500 Hiroshima Atomic Bombs

ES, THAT WAS THE EQUIVALENT FORCE OF ENERGY released when Mount St. Helens blew her top just five years ago on May 18, 1980. That ash-charged blast heard 200 miles away, removed 1,300 feet from the top of that beautiful mountain. In more striking terms, it meant moving a ton of rock and ash for every person on earth.

The north face of the mountain had been bulging at a rate of five feet per day for several weeks. That eruption left a crater 2,000 feet deep. Three hundred homes were buried or swept away. A resort lodge was buried in 300 feet of sediment.

Wind velocity reached 200 miles per hour, temperature reached as high as 500 degrees celsius and the flow of debris, including huge trees with diameters of up to seven feet, swept down the mountain and valley reaching speeds of almost 90 miles per hour. Some transported trees and stumps were deposited in upright positions miles away. One stump 7 feet in diameter and 45 feet tall was vertically deposited in a mud bank.

The once beautiful Mount St. Helens with the gem-like Spirit Lake at her feet is now a shattered remnant of her former self. All of this just five years ago. Do you remember?

And so many said, "Time must be short." And so many quoted Luke 21:11, "And great earthquakes shall be in divers places . . . and fearful sights and great signs shall there be from heaven." "All of these are the beginning of sorrow." Matthew 24:8.

There have been many sorrows — Afghanistan, India, Ethiopia and what will be next? We cry out, "How long, oh Lord, how long?" When will Jesus come "and not keep silent?" How can His coming be hastened?

The answer lies with each of us. Spring brings new life. The seeds, plants and flowers all burst forth with the exuberance of spring. If our Christian experience has been dormant, let it now burst forth with newness of life and a newness of purpose.

Let us hasten the "glad tidings." Let the "blessed hope" swell forth. Let the external physical manifestation be signals to each of us to be

Family Forum

This is a new column with an old theme.

Deut. 6:7 reads, "And thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up." God has been giving us counsel for years. The problem comes in selecting, applying, following and enduring His counsel.

Talk about confusing! Especially when it comes to our families. No one knows what to do. Yet, everyone has an answer. "Read your Bible." "Ellen White says. . . " "This is what I would do." "It's your problem, not mine." The list goes on. The confusion, hurt, and anger also go on. The family slowly crumbles, along with one's faith or explodes in violence or abuse. Only tragic "if only" memories remain. This is all too true for many of our families today.

There are some very disturbing statistics about the family. 56% of couples have at some time been violent. 20% are repeatedly violent. The domestic disturbance calls are the largest single category of police calls and are responsible for 50% of police fatalities and 40% of police injuries. 34% of all murders happened between consorts (spouses and common-law partners). Five out of ten women experience some form of molesting as a child or teenager before leaving home. There are more statistics about divorces, suicides, incest, and battering. The most horrifying discovery is that Seventh-day Adventist homes are not exempt, not by a long way. Family pathology is gaining strength and depth in our church. Our goal now must be not to deny our situations, but to remedy them. We can't just look away or disfellowship or feel bad or feel helpless. Our great God intends us to have peace on earth, whatever the crisis. The family, God's original network for support, guidance and nurturing, has become a battleground or cold war for survival for too many Adventists and much of the rest of the world. This tragedy must be confronted and reversed. The Canadian Union is committed to facing this spiritual and national crisis. One way is the birth of this column.



I'm sometimes asked the question . . . "What is the point in saving one starving Ethiopian child when there are millions you cannot save?"

Let me answer that question with a little story.

It was late 1975 in the Cambatta area of Ethiopia. Our ADRA field director at the time, David Syme, was driving along the road when he noticed an object that looked like a log straddling the middle of the narrow road.

As he swerved to miss the "log," it moved. It was a little three year old boy, Johannes Tutti.

David quickly got out of his vehicle, and rushed to the child. He could hardly believe what his eyes were seeing.

Three-year-old Johannes was no more than a small bag of bones wrapped in a worn-out body that bore all the appearances of a wizened, old man.

Later David discovered that Johannes' brother had dragged the little boy to the middle of the road so that, "he would suffer no more."

What do you do to save the life of a three-yearold boy who weighs only seven pounds?

