## Straws In The Wind

ALMOST every day comes added evidence of the threat to the people's liberties so long enjoyed in our fair land. Not only is there a threat to liberty but the fact is apparent that freedom and liberty as set out in the Constitution are actually and surely being deleted from our political and social economy. Not so much by act of Congress as by court decision and by executive decree.

A case in point is the exclusion of the press and the public by arbitrary executive decree from the international food conference now in session in this country. This is a blow aimed directly at the freedom of the press for which no good reason has been offered. Nor indeed can any valid reason be given. There is nothing of a military nature to be discussed at the conference and no harm could possibly result should the entire proceedings be published to the entire world. On the other hand there is every reason for the proceedings of the conference being open to the public and to the press as the matters under consideration are of the deepest interest to the people. Administration official hostility to the press does not justify a denial of the rights of the people by those placed in charge of the government.

A second "straw in the wind" is the recent decision by the supreme court sustaining complete control of broadcasting by the FCC (Federal Communications Commission). The FCC was created by act of Congress and consists of three members appointed by the president and are under his jurisdiction. This agency now under the supreme court ruling has the power to dictate what shall or shall not be broadcast over the air. It constitutes supreme authority in the matter of what the American people shall be permitted to hear over the air in the way of news or what not, a most flagrant violation of the right of free speech. This, notwithstanding the law creating the FCC, conveys no such authority.

Under this supreme court ruling the press can now be regulated in the same

manner. David Lawrence in his paper, the United States News, says, "This sad turn of events, a tragic milestone in the history of freedom of speech, comes at a time when our leaders are exorting the people to make sacrifices for the preservation of the "four freedoms."

In the history of nations the loss of free speech and free press has always been followed by the denial of religious liberty. We would do well to watch closely for signs of coming events. It is not so well recognized as it should be that there are forces diligently and continually at work looking to the destruction of our form of government. Evil forces are ever busy picking at the foundation stones seeking to destroy the underpinning of a government brought into being through the divine providence of God.

It did not just happen that there was inscribed on the liberty bell the words of sacred writ—"Proclaim liberty throughout all the land unto all the inhabitants thereof." It was not by chance that the guarantees of freedom of expression and of religion were written in the American Constitution. These great fundamentals of Americanism did not originate with the founders of this republic. These mighty principles of truth are of divine origin and in the providence of God were delilvered to this nation to be exemplified to all the world for the blessing of all mankind and for the glory of God.

To this people in these last days is committed the task of teaching and defending the principles until the work of God is finished in the earth. May the dear Lord give us the spirit of faithfulness and devotion until He comes.

## Looking Forward

THE patrons and friends of Shelton Academy will be interested to know something of the plans that are being made for the progress of their school, which was established and is maintained to give all the help possible to the young people of Nebraska. In a time such as

this our school stands ready to serve; indeed it is a haven of refuge for our youth. May the Lord make it just that for our Nebraska young people.

Just a word about two new teachers. Edward Wines, dean of boys, and Alfred Morford, teacher of mathematics, biology, and woodwork, both graduates of Union College, will join our staff next year. Before many weeks pass the other vacancies will be filled. Teachers can come and go: students come and are graduated; but this change of personnel does not affect the purpose for which Shelton Academy was established-to give our children a Christian education, "That our sons may be as plants grown up in their youth; that our daughters may be as cornerstones, polished after the similitude of a palace.'

Agriculture is the A, B, and C of education. Here at S. A. we are very fortunate to have an agriculture department, fostered by one who has had years of experience in this particular section of the county and who, with student help, is at present doing his best to promote an active farm program.

Should you step in to visit us you would see a happy group of boys and girls working faithfully at their tasks. You could see, growing nicely, about thirty acres of potatoes, fifteen acres of sugar beets, over eighty acres of corn, several acres of garden produce—peas, sweetcorn, beans, tomatoes, sweet potatoes, and other common garden vegetables. From the garden comes a large portion of food, both fresh and canned, used in our school kitchen during the year.

By the time this is read, plans will be well laid for our summer work program. However, if there are young men who would be interested in coming to school to work, feel free to write us immediately, stating your age and the grade you have finished in school. We are anxious to get as many young men as we can use who are at least sixteen years old to work, beginning next month. At present we have a number of young people who have come to work up a credit for the coming school year. Furthermore, the credit earned is kept here on our school books so the student knows that at the end of the summer he will be able to attend school

If ever there was an opportunity for young men and young women to get a Christian education, that time is now. On the other hand the world is bidding

high for the services of our young people, but the cause of God calls for greater sacrifices to be made so that His work may be finished. Can't the spirit of sacrifice be revived? Can't we do more to save our boys and girls?

If you are interested in attending Shelton Academy this coming year, whether you care to work here this summer or not, let us hear from you. Already many applications from prospective students have come to us. Send in for your application blank now.


#### America and the Future
