CCASIONALLY the Seventhdav Adventist Church has been unfairly criticized by writers of books, big newspaper reporters and journalists. At times, what has been written is hurtful and unjust. At other times, the criticisms we have read or heard are precisely true and well-deserved. In any case, it is true that the critics of the "Advent-Faith" and of the "Advent-people" may have at times caused us to flinch and shrink-back with feelings of being persecuted. Consequently we have sometimes failed to see the value there is in having been criticized.

One of the best things that has happened in the interest of the church in recent years is that a certain objective-minded Baptist minister, (Church Growth Consultant, Carl George, Professor at Fuller Institute of Church Growth), has spoken out about the Seventh-day Adventist Church and about the way we live our church-life. May I suggest that we ought to listen to what he has said and we ought to make some of the changes he recommends out of his

extensive research of our denomination.

Recently I discovered a thought-provoking proverb. It makes me appreciate when someone has a constructive criticism to offer. Solomon said, "A rebuke goes deeper into a man of understanding than a hundred blows into a fool." (Proverbs 17:10, RSV). So, when outside observers of our church say something about us as a church, I think we ought to weigh the merits of what is said to make sure we don't suffer the fate of fools who need multiple blows before they understand.

Of all the critics of Adventism over the years, Carl George has been the most generous with his compliments. For example he says, ''Adventists are people who do good in the world because you are so aware of another world.'' He said this in context of our firm belief in the Second Coming of Jesus Christ.

But, to balance the equation, George identifies one of the most serious considerations that we have. In the book entitled *Empty Pews*, *Empty Streets*, he assesses our development over the years in a positive way. He said, "Your transition from sect to church means that you are more conscious of other Christians today than ever before. There is more exchange between Adventists and other churches than at any other point in your history. You are more aware of other Christians, and more willing to admit that people hunger after Jesus in many places."

Subsequent to that, George asks a penetrating question which pertains to the issue of why too many of our members walk away from the church (of course, one is too many). He affirms the Christcenteredness of our theology, then he says, "You still believe people find Christ best in the Adventist system. I can't argue with your point of view. People who come to you are greatly helped and are probably much better Christians than they would be in many other systems. But there are those within your church who feel they find Christ more easily in other fellowships. What will you do with them?"

Although our theology is Christ-centered, the issue is whether or not we manifest Christ in our lives for the purpose of keeping in the church all those who love Christ and yet who dare to differ on some points of faith.

Carl George's answer to his question is this "You need a recommitment to our Lord Jesus Christ and His great commission that we should go into all the earth, as many of you have been faithfully practicing. You must have renewed commitment to His great commandment that we should love one another, which you do very well, except for Adventists with whom you disagree." (Italics supplied).

The observation is both frightful and profound at the same time. Are some of us, in our dogmatism unmixed with Christian love, demanding that our brothers and sisters see all things just as we do? And, when we find differing points of view among us, do we respond with less tolerance than we would with other Christians or even unbelievers? Do we tend to alienate some of those who are true Christians but who cannot Continued on page 5

When the explanation was made, they prayed, and a glorious tearful reconciliation was effected by God's Spirit. Assured of being back on the list was of secondary importance.

When the church was identified, another businessman became misty-eyed when he recounted with deep gratitude how his father, many years ago, had been cared for by an Adventist family in Red Deer, Alberta.

God's Spirit is at work in His people. Please experience the blessing for yourself in ADRA/Ingathering. They are there just for the asking.

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
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Pacific Press Board Chooses Canadian As New President

"We appreciate the interest of the Canadian government and the help of ADRA Canada for the people and church members in Angola." So reads the FAX message.

What was behind it? Elder Gary DeBoer some months ago was a member of a government appointed task force to evaluate Angola.

He reports that since the Portuguese withdrew in 1975, when Angola received its independence, that internal turmoil has paralyzed the whole country. Rebels, South Africa, and Cuba have all sought control. \$20 billion later we have a politically chaotic country with a very fragile peace.

