OUR MEMBERSHIP

THE church membership in Wyoming at the close of the year stood at 646, which was a net increase of seventy-three members for the year. There were eighty-two baptized during the year, which was an increase of twenty-five over the previous year. A few of our members moved away from the state, as the records show that fifty have transferred their membership to other churches. However, forty-one joined with us; so we had a net loss of only nine through removals. Six of our members passed away during the year, and five were removed from our membership rolls because their addresses were unknown after two years of effort to find them.

We look forward to the adding of many more members during 1938, and

we solicit the assistance of every church member to search out the honest in heart, that they may be saved for the kingdom of God.

1 LAY EVANGELISM

Our lay preachers in Kansas are a faithful group of workers. There are about fifteen who are right in the midst of real work at this writing, and two are anxious to get started.

The reports for the last two months indicate that these fifteen workers preached 153 sermons, with a total average attendance of 183 people in their combined audiences. Ninety-nine meetings were held, ninety-seven Bible studies given, and 291 missionary visits made. Three converts were baptized for these workers. a number are now keeping the Sabbath. and others are greatly interested.

These interests and labors are in all parts of Kansas, from Liberal to Coffeyville, and Wakeeney to Kansas City. This combined work equals about the labors of one full-time minister if this record were placed on a yearly basis. Let us remember these faithful lay workers in our prayers.

COOKING SCHOOL

A HEALTH cooking school, sponsored by the Greeley church and conducted by the Boulder-Colorado Sanitarium group, was begun January 26 at the light and power company model kitchen in Greeley.

It was felt that, because there is a large number of new members in the church, some definite, constructive health instruction is needed. Too often we speak of health reform and stop with that, leaving the people without instruction as to how to prepare good health foods. It was with this in mind that the health cooking school was instituted.

The light and power company lounge and model kitchen is being furnished free to the school, even to dishes and silverware. One of the local groceries was glad to furnish grocery supplies free for the demonstrations.

At present there are seventy-nine women enrolled in the class, with a twenty per cent increase to date in attendance over the first enrollment. In the near future it may be necessary to call a halt on enrollment because of lack of seating space. Not only are the ladies of the church in attendance. Many who are not members are coming, and they express themselves as being intensely interested in the instruction.

Mrs. John Cooper is conducting the lectures on balanced diets, and Mrs. C. A. Skinner is giving the food preparation demonstrations. They are being assisted by nurses in training. Both Mrs. Cooper and Mrs. Skinner are on the instructional staff of the sanitarium at Boulder.

The people of the church at Greeley feel indeed privileged to be able to have such competent instruction on the vital subject of health.

A HUMMING CENTER

WE DO not know how soon the activities of the press may be curtailed. The Pacific Press is now prepared as it never has been before to help our people do great things with the message-filled literature. During recent months the Press has been greatly improved within and without. The new machinery equipment insures better and larger service in the production of tracts, books, and periodicals.

Our people in the West should keep the Press a humming center of radiating influence by day and by night. Every month in 1938 should witness increased activity in the publishing house at Mountain View. The times demand it, brethren, The people all about us in every community need just what our literature can bring them—warnings, light, hope, comfort, the things of enduring satisfaction.

Our own homes need the new things coming weekly from the Press. Every Adventist family should have a growing library of our literature for personal study and for lending to friends and neighbors. To keep abreast of fulfilling prophecy we must read and study. The youth in our homes will welcome and read the new things that the Press is preparing especially for them. The children should have a little library of their own. Encourage them to form the habit of collecting good books. It will go far in holding them to the cause.

Our relatives and friends need just what we need—a literature of righteousness in their homes. Every good book has a saving influence. How impoverished are most of the homes about us in the matter of spiritual reading! A book or periodical or tract placed in a home at an opportune time may change the career of an entire family. Such things would happen oftener if we all were more active in the literature ministry.

Our communities need more systematic attention. The new tracts, attractively printed in larger type, illustrated, modern in appearance, are just the thing for systematic distribution. The Truth for Youth series of tracts (something entirely different) should go to every home in your community and in mine. 
FIELD PROSPECTS GOOD
