The Wyoming Camp-meeting

Our good camp-meeting is now in the past, and the unanimous expression of those present was that it was the best camp-meeting ever held in this conference. The attendance was much better and more representative than we had expected. There were fifty delegates present, representing nineteen churches. Three new churches were admitted, the Carroll Church of eleven members and having a full set of officers, which is located about sixteen miles south and east of Sheridan; the Buffalo Church with seven members; and the Powder River Church, located about twelve miles east of Kaycee, Wyo.

The outside help was more than we have ever had before,—Elder Chas. Thompson, president of the Northern Union; Elder Russell, of our own Union; Professor Griggs, from Union College; Elder W. C. Hankins, who is in this country on a furlough from China; and also Mrs. J. P. Anderson, from China. The spiritual interest of the meeting was excellent. Very few left the ground without giving themselves to the Lord.

Brother F. Burton Jewell, who was our state agent four years ago, was present the last few days. He and his wife are under appointment to South Africa. and are booked to sail from New York, August 28, via England.

The business of the conference passed off very harmoniously. No change was made in the officers, except in the departmental secretaries, Prof. P. V. Thomas taking the work of educational and young people's secretary, and Brother E. H. Meyers the work of missionary secretary and canvassing agent, relieving Brother Fish, who takes up ministerial work. Elder Hale was chosen religious liberty secretary. The conference com-

mittee remains the same.

The president's report showed that there had been an increase in the membership and also in the finances over the previous year. The tithe receipts for the thirteen months ending June 30, 1913, were more than \$9,000. The amount raised for missions was nearly \$3,500, and the increase in the Sabbath-school offerings was 100 per cent over the previous year. The book work showed an increase of more than \$6,000 over the previous year, and the work in the conference office has increased twenty-five per cent during the past year.

About thirty-five family tents were occupied. There were over two hundred camped on the grounds the last Sabbath. There was received for missions during the meeting \$1.511.46, \$300 of which was cash, the balance being pledges. Of this amount, \$89.77 was the Sabbath-school offerings, and the balance was the midsummer offering. This is the largest amount ever raised at one of our camp-meetings. Surely we have reason to thank the Lord for the good spirit which was in the meeting. Not a word of criticism or complaint was heard in any way. The Lord is giving His people more of the spirit of unity and love for His cause.

On the last Sunday of the meeting,

nearly the whole camp went out to the Wyoming Intermediate School, where twenty-two were baptized. Most of these were young men and women in the strength of youth. One aged sister of nearly four-score years was converted and baptized. It was a meeting long to be remembered by all who were privileged to attend.

Every camp-meeting should be an object-lesson of neatness, order, and good taste. And in all our work we should present the discipline of organization and order.

Everything should be so arranged as to impress both our own people and the world with the sacredness and importance of the work of God. The regulations observed in the encampment of the Israelites are an example to us. It was Christ who gave those special instructions to Israel, and He intended them for us also, upon whom the ends of the world are come. We should study carefully the specifications of God's word, and practice these directions as the will of God. Let everything connected with the encampment be pure, wholesome, and cleanly. Special attention should be given to all sanitary arrangements, and men of sound judgment and discernment should see that nothing is permitted to sow the seeds of sickness and death throughout the encampment.

The tents should be securely staked, and whenever there is liability of rain, every tent should be trenched. On no account let this be neglected. Serious and even fatal illness has been contracted through neglect of this precaution.

We should feel that we are representatives of truth of heavenly origin. We are to show forth the praises of Him who has called us out of darkness into His marvelous light. We should ever bear in mind that angels

of God are walking through the encampment, beholding the order and arrangement in every tent. To the large number of people who come to the ground, all the arrangements are an illustration of the belief and principles of the people conducting the meeting. It should be the very best illustration possible. All the surroundings should be a lesson. Especially should the family tents, in their neatness and order, giving a glimpse of home life, be a constant sermon as to the habits, customs, and practices of Seventh-day Adventists.

There is nothing gained for a student in the preparatory grades to go to an advanced school, and according to the plan recommended by our educational department we are advising the parents and youth of these grades to attend the conference school in your home conference, but to all who are beyond these grades, we mention Union College as the school, planted under divine counsel, for the youth of God-fearing parents. Union College stands for the highest and noblest ideals in educational lines and character development. Find your place, and plan to be there this year.