Hundreds of thousands have been either displaced or crippled indiscriminate use of land mines has seen to that. This country has one of the highest rates in the world for infant mortality.

In the middle of all this, how has the SDA Church survived? The answer is very well indeed! The Adventist membership is just over 100,000, just about 3 times the Canadian membership.

Pastors and members are involved in community outreach, training the people in parenting, health care, education, and the Scriptures.

Into all this came the FAX message. Severe drought conditions in the four southern provinces confirm a crop failure ranging from 64% to 90%. Warehouses are empty except for small quantities of food reserved for orphanages and hospitals.

Serious hunger is expected to prevail in the Southern region until this November when some vegetable crops become available. The next cereal crops will not be ready before June of 1990.

Help is on the way from ADRA and other agencies. In the Southern provinces, where the famine is most severe, there are 95 Adventist Churches. Could they be praying "How long, oh Lord, how long?"

find Christ among us?

It is very well that we are perceived as being accepting of non-Seventh-day Adventist Christians who obviously have viewpoints which differ from ours. It is not very good at all that there is evidence that in dealing with our own within the church, we are not so accepting. At this time in the development of our church, when difficult issues are being raised, such as *Women in Ministry*, let us see if we can do better in manifesting the spirit of Jesus Christ toward each other.

Nationwide Survey Will Study Attitudes, Practices of Adventists

The Survey Research of Loma Linda University will conduct a nationwide survey of Seventh-day Adventists across Canada. This comprehensive study will gather information regarding health status, dietary practices, and the use of drugs, medicines, and health care facilities. Also to be studied: members' views towards the church, attendance, involvement in church activities, and financial support. Other topics covered include children's attendance at Adventist schools and members' opinions regarding divorce and abortion.

Because the survey is comprehensive it will take about one hour to complete. Those church members selected for this study will receive their questionnaire in the mail. They are asked to complete and return this questionnaire as soon as possible. Questionnaires in French will be made available to those who prefer them.

All information gathered is strictly confidential and used only for statistical purposes. No personal information will be disclosed to anyone.

Some 500 households will be chosen from the seven Canadian conferences. Churches chosen and certain households from those churches (approximately 14) will be selected by a scientific sampling procedure similar to that used by the Gallup and Lou Harris Polls.

Although there have been several health studies of Canadian Adventists, there is no comprehensive national baseline data on our health status, health practices, and attitudes. According to Jan W. Kuzma, Ph.D., Director of the Survey Research Service, at Loma Linda University, "Such data are needed to determine the impact of church programs and cultural influences upon typical church members." Over the years there has been a recognized need for objective Canadian-based information regarding the practices, attitudes, concerns, and needs of Seventh-day Adventists in Canada.

We urge all who are selected to participate in this very important survey. The results of this survey will be of great value as we make our plans for the growth of the Church in Canada. Thank you for responding.

Our Hands Do Span The Oceans

he "Ingathering World Service Appeal" continues to be one of the most effective community outreach activities of the SDA Church. 85% of our pastors and lay-leaders find Ingathering to be an effective form of witnessing. Only rarely does the public respond with hostility to the "Annual Appeal".

The great satisfaction and reward of Ingathering comes, not just from the dollars raised, but from requests for community service, health education, varied literature and Bible studies. Possibly the North American churches' best kept secret is that about 400 individuals per year are baptized who were first contacted by ingatherers.

Here in Canada last year, we raised over \$750,000—about half by public solicitation and the other half by personal donations. With a potential of 38,000 Canadian Adventists, we should easily have an army of solicitors to reach an approachable public. It would be thrilling to once again catch the Ingathering ''spirit'' of earlier days when whole churches enthusiastically made the ''Appeal'' one of the highlights of their church calendar.

At this time, less attention by the public media does not mean that the needs are reduced—the needs are staggering. Over 500 Adventist Community Service (ACS) Centres in the North American Division receive major assistance from Ingathering funds. This translates into 2 million clients whose food aid value is annually \$4.6 million, and whose value in clothes, bedding, and furniture reaches \$5.7 million. Complete reports would define a stronger picture.

