## Easy Plan For Selling Literature

#### Fifty Cents a Week For Missions

Missions goals in giving have for many years helpfully influenced our church membership. We rejoice in seeing a tremendous increase in mission funds, as by faith we have reached and advanced these goals, and we note with interest the development of this plan through the years.

Forty-three years ago the General Conference Committee voted "that plans be immediately set on foot to arouse the denomination to united action, in raising for foreign missions an amount averaging not less than ten cents a week for each church member."—Action of Foreign Mission Board, New York City, July 31, 1889.

This goal was kept before our membership until 1911, when in July of that year the following action was taken:

"That beginning with January 1, 1912, the rate of ten cents a week per member for missions, be raised to fifteen cents per week per member."

This was maintained until 1917, when the rate was advanced to twenty cents per week, per member, then to twenty-five cents for 1918, to fifty cents for 1920, and to sixty cents for 1921. Rapid indeed were the actions taken to increase the goal from fifteen cents to sixty cents per week, per member. The sixty cent goal was maintained for 13 years. Through the depression and the greatly decreased earning power of our people, this goal was reduced to forty cents. It has remained there for nine years, that is from 1934 to 1942.

Financial conditions in recent years have greatly improved, and at the Autumn Council held in Cincinnati in October last, the following action was taken:

"That beginning with January, 1948, the missions goal for the North American Division be increased from forty to fifty cents per week, per member."

We are very happy to pass this word on to our people, for we know that any advance in service or in giving, is of encouragement to them.

Several of our conferences for some time have been reaching the forty cents per week, per member for missions. A number have actually reached the fifty cents per week per member goal during 1942.

With money now circulating freely, and with the consciousness that this is the day of our opportunity to further the work of God, both by giving of our tithes for the needs at home, and the the giving of our missions offerings for the needs abroad, shall we not see in this added goal a further incentive to more liberal and systematic giving?

#### S. S. Reading Circle

The purpose of the Sabbath School Reading Circle is to stimulate interest in becoming better Sabbath school officers and teachers, by reading the Sabbath school reading course books for 1943. Beginning with January and con-(Continued on page 2) It has been estimated that 75% of all goods sold to consumers in the United States during the last 20 years has been sold on the installment or easy payment plan. The public has been educated to this system of buying. Considerable experimenting has been done on installment selling of our literature in many parts of the United States during the last few years. A few changes were suggested to those who pioneered in this experiment. Recently a fine working plan was adopted throughout North America and was labeled the "Easy Payment Plan."

At present the plan is used in areas of dense population. Some work the plan in rural territory by collecting through the mail. The latter method has not proceeded far enough to publicize. But use of the plan in cities has brought great blessings to the literature ministry.

The Selling Process:

It is the same as when selling on the "cash-on-delivery plan." We still must "sell" the benefits the books offered. The difference is that on the Easy Payment Plan we deliver the books upon receipt of a small down payment (usually \$1.00 or \$2.00) and arrange for the balance in the form of weekly, bi-weekly, or monthly payments. We add 20% to the catalog price of the literature, which pays for time spert in collecting.

Advantages to Colporteurs:

- An increase of 100% to 500% in value of orders.
- 2. Almost a 100% value of delivery.
- 3. A boost in commissions.
- Frequent collections make the colporteur a friend of the family and give him opportunity to answer the customers' many Bible questions, also remove prejudices, and arrange for Bible studies.
- Often the customer asks the colporteur to deliver a book to a friend whom she has convinced should have a book. The sale is already made.

- Once an individual buys on the Easy Payment Plan, it is easy to sell him other books by just continuing the payments. He becomes almost a permanent customer.
- The Book and Bible House finances the colporteur.
- The colporteur receives an advance commission in the form of a drawing account each week. It amounts to 40% of the value of the books and magazines delivered each week. (Remember, the literature is reported delivered when it is placed in the hands of the customer upon receipt of the down payment.)
- By receiving a 40% drawing account, the other 18.3% of his commission aids in reducing his Book and Bible House bill, so that when he is out of debt with the Bible House, he has hundreds of dollars worth of books in customer's hands that he has paid for but that the customer have not yet fully paid for. Those books are his stock.
- The 40% drawing account has a ceiling of \$35.00 per week. If 40% of the value of deliveries amounts to more than an average of \$35.00 per week, all above the \$35.00 is applied on the colporteur's Book and Bible House account. If the colporteur is out of debt, then all above the \$35.00 is credited to his favor and he is encouraged to accumulate a credit reserve of \$100. All above the \$100 can be drawn at the end of each month. Thus one sees that plan is built upon sound financial bases for both the colporteur evangelist and the Book and Bible House:

#### Farewell, Missouri

A LITTLE more than two years ago we took up the work as pastor-evangelist for the Central Church in St. Louis. These two years have been very happy years for us. Never have we found in our work for God such a loyal, faithful, liberal constituency as in the St. Louis churches. If any good has come from our short ministry there, the glory must first be given to God, who has manifestly blessed our efforts, and secondly, to the members for their loyal, faithful support.

As we humbly recount the blessings of God upon the work in St. Louis for the past two years, we must recognize His guiding hand in the various phases of the work. The debt on the church building was liquidated, and the church dedicated in October of 1941. During this time more than two thousand dollars has been spent on church repair and up-keep, aside from the regular monthly maintenance expense. At the time of this writing, the large, beautiful organ has just been completely rebuilt with modern electrification at a cost of more than \$1,200. While this instrument is the third largest in the city, it is now rated as the finest, most modern organ in St. Louis. The Central Church can rightfully be proud of this wonderful instrument.