Well, David didn't waste any time figuring it out. He found the parents and showed them how to use an eye dropper to feed little Johannes fortified warm milk mixed with a vitamin solution.

Weeks passed, and Johannes started to gain weight. His frail muscles slowly began to develop. A spark of light returned to his once dull eyes. He'd even flash a smile on occasion.

Johannes was on the road to recovery.

NINE YEARS LATER

Last year, David returned to the Cambatta area of Ethiopia when someone said, "Come, Mr. Syme, see your friend."

David followed the man to a small hut, when lo and behold, there, standing in front of him was a 13-year-old lad. A normal, healthy, happy, smiling boy.

It was Johannes Tutti . . . the little "log" in

the road. The boy nobody wanted!

Now that I've told you that true story, I ask you the question, "What is the value of saving the life of one starving Ethiopian

The answer is obvious. You can't put a price tag on the life of a child!

That's why ADRA has been in Ethiopia now for more than 15 years - feeding hungry children, providing blankets to protect families from the cold, desert nights, and giving medicine to the sick and the

My friend, we must not . . . we simply must not let these nations become another Ethiopia!

ETHIOPIAN UPDATE

Your offering is the base for all operations of Adventist Development and Relief Agency throughout the year. Projects for development which help people to help themselves with agriculture, water, education, and literacy programs are dependent on the freewill offerings of our members.

We want to thank everyone who has made donations for ADRA, CANADA and Ethiopia Famine Relief. For this special help for the African famine, which has affected 24 different countries, we have received a total of \$380,261. Of that amount, \$166,271.57 has come from our church members, and \$166,271.57 from the Africa Emergency Aid, which was set up by the Federal Government to match the funds raised by development groups such as ADRA. So you can see that all the money raised was matched by the Federal Government, then the Alberta Government has given us a total of \$47,717.00.

The money that was sent in specifically for Ethiopia has been used for that purpose, and so far we have spent \$110,775.00 for cracked wheat, \$35,100.00 for beans, and \$19,727.00 for oil. The shipping costs for these amounts has come to \$84,670.66. The amount that has been allocated for the land transportation — gasoline, truck drivers and inspection tours in Ethiopia is \$35,439.00. We have been able to make a little saving on the ocean freight, and the balance of the money that has been sent to us will be used for the purchase of more wheat and beans.

The first shipment of food, which consisted of 100 tons of cracked wheat, has already arrived in Ethiopia aboard the boat "The Queen of Sheba", the second shipment has been paid for and is aboard the boat the "Kapitan Pavolovic", the third shipment is in the process of purchase and will be sent as soon as possible, on the ship "Malakon."

Donations that are coming in daily will be used for famine relief in areas that Cliff Patterson, our representative in East Africa, will designate as most needy at the time. The money that was designated for African Famine Relief will be used either in Ethiopia or in a needy country as specified by the Division there.

The following project proposals will be helped as far as the money will go. Water related projects in Ghana, Kenya, the Philippines and India, and a sanitation project in Burma. Agricultural projects in Madagascar, Zimbabwe and India; health care centres in Rwanda and Papua, New Guinea, dispensary in India, rural community development in Bangladesh, and a pure water and family gardening project in Chile.

In Brazil ADRA is proposing five wells, a fish farm in Jamaica and some projects in Haiti - one dealing with the planting of cashew nut trees, and another one for an electronic assembly plant that will be fostered by Canutel Industries Ltd., of Lacombe, Alberta.


In reference to Chile, you may remember that \$100,000 of the money given last year by the Alberta Government was used for a nutritional food package there. We have just received photographs and a videotape of the distribution of that food. When the earthquake came in Chile, the only food that ADRA had available was the food that had been donated by the Alberta Government - \$100,000 worth of food. We want to thank them for this, and also we wish to thank the federal government, who provided the transportation for this food. It was used for the public school program of feeding children from underprivileged homes, and when the earthquake came it was used to help alleviate the suffering caused by that earthquake.



ADRA was the first agency to offer aid to Chile following the devastating March 3 earthquake. Within days, 42,000 pounds of emergency relief had been sent to the country and ADRA International personnel were on the scene to report and assess the need for future aid. ADRA's quick response to this disaster and others is possible because of the generous support of Seventh-day Adventists. The only food available was from ADRA, Canada, thanks to the Alberta government and to the federal government who provided the shipping.