Strangely, some well-meaning advocates demean the Ingathering program. Should it be terminated, ACS Centres would all virtually close their doors. Few would ever agree to a paralysis of this proportion of our church's mission. Could anyone really believe that Ingathering is not evangelism—feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, and visiting those that are cast down? It is an integrated part of the Gospel Commission.

Here at home, the emergencies continue to be fueled by fires, hurricanes, twisters, floods and human tragedy that beggar description. Any thought of closing the Community Service Centres could be myopic. The cure is "no-nonsense" expansion. We need expanded contingency funds giving us the ability to meaningfully and quickly respond to major disasters.

And now to ADRA Canada. Beginning in 1988, ADRA and Ingathering became joint venturing partners. This year, 35% of the Ingathering funds raised, will be available for ADRA Canada projects. By 1991, the figure will reach a maximum of 46% for overseas projects and 54% for the home base.

At present, ADRA Canada is par-

ticipating in 81 projects in developing countries such as Ethiopia, Sudan, Haiti, Jamaica, the Philippines, Uganda, Mexico, Pakistan, and many others. Our hands do span the oceans!

Here are some of the challenges. Developing countries will need twice as much food as in 1980. 14 million infants and children die every year from malnutrition and preventable diseases—40,000 per day—1,666 every hour—27 per minute.

800 million people do not have health care of any kind. (Have you thanked YOUR doctor today?) The total amount of food produced in the world could feed the world twice over. Yet hunger persists. 1.4 billion people do not even have clean water.

The three sources of funding for ADRA Canada are: Ingathering, the Annual Disaster and Famine Relief Offering each May, and private donations. With these funds, ADRA Canada receives matching funds from CIDA (Canadian International Development Assistance) and the Alberta government. Other provincial governments may participate.

The "new look" Ingathering brochure has been most enthusiastically received and recognizes a number of Adventist photographers from coast to coast. Remember last year, a second printing was required to meet the demand.

This is "no-nonsense" Ingathering expansion, and this is the way it ought to be! This strong signal says how YOU feel about the joint venturing partnership of Ingathering and ADRA CANADA.

Last year, upwards of 750,000 Ingathering brochures reached about 1 home in 9 across Canada. This type of mass circulation surpasses that of the vaunted TIME Magazine in Canada. It would be so wonderful if this year your church helped to change the ratio to one in eight or even better, to one in seven! It is achievable, and Maracle Press would be delighted to do a second printing again this year!

Now, do you realize that the present \$25 per member objective was established in the late 50's? Why, that is well over 20 years ago, and it is as antiquated as the Tiger Moth Airplane. It is time to raise our sights and pull the trigger!

We must provide Canadians, ourselves included, with the opportunity to give as God impresses and to experience a sense of accomplishment. Those who solicit and those who donate are, in reality, saving lives by proxy. And what can be said for the enthusiastic support of the Adventist Educational system? Students, Faculty, Adventist Educators are all an integrated part of this program. Without their loyalty and dedicated support much of the enthusiasm and spontaneity would be missing!

Let us support our pastors, Church Ministry leaders and our educators in response to their annual Ingathering Campaign. Your church needs YOU! We will reach an annual million dollars in Ingathering soon. It is going to happen—why wait let's go for it this year! The needs are staggering. There is not one valid reason as to why the Canadian churches should not respond whole heartedly to this year's Ingathering/ADRA Appeal. Recent increases hardly cover inflation. Let's go now for a voluntary, super goal of \$1,000,000. We can do it by pulling together.

Pastors, Church Ministry Directors, Church Boards, Educators let's find new innovative ways to reach out and meet today's needs with today's dollars. The Ingathering program is the largest single community contact that our members are personally involved in, and we need to find exciting new ways to make our witness Christ-centered and welcome. We need an outpouring of creativity to bring new life to the campaign.

