AT THE recent Fall Council arrangements were inaugurated for a national hookup of the Mutual Broadcasting Company of New York City with members of our General Conference, in which the message that makes us a distinct people will be proclaimed in practically every state and hamlet of our nation. This is one of the most wonderful things that has ever been inaugurated by our people. No doubt this message, proclaimed in this half hour of national broadcasting for America, will reach other countries as well.

Arrangements have been perfected now for Elder H. M. S. Richards of California to be the broadcaster, and Elder F. W. Detamore of Kansas City will work with him as associate and service secretary for this program. The first broadcast will be on Sunday evening, January 4, and each week thereafter for the next fifty-two weeks. It will come over the Mutual System of stations in our field, which will be announced later, from 6:00 to 6:30 each Sunday evening, for stations in the states other than Colorado and possibly Wyoming. The broadcasts in those states will be given at the 5:00 to 5:30 hour or 8:15 to 8:45.

Cards on which our people can write to interested friends and neighbors encouraging them to tune in on this broadcast, with other information, will soon be forwarded to our churches. We hope everyone will receive these and take a part in advertising this wonderful opportunity of having the message proclaimed in every home in the United States. So when the postal cards and other information are received, do what you can in awakening an interest among your friends, neighbors, and relatives by having them tune in on this hour

She Couldn't Do A Single Thing!

YEARS ago, there was in northern Minnesota a woman who was an Adventist. She lived in a heavily timbered country. Adventist neighbors were few and miles and miles away. It seemed as though there was no possibility for her to do any missionary work, but her husband hired some men for the logging camp that winter. She saw

little of these men for they stayed in their camp. But in the spring, before they left, she went to them and gave one of the three men a bundle of well-assorted tracts. He put them in his pocket, took them back to North Dakota, gave them to his father, who was a Baptist lay preacher—in fact, the only preacher in hundreds of miles on the plains of North Dakota. He devoured the contents of these tracts, began to preach them to his congregation Sunday after Sunday. The result—the community began to keep the Sabbath. In the spring, a nice number of people were baptized. To this day, there is still a church there—not only one but three. Of that family that became Adventists, there are five ordained ministers and a great number—I know not just how many—who are Adventists because of what this isolated sister did by watching every occasion offered her. The writer of this article is one of the ministers.

This woman never heard of what happened because of her missionary work. We never learned her name. She may have died discouraged, thinking there was no use doing anything, but will it not be a pleasant surprise someday when she meets in the earth made new community after community of Adventists who became such because of that one simple act?
