Overseas Needs and Requests

Now is the time for all of our good church members to revive interest for the distressed and to come to the aid of their brethren and sisters in foreign lands! For a time we asked that clothing not be sent to our warehouses as we were not able to get the goods shipped out fast enough to make sufficient room for new contributions; but now we are happy to announce that we are able to get shipments out quite rapidly, which gives ample room in the warehouses for all clothing that should come in. So we are urging that everyone send in as much as possible to the warehouses.

Since the war has closed, opportunities for getting the clothing overseas are opening up as rapidly as we can take care of them. More and more requests from distressed countries are coming in to us, and since shipping space on the boats is easier to secure now, our workers in the warehouses are working full speed in assorting, baling and getting the shipments ready for sailing.

The cold weather is coming on now and in most of these countries the winters are quite severe. We are therefore appealing to each one to continue to give as liberally as they can so that we may help to alleviate some of the suffering of these needy people. It is necessary that some of the clothing be such as to meet the needs of the cold winter months. Woolen and flannel clothes would be most useful. However, shoes and clothing of all kinds for men, women and children of all ages would be acceptable. Please be sure that the clothing is clean and in good repair. Articles that are old, worn out and dirty are not sent across. So please see that all clothing donated is in good condition.

Up to date we have sent over one hundred tons of good used clothing to the liberated countries of Europe and to the Philippines. Ten tons are now on the way to Italy and ten tons to Greece. Negotiations are being made at the present time for shipments to go to Rumania and Jugoslavia. Up to now it has been impossible to reach these countries, but we hope to have the goods on the way within a short while. New requests for help have come to us from China and the islands of our Portuguese Union Mission. The General Conference War Relief Committee has voted to send several tons to these ports as soon as we can secure space for shipping.

It does our hearts good to receive words of thanks from the countries that have received the clothing. For the benefit of those who have so generously donated the clothing, we quote here from several of the letters we have receivd at the General Conference Home Missionary Department.

Elder F. Voorthuis of the Netherlands Union Conference on August 16 wrote: "Your letters have been received. Yesterday I heard from the Welfare Committee of the Netherland State that the first shipment of goods had arrived in Rotterdam. We will soon receive the goods and give to our members. You can't imagine how thankful the people will be when they get some clothes and shoes. We need them all very much. We have not been able to buy anything for years and we hope that God may bless you all for your kindness to help us over here. My wife and I lost everything, too. We were bombed on March 3, 1945. They tried to get the V-1 but did not have success, so we were hit. But, thank the Lord, our lives were spared. With the wish that our gracious God may bless His work everywhere and give you in your great country and us in our little responsibility His wisdom and His spirit."

Elder F. Charpiot of France on August 19 wrote:

"We will try to have some good pictures taken of the shipment and send them to you. As Mr. Nelson told Dr. Nussbaum that there would probably be a chance to send some new cloth for suits, I have just sent him a list of our French workers with the hope that some of them at least will be able to receive some material for a new suit. Most of us have hardly anything to wear, and it is impossible at present and still will be impossible for many months to come to find material for suits in France. We surely are very thankful for the fine help that

As Sister White has said: "The words of inspiration, pondered in the heart will be as streams flowing from the fountain of life."

If plans have not already been made in your church, let the home missionary department of the church and the Missionary Volunteer society organize at once for this effort.

The American Bible Society has sent quantities of their bookmark leaflet to the home missionary secretaries of all our conferences to be distributed to the churches, and the Review and Herald is sending our leaflet, "The Bread of Life." Last year we distributed to our people a half million of each of the two leaflets used. This year we have orders for a million, so we must double our efforts.

If the leaflets have not been received by your church, write your conference home missionary secretary at once, for this work should be done before Thanksgiving.

"We are hoping, if you are not already a daily reader of the word of God, that you will decide to continue right through the year 1946. Here is a little leaflet, "The Bread of Life," which sets forth the greatest importance of Bible study, and also has a list of all the chapters in the Bible, so that you can check off each chapter as read. You can read the whole Bible through in a year by reading three chapters each week day and five on your day of rest. I will be glad to leave leaflets for other members of your home, if desired. we are receiving from our dear brethren and church members in the United States. We still have quite a number of American soldiers coming to church in Paris and other places. We, of course, wish that all of them might return to their homes soon, but it will be a sad day for us when they take their leave. We have learned to love them and appreciate their presence and their fine spirit very much. Several French people coming to our meetings now have been interested in the message by the missionary work done by some of our American boys. We are sure that a number of souls will be baptized as a result of the presence of our American soldier boys."

And from the Philippines came this word from Brother V. C. Medina on July 24: "I am informing you that the clothes that you wrote me about on March 5 of this year are here already in the Philippines and they are stored in the warehouse of the Philippine Bureau of Public Welfare here in Manila. This shipment of clothes is already in the care of Elder L. C. Wilcox to be distributed among all the missions of this union. We thank you very much for this shipment of clothes."

Our churches are also responding in a wonderful way to our appeal to send parcel post packages addressed to individuals in some of these countries. One sister in Washington State sent us the following letter: "Send me the name of a family in Greece so that I can send parcel post packages. Winter will soon be here, and every day counts. As a matter of fact, you might send several names as there are others who are eager to get packages on the way. I have some sweaters and other articles of clothing, but would like to know the ages or sizes of the members of the families. Besides clothing I am going to send an extra box of concentrated food. such as dried fruits, malted milk, soup powders, Spanish rice, Savita, onion flakes, parsley flakes, prepared pudding powder, etc. Also preparing to send needles, thread, pins, tape, buttons, razors. razor blades and soap, and other articles which do not take up much room and will be appreciated. If you do not have the name of a Grecian family, I'll take a name from some other country, preferably the Balkans or other Catholic dominated countries where I believe the people have a harder struggle. Please reply soon, as I am anxious to get the packages on their way."

We are looking for many such letters as this, for we have several hundred families representing Italy, Greece, France, where the names and ages of parents and children are given, and the need is urgent. Children's clothing, layettes, shoes, toys and other things should be included. Secure as many names as you can care for from your conference home missionary secretary, or send your request to the General Conference Home Missionary Department.

We cannot expect our people to continue to give forever, but for the present we urge that you weary not in your well doing, for never before have the words of the Saviour meant more than at a time like this when He said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, ye have done it unto Me."

For the last few weeks it has been my privilege, in company with other conference workers, to visit many homes in the interest of our educational institution at Enterprise and to familiarize them with the fact that we have outgrown the present dining room and chapel. For a long time the need of a larger and more commodious building has been felt by the board of directors and our brethren throughout the field. It has been most inspiring to observe the keen interest our people have in this institution and in the young people of the denomination.

As the needs were presented, our people responded most nobly in their offerings to help this institution build up to what it should be. Very few families visited have given less than \$100 toward this project. Not only have we called on members of the church, but on business people and others who are acquainted with our work, and in many instances they have given good-sized checks for the development of our school. It may appear to be a real sacrifice at this time for some to give \$100, \$200, and \$500, but when we view the whole matter as God must view it, we will feel as most of the donors upon whom we have called, who expressed their feelings by saying that their gift is very small compared to the needs and their interest in the project. Nevertheless, they apologetically hand us a check for \$100 or \$200.

Many times invitations have come to us to call again if further funds are needed. It is a pleasure to belong to a people whose eyes are fixed on one great objective in life; it is a pleasure to go to their homes and to talk with them about eternal things and about character building.

Many more homes in the Kansas Conference will be visited by representatives in the interest of this work, and they will talk over with you your family educational problems and the conference family educational problems.