Everyone's help is needed. Working together, we can exercise our faith and demonstrate to the matching agencies, that the Adventist Church in Canada does genuinely care about the needs at home and across the ocean, and that their confidence is justified.

Will we accept the \$1,000,000.00 voluntary faith challenge? Church Ministries and ADRA are counting on our spontaneous response to the overwhelming needs. Let's adjust our plans and go for the \$1,000,000!

Sabbath Accommodation in Jeopardy

"We honour those who have lost their jobs trying to establish just principles for sabbathkeepers."

HE CHURCH IN CANADA was elated when the recent ruling of the Supreme Court of Canada in the case of O'Malley v. Sears ruled that employers were required to make reasonable accommodation for a person's religious day of worship. The case was out of Ontario and now may not apply in many provinces in Canada where the provincial human rights legislation makes an exception. In all jurisdictions the law says that an employer may not discriminate on the basis of religion-but in many provinces the law provides an exception where the employer has a "bona fide occupational requirement."

On August 10th the British Columbia Court of Appeal ruled that where an employer has hours of employment that are necessary to its operation and the hours of employment are generally applicable to everyone, an individual may not claim accommodation for religious practice since the hours of employment are a bona fide occupational requirement of the employer. The requirement to work therefore comes under the exception in the law.

The ruling is the result of an appeal by Larry Renaud, a Seventh-day Adventist janitor who worked for the School Board in Kelowna, British Columbia. After some preliminary attempts to come to an accommodation with the employer were unsuccessful Mr. Renaud was dismissed from his job after he refused to work on a Friday after sunset.

The court said that the employer required someone on the premises at that time, and had set shift arrangements for that purpose.

Therefore the employer had a bona fide occupational requirement that came under the legal exception provision. As such, the employer was under no obligation to make an accommodation. Karen Scott, Seventh-day Adventist lawyer representing Mr. Renaud at the Appeal, argued that before an employer can rely upon the exception in the law there must be no reasonable accommodation available. In other words, an employer should not be able to assert a time requirement on an employee who cannot work at that time for religious reasons—unless the employer first has taken reasonable steps to accommodate or can show that no accommodation is reasonably possible.

The Court disagreed, and in effect made a ruling that the requirement may be made by the employer in relation to the job, and if it is bona fide (in good faith) then it applies to everyone and no one is entitled to accommodation for reasons of conscience.

The ruling will probably be looked upon by employers as a legal justification to insist upon shift requirements in spite of conscientious objections. This is an ominous ruling for Seventh-day Adventists in many provinces. It will not only mean that Sabbath accommodation is more available in some provinces than others, but it also signals how quickly new legal rulings can alter circumstances for those who must keep Sabbath.

In British Columbia our members had been using the favourable ruling in the O'Malley v. Sears case to persuade employers to be reasonable in making adjustments for personal conscience; now our members are far more at the mercy of employers and their pre-scheduled shift arrangements.

Whether or not the Church sponsors, encourages or intervenes in an application for leave to appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada, in due course our highest Court will no doubt make a final ruling on the issue. We can only hope and pray that it will be more sensitive to minority individuals who have conscientious scruples. Meanwhile we honour the example of those who have sacrificed their jobs as well as the stress, time, and cost of judicial process in order to try to establish just principles for all sabbathkeepers.

Tired of Being Tired – Part 2

A HANDSOME YOUNG clergyman sat before me complaining of being all washed up. He figured he knew the problem but didn't know what to do about it.

Six months ago he had been assigned to a new parish, the first congregation that he had been entrusted with sole pastorship. He enjoyed his parish and his people.

Oh, there had been problems all right. In his judgement, his fatigue related to those problems, for he knew the difference between functional tiredness and organic tiredness.

He deserved, he thought, to have functional tiredness, the fatigue that comes with stress and stressors, an uneasy balance between psyche and environment. That's what he had, he was pretty sure.

He didn't even consider organic tiredness, that feeling that comes with a physical illness, be it multiple sclerosis or multiple myeloma, rat-bite fever or rheumatic fever, and hundreds and hundreds of others.