Pierre Des Hommes from Ottawa is at a missions institute at Andrews University, and will be leaving for Ethiopia within a month to become our distribution agent there. We are also happy to report that Cliff Patterson, our representative for ADRA for Eastern Africa, will be returning on furlough this year. You may have the opportunity of hearing him speak in your church when he will be able to give you a first-hand report of what has been done with the money that you have given.

Thank you again for your generosity for the Disaster and Famine Relief Offering and for your continued support of ADRA.



RINTENTS

During the past several months the ederal and provincial governments have een preoccupied with some very important natters, which when decided upon will feet our human freedoms for years to ome.

When the Constitution of Canada was roclaimed as the supreme law of the land n April 17, 1982, the coming into force of ection 15 was delayed until April 17, 1985. ection 15 is the "equality-rights" clause hich provides that every individual is equal before and under the law and has the ght to the equal protection and equal enefit of the law without discrimination nd, in particular, without discrimination ased on race, national or ethnic origin, plour, religion, sex, age or mental or hysical disability." The three-year waiting eriod was designed to provide time for the anadian Government and the provinces amend their laws in word and substance as to eliminate any discriminatory lements.

Sensing that the importance of religious reedom may become swamped in the urrently popular debates on racism, exism and other secular human rights, the bubble affairs department of the Church etermined in the beginning of 1985 to present certain religious issues before the overnments in Canada. It was felt that this

would be the opportune time to assist the legislatures in harmonizing existing laws with the Charter of Rights and Freedoms.

At the outset, legal experts predicted that unless the necessary adaptations in existing laws are made there will be an inordinate number of equality rights challenges brought to the courts as individuals and groups assert their civil liberties. It was our purpose to ask the drafters of the legislative amendments to implement certain changes in the laws which would properly accommodate religion. In this way we hope that the Church will not find it necessary to use the costly process of defining religious freedom in Canada through the court system.

In each of our Briefs to the provinces, we pointed out the chilling effect of Sunday laws upon religions which practice the observance of a day other than Sunday. We appealed to most of the provinces to insert a "conscience clause" in their labour relations acts so that workers in the provincial jurisdictions will have the right to be fully exempted from labour union membership based on religious conscience, (Saskatchewan and Manitoba already do have such provisions). Readers will recall that such an exemption was brought into the Canada Labour Code in June, 1984 after special representations were made by the Church in a Parliamentary Committee. With good effect we asked the provinces to follow the lead of the federal government in this matter.

Other related recommendations in our Briefs gave support to widely proposed changes in the Human Rights Acts which are designed to eliminate systemic discrimination in the workplace. We proposed further that the law should place a requirement upon employers to reasonably accommodate employees who cannot conscientiously work during Sabbath hours.

This exercise in government relations on behalf of the Church was an exciting and rewarding adventure for me as I personally met the responsible government officials in order to make our submissions. In each instance much appreciation was expressed to our organization for taking the initiative in communicating our concerns to government. A particular case in point was the remark of Eugene Szach, legal counsel to the Attorney General of Manitoba. He told me how pleased he was that we came forward because he has wanted for some time to come to know what Seventh-day Adventists believe and teach. Later in the interview he took me to meet Mr. Tanner Elton, Deputy Attorney General. He then proceeded on our behalf to convincingly urge the Deputy Minister that the recommendations the Adventists have brought forward are noteworthy and should be implemented without delay.

As I left Szach's office he said, "Many thanks for coming. In my research work for the government, I am mostly isolated from what people are really concerned with in the province. You have certainly informed me today about the concerns of Seventhday Adventists." It was my privilege, in addition to the Brief, to also present Mr. Szach with appropriate literature on what Adventists believe.

So willing were the government people to hear our views that when I proposed to visit British Columbia, Robert Edwards, Q.C., offered to take extra time during a government visit to Toronto in order to hear our Brief. He said he would be happy to save the Church the travel costs involved



in a trip to Victoria. At the appointed place in Toronto, he left an important conference and spent an hour hearing our points and quizzing me on some of the fundamental beliefs of our Church.