All financial aspects of the church work show a strong gain, and at present there are substantial reserves in all local funds. Truly the Lord has blessed the church as it has gone forward by faith to do greater things for God in the various lines of endeavor. Harvest Ingathering, tithe, Sabbath school of-

ferings have reached an all-time high-God has truly prospered the church in all its financial obligations.

The St. Louis Junior Academy now has the largest enrollment in years. The building has just been completely repainted and repaired throughout. Brother and Sister Lee Taylor and Miss Joyce Gunderson, are doing splendid work, and this promises to be the best year in the history of the school.

The Lord has manifestly blessed the program of evangelism during the past two years. A radio broadcast has been conducted by the writer for nearly two years. This program, known as the Bible Auditorium of the Air, has been broadcast over the large Blue-Network Station, KXOK, 630 kilocycles. Along with the broadcast, a large Radio Bible Correspondence School has been carried on. This school has been productive of souls. During the large effort conducted by the writer and Brother Charles W. Teel, in the fall of 1941, almost forty precious souls were baptised from our Bible School of the Air. As a result of this and smaller efforts, nearly eighty precious souls have been baptised, largely due to the radio broadcast. At the present time the broadcast is heard daily at 9:15 a.m. Sunday through Friday. More than seventy-five hundred people are now enrolled in the Radio Bible School, Miss LaVerne Turner is efficiently carrying the work of the Bible school. The receipts in offerings from the radio audience and our members is now averaging more than one thousand dollars a month.

As a result of the radio program and the Bible school, many hundreds of people are studying this message, and have indicated a definite interest in it. The interest in the city of St. Louis is so large that it is impossible for the conference workers to follow it up adequately, so to meet the need for more workers a radio seminar, consisting of our faithful lay members in the church, has been organized and trained to assist in following up the interests in the city of St. Louis. As these workers go from door to door, they are finding many precious souls ready to unite with the remnant church. We believe there is now a tremendous harvest of souls waiting to be garnered in.

Responding to the call of the General Conference to take up the work as Radio Secretary for the South American Division, we must now bid farewell to St. Louis and the Missouri Con-

ference. This is not easy, Our hearts are bound closely to the work in St. Louis, and to leave now is a difficult experience. However, as we take up a larger work in South America, we do so with the assurance that the work will be carried forward strongly by our successors. We are happy to know that Elder and Sister C. R. Harrison, formerly pastor of the large Broadway Church in San Diego, California, have responded to the call of the Missouri Conference to take up the work in St. Louis. They are faithful and strong workers, and for them we ask the same cooperation, help and loyal support that have been afforded us. We feel confident that the work will go forward in a much stronger way under their leadership. Pray for them and the work in St. Louis. Also remember the work to which we are going in South America.

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



The interest developed to an attendance of ten to twenty-five outsiders a night with an attendance of fifty to two hundred, including our people. Union College Gymnasium

The opening of Union College's recreation hall has been set for Saturday night, December 5, at which time the first lyceum course number will be held. The construction of this building was begun early in the spring, and it is now on its final completion stretch. An average crew of twenty men, mostly students of the college, have worked continually since the foundation was laid.

Strictly modern, with lamella trussed roof, the new building was erected with a view of eliminating all obstructions such as posts or supports in the auditorium. The roof is supported by eighteen concrete pilasters in the walls of brick.

The gymnasium provides 122 feet by 87 feet floor space for skating, basket ball, and other recreations. One hundred twenty pairs of skates have been secured in readiness for the opening date. The building has a seating capacity of 2000 people. The platform will hold a chorus of 125 persons. In addition there are three storage places, a kitchen and dressing rooms.

Funds for this gymnasium were received from persons throughout the Midwest. Much of it was received from the city of Lincoln alone. The liberality of those who gave will be greatly appreciated by the students in the pleasant months to come. The total cost according to H. C. Hartman business manager and treasurer of the college, was \$36,000.

#### Attention! Prospective Dental Students

Because of the war emergency the Atlanta-Southern Dental College is on an accelerated program, and the next date for the admission of freshmen is March 17, 1948. Any students who will be prepared to enter at that time should make application at once as applications are received from many more individuals than the school is able to admit. The next date of admission following the one given above will be November, 1943.

This is a question many young menthroughout the nation are facing at this very hour. Within a very short time many of our boys eighteen, nineteen, and twenty years of age, will be drafted into the armed service of our country. A large number are getting into serious difficulty because they have not been classified properly to begin with. Further, they have not been classified properly because they have not filled out their questionaire correctly.

I call attention to five items: (1) affidavit of membership cards, (2) how to fill out your classification blank, (3) how to make appeals, (4) a statement of our denominational position, (5) explanation of the difference between volunteering and being drafted. We have a supply of leaflets in our office that will help you to answer some of these questions and to deal with the above problems. The leaflets are: (1) "Information and Instruction for Seventh-day Adventist Noncombatant Selective Service Registrants," (2) "Filling out the Special Form for Conscientious Objectors," (3) "Seventh-day Adventists and Civil Government." Then we have two other leaflets, "Sabbath Rulings in Army and "Ouit Yourselves Like Camp," (Continued on page 10)