He had lost some weight, and his appetite wasn't robust. Following inquiry, he mentioned that his bowel movements looked strange and were unusually malodorous. A specimen of stool appropriately smeared, stained, and studied under the microscope revealed a parasite living free and exuberant in his intestine — Giardia lamblia.

A few days of treatment with the appropriate antibiotic and the memory of six months of fatigue quickly gave way to a new exuberance, the well-being of youth with a challenge.

This is an example of an organic illness, one that is capable of causing tiredness (along with a lot of other symptoms).

Attention to tiredness could be called "listening to your body's messages." So can pain. So can inappropriate weight gain and weight loss, and loss of appetite and excessive appetite. Listening to somatic messages often calls for action, and frequently it is your friendly family physician who can best initiate that action.

A few illnesses act paradoxically. For example, if the thyroid gland is working too rapidly (hyperthyroidism), we get tired. Conversely, if the thyroid is under active (hypothyroid), this too makes us feel fatigued.

The same with diabetes. If the blood sugar is out of bounds on the high side, we can have fatigue. When it plunges to the low side, again we are fagged.

The doctor's dilemma, and consequently the patient's, lies in attempting to determine which tiredness in which patient, demands expensive studies. Tests can be discomforting and inconvenient. If the tiredness is caused by stress, your doctor can forget the tests and simply assist you in rearranging your lifestyle priorities. If, on the other hand, the tiredness is due to physical phenomena — that's a different story.

Sometimes the dilemma can deepen. For example, let's suppose because of persistent stress the patient has developed a duodenal ulcer. Then the ulcer begins to bleed and anemia develops. Now the tiredness is directly related to the blood loss and the consequences that follow.

So what are the two major kinds of fatigue? Answer: Those related to stress or boredom, and those related to a physical illness.

And what can be done about them? Well, first of all, a firm diagnosis leading to appropriate changes in lifestyle priorities, or specific treatment for the illness causing the weariness.

In any case, heed your body, tired or not. It may have a message for you.

300 Churches in Canada

In the year 1848, Joseph Bates, carrying copies of a Sabbath tract with the long name "The Seventh-day Sabbath, a Perpetual Sign, from the Beginning to the Entering Into the Gates of the Holy City, According to the Commandment", journeyed to the Eastern Townships of Quebec and held meetings at East Angus. Two years later in 1850, the believers converted by Joseph Bates were privileged to be visited in Canada by James and Ellen White who travelled to Melbourne, Quebec following a meeting of Advent believers in Sutton, Vermont.

In this small group of Advent Sabbath-keepers, is to be found the roots of the Canadian Seventh-day Adventist Church. On September 30, 1877 in a stone school house near the home of William Booth, the Stukely & Bolton church was organized. By 1879 A.C. Bourdeau was able to report that there were ten Sabbath-keeping families in Sutton, fifteen families in Stukely,

> Hanna Hiebert 1941 – 1989

Hanna was born to Johann and Ella Foege on October 5, 1941 in Hoffwinkel, East Germany. At the close of World War II, she and her family, with the guidance of God, escaped to West Germany.

She was raised primarily by her godly grandmother, who many times helped her with her struggle of getting Sabbaths off from mandatory school attendance.

Hanna graduated from Marienhoehe Seminary in West Germany, having studied nutrition and home economics. Later she also took up nursing.

In April of 1960 Hanna immigrated to New Haven, Connecticut to assist her aunt. While there she became acquainted with Jacob Hiebert from Ontario, and on January 15, 1961 they were married. The couple made their home near Stratford, Ontario where Jacob owned a successful business.

Two children were born to the Hieberts, Juanita and David.

During the mid 1960's the Hieberts sold their business and returned to college to prepare for the ministry. Following Jacob's twelve families in the vicinity of Barford, plus ten more in and around Westbury and Eaton.