Newfoundland provided one of the most interesting dialogues. During our presentation to a lawyer of the Justice Department, Ed Reimche, acting education superintendent for the Church in Newfoundland at the time, and I made reference to the fact that Seventh-day Adventist Christians observe the Sabbath while other Christians, for religious reasons, observe Sunday. The lawyer interrupted saying, "Some people observe Sunday for historical reasons only, because there is no religious authority in the Bible for observing Sunday." Obviously he was very understanding of our reasons for recommending the repeal of Sunday legislation in Newfoundland.

Similar to our visit in Newfoundland was the cordial reception given to our Brief by the Director of the Law Reform Commission. The Honourable Wylie Wilkie, once a judge in another country, was approving of all our recommendations and promised to refer these matters to the Department of Justice for inclusion in a Bill to make legislative changes. He was most sensitive to the Sabbath/Sunday issue and stated that in his view, this issue as it is now before the Supreme Court of Canada in the matter of The Queen v. Big M Drug Mart and also in the name of The Attorney General of Ontario v. Videoflicks, is the most crucial matter in defining religious freedom that Canada has ever experienced. Adventists will recall that the Church has taken its part in this process of defining religious freedom by its interventions in these Sunday observance cases heard in the Court of Appeal of Alberta and of Ontario.

Recently, while in attendance in Quebec

City at the Third International Conference on Human Rights, I had the opportunity of meeting Justice Walter Tarnopolsky, Justice of the Ontario Court of Appeal. Mr. Justice Tarnopolsky is one of the five justices who heard arguments in the *Videoflicks* case in which the Adventist Church was an intervenent.

I took the time to express to Justice Tarnopolsky my personal appreciation for the decision he wrote on behalf of the Court. I said, "The requirement for an unlimited exemption in the Ontario Retail Business Holidays Act which you put forward in your Judgment is much appreciated by Seventh-day Adventists."

With his typical modesty, Justice Tarnopolsky answered, "Well, the Adventists had most excellent counsel in the person of Ian Scott. He represented your interests very well. You will note that my Judgment follows the arguments given by Ian Scott and J.J. Robinette in the matter of religious freedom."

Seventh-day Adventists in Canada have had and continue to have an important role in the development of the Canadian story. Our purpose for existence goes beyond simply enjoying our own right to survive in our often closed communities. Governments and courts recognize us as an integral part of the mosaic of Canadian culture. We must be vigilent in communicating our beliefs and concerns in order that we fulfill our place in preserving the freedoms we enjoy and in using well our opportunities for witnessing concerning the truths of God.

As we often repeat it in these columns—please pray for our governments, for our judges and for all thought leaders in Canada so that through them, God's blessed will may be done in this great land of religious freedom.

On May 25 You Can Invest in God's Radio Station on Guam

"You'll never get a license to build a radio station on Guam," is what they told Tulio Haylock, associate communication director at the General Conference. But the station that couldn't be came closer to being a reality early this year as definite plans for its construction took shape on Guam.

A 22-acre tract of land on Facpi Point, near the village of Agat, will soon become the home of Adventist World Radio/Asia.

From this vantage point overlooking the Philippine Sea, God has planned that His saving message will be sent to all Asia, from Siberia's frozen tundra in the north to Sri Lanka's tropical shore in the south. In over 25 languages the gospel message will be beamed by four powerful 100,000 watt transmitters into the great cities and remote corners of the world's most populous

continent.

"Since arriving on Guam we have been working full time on planning the property site and buildings and securing the services of an architect and engineers," Dr. Steele said. "At the same time we have had to start our search for personnel and lay solid groundwork for programming. We have made progress in all these areas." He added, "Ground-breaking ceremonies are planned for mid-July."

May 25 is designated as the General Conference Session Offering to build the new Adventist World Radio - Asia station on the island of Guam. The Adventist Church will have the opportunity to reach one-half of the world population through this single outreach endeavour. Remember May 25.

H.M.S. Richards, Sr. Dies



Elder H.M.S. Richards, Sr., founder of the Voice of Prophecy Radio Broadcast, died on Wednesday, April 24, 1985 at 4:40 p.m., in Newbury Park, California. He entered a coma five days before and never regained consciousness. Dr. Richards was 90 years old and had suffered several strokes which began in August of 1982.

