9:00 for prayer, dialogue, and planning. At 9:00 all groups gather in the Chapel for a joint assembly. This fall quarter the emphasis in Assembly has been on ecclesiology with lectures on various aspects of the Church's self-understanding and mission. Animated dialogue and discussion has usually followed. Students and faculty have responded with enthusiasm to this approach to ministerial training, and morale is high.

Students enter the Seminary from a wide variety of educational and national backgrounds. Currently 143 have earned undergraduate majors in theology, 66 in religion, 4 in engineering, 3 in english, 2 in history and 1 in geography. Other majors include social ecology, marketing, journalism, mathematics, biology, public health, industrial arts, auto mechanics, philosophy, elementary education, and chemistry. Even though theology/religion majors have an initial advantage when it comes to pre-requisites, any person with a bachelor's degree, and feels called to ministry, may apply for admission. Students may enroll only for the sequence that begins with the fall quarter of each year. No beginning admissions are accepted for the winter and spring quarters. The student who plans to begin his/her Seminary program in the fall, and who has deficiencies that need to be made up, must plan to arrive in June for the summer sessions.

The present student body has a wide variety of professional goals. Most plan on becoming pastor/evangelists. Some plan to specialize in evangelism and will take their ninth quarter at the Lake Union Soul Winning Institute near Chicago. Some are planning on mission service. Military

chaplaincy is the goal for a few. Some are interested in hospital chaplaincy. Others are planning on careers as religion teachers in Adventist academies or colleges. There are even a few who hope to become professors in one of the growing sisterhood of SDA Theological Seminaries. A few are interested in editorial work, or employment in secular institutions as teachers or chaplains.

Or call, toll free, 800-253-2874 (800-632-2248 in Michigan). Applications must be returned no later than February 28. Acceptances will be mailed out by April 15. Late applications will be considered on a space available basis only.