Sabbath work began in Ontario in 1850, two years after Bates entered Quebec. Soon other provinces east and west had ambassadors of the gospel carrying the Advent and Sabbath truth to their people.

The present Canadian Union Conference, embracing all Canada, came into existence in 1932. However, the first Canadian Union Conference comprised eastern Canada only, and was formed in late 1901 with 1,093 members. Six years later in 1907 the Western Canadian Union Conference was organized with a membership of 941. The merger of east and west occurred in 1932 and the records indicate a membership of 6,956 with 143 churches.

In 1942 while world War II was raging, membership had increased to 9,325 and three new churches had been added bringing the total to 146. Twenty two years later in 1964 the membership had almost doubled, having reached 15,926, and the number of churches had risen to 174.

We rejoice at the growth of Seventhday Adventism in Canada. By the end of the second quarter of 1989 the membership in Canada stands at 38,272. It is of interest that Quebec, the place where it all started in Canada, is the field where recent growth and the addition of several new churches has pushed the total number of organized churches to 300.

The admonition of God to Adam and Eve to "be fruitful and multiply" is being heeded by the "seed of the woman" in Canada.

She was bedridden for one year prior to her passing. However, she never complained, but tried to maintain a cheerful disposition.

On August 30, 1989 her life was ended as the deadly disease took its toll, but her hope in the resurrection when Jesus comes surpassed all her suffering.

One of Hanna's last conversations with her husband was, "I have confessed all my sins to Jesus and I know He has taken care of them. I will be awakened on that great resurrection morning with all of God's people. When I arise from the grave, the first thing I will do is look for you, my dear partner. Next, I will look for Juanita and David, our children."

With this hope in her heart, she closed her eyes in death. Memories of Hanna will linger on in the minds of her family and those who made her acquaintance. Hanna was in the process of writing a book about her thrilling life story, which Jacob will now endeavour to complete.

She leaves to mourn her beloved husband, Jacob; their two children, Juanita Patricia of Victoria, B.C. and David Roy of Oshawa, Ontario; her mother, Mrs. Ella Foege, of Bonn, West Germany; a sister, Mrs. Loni Teuber, also of Bonn, West Germany; four nieces and nine nephews. We say farewell until that special resurrection morning.



THE ADVENTIST COLLEGE IN CANADA

Opening Convocation

During the first week of college classes, an evening of dedication and a reception for college students, faculty and staff was organized.

Warren Trenchard, newly appointed Vice President of Academic Administration, was the key speaker. Trenchard's emphasis was on beginnings. The topic "In The Beginning Was The Word" was developed with John 1:1-5 as the textural basis. Lori Corbett, a Sophomore college student, played a piano solo from the works of Maurice Ravel. President Reo Ganson welcomed the students to the campus of Canadian Union College and challenged each one to excellence in academics and spirituality as well as an active involvement in campus life.

Following the dedication service which was held in the College Church, a reception was held in the College Cafeteria.

Enrollment Up

For the first semester of the 1989-90 school year, the enrollment of Canadian Union College increased by 16 students. Two hundred and seventy-eight are registered for college courses.

The largest number of students come from the province of Alberta, followed by British Columbia. There are 30 students from Ontario, 20 from Saskatchewan, seven from Manitoba, one from Quebec, five from New Brunswick, four from Nova Scotia, eleven from Newfoundland, one from the Northwest Territories and 15 foreign students.

In the new Master's Degree program in Marriage and Family Therapy there are 19 registrants which are not included in the total college enrollment figure. The new four-year degree in Business Administration has 23 students registered. Elementary and Secondary Education continue to be the most popular degrees offered on the CUC campus. There are 73 would-be teachers registered in the education area. The ministerial course has 24 students majoring in Religious Studies.

"We are encouraged by the increase in enrollment in our college," said Reo Ganson, President of Canadian Union College. "As one looks at the number of CUC graduates who are pastors and teachers in the Canadian provinces, it is abundantly obvious that Canadian Union College plays an extremely important role in the spread of the gospel throughout the provinces of Canada.


