Our Temperance Campaign

We wish to call especial attention of the believers in Nebraska to the following temperance plans in which we hope that every church and isolated believer will unite to make Nebraska dry at the November election.

It will interest the readers of the OUTLOOK, no doubt, to know what we are doing here at College View.

1. We first presented to the church the need of having a temperance committee whose chairman would be the temperance secretary of the church. Accordingly, a committee of five was appointed.

2. Definite plans were then laid by our temperance committee for our summer's campaign as follows:

a. A Temperance Rally on Sabbath, June 17, at the regular Sabbath forenoon service. At this meeting the following program was rendered:

b. In July to have a Sunday night

Temperance Rally for the whole town. This will be conducted by a branch of the Dry Federation.

c. Another Sunday night rally a short time before election this fall, with our own speakers.

d. To start immediately a campaign to sell "The Shadow of the Bottle," the Temperance *Instructor*, and *The Signs* of the Times Prohibition Special in Lincoln and surrounding towns.

e. To give away just before election some temperance tracts in every home in Lincoln.

3. Fourth of July we had a church outing at one of Lincoln's pretty, quiet parks, and after a delicious luncheon we had a patriotic program. After some entertaining and patriotic speeches. Brother McEachern, our Union Conference field missionary secretary, spoke on the subject of "How to Make Nebraska Dry in 1916." Brother McEachern presented his theme in a taking way and closed by introducing "The Shadow of the Bottle," and our other temperance literature as the most effective way of educating the people aright. A report of the patriotic and temperance speeches appeared in the city papers the next day.

We are organizing here in College View for definite service, and we appeal to the dear brethren and sisters throughout Nebraska to co-operate with us and begin some similar programs and local campaigns. Now is the most opportune time for us to show our colors in Nebraska. We appeal to you to come to the front in this temperance campaign and show your true spirit of loyalty to the cause of temperance in helping to banish the saloon, the greatest enemy to the American flag.

Recently one of our canvassers was in a home with a leading church member and a minister of one of the firstday churches, and in their ignorance and prejudice they showed a very bitter spirit toward Seventh-day Adventists. They did not hesitate to denounce those who are spreading this blessed gospel light as proselyters and classed them with saloon keepers because of our opposition to religio-political Sunday laws. While the enemies of the truth have never found us favoring the saloon, yet many of them do not hesitate to misrepresent and cast reproach upon our unpopular cause.

The above incident ought to be an eye-opener to us as a people which will lead us to come out boldly in this fight against the liquor traffic and declare ourselves in unmistakable language in favor of absolute prohibition.

Next week we will explain more definitely the plans for the Nebraska campaign.

Falls City

Our series of meetings began June 25, with but a fair attendance, despite the fact that we had advertised thoroughly both in the daily paper and with hand bills. However, at this writing things are much more encouraging.

Last night we spoke on the subject of Christ's second coming, to the largest audience we have had in this place. The tent was well filled, besides there were a number seated on the grass, and several auto loads; all of whom gave marked attention to the discourse. We might add that all of these, except eight were people not of our faith. In fact, we are almost doing pioneer work, as there is not one Adventist living in this city. However, there are three families living in the country who can get in to the meetings once in awhile.

We have had a great deal of opposition to our work by the preachers of the city, who have combined in a big union meeting every Sunday night in the City Park. Besides this, there is in progress in this little city of perhaps six thousand people, a Pentecostal tent meeting, a Holiness hall meeting, and a Spiritualistic tent meeting. However, the people are begining to see the difference in the character of the various meetings, with the result that the interest and attendance at our meeting is on the increase. For this we thank the Lord, as it has been in answer to our prayers, coupled with hard work, that things are beginning to look more favorable.

While of course we cannot tell at this time what the results will be, we are determined by God's help to make the truth so clear that everyone who is honest will accept it. To this end we ask the prayers of the OUTLOOK family.

Camp Meeting Location

At the time of our last committee meeting, the matter of the location of the camp meeting was considered. There was a difference of opinion by the committee as to whether the meeting should be held at Crawford or at Bridgeport, and as the committees were about equally divided, it was decided that the matter should be placed before the churches in the conference by a letter from the president. Accordingly, such a letter was prepared and sent to all the churches in the latter part of May. This letter gave some reasons for holding the camp meeting at Crawford and also reasons for having it at Bridgeport. The churches were asked to vote upon the matter and their decisions be sent in to this office. Up to the present time, returns have been received from the following churches in favor of having the meeting at Bridgeport, Nebr., viz.: Broadwater, Buffalo, Garland, Hemingford, Lisco, Minatare, and Mitchell. The churches of Bridgeport and Crawford were not considered, as they would vote for their home town. The Whitney church voted for Crawford. The Sheldon church notified us by a letter that no action was taken. At present. July 10, no word has been received from the other churches. The time of holding our meeting is fast drawing on, and many of our people are anxious to know the location in order that they may make their plans accordingly. The vote already secured gives a majority for Bridgeport even though the churches not reporting were to vote for Crawford, which is altogether unlikely, as some of them are located nearer Bridgeport. Therefore, I have been authorized to announce that the camp meeting will be held at Bridgeport, Nebr., September 21 to October 1.

4. Inasmuch as the Spirit of Prophecy tells us that "nothing is of greater importance than the education of our children and youth," we urge that an effort be made to place every child of Seventh-day Adventists under the care of a Christian teacher: and

Whereas, the supervision of the educational work needs a normal-trained. experienced teacher to organize new schools, help the teachers, and lift the standard of our school work.


We Recommend, That an educational superintendent be selected for this conference who will give his entire time to this work.

This will add a further large expense. And this is not all. Twenty-five or thirty must follow this party within a month or two.

The demand oon cur mission board are great. At present there is a deficit of over \$122,000 in the General Conference treasury to say nothing of a surplus of about \$109,000 that has been used which was on hand at the beginning of the year.

The amount that we are behind in our union is \$14,315.13. Let every church and every conference give to its fullest ability, that we may no longer help to make this deficiency, which sum the General Conference needs in carrying on its work.