Since that time, he and his wife Mabel, have resided at Ventura Estates, an Adventist Retirement home near the Voice of Prophecy Headquarters, in Newbury Park, California.

The funeral was held on Friday, April 26 at Loma Linda, California, with a private graveside service for the family. Public memorial services were held on April 27, at Loma Linda University Church and on May 4, at Glendale City Church, where he was a member since 1952.

Dr. Richards was born in Iowa on August 28, 1894, and met his wife Mabel, in Ottawa, Ontario, Canada, in 1919 while he was pastoring the Ottawa District, and she was employed as the church school teacher. They were married on April 14, 1920.



NCE IN FIVE YEARS the world Sabbath School focuses attention on the unfinished business in North America. Two projects chosen to benefit from the Thirteenth Sabbath Special Projects Offering this quarter will benefit native Americans.

More than half of Pastor Jim Kincaid's Alaskan parishioners are native Americans. Each Sabbath morning he flies more than 300 miles, caring for three churches, situated above the Arctic Circle. One of them, the Selawik church, is a simple wooden structure in desperate need of

rebuilding. Its 16 members hunt and fish for a living.

'What little cash they have to buy oil and clothing comes from the skins they occasionally sell or from government welfare cheques," Jim says. "They cannot rebuild their church without our help."

Unlike mission schools in other world divisions, Seventh-day Adventist schools for native Americans all began as selfsupporting institutions. They were, and to some extent still are, staffed by volunteers. These schools have operated for years with meager facilities.

The administration building at the Seventh-day Adventist School for Native Americans near Holbrook, Arizona, was originally built in 1940, and added to in 1951. Over the years it has been dormitory, cafeteria, staff living quarters, and right now serves as classroom block. But the school is fast outgrowing its facilities. It needs more office space and classrooms. A new administration building, to be built from this quarter's Special Projects Offering, will provide the needed office space and new classrooms.

Children from at least 12 tribal groups

attend the school, living peaceably together. They help to cultivate the land, learn auto mechanics, and study hard. Holbrook is well known as a vocational training school. Its students may become certified as welders and nurse aids, as well as in office practice and home economics. All six in the 1984 graduating class went on to college — five to Union College in Nebraska, and one to a vocational college.

But the most gratifying sign of growth at Holbrook school is spiritual, according to Shirley Burton, associate director of the General Conference communication department and a long-time friend of the school. After many years of seed sowing, many of the older students are committed Adventists and increasing numbers of former students and parents of students are committing themselves to the Christ of Holbrook school.

Tony and Franklin Goldtooth, first generation Navaho Americans, attended Holbrook. Franklin and his wife, also a former Holbrook student, were charter members of the recently organized Waterflow Seventh-day Adventist church. Their daughter will graduate from Holbrook this spring.

"The pioneers of Holbrook school longed to see native Americans join the church in significant numbers as they are doing today," says David James, the school's principal. "The steady Christian influence of this school over the years is just now coming to fruition."

A medical/dental mobile clinic for the Southwest Region and remodelling the North American Evangelism Institute in Chicago are the other two Thirteenth Sabbath projects for this quarter.

No Tuition Increase at CUC/PAA

"There will be no increase in tuition at either Canadian Union College or Parkview Adventist Academy for the academic year beginning in September 1985," states Eric Rajah, Director of Student Finances and Information Services. The announcement was made following the March 7, 1985 meeting of the Executive Committee of the CUC Board of Trustees.

"A number of Adventist colleges have been forced to increase tuition this year," reports CUC president, Malcolm Graham. "With no tuition increase at CUC and the lower Canadian dollar it now costs much less at CUC than at most other North American Adventist colleges," Graham emphasizes.

"With the increased number of accredited courses," states Dr. Reo Ganson, Vice-President for Academic Affairs, "many students who previously went to the U.S.A. can now find the courses they require at CUC, and at a much lower rate."

Student finance director, Eric Rajah encourages any prospective college or academy student who may be concerned about how to pay his school expenses, to phone him collect at (403)782-3381, extension 274. Mr. Rajah has information about work opportunities, loans and grants, and a growing number of scholarships.

Employment opportunities for students are coordinated by Don Stoyanowski who left a successful construction business to become a theology student at CUC. Youth Plan Methods of Witnessing





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
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
